FAMILY PLACE

The Angleton Branch became a Family Place Library in 2018. Through the years, we have embraced the philosophy of learning through play by implementing an early childhood play area that is available any time the library is open, as well as growing our early childhood programming by offering age-specific programs for infants, toddlers, and preschoolers.



Our families also love attending the twice a year parent/child playtime program, 1-2-3 Play with Me. For four weeks each spring and fall, families can come play together while meeting other families and representatives from local community organizations.

Our Family Place community partners include Brazoria County WIC, Angleton ISD, Brazoria County Head Start, Brazoria County Health Department, BACH, Brazoria County Dream Center, Icon Dance, and Brazos Smiles Dentist Office.



STORYWALK® AT DICKEY PARK

The StoryWalk® was created through a partnership with the City of Angleton Parks and Recreation Department and the Angleton Friends of the Library. The first one, using temporary signs, was placed in Dickey Park in July of 2020 as a means to continue engaging with patrons during the COVID pandemic. Permanent signs were purchased thanks to a matching grant between the Parks Department and Library Friends, and they were installed in 2021.
