### **[COMMENCEMENT]**

**Mayor Gilbert** called the meeting to order at 12:00 PM. He made a note that he would be leaving at 2:00 p.m.

**Town Manager Vosburg** said that this is one of two major meetings done throughout the fiscal year, the second is the Budget Retreat, typically held in February, and with two new Council Members coming then, several of the items will be covered in this meeting and a

more robust retreat will be in February. He introduced the Director team and introduced the new Finance Director, Jon Griffin.

**[FINANCIAL ADVISORS - COMMUNITY INVESTMENT FUND (CIF) AND CAPITAL PLAN REVIEW]**

**Financial Advisors Douglas Carter, DEC Associates Inc., Andrew Carter, DEC Associates Inc. and Jeremy Carter, DEC Associates Inc.** gave an overview, laying the groundwork of where Apex is financially and for future planning. ## Current Policies

- ▶ Current financial and debt policies
  - ▶ Debt policies
    - ▶ Net Debt as a percentage of total assessed value should not exceed 2.5%
    - ▶ Debt Service as a percentage of total governmental fund expenditures should not exceed 12%
    - ▶ 10-yr principal payout ratio target of 55% or better
    - ▶ End of fiscal year CIF fund fund balance coverage ratio policy – 50% or better
  - ▶ Reserve policies
    - ▶ “Available” fund balance at least 20-25% of annual operating budget
      - ▶ If drops below this level, Town has 36 months to restore
    - ▶ Excess funds in “available” fund balance over 30% is to be transferred into the CIF Fund after completion of annual ACFR (audited annual financial report)

    - ▶ Requires prioritization and timing of projects in CIP



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1       **Councilmember Gantt** asked if certain bonds were only for certain purchases, and  
2 how they are used.

3       **Mr. Carter** explained the difference between General Obligation bonds (GO), Limited  
4 Obligation Bonds, and two-third bonds. He said that GO bonds require voter approval and  
5 can fund any project listed on the ballot question, Limited Obligation Bonds (LOBs) do not  
6 require a vote and may be used for most Capital projects at the discretion of the Board, and  
7 Two-thirds bonds are another financing tool that allows issuance of up to two-thirds of the  
8 previous year's debt service without voter approval. GO bonds are for projects like streets  
9 and sidewalks that don't have physical assets to serve as collateral and LOBs can be used for  
10 building projects that qualify as assets.

13       **Councilmember Zegerman** asked if a penny tax could be \$12 million, why does  
14 another penny only generate \$11 million.

15       **Mr. Carter** said that it has to do with the ratio with the 50% payoff to the debt service.  
16 He said it gets way far out where there is a 50% fund balance and the CIF starts flashing and  
17 then the pennies are added and it is then getting to the guard rails with debt service ratio  
18 grows a little faster.

19       **Councilmember Mahaffey** said that last year there was a CIF created and a 7 cents  
20 funding which included a penny and a half, which was a little aggressive, he asked for a sense  
21 of how that level of funding for a town is the size of Apex compared to other towns this size.

22       **Councilmember Gantt** said that Holly Springs is putting in more.

23       **Mr. Carter** said that they had a large project and increased it 3 to 5 pennies by vote  
24 and it seems higher because of the parks. He said that Apex's funding is in a good place but  
25 there is room to be prepared and may consider CIF. He said it depends on what percentage  
26 of the budget goes to Capital and there is room before getting to the guard rails in CIF.

27       **Councilmember Zegerman** asked if instead of putting pennies all in one year, about  
28 staggering a penny in for each year, and would this help with a negative financial impact.

1       **Mr. Carter** said that this approach may be helpful and this would be something that  
2 would come back to the February budget meeting to evaluate. He said the more revenue you  
3 have, the more you can have in funds.

4       **Deputy Town Manager Purvis** said that there are multiple options that the current  
5 version reflects, and it would be a separate piece for Council to consider a GO approach  
6 where that additional tax impact is not included in the current mode.

7       **Director Jessica Hoffman**, Budget and Performance Management, gave an overview  
8 of conclusions using the model that DEC Associates has created with steady State and there  
9 are three pages, with the first two pages showing all the projects that are fundable with the  
10 funding source. She said that the City typically allocates about \$7 million annually in pay-go  
11 funding, provided through General Fund transfers or capital allocations within the operating  
12 budget included in grants and other governmental funds, all of the debt models are included  
13 that are currently anticipated. She said that there are rolling stock loans for the larger  
14 equipment. She said the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> page is not based on cost, it includes how fund year and  
15 two are funded and this is how staff went through and assigned funds to projects, and with  
16 these funding guidelines is what could potentially be funded and this is the amount that is  
17 left. She said this gives you the overall picture of the total that can be found.

18       **Councilmember Zegerman** asked if items could move between funded and  
19 unfunded areas and what criteria was used to determine what should be funded and stay  
20 unfunded.

21       **Director Hoffman** said the first project funded was pay go, then projects with  
22 deadlines are prioritized first and then current projects are prioritized. She said that other  
23 projects are prioritized in their entirety to make it a little simpler, but this is flexible.

24       **Town Manager Vosburg** said that it can be changed in the future.

25       **Director Hoffman** said that this method was just to get a total baseline and around  
26 \$215 million can be funded in this model, and then there would be \$300 million unfunded,  
27 this is an overall total and will be prioritized through the process.

28       **Councilmember Mahaffey** asked if the model included the GO bond for the PO work  
29 and to clarify the General Fund transfer.

30       **Director Hoffman** explained that these items were funded through direct transfers  
31 from the General Fund into Capital projects each year.

32       **Mayor Pro-Tempore Gray** asked why the same project is in both the funded and  
33 unfunded categories.

34       **Director Hoffman** said the project is in both categories because the total cost of the  
35 project is \$2 million, but only \$1 million was funded in this fiscal year and the remaining part  
36 of the project will be completed in next fiscal year.

37       **Town Manager Vosburg** asked Assistant Town Manager, Marty Stone, to talk about  
38 projects that have increased costs recently.

39       **Assistant Town Manager Stone** spoke on the most recent project which was  
40 estimated at \$450,000 and is now in at \$1 million. He said that construction costs are  
41 extremely high, far above what they were a decade ago.

1           **Councilmember Zegerman** asked if it was possible to bring some of the projects in  
2 house.

3           **Assistant Town Manager Stone** said that is a construction item and some projects  
4 could be done by staff, like a small water line extension but projects like grading a site could  
5 not be done in house.

6           **Councilmember Zegerman** said that things that are being done repetitively may be  
7 worth hiring for that skill and renting the equipment.

8           **Councilmember Gantt** said this plan and planning through 2040 will help decide  
9 these types of things.

10          **Town Manager Vosburg** asked staff to discuss concerns regarding the interplay of  
11 the model where there is an operational need that isn't associated with the project and isn't  
12 reflected in this model.

13          **Mr. Carter** said there are operational needs that aren't associated with the projects  
14 that aren't reflected such as staffing a new building, for example the new school being built.  
15 He said that when projects start, the money is issued for the facility and it takes 18-36 months  
16 to build, this money is in two budget years. He said it can fund what Council wants it to fund,  
17 but it is not the intent. He said that the model does not include operational costs, but it could  
18 at Council's direction. He said the model is primarily focused on debt service but is now  
19 being expanded to incorporate the City's existing pay-go funding which is approximately \$7  
20 million annually, which brings both debt and pay-go together allowing the decisions about  
21 whether to fund projects through debt or pay-go to be evaluated together rather than  
22 separate processes in the future.

23          **Councilmember Gantt** asked what Cary's situation was with new generation needs,  
24 and GO bonds, two of which failed on the ballot, and what lessons can be learned.

25          **Councilmember Mahaffey** asked if that was more of a political question.

26          **Town Manager Vosburg** said it was partly political and partly mechanical, with the  
27 volume of what they asked for possibly intimidating voters, it was a big ask of \$500 million.

28          **Mayor Pro-Tempore Gray** said that the model being used seemed the appropriate  
29 one from the departmental standpoint because in 5 to 10 years if a new Council comes in and  
30 changes the priority list then money is reshuffled and that delays projects, which will cost  
31 more. He said this model seems to create a longer form of stability and ease of planning,  
32 giving the ability to maintain a good picture of how much the cost will be and how stable the  
33 cost will be.

34          **Councilmember Gantt** asked if the recommendation was to spread out the projects  
35 and plan out further.

36          **Mr. Carter** said yes, this is what the tool helps you do.

37          **Councilmember Gantt** asked how much was on the General Government Capital  
38 Model.

39          **Mr. Carter** said it has pay go and debt and it's about \$7 million.

2 **Town Manager Vosburg** asked what the next steps are.

3  
4 **Director Hoffman** said that next steps are in December and will get Council  
5 highlights on project submissions from this year and will bring the results from the resident  
6 budget priority survey as well as staff scoring. She said Council will take that information and  
7 the project prioritization survey and Council will have all of the information to prioritize  
8 projects for February's budget meetings where discussions will be had with placement of  
9 projects more realistically.


10 **Town Manager Vosburg** said that Googling other communities in the area will show  
11 that they haven't done what Apex is doing in taking financial planning to this level. He  
12 thanked Council.

13 **Councilmember Zegerman** said that he likes this model because of the steady state  
14 baseline investment that staff can plan for or count on.

**Councilmember Zegerman** asked why Apex is doing events like ghost tours instead of businesses and the community and how does the events become more permanent instead of one-off events that people can do on their own.

**Ms. Raschke** said that the dinner and movie series is something to look into seriously because it is something that a lot of different municipalities are currently doing and the art museum does it. She said that she likes the idea of self-guided tours but wants to make sure they are being used. She gave a list of ideas for events and how the public can engage staff but these events she highlighted she isn't sure that businesses would do.

**Town Manager Vosburg** said currently businesses aren't involved and there is a void, but it doesn't mean that they won't get involved. He said that if Apex does the logistics of an event that asked businesses to partner that may be a better way to get them engaged. He said that the presentation shows where there is a lack for capital to invest, but there are spaces that aren't utilized 100% that could be possibly used.

**Councilmember Gantt** asked what the plan looks like as to the town's involvement.

**Ms. Raschke** said it depends on the fact that there isn't a lot of space for different activities and the idea is to use Apex's space and bring in different groups and businesses in town and surrounding areas to draw people to Apex with small businesses downtown and beyond. She said this had not been done before so it is unsure on how this will be done.




**Councilmember Gantt** said recent discussions by State Representatives about the possibility of realignment of hospitality tax to be based on population growth could result in additional funding and the projects should be ready to submit.



3 **Town Manager Vosburg** recognized Craig Setzer, Director of Parks and Recreation  
4 and Assistant Town Manager John, as this has been a collaborative effort today and wanted to  
5 give them an opportunity to speak.

6 **Director Setzer** said that this is part of the master plan and there are spaces in the  
7 park that aren't used to capacity, but ball fields and gyms are packed all the time. He said  
8 there is a little space at the Senior Center typically at night. He said that this is an opportunity  
9 to embrace the entertainment in Apex but it should be a private public combination and they  
10 are stretched from a special events perspective.

11 **Ms. Raschke** said that she has been working with Nora Skinner and has talked with  
12 the Environmental Food Symposium and they want to come to Apex, making this a Triangle  
13 event.

14 **Councilmember Gantt** asked if there were programs that had been considered  
15 similar to Launch Apex that focus specifically on supporting service-based small businesses to  
16 utilize resources.

17 **Ms. Raschke** said that a lot of other towns have that and businesses are already  
18 meeting and doing this and Apex is in a transitional period currently. She is not aware of a lot  
19 of forums or ways that businesses are getting together. She said the avenues for businesses  
20 to come together and create things like this may not be available, but it's also a private piece.

21 **Director Setzer** said that there are communities that have rivers, oceans and lakes  
22 which will draw the community in, Apex has a railroad and this falls on Apex to draw people in  
23 and the events that are offered are one way to draw people in.

24 **Councilmember Zegerman** appreciated the creativity. He said that it would be  
25 interesting to see the short-term plan. He said they should look at events that were sustained  
26 with public private partnerships and with the full intent to transition to private overtime. He  
27 would like to see more details over the year or so.

28 **Ms. Raschke** said that most events in the presentation could be done if there was a  
29 Special Events Coordinator, there is already a plan in place and this could be done quick. She

1 said that the events listed in the New Special Events slide could be done now if there was one  
2 more staff person.

3 **Mayor Gilbert** asked how the plan may include different communities and how they  
4 will evolve over 20 or 40 years. He also asked if public safety staffing costs were factored into  
5 the planning process.

6 **Ms. Raschke** said that other than the festivals most of that work is with Special Events  
7 and Parks and Recreation and she gave some examples of events that would not need public  
8 safety.

9 **Director Setzer** said that parking facilities need to be increased to help with  
10 additional events.

11 **Mayor Gilbert** asked if there was another option besides bluegrass for music.

12 **Ms. Raschke** said yes, there were bands that play music just for children and many  
13 other options. She said that if they start doing events the downtown businesses may get more  
14 involved and partner with Apex to support these events.

15 **Councilmember Gantt** asked if there could be a survey to see what the community's  
16 interests are and what may be missing in Apex.

17 **Ms. Raschke** said that there was an unofficial survey with the Cultural Advisory groups  
18 but there could be a more formal survey to help inspire people to see what they would like to  
19 see in Apex.

20 **Assistant Town Manager John** said it would be good to take this from the Master  
21 Plan and recap it in the survey for what the community would like to see in Apex.

22 **Mayor Pro-Tempore Gray** asked if there was a survey of the facilities that are available  
23 and the likelihood of them being able to support an event.

24 **Ms. Raschke** said there are different ideas, Sue Helton Park would not be a good  
25 location for a large event but Salem Pond Park might be and this is where the details would  
26 come in to determine more location options.

27 **Mayor Pro-Tempore Gray** said it would be a benefit to understand what will be  
28 needed for personnel anticipated and locations available for budgeting purposes. He  
29 supports this idea but would want more information.

30 **Ms. Raschke** said that they were taking a phased approach and would need another  
31 staff member either way for what events are being held currently. She said that this would not  
32 be done all at once, and once Phase I was complete then that would be assessed to move to  
33 Phase II.

34 **Mayor Pro-Tempore Gray** said that with small events, like the Candidate Forum, there  
35 were 2 Police Officers there, and how that impacted the Police Department's operations is a  
36 question to have since there is a cost associated with these events.

37 **Director Setzer** said that costs can be built per event.

38 **Ms. Raschke** said that staffing numbers can be given for the events that she has  
39 presented and an estimate of cost. She gave some numbers based on size of events and said  
40 that she would get an estimate for Council.

1       **Assistant Town Manager John** noted that no matter what size the event is public  
2 safety should always be considered and those costs should be factored into the budget for  
3 the event.

4       **Mayor Pro-Tempore Gray** said that not only public safety but also other departments  
5 that are involved need to be factored in.

6       **Ms. Raschke** said this is why these events should start slowly; the other piece is if  
7 there is alcohol. She said that they have done some research on how to have alcohol at the  
8 events and what that would entail.

9       **Town Manager Vosburg** said it sounded like there was general support for this  
10 concept and there are some events already being planned that can be accomplished with  
11 existing staff and they would continue planning for more robust events and what that would  
12 look like. He said this would be discussed further during budget discussions.

13       **Councilmember Mahaffey** asked if there was an ask for additional staff in Phase I.

14       **Ms. Raschke** said that they were asking for additional staff when Council is ready.

15       **Councilmember Mahaffey** said to hire the position now.

16       **Mayor Pro-Tempore Gray** asked if they were asking to hire staff immediately.

17       **Councilmember Mahaffey** said if the process is started now, it will take several  
18 months to bring on that person.

19       **Councilmember Mahaffey** said that there are a lot of good ideas and this was an  
20 awesome presentation. He said this is a heavy lift for a lot of people over a long period of  
21 time and the popup type events may be easier and these have been well received and have  
22 usually done well.

23       **Mayor Pro-Tempore Gray** said that these are things that Council would need to see to  
24 justify the budget.


25       **Town Manager Vosburg** asked if Council was potentially open to a position sooner  
26 rather than later.

27       The consensus of Council was yes.

28       **Councilmember Killingsworth** said that it wasn't expected to be able to do these  
29 events without another staff member and the town should move forward with that.

30       **Councilmember Mahaffey** said that event attendance has grown significantly and the  
31 Town needs additional staffing support today and not just for future expansion, because  
32 current events are reaching capacity.

**[NORTH CAROLINA CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL UPDATES]**


**Town Manager Vosburg** said that Assistant Town Manager Stone will be giving an update on North Carolina Children's hospital and where the project is at this time.

**Marty Stone**, Assistant Town Manager - Development and Operations Portfolio gave an overview of the progress with the NC Children's Hospital in the following presentation:



3 **Councilmember Zegerman** asked if there is a trench being dug, could there be a  
4 plan for the reverse to drop a second pipe in there so we don't have to dig a hole.

5 **Assistant Town Manager Stone** said the more direct route would probably be to use  
6 some of the corridor that will be used to get into the plant with the temporary line but the  
7 route that it would take to get the reused water back to the hospital would most likely be  
8 down on Dead End Prince Road but they would utilize anywhere they can.

9 **Councilmember Zegerman** said if there is an opportunity to trench and drop one line  
10 into the ground this is the suggestion.

11 **Assistant Town Manager Stone** said that they were looking at all options. He said  
12 that they were in the process of hiring a staff member that should be on board on December  
13 27<sup>th</sup> to help with the Big Basin project and other projects.


14 **Mayor Pro-Tempore Gray** asked if Apex would be providing power.

15 **Assistant Town Manager Stone** said that is the plan.


16 **Councilmember Zegerman** asked if the physician's building will become operational  
17 before the main hospital.

5 **Councilmember Gantt** asked what the future choices that the Council would have  
6 with this project, for example transit or greenways other than what was done at the December  
7 9<sup>th</sup> meeting with the rezoning.

8 **Assistant Town Manager Stone** said that the transit would be talked about at the end  
9 of the presentation.

10 **Town Manager Vosburg** asked for a show of hands from the leadership team that this  
11 project would significantly impact your department in the future. He said that most of the  
12 hands are up so there will be multiple points from that perspective on staffing and decisions  
13 as it relates to stations and transit.

14 **Councilmember Gantt** asked if it would have an operational impact more than a  
15 policy choice.

16 **Town Manager Vosburg** said that it is true, it would also have a staffing and  
17 budgetary impact as well.

1       **Councilmember Mahaffey** asked what the effect on the operations of the rest of the  
2 town was.

3       **Town Manager Vosburg** said impacts are already being seen on staff and it is pulling  
4 resources, this is huge piece of growth.

5       **Mayor Pro-Tempore Gray** said that it is a realistic expectation that there will be an  
6 increase in at least the major departments because this will absorb everyone's time, so being  
7 staffed is important.

8       **Town Manager Vosburg** said this is a great point and this Strategic Planning meeting  
9 specifically is to keep help with planning and the impact.

10       **Councilmember Zegerman** said that between now and 2033 they should start  
11 layering in the operational support and other support from the town.

12       **Councilmember Mahaffey** asked if any of these could be contracted, as opposed to  
13 hiring a full-time person which may take six months to get on board and then also leading to  
14 the possibility of being overstaffed in three years.

15       **Assistant Town Manager Stone** said that with Veridia and other ongoing projects for  
16 development that this was the start of at least 10 to 15 years of solid work and it's going to  
17 change which departments are affected. He said that Water Resources have got plans and are  
18 working on those now for the Big Branch water and sewer needs.

19       **Councilmember Zegerman** asked what could be expected to have to layer into the  
20 various departments over the next couple of decades as some of these developments are  
21 coming.

22       **Assistant Town Manager Stone** said that they are currently updating staffing plans  
23 which means that once the plans are finalized then the Master Space Plan Study that was just  
24 completed will be outdated.

25       **Councilmember Zegerman** said that multi story buildings should be planned.

26       **Assistant Town Manager Stone** said that they are planning on multi story buildings,  
27 right now they are looking at possibly increasing the footprint by combining the warehouse  
28 with the fire station by adding a couple of bays and some other things.

29       **Councilmember Killingsworth** asked if there were any discussions about expanding  
30 down 55 for traffic in respect to Wake Tech, the school, and hospital that are coming.

31       **Russell Dalton**, Traffic Engineering Manager, said that the traffic study was just  
32 submitted but as an overall Master Plan for Veridia we do have some framework structure that  
33 is being followed and will be reviewed to make traffic recommendations for the opening site.  
34 He said that some portions of NC 55 widened, and the HL0007 DOT project is a major  
35 interchange intersection upgrade at Technology Drive, a four-lane connector of Forest Light  
36 Way up to Jesse Drive to Veridia Parkway and it will connect to 540 so that is given a lot of  
37 options for people locally to go north and not have to be on 55 to 540. He said that NC55 will  
38 continue to be very busy but there will be alternate routes to avoid this.

39       **Councilmember Zegerman** said that he had not heard how the bridge over US1  
40 would be impacted and that he would like to see some bike lanes somewhere in this  
41 rendering especially on the north south corridor going into town along Veridia Parkway.

1       **Councilmember Gantt** asked could there be an interchange if it is far enough away  
2 from the 540 interchanges.

3       **Mr. Dalton** said that it would not be far enough away, but the Engineer that worked  
4 on Grace Christian and Seymour PUD did look at the regional model and the volume on  
5 Veridia Parkway and that road was downgraded from a four-lane to a three-lane road, the  
6 four-lane road only extends up to just south of US1 and transitions to a three lane road based  
7 on volumes of car, Perry Road is the major four lane road all the way up now.

8       **Councilmember Gantt** asked if Perry Road was in proximity to the 55 interchanges.

9       **Mr. Dalton** said it was actually a weaving section to 540.

10      **Councilmember Gantt** asked if it could be an in and out like on Wade Avenue.

11      **Mr. Dalton** said that it was not looked upon very favorably.

12      **Councilmember Mahaffey** asked if Jesse Drive for Phase II is under the CIP for the  
13 future or would it need private development.

14      **Mr. Dalton** said that there is a section of Jesse Drive both east and west of 55 that  
15 Veridia will not be building, they will build Forest Light Way but there will be a gap. He said  
16 that much of Phase II will be built by private development and it will be very expensive so this  
17 has been pushed out.

18      **Councilmember Mahaffey** asked if it was considered important for overall traffic to  
19 the site or is it more for 540.

20      **Mr. Dalton** said that for the overall network it's important for the future but not  
21 necessarily essential for this site.

22      **Councilmember Gantt** asked if the hospital has had discussions with Apex about the  
23 needs for hotels, restaurants and shops to the east they will want or need.

24      **Assistant Town Manager Stone** said they do not yet have numbers on that.

25      **Assistant Director Amanda Bunce**, Planning, said that they have not solidified their  
26 vision for what they want to do in West Village. She said that it may include hotels and  
27 restaurants.

28      **Councilmember Gantt** said that hospitals across the country presumably have  
29 amenities close by.

30      **Assistant Town Manager Stone** said that RXR has stated that their vision has changed  
31 but have not provided what that vision is.

32      **Councilmember Gantt** said that planning was for them to do.

33      **Assistant Town Manager Stone** said yes that it would be up to RXR for the planning  
34 but they could have more units now than previously planned, but they haven't confirmed this.

35      **Councilmember Gantt** asked if there were any grade separated crossings at Jessie  
36 Drive, Veridia Parkway, and the hospital road.

37      **Assistant Town Manager Stone** said that not that he was aware of.

38      **Councilmember Zegerman** asked if there could be a roundabout at Jesse Drive and  
39 Veridia parkway.

40      **Councilmember Gantt** said that it would be 5 lanes. He said that it would be a perfect  
41 place for a roundabout.

1       **Assistant Town Manager Stone** said that they are still in the process of making  
2 decisions which also includes adding an extra wing to the hospital in a future plan.

3       **Councilmember Mahaffey** asked about having to hire 30 plus people across every  
4 single department for this massive project that's not yet taxable, and having to explain to the  
5 citizens that taxes will be raised three or four cents.

6       **Councilmember Zegerman** said that there may be revenue produced along with it  
7 even though it's not direct.

8       **Councilmember Gantt** said hopefully citizens will see how amazing and important  
9 this is for Apex, the region, and the state once it opens.

10       **Town Manager Vosburg** said their vision is already changing and the fact that they  
11 did this deal, they are going to make a lot of money as a result of this and Apex is already  
12 seeing the spin-off impact from the houses that they will sell in the area, and they may be  
13 more now than before.

14       **Mayor Pro-Tempore Gray** said that it is understood what is happening and they can't  
15 continue to live in the past of how they think things are operating, this is a new steady state  
16 and it's a bigger steady state than Apex has ever had, and the personnel needs for each  
17 department isn't only driven by Veridia or other developments, Apex is at the point to  
18 consider the personnel impact.

19       **Councilmember Mahaffey** said that it may come a time when there are 35 staff  
20 members or more added to departments along with benefits and there will be costs  
21 associated with this.

22       **Councilmember Zegerman** said that the growth of the staff is typically directly  
23 correlated with tax income. In this case, that represents growth coming from other resources,  
24 like practitioners in the hospital not necessarily from the grounds that the hospital sits on and  
25 the surrounding services which is a more difficult story to articulate.

26       **Mayor Pro-Tempore Gray** said it will come down to the Council articulating this and  
27 they are depending on the departments to explain why they need the extra staffing because  
28 they want to be good stewards of the tax dollar.

29       **Councilmember Mahaffey** said that they didn't want to get into a position where  
30 departments are understaffed.

31       **Assistant Town Manager Stone** said that as construction starts there is a program  
32 available to provide help in finding help for staffing, but there hasn't been much success  
33 finding or accessing it.

34       **Councilmember Gantt** asked if they aren't trained properly.

35       **Assistant Town Manager Stone** said that it more about the availability.

36       **Councilmember Gantt** asked if Holly Springs would let them borrow some people.

37       **Assistant Town Manager Stone** said that the Children's Hospital in general is a  
38 project that's going to cost hundreds of millions, billions of investments from the State level  
39 and they don't want to be in a position where Apex is not able to handle the capacity at a  
40 certain point and then creating delays, costing the developers and the state millions.

41       **Councilmember Zegerman** said they have to think outside of the box, like  
42 contracting some of the pieces out.

**Councilmember Killingsworth** said that this should move forward in a timely manner but not rush things so there is no regret later.

**Assistant Town Manager Stone** said that there is a bike plan in this but this is not the final plan, staff is working with greenway connectivity and bike paths to create connectivity.

**Councilmember Gantt** said that pedestrian items would be great here too.





**Assistant Town Manager Stone** said that they will be recommending at December 9<sup>th</sup> Council members remove from the transit plan the bus/rail station that is in the middle of the NCC property but it will be replaced with a mobility hub closer to 55.

**Planning Director Dianne Khin** said that staff are working closely with the RXR to get the SD plan language correct for the transportation plan but it is in very early stages and it will come to Council in December. She said the thought is that the bus transit center would allow enhanced transportation, and this would be worked out with the regional partners but it would not be complete this year.

**Assistant Town Manager Stone** said that this was the number 1 of the conversation on how it would be addressed.

**Councilmember Gantt** asked where the hub may be located and if the hub would end the route and be the hospital and go through that hub as one cohesive route.

**Assistant Town Manager Stone** said that it is believed that there will be connections.

**Director Khin** said that they are still working through the exact language.

**Councilmember Gantt** said that this is important to this development and they intend on using it.

1       **Director Khin** said that staff at large hospitals particularly use transit because the  
2 traffic is so difficult.

3       **Assistant Town Manager Stone** said that RXR is very committed to bus transit within  
4 Veridia as a whole.

5  
6       Mayor Pro-Tempore Ed Gray called for a recess at **2:36 p.m.**

7  
8       Council reconvened the meeting at **2:53 p.m.**

9  
10 **[YEAR-IN-REVIEW ACTIVITY]**

11  
12       **Town Manager Vosburg** gave an update on Year-In-Reviews. He started celebrating  
13 successes over the last year and presented a video, then picked a few directors to talk about  
14 their top three to five successes over the last year.

15       **Director John Mullis**, Public Works, highlighted two of the four divisions which are  
16 Facilities and Fleet. He said that one issue was an IT server room at PD and Facilities jumped  
17 in to work with Communications coordinating with other departments, as they had to bring  
18 one unit down and replace another one. He said the coordination was a big event. The  
19 second success was working with Park Maintenance building improvements with addressing  
20 elevated humidity. The staff and contractors worked together to improve that situation. He  
21 said on the Fleet side they received the Geotab Innovation Award for excellence, which is not  
22 only a national award, it's an international award. He said that Geotab's the leading telematics  
23 provider and Fleet won in a Public Fleet small municipality category, which is huge. He said  
24 that the other success for Fleet is the development of Fleet policy, an AVL policy, which was  
25 presented to management for review. He said it will address a lot of important issues  
26 regarding the town's vehicle fleet.

27       **Director Stacie Galloway**, Communications, highlighted three projects that were  
28 successful this year. First was the Local Spot Campaign, and a strong public recognition at the  
29 farmer's market. The second was the Saunders Lock campaign which was a large undertaking  
30 and the third was internal support with work for Infor across the organization with the  
31 Communications team.

32       **Director Erika Sacco, IT**, highlighted contract negotiations and working with Budget,  
33 noting that \$143,000 was saved. She then highlighted working with Spyglass to identify every  
34 old AT&T line. She thanked Councilmember Mahaffey for his push for smart cities; the  
35 Innovations team was created from that and now there is Security and Innovations teams and  
36 they created the parking app, and are working with some people in the community that do  
37 Parks apps. She said that the largest accomplishment is the ERP implementation which is still  
38 being rolled out. This was in partnership with many departments and a lot of work went into  
39 that.

40       **Director Craig Setzer**, Parks, Recreation, and Cultural Resources, gave highlights of  
41 the successes for the past year for Parks and Recreation, there were 2 Street Hockey Rinks in  
42 Partnership with Carolina Hurricanes. Council adopted the pricing policy for program rental

1 fees and they are heading in the direction of a fee study for fee in lieu. He noted there was  
2 another picket fence at Jaycee Park at the softball field, and another cricket pitch was coming.  
3 He said that programming increases in athletics by 10%, Seniors increased by 22.22% and  
4 Specialized recreation increased by 17%. There was 54 Town and Community Special events  
5 completed this year, the current West Street site plan is in development in TRC, and the  
6 Hunter Street bike track public engagement has been started.

7 **Director Dianne Khin**, Planning, gave highlights for the year, including adoption of  
8 the Western Big Branch area plan and the associated changes to land use, transportation  
9 plan, the Apex Transportation prioritization Study, and all of the Public Outreach in the report  
10 for last fiscal year. She further highlighted the Apex Mobility Hub Study in Downtown Apex,  
11 creation of the Apex Coordination Team Act to increase collaboration on public outreach and  
12 engagement, and is planning an engagement expo for the community which is a large  
13 project and is projected for the winter of 2027.

14 **Director Marla Newman**, Community Development and Neighborhood Connections,  
15 gave highlights for the year, including onboarding of Ask Apex Town services specialist,  
16 updates to the Housing Plan and Affordable Housing Incentive Zoning Policy, and she  
17 thanked Council for the purchase of the 13 acres on View Street for staff to start looking at  
18 how they can be more active in providing more housing options in Apex.

19  
20 **Town Manager Vosburg** thanked all that shared their highlights for the past year. He  
21 also thanked Council for allowing staff to do these types of sessions.

22 **Mayor Pro-Tempore Gray** spoke on behalf of Council and said that he has had the  
23 pleasure of working with great leaders. He said that it was important to recognize those who  
24 contribute to leadership, he presented a five-pointed star which is part of the military culture  
25 of coining, which he explained what that was to show that you were part of your unit and say  
26 "Hey, you're one of us". He gave one to Town Manager Vosburg and thanked him for his  
27 leadership and direction and focus for Apex. He presented one to Director Dianne Khin,  
28 saying that she gives up herself and she raises up other people, and thanked her for all that  
29 she does.

30 **Councilmember Killingsworth** said that she is so amazed at the people in this  
31 meeting that they make Apex great!

32  
33  
34 **[INITIATIVES PRIORITIZATIONS ACTIVITY]**

35  
36 **Randy Vosburg**, Town Manager, presented the initiative list for the last two years and  
37 the current year for the Council to do a visual survey to see if the initiative has been  
38 accomplished or is well under way, or if the initiative hasn't been done, they will be coded to  
39 reflect the answers starting with Fiscal Year 23-24. He said there were about 30 initiatives on  
40 these lists and staff believed that about 10 are left to be completed.

41 **Councilmember Gantt** asked about the historic marker program, and said it didn't  
42 seem like that many had been done.

1       **Director Khin** said it is a reimbursement program which has now gone up to 100%  
2 from 50%. She said they have had people talk to them about it but not end up applying. She  
3 said that St. Mary's has an approval but they haven't put that up yet. She said that she may ask  
4 at the end of the year to use the funds for the Tunstall house or other Town locations if there  
5 are unused funds.

6       **Councilmember Zegerman** liked that idea.

7       **Councilmember Gantt** said that the town-initiated ones may be appropriate.

8       **Town Manager Vosburg** said it sounded like a good plan for the end of the year.

9       **Director Khin** said yes it would take a few months, so she would like to start that  
10 planning and have it ready in January to utilize the funding by the end of the year.

11       **Town Manager Vosburg** said that increasing elementary school's SRO's attempted to  
12 be done in recognizing that gap, there was a special project initiated and they engaged the  
13 School Board. He said it was felt that the School Board received it as SRO's being replaced  
14 with civilians, but the idea was the engage retired law enforcement professionals if a full-time  
15 SRO was unable to be funded. So, the options were that Town Council fund those SRO's or  
16 choose another staff as an alternative.

17       **Councilmember Killingsworth** said that she hadn't supported needing SROs in  
18 elementary schools, that it was about relationships that are fulfilled when you have an SRO  
19 that is able to rotate through the elementary schools. She said there are other sworn officer  
20 positions that need to be filled first, which is more important to the community rather than  
21 SRO officers being at an elementary school.

22       **Councilmember Zegerman** said he liked the alternate approach of retired law  
23 enforcement due to the Police Officers needed in the community.

24       **Councilmember Gantt** asked if Chief Johansen had any thoughts on this topic.

25       **Chief Johansen** said that he would be supportive of either option. He said that there  
26 would be sworn staffing priorities in his opinion that would supercede the need to put cops in  
27 every elementary school and if it comes down to limited resources that is a decision that  
28 would have to be made. He is in support of alternative models but there were some  
29 shortcomings with some of those, so if this is direction that Council would like to see he  
30 would look at this.

31       **Councilmember Killingsworth** said that priority would be serving the community as  
32 a whole and not just dedicated to a school, especially when Apex is not getting reimbursed  
33 from the County or State level for elementary SROs.

34       **Mayor Pro-Tempore Gray** said that this is a resource priority issue and it should come  
35 from the department and come back to Council with a proposal to see what can be done and  
36 recommend possible other options, such as a retiree.

37       **Chief Johnsen** said there is a plan to come in the next Public Safety Work Session to  
38 provide Council with an initial assessment for a potential reorganization of the existing assets  
39 of the Police Department and this would feed into that and there will be more discussion for  
40 what are the new assets or resources that may be necessary.

41       **Town Manager Vosburg** asked if anyone wanted to have discussions on even year  
42 elections, it is red on the board.

1       **Councilmember Gantt** said that he would like to see this happen but it may not be in  
2 full agreement with others and the Council can't change this without support.

3       **Councilmember Mahaffey** said that it was the agenda and was discussed with the  
4 lobbyist and State legislators and they were lukewarm to the idea, and it is too late for this  
5 year. He said it would have to be done the day after an election so adjustments could be  
6 made.

7       **Councilmember Gantt** asked if there were more municipalities on board with this,  
8 that is when the lobbyist would get it on the list, it would be more likely to happen.

9       **Councilmember Mahaffey** said that the conversations have been started and there  
10 needs to be education for people about it so the public would understand the benefits.

11       **Town Clerk Coleman** asked if even year elections should be tied to modifying at-  
12 large district and/or district seats, would this be together or those two things separate.

13       **Councilmember Mahaffey** said that it can be modified by the form of government at  
14 large without changing to even-year elections. He noted that at-large districts may make  
15 more sense as the Town grows close to 150,000 people.

16       **Councilmember Gantt** said that in theory doing this next year for 2028 would be the  
17 timeline to give all a chance to get settled into this.

18       **Councilmember Mahaffey** said there are different ways to do this, there could be an  
19 election where the term is three years instead of four years or if you want to save money, then  
20 it could be done and the reason is it saves \$4 million a year. He went through the policy and  
21 constitutional reasons about terms once you get elected to a four-year term.

22       **Town Clerk Coleman** said that this was already on the legislative agenda and  
23 suggested that this be brought to the retreat in February to have a more robust conversation  
24 and move forward with the process then.

25       **Councilmember Mahaffey** said that Raleigh has made changes.

26       **Councilmember Gantt** asked if Cary had moved back.

27       **Councilmember Mahaffey** said no that Cary got rid of the run-off.

28       **Councilmember Gantt** said that for the meeting in February that there could be  
29 outreach to other clerks about how officials are feeling about this in Wake County to inform  
30 them.

31       **Town Clerk Coleman** said that outreach has started.

32       **Town Manager Vosburg** moved to the next red, which is the Adopt a Tree  
33 Preservation ordinance and increase Apex Tree Canopy. He asked Director Khin to speak  
34 about this.

35       **Director Khin** said that the first Environmental Programs Coordinator has been hired  
36 and is working diligently with the Environmental Advisory Board and the Mission of Tree CAP  
37 and Bee City, and in July she had a series of presentations and then there were issues getting  
38 a quorum. She said that there has been a presentation on the current Tree Ordinances and  
39 the next presentation will be on what other communities are doing to embrace other  
40 ordinances. There was a Special meeting this week with Trees and Triangles to discuss with  
41 the EAB about this, so this is being worked on but it's not quite there yet. She said the goal is  
42 to have this fiscal year to have some UDO amendments for Council.

1       **Councilmember Gantt** asked if County was planning to do a mid-decade update to  
2 their Tree Canopy study.

3       **Director Khin** said that not that she was aware, and that they had reached out with a  
4 spreadsheet to report tree planting activities, and so each year they put in Plant the Peak  
5 information and Earth Day planting.

6       **Councilmember Gantt** asked if Apex staff would be able to replicate that study for  
7 Apex.

8       **Ms. Khin** said no, that communities with robust Urban Forestry programs, which have  
9 more staff are able to do that but Apex relies on Phillip Barnes, and Nora Skinner's  
10 background is more of Horticultural, not arborist.

11       **Town Manager Vosburg** said next is Public Transit options to RTP and increase Transit  
12 Operation frequency. He said that there have been discussions with Katie Schwing and she is  
13 a genius on transit and there has been some progress.

14       **Councilmember Gantt** said that the Transit Plan 2035 update that is going to Campo  
15 has a lot more than just advocating for the local money, it has more regional routes in that  
16 plan, including the RTP route and increased frequency to Cary and one route that's directly to  
17 Raleigh. He said this is an increase in routes for Apex.

18       **Town Manager Vosburg** said that in the 2027 plan the 311 routes will be back and  
19 funded.

20       **Director Khin** said that Ms. Schwing will be doing a presentation on the regional  
21 routes that have or will be changing on October 28<sup>th</sup>, so this will be a chance to ask questions.

22       **Councilmember Mahaffey** asked if the routes would be a route on Sunday.

23       **Town Manager Vosburg** said that it may be still pending because of the other special  
24 service that matched it.

25       **Director Khin** said that Wake County was unable to provide the paratransit service on  
26 Sunday and there are options with Cary being explored.

27       **Town Manager Vosburg** asked if Council felt like the Transit initiative was still red.

28       **Councilmember Killingsworth** said that it is still being worked on and is being  
29 actively addressed.

30       **Town Manager Vosburg** changed it to green. He said the last red for 23-2024 is  
31 focused on improving bike ability. He asked Angela Reincke to comment on bike ability and  
32 greenway.

33       **Ms. Reincke** said that October 18<sup>th</sup> is the Great Trail Day celebration and she had  
34 done some inspections with the event coming. She said there have been logs on the trail but  
35 it doesn't stop riders. She said that it's a mile-plus extension. She said they are excited about  
36 Middle Creek because it fits the southern boundary with Holly Springs, and if you get to the  
37 Sunset to Lakemont segment, which is our first official segment, it has a big emblem carved  
38 into the surface. She talked about branding the greenways and connections and they are  
39 starting projects this year for all the gap-filling segments and for extending larger greenway  
40 segments to start to close those gaps and there is progress there.

41       **Councilmember Gantt** asked if the Salem Street greenway was still happening.

42       **Mr. Dalton** said that the scope of design is currently being completed.

1       **Councilmember Zegerman** said that his red for bike ability was not a reflection on  
2 the greenways and the expansion of that system, t but it is how do I get from A to B in town  
3 with safe crossings such as at 55 and then 64 and the busier roads.

4       **Councilmember Gantt** added that the Hunter Street Park biking is great. He asked if  
5 this would be done on every road with the state while they redo the pavement.

6       **Mr. Dalton** said that there were some challenges with newer guidance that has come  
7 from the Highway Department, with the major multi-lane roads it is no longer recommended  
8 for striped bike lanes, and they want barrier-separated bike lanes which is very difficult from a  
9 cost and functionality standpoint so this may be going towards off -road separated facilities  
10 next to the roadway, two-way cycle tracks or something similar versus the on-road bike lanes.  
11 He said they are trying on Hunter Street as that is one of Apex's streets because it is easier to  
12 do bike lanes. He said there will be further conversations as well about Veridia Parkway.

13       **Councilmember Zegerman** said that from Veridia these are kids that will go through  
14 this area and the bike lane stops, so it's important to try and fill in that connections.

15       **Town Manager Vosburg** left this bike ability initiative red. He then moved to 2024-25  
16 initiatives and went through them for Council to rate as green or red. There were some  
17 discussions for clarification on some of the initiatives to decide if they were green or red. He  
18 asked if there were any discussions for the green initiatives and then the red initiatives.

19       **Councilmember Gantt** asked if there was another Cash Corporate-type development  
20 coming.

21       **Deputy Town Manager Purvis** said land suitable for industrial use is at a premium in  
22 the area.

23       **Councilmember Killingsworth** said that for the Williams property it was an idea of  
24 putting a parklet there but the use is up for debate as to what the town needs at any point in  
25 time.

26       **Councilmember Gantt** asked if there should at least a plan for that property.

27       **Councilmember Zegerman** said that the direction here isn't just to build a parklet,  
28 but to figure out how to activate that space in a way that makes sense.

29       **Councilmember Gantt** said that if parking is what is wanted, it has 30 parking spaces.

30       **Councilmember Killingsworth** said that it shouldn't be rushed to program  
31 something there if it is not known what is needed.

32       **Councilmember Mahaffey** said that a parking lot for the festivals might be something  
33 for this to be used as.

34       **Councilmember Gantt** suggested looking at not just town hall but maybe other  
35 places that could be used downtown that could be used.

36       **Director Setzer** said that they could add that parcel for discussion.

37       **Director Khin** suggested that if there is going to be a stage, it may be better to be  
38 closer to the police station and make it more temporary, to have something there like music  
39 or any kind of amplified sound it would be close to the neighbors and having the extra space  
40 for extra parking and then have the activation closer. She said that it may be set up to make a  
41 lot of folks really unhappy to have a stage or an activity right there on this property.

1       **Councilmember Killingsworth** said that you could always have wine and paint,  
2 something chill.

3       **Director Khin** said that is what was done for the Downtown Festival because there  
4 can't be amplified right next to residential. She said that if it is an event focus then it may be  
5 good to keep it as parking.

6       **Town Manager Vosburg** said that the general goal is to hold on to this but if there is  
7 an opportunity that can be presented and it's tied to entertainment or something else, then  
8 this can be bought forward. He kept this initiative red. He asked if there were any other red  
9 initiatives that they wanted to discuss.

10       **Councilmember Gantt** asked how safe it is to cross at Humie Olive.

11       **Councilmember Mahaffey** said that there is a stop light there now.

12       **Town Manager Vosburg** said that he had not heard of any complaints.

13       **Councilmember Zegerman** said that there was signal crossing further down the  
14 street with access for crossing.

15       **Councilmember Gantt** said that intersection crossing signalized is better than a mid-  
16 block signalized crossing.

17       **Town Manager Vosburg** said that there were reported issues this week at Whistling  
18 Quail, which is not too far from there.

19       **Councilmember Mahaffey** asked if this idea had been explored and that it's not  
20 feasible or is there utilities on the way or something else.

21       **Town Manager Vosburg** asked for the pedestrian bridge piece.

22       **Mr. Dalton** said that it was expensive just for the tunnel option, with preliminary prices  
23 it was \$4 million for the tunnel itself and \$8 million for tunnel road work involved and as for  
24 feasibility it would depend on how much money and the time it would take for this to happen.  
25 He said that there is also with concern is if students used it, there are intersection that can't be  
26 closed off and you can't force people to use a bridge, also most of the pedestrian traffic right  
27 now is coming down Evans Street where there is a signalized crossing coming downtown, so  
28 directing them to the midpoint and making sure they don't cross mid-block because they will  
29 have to walk extra distance to go up and over or down and under, there may not be a lot of  
30 value in it.

31       **Councilmember Killingsworth** said that with Apex High crossing across 64 there was  
32 concern that the students may run out into traffic or cross on the other side of the road where  
33 there was no signal or crosswalk, but the students are doing well staying within the crosswalk  
34 and following signs. She said if the students are given a safe place to cross that they will  
35 probably use it and the pedestrian bridge, yes, it is expensive, but it is probably the safest  
36 way to get people across and not interfere with traffic.

37       **Councilmember Mahaffey** said that priorities may change based on the options that  
38 are available, but if a kid gets hit tomorrow, then it may come back on them. He said that this  
39 should have been planned when the campus was first planned 10 or 11 years ago. He said  
40 that it could be added to the CIP to have it there.

1       **Councilmember Zegerman** said that there should be a feasibility study to categorize  
2 this given how tight the margins are. He said that at one-point staff mentioned that there was  
3 an issue for utilities and digging.

4       **Town Manager Vosburg** said that there could be more discussion among staff on this  
5 for brining at least a feasibility study and he left this initiative red. He then moved to Legacy  
6 Community, the last red for 24-2025'.

7       **Councilmember Killingsworth** said that it was unclear what this means, Legacy  
8 Community. She said there has been land purchases and Community Land Trust, and thinks  
9 that gets to the purpose of the item.

10       **Town Manager Vosburg** moved that initiative to green and moved to 2025-2026  
11 initiatives. He read the initiatives and selected them to green or red depending on the  
12 discussion and clarifications of Council members. He said the first initiative Expand CART.

13       **Chief Johansen** said that the CART program still consists of a single house and a  
14 single clinician.

15       **Councilmember Zegerman** said this was an additional service for first responders  
16 and he didn't think this was done.

17       **Chief Johansen** said that the additional services for first responders with deployment  
18 of the inter-wellness program this year is done but as far from the expansion of the  
19 community facing CART programs that will likely be in front of Council.

20       **Councilmember Gantt** asked if this was for the community or the officers.

21       **Chief Johansen** said that it was for the community, it's the co-response model  
22 involving an officer in a crisis counsel.

23       **Councilmember Killingsworth** said it sounded like it was being worked on.

24       **Town Manager Vosburg** moved to the School Preservation, it was red. He went to the  
25 Smart Cities Technology initiative.

26       **Councilmember Killingsworth** said that this was actively being worked on.

27       **Town Manager Vosburg** set this initiative as green. He moved to the Plant the peak  
28 expansion to HOAs.

29       **Councilmember Killingsworth** asked if this initiative was a neighborhood  
30 improvement grant.

31       **Councilmember Zegerman** said that this initiative is for HOAs that are looking for  
32 additional support which is residence focus to allow HOA to apply for additional funding in  
33 their community that might be needed.

34       **Director Khin** said that Plant the Peak plan is Phil Barnes and electric. She asked if  
35 Plant the Peak is eligible for HOA now.

36       **Director Galloway** said she wasn't sure.

37       **Councilmember Zegerman** said that it doesn't matter where the tree is planted as  
38 long as the tree is plated and limiting Apex to residential property was not necessary.

39       **Assistant Town Manager Stone** said that today we have not had any issue getting rid  
40 of all the trees we had and all the money. The Town actually doubled it this past year on how  
41 we were doing it because of how we removed the contractor watering requirement and  
42 shifted responsibility to the owner receiving the tree.

1       **Councilmember Zegerman** said he attended the last EAB meeting where Trees for  
2 the Triangle was presenting and there is some partnering opportunities for Apex that would  
3 expand the program further.

4       **Town Manager Vosburg** said that if it was confirmed that this is has been opened up  
5 to the HOA, then it is green.

6       **Director Khin** said that they are really excited about the Peak being focused on native  
7 trees.

8       **Councilmember Zegerman** noted that the Trees for the Triangle is also focused on  
9 native trees.

10       **Town Manager Vosburg** moved to Alternative Road Design initiative and moved it to  
11 red. He then moved to CSX Switching Station.

12       **Councilmember Zegerman** said it seemed like there was some encouraging signs,  
13 and the US was catching up some as a country.

14       **Councilmember Killingsworth** asked if there were any updates on the CSX switching  
15 station.

16       **Director Khin** said that they had to pivot because CSX had a problem with the time it  
17 takes to go up the Durham line because they only go a few miles per hour and so the study  
18 pivoted and is looking at how to improve the lines because once the trains can go faster, they  
19 will be able to move the switching station further south.

20       **Councilmember Zegerman** said that it is the on-duty limits per the agreements with  
21 the unions.

22       **Councilmember Mahaffey** said that the trains have to be parked in town because the  
23 staff can't work the extra and it runs all weekend too.

24       **Town Manager Vosburg** asked if there was anything that the staff needed to be  
25 doing additional to help move this along. He moved the initiative to green.

26       **Councilmember Zegerman** said he doesn't think staff could do anything to help this  
27 right now.

28       **Councilmember Killingsworth** asked if they were putting the most ancient trains on  
29 this line.

30       **Councilmember Zegerman** said that typically there are two locomotives on this line,  
31 one was rebuilt about ten years ago and the other is an older model and the older engines  
32 require frequent maintenance and must stay running in the cold weather because they are  
33 designed to use water coolant that forces them to idle to maintain engines and brake  
34 systems.

35       **Councilmember Killingsworth** said that needs to be de-commissioned.

36       **Councilmember Zegerman** said even the newer trains have the same issues in the  
37 colder weather.

38       **Councilmember Gantt** asked if there was something that the town could do to help  
39 fix this.

40       **Councilmember Zegerman** said that he spoke with one of their engineers that builds  
41 these and it just isn't that simple. He said one of the complaints is the idling up and down of  
42 the trains.

1       **Councilmember Killingsworth** said that they park behind the Villages of Apex, which  
2 makes it so they can't sleep or think.

3       **Town Manager Vosburg** moved to the next initiative New Go Apex Route; it was  
4 moved to green. He went to the next initiative Protect and Encourage Mobile Home  
5 Developments, which was moved to yellow. He then moved to the last initiative Salem Street  
6 Pedestrian Zone options expand Streetscape.

7       **Town Manager Vosburg** asked if there were any of the greens to talk about.

8       **Councilmember Gantt** said that Councilmember Zegerman said that he would like to  
9 see the Transit Plan move faster.

10       **Councilmember Zegerman** said that there is a plan that is not moving very fast with  
11 some of the improvements not moving forward for three years and encouraged staff to be  
12 more aggressive to expand services.

13       **Councilmember Gantt** asked if there was a CIP item that could be added for next  
14 year for more money that could escalate it versus less money for the timeline shown for Route  
15 2 in the Transit Plan.

16       **Town Manager Vosburg** said that there was discussion about prioritizing making it a  
17 30-minute route versus the hour route over an hour, so instead of doing a second route.

18       **Councilmember Zegerman** said that it is not disagreeing with the order of this, it is  
19 the amount of time it takes to get from where we are today to what the plan calls for right  
20 now, but he would like the plan to happen faster, so the question is what needs to happen to  
21 make this happen faster.

22       **Councilmember Gantt** asked if it was \$1 million over three years or \$1.25 million for  
23 two years, if that was even possible.

24       **Town Manager Vosburg** asked if there were any other discussions on the red  
25 initiatives for the 25-26'.

26       **Councilmember Killingsworth** said that she would like to discuss the mobile home  
27 development initiative. She said that there should be a plan for mobile home parks that are  
28 sold out from under residents and then people don't have anywhere to go.

29       **Director Newman** said that there are funds on hand to help with any potential  
30 relocation costs. She said staff have been instructed to do some groundwork to see how  
31 plans were developed in Orange County with Chapel Hill and some other municipalities and  
32 see what role government played versus the community and then coordinate with advocates  
33 in Apex to provide them learning and help equip them to do something similar.

34       **Councilmember Gantt** added that there is one in Apex's planning jurisdiction but not  
35 in its municipality and it would be good if the County was involved in this too, for example the  
36 mobile home park by Felton Grove should be part of this.

37       **Director Newman** said that this is in the investigation phase right now and will start to  
38 tap into potential partners and advocates to see what kind of response there is to this  
39 concern.

40       **Councilmember Killingsworth** said it would be ideal to have a piece of property  
41 already that people could just move to but this is not currently in place.

**Director Newman** added that some mobile homes that are older may not survive a move so this is something else to consider. She said that there was a situation in Charlottesville, Virginia where the mobile home community was provided to Habitat which built homes where they were able to move as the homes became available which takes a lot of resources and collaboration from the model that was shown to staff. She said this is on their radar.

**Town Manager Vosburg** asked if there were any other discussions on the red initiatives.

**Councilmember Mahaffey** asked about the status of the Rosenwald School. He said that they were unable to find a partner to accept the school, the owner was willing to give it up but there wasn't anyone willing to relocate it. He said that they were trying to avoid Apex doing this which would include zoning and adding more parkland.

**Assistant Town Manager John** said there was conversation with staff regarding the new library location and they did not want to go into details about location and are interested in having more conversations at the beginning of the year about a potential location and they are working together to bring the group back together to see what this will look like. She said it was the Friendship Community Committee who gave a presentation and they would bring everybody together at the beginning of the year once that acquisition had taken place and they would be more open about the location but this will be a joint project between the County and the town.

**Councilmember Gantt** said that a joint project between the County and the town would be awesome.

**Town Manager Vosburg** asked for any other discussions for the red initiatives. He asked staff if there were any questions for Council about the red initiatives. He will bring the red initiatives back for the February retreat.
