20 years ago

- Sen. Sam Brownback gave the commencement address Sunday afternoon to the Southwestern College Class of 1998, the largest graduating class in the school's history at nearly 250 members.
- The Chisholm Trail Drive-In Movie Theatre in Wellington is showing "Scream 2" and "Phantoms" starting at dusk May 8-10.
- Linus Brundgardt and Paul Wesley, both members of the Winfield Lions Club, were recently honored by being named Melvin Jones Fellows. The award honors members who devote their time and abilities to improve the quality of life for everyone.

100 years ago

- A record of 100 per cent in subscriptions to the Third Liberty Loan bonds was attained by the Arkansas City Mills today. Every man on the pay roll is now the proud possessor of one or more Liberty bonds, and is intensely in accord with the slogan: "To Helmet The Kaiser."
- Editorial: Arkansas City went "over the top" in the liberty loan

drive by a good margin of more than \$25,000 and it is a remarkable record considering the fact that no organized campaign was made in this community until the big loyalty parade was given last Thursday evening.

• May 3: The annual services of the churches of Arkansas City, for the thirty-fourth graduating class of the local high school, will be held next Sunday evening in the M.E. church at 8 o'clock. One this occasion Rev. W.H. Moore will preach the baccalaureate sermon and there will be special musical numbers.

• May 3: JAMES WOODS IN FRANCE — Interesting Letter of Recent Date Received by Father Today: Somewhere in France April 1918. Dear Dad — ... I don't suppose it will do any harm to say that I have been under slight artillery fire although hardly in any real danger. It's not as bad as you'd imagine though, I hardly think. But in my opinion the Boche are some poor shots. Have also seen quite a number of devastated villages and towns. Not a whole roof in sight. Not a wall complete. Nothing but piles of charred stone and ruins.

• May 3: Mr. and Mrs. D.I. Adams of Syracuse, Kansas, have arrived in the city to make their home here in the future. He will be manager of the Harvey eating house at the local Santa Fe station and Mrs. Adams will be cashier. Mr. Swenson, who has been here in charge of the Harvey house for some months past, is leaving today.

50 years ago

• Arkansas City's National Guard unit has been notified it will report to Camp Carson, Colo., for active duty on May 23. The advance party will depart on May 17, and vehicles assigned to the unit will leave on May 19. The main body of troops will depart May 23, probably by bus. The company will vacate the National Guard Armory here on May 13 and will move to the Cowley County Fairgrounds for drill sessions and in preparation for the move to Camp Carson.

25 years ago

• The Rev. Virgil Watson looked out Monday night at the more than 150 people seated before him. With his strong voice he stated something so obvious, but yet so true. "The people here really love Dr. (Gwen) Nelson. "I can see it in the eyes. See it in the faces," he said. Those who have known Grwen when he came to Arkansas City in the 1960s gathered in the gymnasium of Central Christian Church to celebrate the first Gwen Nelson Award, an award established by the PRIDE organization to honor an individual who has given so much to the community in many ways. 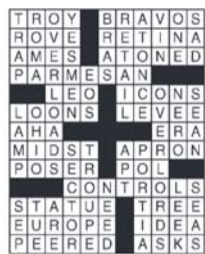
