Explanation:

The Ballwin Police Department has actively pursued grant funding through the Missouri Department of Transportation for highway safety projects for many years. As in past years, the Police Department is asking that the Mayor and each Alderman sign a City Council Authorization form, which must be submitted with the grant application for project approval.

For 2024, we are requesting grant funding in the following amounts for theses identified projects:

- \$10,500 Hazardous Moving Violation Enforcement (includes \$2,000 funding to send two officers to LETSAC training)
- \$4,500 DWI Saturation Enforcement
- \$4,500 Youth Alcohol Enforcement
- \$4,500 Occupant Protection (Seatbelt) Enforcement

PROBLEM IDENTIFICATION

Substance-impaired drivers contributed to 22% of Missouri's traffic crash fatalities during the past five years. Alcohol remains the primary contributor to substance-impaired driving crashes; however, the number of persons under the influence of prescription medications and/or illicit drugs has increased significantly over the past decade. With recreational marijuana now legal in Missouri, there are concerns this trend will continue.

Male drivers were more likely than females to be involved in substance-impaired driving crashes. During the past five years, males were responsible for 81.7% of substance-impaired driving fatalities. Ten percent of the children less than 15 years of age, who were killed in motor vehicle crashes over the last five years, were riding with a substance-impaired driver.

Depending on the jurisdiction, impaired driving offenses in Missouri are prosecuted differently. Prosecutors and judges may not always be aware of the severity of the impaired driving problem or how to best provide treatment for an offender.

During the 2023 calendar year, the Ballwin Police Department worked nine (9) traffic crashes that were related to impaired driving. The nine impaired traffic crashes resulted in one (1) injury. While the traffic crash number is low, this can be attributed as a result of the increase in DWI arrest. The Ballwin Police Department made 21 DWI arrests in 2023, which represents a 5% increase over 2022.

Core Performance Measure Goal:

Based on a goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is setting a five-year average alcohol-involved fatality target of 232.6 by December 31, 2026.

Participate in the "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" campaign Participate in all quarterly DWI enforcement campaigns The Ballwin Police Department will accomplish the stated goals by conducting routine saturation patrols focused on violations involving impaired driving. Uniformed police officers and marked patrol vehicles will be utilized to conduct the DWI impaired enforcement. Officers assigned to this grant will work primarily from 9:00PM until 3:00AM Wednesday through Saturday. Officers will be actively patrolling streets located within Ballwin city limits. Their goal is to locate impaired drivers, and will take appropriate enforcement action upon the detection of such violators.

Alcohol remains the primary contributor to substance-impaired driving crashes; however, the number of persons under the influence of prescription medications and/or illicit drugs has increased significantly over the past decade. With recreational marijuana now legal in Missouri, there are concerns this trend will continue.

Male drivers were more likely than females to be involved in substance-impaired driving crashes. During the past five years, males were responsible for 81.7% of substance-impaired driving fatalities. Ten percent of the children less than 15 years of age, who were killed in motor vehicle crashes over the last five years, were riding with a substance-impaired driver.

Depending on the jurisdiction, impaired driving offenses in Missouri are prosecuted differently. Prosecutors and judges may not always be aware of the severity of the impaired driving problem or how to best provide treatment for an offender.

There are numerous high schools surrounding the city limits of Ballwin, where officers of the Ballwin Police Department often encounter minors who possess or have consumed alcoholic beverages. These encounters occur during traffic stops or in response to party calls involving underage drinking.

While Ballwin has a relatively low rate of alcohol-involved crashes among drivers under the age of twenty-one (21), given the growing number of underage drivers in the area, it is imperative to maintain effective enforcement measures to ensure that the rate remains low.

Last year officers, responded to a house party where multiple juveniles were drinking underage. During this incident multiple juveniles required medical attention and transport to a nearby hospital. The Ballwin Police Department issued two Minor in Possessions citations in 2023. Compared to 2022, the Ballwin Police Department saw a slight decrease for minor in possessions, yet we saw an increase of underage drinking taking place at parties.

Core Performance Measure Goal:

Based on a goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is setting a five-year average alcohol-involved fatality target of 232.6 by December 31, 2026.

Goal:

To completely eliminate and prevent motor vehicle crashes involving drivers under the age of twenty -one (21) who have consumed alcohol within the City of Ballwin.

Performance Measure:

The number of motor vehicle crashes involving underage drivers who have consumed alcohol, as compared to the total number of alcohol-related motor vehicle crashes in Ballwin.

Benchmark:

In 2023, there were zero (0) injuries involving underage drivers in alcohol related traffic crashes. Officers responded to three (3) related calls involving underage drinking.

Objectives:

Participate in the "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" campaign.

Participate in all "Youth Alcohol" campaigns.

Conduct targeted enforcement operations during months with holidays or events associated with underage drinking.

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Officers assigned to this project will work as single or two man uniformed unit from 9:00PM until 3:00AM on Friday or Saturday night. The mission will be to actively patrol streets of Ballwin, with the focus on identifying parties where underage drinking and driving may occur. In addition, officers will monitor roadways for signs of impaired underage drivers. Appropriate enforcement actions will be taken upon detection of violators.



During the last 5 years, no behavior on Missouri roadways has contributed to traffic fatalities as frequently as speed and aggressive driving. From 2017-2021, there were 2,547 fatalities involving a speeding or aggressive driver, accounting for 53% of all traffic fatalities. Speed and aggressive driving are cited in fatal crash reports as a contributing circumstance more than twice as often as impaired driving, and feedback and citation data from law enforcement agencies indicate speeds are up significantly during the last 3 years.

Between 2019 and 2021, St. Louis County documented a total of 83,392 vehicle crashes, with 1,035 occurring within the city limits of Ballwin. Notably, 238 of these crashes were attributed to aggressive driving, a form of hazardous moving violation that continues to pose a significant challenge in Ballwin. In the subsequent year, 2023, there were 566 recorded crashes, further emphasizing the ongoing concern surrounding road safety in the region. Additionally, the Ballwin Police Department issued 1,534 speeding citations and 524 citations for hazardous moving violations, highlighting the need for continued efforts to address and mitigate these issues.

Core Performance Measure Goals:

Based on a goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is setting a five-year average fatality target of 897.6 by December 31, 2026.

Based on a goal of 0 serious injuries by 2040, Missouri is setting a five-year average serious injury target of 4,486.1 by December 31, 2026.

Based on a goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is setting a five-year average speed related fatality target of 293.8 by December 31,2026.

Performance Measure:

The performance measure will be determined by tracking the incidence of motor vehicle crashes related to aggressive driving that lead to injury or death.

Benchmark:

The benchmark for this measure is set at 1. This is reached by analyzing the data from the 2023 year where the serious injuries listed at 1.

Strategies:

To attain the established objective, the following strategies will be executed:

Full engagement in quarterly speed enforcement campaigns. Implementation of three focused patrols each month to address hazardous moving violations. Officers participating in this initiative may have assigned shifts at any time from 6:00 AM to 10:00 PM, seven days a week, working in four-hour increments. Their primary duty will involve actively patrolling the streets within the city limits of Ballwin, aiming to identify aggressive drivers engaged in hazardous moving violations. Upon identifying such violations, the officers will take necessary enforcement actions.



During 2017-2021, 64.9% of drivers and occupants killed in crashes in Missouri were unrestrained. The percent of unrestrained teens killed is even higher at 71.6% while pickup truck drivers and occupants are even higher yet at 76.6%.

Missouri's observed seat belt use rate of 88.9% in 2022 is below the national average of 91.6%. Teen seat belt use is of particular concern coming in at just 71.8%, approximately 17% lower than the state average. Furthermore, seat belt use remains lowest amongst males, on non-highways, and in rural areas, particularly southeast and northeast Missouri. If everyone in Missouri buckled up, an estimated 250 lives would be saved each year.

Core Performance Measure Goal:

Based on a goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is setting a five-year average unrestrained fatality target of 324.4 by December 31, 2026.

Other Performance Measure Goal:

Missouri's goal is to increase statewide observed seat belt use of front seat outboard occupants in passenger vehicles 1 percentage point annually from the 2022 calendar base year rate of 88.9% to 93.0% by December 31, 2026.

Increase seatbelt usage rates within the City of Ballwin and enhance traffic safety through targeted enforcement campaigns.

Officers assigned to this project are expected to operate during flexible hours, ranging from 7:00 AM to 7:00 PM, seven days a week, in two-hour shifts. Their primary responsibility entails conducting active patrols throughout all streets within the municipal boundaries of Ballwin, with a particular emphasis on identifying motorists who are non-compliant with safety belt regulations. Upon detection of such violators, appropriate enforcement measures will be taken. It should be noted that these violations will be deemed primary on all City streets and secondary on State highways.
