# January 2025 - City Manager Report

A report keeping council informed of the many happenings at City Hall. <u>Items in this report</u> <u>may be highly sensitive or confidential and thus Council is encouraged not to share the info</u> <u>publicly without first verifying with the City Manager</u>. Council is encouraged to continue to use their Issue Tracker in TEAMS to assist in ensuring all council directed items are handled in a timely manner.

### **Notable HR Changes**

- 1. Executive Director of Engineering Position Filled Tiger Davis, Retired from the City of Austin.
- 2. City Secretary Remains vacant, Irma Parker is solely working on election items now.
- 3. Chief Financial Officer will be retitled to Finance Director, vacant.
- 4. Project Manager one filled, one vacant

# **Financial Standing**

- a. All funds performing positive to projection except impact fees. The January Financials to be presented next meeting will provide a better synopsis.
- b. Master Meter fee amendment will be modified.
- c. Continuation of discussion of Valverde PID continues.

### **Management Projects**

- 1. Mardi Gras was a roaring success. Final numbers to be presented at Council.
- 2. Hotel RFP
  - Will discuss with Council seeking to amend original legislation extending original boundary to allow for greater financial incentive.
  - Rendition submitted is only 30-35% larger than existing hotel and may not provide longevity.
- 3. OpenGov transition
  - Finance is 75% of the way. Financial reporting after May will be a HUGE improvement.
- 4. Draft Transportation Master Plan Update
  - Ongoing as the Comprehensive Plan continues
  - TXDOT Transportation Alternatives sidewalk grant will be submitted to connect Blakey to Old Austin Highway and downtown. On council agenda 2/2025. Response by October 2025

- 5. Downtown Parking Lot
  - We continue to seek a response from the Church on a purchase or partnership.
- 6. Draft Drainage Master Plan Ongoing
- 7. Development Services Department & Code Revamp
  - Comp Plan Open Houses continue
  - Massive code amendments presented in Feb/March governing lot sizes and setbacks to match the surrounding environment.
  - Tree amendments in progress.
- 8. Economic Development Corporation
  - Sports complex is a no go.
  - Fiesta project is back online
  - LS Electric seeks land for expansion.
  - TA Adhesives will ribbon cut in the early spring
- 9. Parks Master Plan
  - Amendments to the code requiring park exaction, fee in lieu of, penalties, and a park development fee will be adopted by the Council in March 2025.

#### 10.ESD#3

- Voter approved
- o Impact to residents will be telling at the next tax bill.
- Council is encouraged to discuss the budget impacts with county commissioners.
  (i.e. how much is going to be approved by the commissioner's court)

#### 11. CORIX/Boring Company

- Line work for sewer is ongoing. CORIX is working on the necessary ROW on 969.
- Blakey funding is being discussed.
- Discussion with the Townsend Attorney regarding the ROW needed on Blakely is ongoing.

12. Aqua/CCN/Effluent resale

 Aqua is awaiting signature for Valverde. Advised Aqua board likely by End of Month.

13. Quiet Zone

- The study was funded in December 2023.
- No movement on this project.

#### 14. Athletic Field RFP

- o No go
- 15. Additional land at Mayfest Park
  - Further discussion on acquisition is ongoing.
- 16.STR:
  - o Ordinance Completed
  - Town Hall meeting is complete
  - o Ordinance to Council in Feb.
- 17. Uber Ride Share Program
  - o Council presentation expected in February

## **CIP** Projects

- 18. Engineering/Project Management
  - IDIQ contracts are out and signed.
  - A variety of firms are providing services such as plan review, site review, and feasibility studies.

#### 19. Iron Bridge

- o 100% plans are received.
- Endangered bird and historic designation have delayed bids going forward. Hopeful to have bid on the street in March 2025.
- 20. Wastewater Treatment Plant #3 Phase II
  - The technical memorandum on construction and probable cost was submitted by Freese & Nichols for an estimated engineering cost of almost \$10M.
  - Under the new IDIQ contract we are working on, we will seek alternate bids for this work.
  - There is additional cost of \$1M for oversight of the project
  - Field trip on February 28 to view alternate plant type and site.
- 21. Simsboro Aquifer Water Treatment Plant, Well Field and Transmission Facilities (WTP)
  - o Unknown ETA for completion. Filter systems and electrical issues.

- Blakey lane extension is at 100% design.
- ROW discussion with the property owners have begun before we move to legal.
- 23. Agnes Street Extension
  - Groundbreaking picture 2/15/2025
  - Expected completion 12/2025
- 24. Elevated Storage Tank (EST) West of FM 969
  - City's Engineering staff is working the Valverde subdivision to determine location and cost.
  - Valverde has agreed on location that would not harm the subdivision layout.
  - Estimated completion date: Unknown
- 25. Fairview Cemetery Section 9 Development
  - Staff has completed the water line and road improvements.
  - o Groundbreaking 2/2025
- 26. All Line Extension (Water/WW)
  - Council has been briefed on the pipe bursting for the Hwy 71 at the 969 intersections towards Old Austin Highway.
  - Engineering complete, bids received.

#### 27. Streets

- Overlay: HA5 project is on schedule.
- Rehab or Repair: Televising of lines on Water, Linden, and Farm determined some WW improvements needed as follows:
  - Linden replace 820' of WW line from Hill to Pecan, Street estimate was \$644,525 plus WW repairs
  - Water replace 1,450' of WW line from Farm to Cedar, plus 2 manholes.
    Street estimate was \$384, 500, plus WW repairs
  - Farm replace 350' of WW line from Pecan to Willow. Street estimate was \$418,180
  - Pipe bursting can be used to reduce the amount of repair needed to the street.
  - Funding for these segments will be from the existing street maintenance repair program.

  - Legal continues to assist in resolving this issue.
  - Ribbon cutting 2/2025
- 29. Visit Bastrop
  - Contract with City and additional 75K for HOT has been approved.

# Other

- 30. Rodeo Arena Repair/Assessment
  - This has been transferred to Fleet and Facilities for repairs in coordination with Parks
- 31. Farm Street Village
  - Purchase completed
- 32. Kerr Center Property/African American Cultural Center
  - LOI signed with the African American Cultural Center
  - Engineering work continues
  - o Grant dollars of \$50K used to support the organization
- 33. Kerr Community Center
  - o \$40K assistance to fund necessary repairs.
- 34. Assistance to BISD
  - Permitting and site assistance is ongoing
  - An interlocal with the ISD will allow the City to inspect the school sites with local, accessible inspection staff and a lesser cost than outside inspectors, saving tax dollars for all.
- 35. Assistance to the County
