2	AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF BELLE ISLE, FLORIDA, AMENDING THE BELLE ISLE
3	LAND DEVELOPMENT CODE, CHAPTER 48, ARTICLE III, SECTION 48-63 – TREE
4	PROTECTION; PROVIDING CLARIFICATION OF TREE PRESERVATION PROCESSES AND
5	PRODCEDURES; PROVIDING SEVERABILITY, CODIFICATION, AND AN EFFECTIVE
6	DATE.
7	WHEREAS, Citizens of the City of Belle Isle have expressed concern to the Tree Board about the scope and
8	extent of regulation of tree removal and permitting within the City; and
9	
10	WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that further amendment to Chapter 48, Article III of the City Land
11	Development Code is necessary in order to further improve and clarify the City's tree protection regulations and to respond
12	to the concerns of the citizens of Belle Isle; and
13	WHEREAS, the City of Belle Isle Tree Board serves as a recommending body for the City; and
14	WHEREAS, the Tree Board, acting in its capacity as the City's recommending Tree Board, has duly considered
15	and recommended approval to the City Council of the revisions to the tree protection regulations effected by this Ordinance
16	at a public meeting on December 4 <sup>th</sup> , 2018; and
17	
18	WHEREAS, the City Council has found and determined that the adoption of this Ordinance is in the interests of
19	the public health, safety and welfare, will aid in the harmonious, orderly and progressive development of the City, and
20	serves a valid public purpose.
21	BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Belle Isle, Florida as follows:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 48, Article III, Section 48-63 – Tree Protection of the Belle Isle Code of Ordinances is hereby amended		
2	as follows ( <del>struckout text</del> indicates deletions; <u>underlined text</u> indicates additions; and non-referenced sections shall		
3	remain unchanged):		
4	Sec. 48-63 Tree protection.		
5	a) Intent and purpose. The purpose and intent of this article is to establish protective regulations for trees in the city		
6	and the planting of an acceptable tree in another place on the same property or in a public place. This article also		
7	encourages the protection of trees which the city has recognized, and which the city stands to lose unless protective		
8	measures are taken. It shall be unlawful to cut down, remove, damage, poison, detrimentally alter or in any other		
9	manner destroy or cause to be destroyed any trees covered by this article, except in accordance with the provisions		
10	of this article.		
11			
12	b) <i>Definitions</i> . The following words, terms, and phrases when used in this article shall be defined as follows:		
13	• Arborist means a professional arborist recognized and certified by the International Society of Arboriculture		
14	(ISA) as an ISA certified arborist municipal specialist (preferred) or an ISA certified arborist.		
15	• <i>Clearing</i> means the removal of a tree by digging, pushing, or cutting, or the effective removal through		
16	damage.		
17	• Dead or beyond recovery means more than 50 percent of the tree is dead, is a hazardous tree as defined		
18	herein, or in a state of irrecoverable decline.		
19	• Diameter breast height (DBH) means the diameter, in inches, of a tree measured at four and one-half feet		
20	above the existing grade.		
21	• Dripline means an imaginary line on the ground defined by vertical lines which extend from the outermost tips		
22	of the tree branches to the ground.

1		•	Hazardous tree means a tree irreparably diseased or presents a danger of falling that cannot be controlled or		
2		remedied through reasonable preservation and or preventative procedures and pesticides such that the			
3		public health or safety requires its removal.			
4		•	<u>Public tree means any tree existing or proposed on city owned property.</u>		
5		<u>Private tree means any tree existing in privately held land.</u>			
6		•	Removal of a tree means either actually removing a tree from the ground in which it grew, transplanting		
7			a tree, or effectively removing a tree through damage to the trunk, topping, damaging, or removing major		
8			limbs, roots, or enough canopy volume so that the tree dies, declines beyond recovery, or becomes a hazard		
9			to public safety and must be removed. Tree stump must be removed to a depth of six (6) inches below the		
10			surface of the ground. Once removal begins it must be completed within 60 days.		
11		•	Tree means any living, woody, self-supporting perennial plant which normally grows to a minimum height of		
12		15 feet.			
13		•	Trees, stand of, means a naturally occurring grouping of five or more trees forming a canopy of vegetation		
14			which results in a single unified dripline.		
15	c)	Ехс	eptions and exemptions.		
16		1)	Exceptions. The requirements iof this section shall apply to all property in the city except those used for the		
17			following purposes:		
18			a. Commercial plant nursery or tree farm;		
19			b. Public right-of-way or easement; and		
20			c. Citrus groves cleared for replanting.		
21		2)	Exemptions. In the case of an emergency such as a hurricane, flood or other disaster, or agricultural diseases,		
22			the City Manager or the City Manager's designee may waive the requirements of this section so as to not		
23			hamper public and/or private work to restore order.		
24	d)	Per	<del>mit</del> <u>R</u> equirements.

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## 1) No tree, with a DBH of 6-inches or greater, shall be removed from any developed property; and

2 2) No recommended tree (as defined by subsection (5)a. of this subsection (d)) shall be removed from any 3 developed property and no Land clearing for development shall occur in the city without the owner first 4 obtaining a permit from the city except where noted. The city manager or the city manager's designee may 5 issue a tree removal permit for the removal of specific trees. 6 3) Review fee; survey information. The owner of the property shall submit a \$25.00 review fee, set by the City 7 Council, a tree removal permit application, and a tree survey consisting of the following information: a) A scaled aerial photograph or drawing (minimum one inch equals 300 feet); 8 9 b) Property boundaries; 10 c) Identify location, names and heights of all stands of trees; 11 d) Identify location, DBH, names and height of all individual trees, which are six inches DBH or greater; e) Indicate which trees are proposed for removal and identify the tree with a direction and distance from a 12 fixed landmark; 13 14 f) Reason for removal; and g) If applicable, the name of the commercial tree removal service that will be used to remove the tree(s). 15 h) All trees scheduled for removal shall be marked with red paint. In addition, prior to the issuance of a 16 17 permit, the city manager, or the city manager's designee, will meet with the developer or owner 18 representative and be shown the trees designated to be removed according to the site plan. The city 19 representative will take a photo, or video, of the tree(s) to be removed. At the project completion, the 20 city representative will return to the site to verify the correct trees have been removed. For new developments, no Certificate of Occupancy will be issued until the city has verified the correct trees have 21 22 been removed. 23 In the event the City Manager or City Manager's designee is unable to determine whether the criteria for 24 removal are met, an additional fee, to be established by City Council of \$75.00, shall be required for 25

1	review by an arborist. In lieu of paying the additional fee, the property owner, at their own expense, may		
2	provide an independent arborist's opinion; provided, however, that said arborist shall not be employed		
3	by the tree removal service hired by the property owner, if any.		
4	1) Use of unregistered tree removal service prohibited. No commercial tree removal service shall be		
5	used by the owner or occupant of the property unless the service has first registered with the City. A		
6	violation of this subsection (2) may be brought before the City code enforcement <del>board</del> <u>magistrate</u>		
7	pursuant to_section 14-31, et al., as an irreversible violation subject to imposition of a fine not to		
8	exceed \$5,000.00 per violation.		
9	2) <i>Registration requirements for</i> tree <i>removal service</i> . Any commercial tree removal service which		
10	desires to provide tree removal services within the city must first register with the city by providing		
11	its business name, occupational license number, contact person, address and telephone number.		
12	Upon registration, the tree removal service shall be provided information regarding the City's		
13	permitting requirements as set out in this section 48-63. A list of those tree services registered with		
14	the city will be available in the City Clerk's office. The city keeps a list of businesses that are allowed to		
15	operate in the city. This list is to assist in providing residents with a variety of choices for a service or		
16	product. Any specific commercial product, process, or service by trade name, trademark,		
17	manufacturer, or otherwise, is not an endorsement or recommendation by the city or its employees.		
18	Further, the city does not endorse or recommend any commercial products, processes, or services. The		
19	city will not recommend one tree service over another to residents. In the event any		
20	registered tree removal service is determined by the city manager or designee to have violated the		
21	city's requirements for tree removal, that service shall be removed from the list of registered services		
22	with written notice mailed to the service. Any tree removal service that has been removed from the		
23	list may make a request in writing to the City clerk for a hearing before City Council to appeal the		
24	removal.		
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1	3) (	Criteria for recommended tree removal. Tree removal may be approved where design modifications
2	ā	are not feasible or reasonable and one or more of the following circumstances exist:
3	ā	a) The location of the tree restricts the opening of a street or road right-of-way.
4	ł	b) The location of the tree restricts the construction of utility lines or drainage facilities.
5	(	c) The location of the tree restricts access to the property.
6	(	d) The location of the tree restricts a use of the property consistent with all other city regulations.
7	6	e) The tree constitutes a hazard to life or property which cannot be mitigated without removing
8		the tree.
9	f	f) The tree is dying or dead such that its restoration to sound condition is not practical, or it has a
10		disease which can be expected to be transmitted to other trees and endanger their health.
11	Ę	g) The selective removal of up to 25 percent of existing trees, with a DBH of six inches or less, to
12		provide increased light and air circulation.
13	ł	h) Removal of the tree is required, in writing, by the homeowners' insurance company or proposed
14		insurance company.
15	4) <i>I</i>	Replacement of trees. Recommended <u>T</u> trees with a DBH of up to six inches and/or restricted trees,
16	r	regardless of DBH, that are approved for removal shall not require replacement. <u>Trees with a DBH of</u>
17	S	six inches up to but not including 24 inches shall be replaced at a 1:1 ratio. Trees with a DBH of 24
18	<u>i</u>	inches or greater shall be replaced at a 2:1 ratio. All replacement trees should have a minimum DBH
19	<u>(</u>	of four inches.
20	5) F	Recommended trees with a DBH of six inches to 24 inches shall be replaced at a 1:1 ratio with trees
21	f	from the recommended list. Recommended trees with a DBH of 24 inches or greater shall be
22	r	replaced at a 2:1 ratio with trees from the recommended list and having a minimum DBH of four
23	i	inches.

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1	a)	Recommended trees. The following tree replacement species are suggested, and may be used as
2		replacement stock without prior approval. Other replacement trees may be used but must be
3		native to Florida and be approved by the City Manager. The City Council, by resolution, will adopt
4		a list of trees for planting as stated in "Selecting and Planting Trees for the Central Florida Urban
5		Forest <u></u> , by the Florida Urban Forestry Council <del>, shall be used as a guide</del> . <u>This resolution and</u>

6	6) New developments.
7	a) Subdivisions. The information required in subsection (d)(1) shall be submitted as part of the
8	preliminary plat for all new residential and nonresidential subdivisions. The final plat approval
9	shall constitute a tree removal permit for the purposes of this section.
10	b) Site plans. The information required in subsection (d)(1) shall be submitted as part of the site
11	plan for all new commercial, professional-office, industrial and multifamily residential
12	developments. The building permit shall constitute a tree removal permit for the purposes of this
13	section.
14	c) Tree protection during construction.
15	1) Following development approval, it shall be unlawful for any person, during the construction
16	of any structures or other improvements, to place solvents, material, construction
17	machinery or temporary soil deposits within the dripline of any tree designated to remain.
18	2) It shall be the responsibility of the developer or applicant to ensure that any tree designated
19	to remain be protected. The property owner shall guarantee survival of retained or
20	replacement trees for one year from the acceptance of the subdivision improvements by the
21	City or the issuance of a certificate of occupancy for site plans, whichever is later.
22	3) If posts are used as protective barriers, they shall be placed at points not closer than one-
23	half the radius of the dripline of the protected tree. Each section of the barrier shall be
24	clearly visible (flagged with brightly colored plastic tapes or other markers). No attachments

1	or wires other than those of a protective or nondamaging nature shall be attached to
2	any tree.
3	4) The City may conduct periodic inspections of the site. It is the responsibility of the applicant
4	to ensure that all provisions of this section are met.
5	7) <u>Spacing</u>
6	a) Trees with the capability of exceeding 30' in height must not be planted less than 25' from a
7	property line; except in special plantings designed or approved by a landscape architect.
8	8) Distance from Curb and Sidewalk
9	a) The distance trees may be planted from curbs or curb lines and sidewalks must have a 4' setback.
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11	b) The use of root barriers is required and determined at the discretion of the city manager.
12	9) Distance from Street Corners and Fireplugs
13	a) No Tree shall be planted closer than 35 feet of any street corner, measured from the point of
14	nearest intersecting curbs or curb lines. No Tree shall be planted closer than 10 feet of any
15	fireplug.
16	b) No tree which may reach a height of 15' or more may be planted less than 25' from the
17	foundation of any public or commercial structure.
18	c) The use of root barriers is required and determined at the discretion of the city manager.
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20	10) <u>Utilities</u>
21	a) No Trees may be planted under or within 10 lateral feet of any overhead utility wire, or over or
22	within 5 lateral feet of any underground water line, sewer line, transmission line or other utility.
23	b) The use of root barriers is required and determined at the discretion of the city manager.
24	11) <u>Public Tree Care</u>

1	a) The city shall have the right to plant, prune, maintain and remove trees, plants and shrubs within
2	the lines of all streets, alleys, avenues, lanes, squares and public grounds and city right-of-ways, as
3	may be necessary to ensure public safety or to preserve or enhance the symmetry and beauty of
4	such public grounds.
5	b) The city may remove or cause or order to be removed, any tree or part thereof which is in an
6	unsafe condition or which by reason of its nature is injurious to sewers, electric power lines, gas
7	lines, water lines, or other public improvements, or is affected with any injurious fungus, insect or
8	other pest. This Section does not prohibit the planting of trees by adjacent property owners
9	providing that the selection and location of said trees is in accordance with Sections 5(a) of this
10	ordinance.
11	c) <u>It is unlawful for any person to:</u>
12	i. <u>Fasten a carriage, animal, bike, motor vehicle of any kind to any tree, shrub, tree guard or</u>
13	tree support.
14	ii. <u>Authorize or procure any gas, hot water, brine, oil, herbicide, pesticide, chemicals, dye, or</u>
15	other substance detrimental to tree life to lay, pour, flow, leak, or drip into the soil about the
16	base of a tree in any public highway. street, avenue, public right-of-way, or public place.
17	iii. <u>Allow a tree on public right-of-way to be injured or removed during the erection, repair,</u>
18	removal or alteration of any building or structure.
19	iv. Build or kindle a fire near any tree or any public right-of-way, as to endanger the trunk, limb,
20	or foliage of such tree.
21	v. <u>Attach any advertisements to any tree or shrub in any street, highway, avenue or public right-</u>
22	<u>of-way.</u>

1	vi. Lay any pavement within three (3) feet of the base of the trunk of any tree on public right-of-		
2	way or deposit any stone, gravel, cement, lumber, or other materials in such a way as to		
3	obstruct the free access of air and water to the roots of any tree in such right-of-way.		
4	vii. <u>Attach or keep attached to any public tree any ropes, wires, chains, or other device</u>		
5	whatsoever, except that the same may be attached to any tree as support or protection		
6	thereof. This prohibition shall not apply to the seasonal attachment of holidays lights.		
7	viii. During the erection, repair, alteration or removal of any building, sidewalk, or structure, it is		
8	unlawful for the person in charge of such erection, repair, alteration or removal to leave any		
9	public tree in the vicinity of such building or structure without good and sufficient guard or		
10	protector as to prevent injury to such tree or its roots arising out of, or by reason of such		
11	erection, repair, alteration or removal		
12	ix. <u>Abuse, destroy or mutilate any public tree.</u>		
13	x. <u>Perform any minor tree work on any public tree without a permit.</u>		
14	12) <u>Tree Topping and/or hat racking</u>		
15	a) It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or city department to top and/or hat rack any tree on		
16	public property. Topping is defined as the severe cutting back of limbs to stubs larger than three		
17	inches in diameter within the tree's crown to such a degree so as to remove the normal canopy and		
18	disfigure the tree. Hat racking is defined as the destructive act of improperly trimming a tree,		
19	leaving stubs, tears, stripped branches, unnecessary wounds and other irreparable damage. Trees		
20	severely damaged by storms or other causes, or certain trees under utility wires or other		
21	obstructions where other pruning practices are impractical may be exempted from this ordinance		
22	at the determination of the city manager.		
23	13) Pruning and Corner Clearance by Private Property owners and by Utilities

1	a)	Every owner of any tree overhanging any street or right-of-way within the city shall prune the
2		branches so that such branches shall not obstruct the light from any street lamp or obstruct the
3		view of any street intersection and so that there shall be a clear space of fourteen (14) feet above
4		the surface of the street and eight feet (8') above the surface of the sidewalk. Said owners shall
5		remove all dead, diseased or dangerous trees, or broken or decayed limbs which constitute a
6		hazard to the safety of the public. The city shall have the right to prune any tree or shrub on private
7		property when it interferes with the proper spread of light along the street from a street light or
8		interferes with visibility of any traffic control device or sign.
9	b)	Pruning for or by Utility will require the franchise to obtain a written permit from the city. A city
10		franchised utility maintaining its utility system in the street may prune or cause to be pruned, in
11		accordance with this chapter and using proper arboricultural practices in accordance with the
12		permit, any tree located in or overhanging the street which interfered with any light, pole, wire,
13		cable, appliance or apparatus used in connection with or as part of a utility system. The permit
14		may be issued as a city-wide permit valid for one year if the utility adequately demonstrates the
15		ability to meet the performance requirements of this chapter and to consistently apply proper
16		arboricultural practices to the pruning of trees.
17	c)	The utility shall provide the city written notice of any pruning work at least three (3) working days
18		prior to the start of the work.
19	d)	In those cases where a tree cannot be pruned in such a manner as to preserve the physical or
20		aesthetic integrity of the tree, the tree may be removed and replaced by the utility at its own
21		expense and in compliance with the replacement provision of this chapter.
22	14) <u>Dec</u>	ad or Diseased Tree Removal on Private Property
23	a)	The city shall have the right to cause the removal of any dead or diseased trees on private property
24		within the city, when such trees constitute a hazard to life and property, or harbor insects or

1	disease which constitutes a potential threat to other trees within the city. The city will notify in
2	writing the owners of such trees. Removal shall be done by said owners at their own expense
3	within sixty (60) days after the date of service of notice. In the event of failure of owners to comply
4	with such provisions, the city shall have the authority to remove such trees and charge the cost of
5	removal on the owner's property tax notice.
6	15) <u>Removal of Stumps</u>
7	a) In addition to the standards of the National Arborist Association, all stumps of street and park trees
8	shall be removed to a depth of six (6) inches below the surface of the ground.
9	16) Sidewalk, Walkway, Curbing or Roadways Damaged by Roots
10	a) Any street and park trees whose roots have damaged any sidewalks, curbing, roadways and the
11	owner is unable to remove the hazard by root grinding the tree will be removed at city expense and
12	replaced with a recommended tree species. The owner of the property will be given a choice of
13	not less than three (3) tree species for replacement. Replacement will take place within one year
14	of removal at the convenience of city and owner.
15	17) Interference with City
16	a) It shall be unlawful for any person to prevent, delay or interfere with the city, or any of its agents,
17	while engaging in and about the planting, cultivating, mulching, pruning, spraying, or removing of
18	any Trees on private grounds, as authorized in this ordinance.
19	18) Appeal. If a tree removal permit is denied by the city manager without prior review by a city
20	designated arborist, the owner may appeal the city manager's decision by making a written request
21	for review by a city designated arborist and paying the fee for such review, both within ten days of
22	the written notice of denial. If the designated arborist certifies the tree is a restricted tree or meets
23	the criteria of subsection 48-63(d)( <u>3</u> 4)f., the city manager shall issue the permit.

4		20) Removal protection. All replacement trees, regardless of DBH, shall be protected from removal				
5	pursuant to the provisions of this section.					
6		21) Tree replacement must be completed within 12 months of the approved removal application.				
7	(e) Variances and penalties.					
8	1) Variances. Variances to this section may be applied for in accordance with the variance section of this Land					
9	Development Code (chapter <u>42</u> , article III).					
10	e) Penalties.					
11	1) Violations of this section shall be subject to the following:					
12	a)	Where violations of this section have of	ccurred, remedial action shall be taker	to restore the property		
13		consistent with a restoration plan appro	oved by the city manager or the city m	anager's designee. The

24	b)	No certificate of occupancy or certificat				
25		until all applicable permit or restoration	n plan conditions have been accomplis	hed. For developed		

1		properties, failure to take the remedial action required by the restoration plan shall constitute a
2		continuing violation of this section, and shall be referred to the code enforcement board magistrate for
3		enforcement as provided by chapter 14, article II of this Code; and
4	c)	The City shall fine the applicant \$250.00 per tree, having a DBH of less than six inches and \$500.00
5		per tree having a DBH of six or more inches, which was removed in violation of this section. Any person or
6		persons found in violation of this section shall be fined by an amount set by the City Council.
7	d)	Any person or persons who violate any of the provisions of this chapter shall be required to reimburse
8		the city for any costs incurred for treatment or removal and replacement of the tree or repair of the box
9		or casing around the tree, including total personnel services, costs, materials and an additional charge of
10		ten percent for administrative overhead.
11	e)	If, as the result of the violation of this chapter, the injury, mutilation, or death of a public tree or

15	f)	For new development, the developer, or property owner is responsible to insure the planted trees and
16		shrubs have the proper care for a period of one year after the project close-out. The developer may be
17		required to issue a performance bond, or place a deposit, with the city in the event the trees need to be
18		replaced within the one-year period.
19	g)	Any person or persons who have previously been found in violation of this section may be required to post
20		additional assurances in the form of performance bond, cash, or any other financial vehicle acceptable to
21		<u>the city.</u>
22	2) Tre	ee trust fund. In lieu of tree replacement as required by subsection (d)(5), the city manager may approve
23	the	e payment by the owner <del>of \$250.00</del> <u>in an amount set by the City Council</u> per tree removed but not replaced
24	to	be paid into a tree trust fund. The tree trust fund shall be established from all monies collected pursuant to
25		

this section 48-63. The tree trust fund shall be used to plant trees of the recommended species on public property, such as, but not limited to, public parks and rights-of-way. The tree trust fund may also be used to fund grants to private individuals who establish financial need to replace trees that are removed pursuant to this section.

**SECTION 2. Codification.** This Ordinance shall be incorporated into and codified within the Land Development Code of the City of Belle Isle, Florida. Any section, paragraph number, letter and/or any heading may be changed or modified as necessary to effectuate the foregoing. Grammatical, typographical and similar or like errors may be corrected, and additions, alterations, and omissions not affecting the construction or meaning of this ordinance or the Land Development Code may be freely made.

SECTION 3. Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, word or provision of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, whether for substantive, procedural, or any other reason, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision, and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

SECTION 4. Conflicts. In the event of a conflict or conflicts between this Ordinance and any other ordinance or provision
of law, this Ordinance controls to the extent of the conflict, as allowable under the law.

SECTION 5. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon adoption by the City
Council of the City of Belle Isle, Florida.
