TOWN OF BLUFFTON LAW ENFORCEMENT CITIZENS ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEETING Thursday, June 10, 2021

Members Present: Harry Lutz, Mayra Rivera-Vazquez, Michael Frazier, Reggie Howard, Michael Frazier, Bill O'Toole and Gerhard Ogurek Members Not Present: Tabor Vaux, George Baily and Jennifer Morrow

Staff Present: Lieutenant Danyov and Officer Harden

Chairman Tabor Vaux was not present. Vice Chairman Harry Lutz called the meeting to order at 6:18 p.m. followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. Prior to Vice Chairman calling the meeting to order, new member Gerhard Ogurek introduced himself to the present committee members. Each member then introduced himself/herself to Mr. Ogurek.

A motion to amend the minutes from May was presented and several members seconded the motion.

Old Business: There was not any "old" business that needed to be addressed.

New Business:

There was not any "new" business that needed to be addressed.

Bluffton Police Department Update:

Lieutenant Danyov presented the committee with the Bluffton Police Department. Items discussed are as follows:

 Spanish classes are being offered to BPD Officers in order to better communicate with our Spanish speaking community.

 The multi-jurisdictional hiring expo that was previously scheduled will be postponed to a date to be determined in September 2021.

 Cook out with the Cops community event will be held at the Baynard Park Community on June 11, 2021 at 1700. BPD Officers will be present to show community support and answer any questions that the community may have.

Three new Officers started with the BPD this month. One Officer is prior certified from New York and is
equipped with a K9. Another Officer is a local hire and speaks Spanish. The third Officer was honorably
discharged from the United States Marine Corps.

 Lt Danyov asked the committee members to come up with ideas or additional methods in order to address retention efforts.

The next LECAC will be held on July 8, 2021 at BPD training room in order for committee members to
observe and utilize the de-escalation and scenario simulator.

Discussion:

Harry Lutz stated that the purchase of the simulator is a great asset for the BPD. It is a tremendous too
to train Officers and to maintain proficiency. It is also a valuable asset to educate community members
and possibly the media on the decision making process that Officers face every day.

 Bill O'Toole commended the efforts of the BPD recruitment team in order to identify potential new hires in an efficient manner. Mr. O'Toole stated that some agencies take a significantly long period for this process and potentially losing new hires to other agencies. Mr. O'Toole stated that many applicants submit applications to several agencies at once and often accept an offer form the first agency. Harry Lutz asked the question in terms of geographic location of new hires if the majority are from out
of state or local hires. Lt Danyov answered that the BPD hiring board tries to maintain a balance of out
of state and local new hires. This balance is beneficial to the BPD because it brings diversity to the
department. Lt Danyov also stated that the hiring board also maintains a balance of prior certified
Officers and Officers with no prior law enforcement experience.

Harry Lutz also asked if there are any additional incentives for BPD, Officers in order for apply or
remain with the department. Lt Danyov answered that there are several incentives for Officers and that
the department is researching additional incentives. The Department is researching the possibility to
increase the boundaries that Officers may drive their "take home" vehicles in an "off-duty" status.
Other incentives include one hour of paid gym time. The department continues to provide for the
health of each Officer both physically and mentally.

Michael Frazier asked if there has been any reports regarding scam/fraud using music apps. He stated that he has had several citizens inquire about this. Lt Danyov answered that scams/fraud attempts are common for this area due to the individuals attempting to prey on the older generation residing in the Bluffton area. Lt Danyov encouraged anyone who maybe a victim of fraud/scam to contact the BPD.
Mayra Rivera asked about the mental health position. Lt Danyov answered that the BPD is looking to fill a non-sworn position to a qualified applicant to offer mental health services to the community. Gerhard Ogurek stated that his previous agency had this position and it was a great benefit to the department and to the community.

- Harry Lutz would like to have more advance notifications of BPD scheduled events.

 Harry Lutz asked the question about "left lane" traffic enforcement in regards to slower traffic in the left lane.

- Michael Frazier stated that his company would be donating to the BPD for the hiring expo.

 Harry Lutz would like to see if members of the committee could get a "shirt" identifying them as members of the LECAC.

 Mayra Rivera would like to put on the agenda for next month's meeting the capability for the LECAC to branch out more and meet with the community.

A motion to adjourn was made at 1833 and several members seconded the motion.

- Responded to Noise complaint on Crossings Blvd. H.O.A has regulations for noise on Holidays. Resident will contact H.O.A to discuss.
- Sub-Contractor license check for Tony Charron in Palmetto Bluff. KDL / KFL on Davies Road, couldn't produce I.D at the time.
- Sub-Contractor license renewal for Lighthouse Electrical. They were named on a permit at the time was prior to their renewal.
- Certified and Regular letter sent to Jimmy Taylor @ Calvary Training Center. Spoke to his wife on the phone, the manure piles have been removed and property is in compliance.
- Spoke to April Hudson regarding an illegal dump site on the edge of the parking lot behind Evi-Core off Buckwalter Parkway. Paint cans and buckets were found at the site, photos were taken of the site and tags on the buckets. I contacted Sherwin Williams to determine who the paint was sold to and made the appropriate calls. The business confirmed ownership and indicated it was done by their sub-contractor and ultimately cleaned the area without incident.
- Business License check for G&S Roofing, A1 Glass and Fireside contractors for 234 Davies Road. They were listed on a permit application to town hall, at the time their business license was expired.
- Spoke with Ms. Norma Cooley regarding a fenced right of way on a property located on Wharf Street. Upon review it appears to be a deeded right of way as its solely contained on privately owned property. Ms. Cooley isn't harmed in any way based on this property being fenced off and no action was taken.
- Spoke with Jacob @ DHEC regarding a potential collaboration between DHEC and Bluffton for a cleanup but the property in question was found to be on Alljoy which is outside jurisdiction.
- Certified and Regular letter sent to 25 Bruin Road for a sign that contained flashing and moving message. Letter were sent to both the owner of the property along with the occupant as they were different.
- · License check for contractor: Alpha Omega Construction Group for Tony Charron @ Palmetto Bluff
- Complaint investigation of potential tree removal without permitting on Goethe Road. Information from Town Hall, original email from Heather Colin. I spoke with Will Howard, planning department regarding the potential issues. Further property inspections will be done to determine extent of possible violation(s).
