# Impact to Local Governments

- Congress approved \$350 billion for state, local, territorial and Tribal governments to respond to the COVID-19 emergency and bring back jobs.
- Municipal allocations based on two tranches; non-entitlement (\$19.5B) vs entitlement communities (\$45.6B)
- Metro (entitlement eligible) communities receive distribution based on CDBG formula which uses objective measures of community needs;
  - Population
  - Extent of poverty
  - Housing overcrowding and
  - Age of housing
- Non-entitlement allocations are based solely on population

# Final Allocations

- State = \$2.5 billion
- Beaufort County = \$37.3 million
- **Bluffton = \$1.98 million**
- Hilton Head = \$5.2 million
- Beaufort City = \$6.69 million (non-entitlement)
- Hardeeville = \$3.6 million (non-entitlement)

# Final Allocations Cont'd

Original Estimate \$9.55M

Why a 79% decline?

- Congressional estimates recognized Bluffton as a non-entitlement based on our decline of HUD entitlement classification
- U.S. Treasury interpreted the law to mean all eligible metro areas, regardless of HUD CDBG status, shall be treated as an entitlement community for purposes of ARPA allocations
- Revised estimate based on CDBG formula = \$1.98M

Options:

- U.S. Treasury will not adjust allocations
- Some communities impacted by the different interpretation were made whole from State ARPA allocations.

# Distribution of Funds

- Direct allocation from U.S. Treasury to entitlement communities
- 50% Received (\$991,235.50)
- Other 50% allocated in June 2022
- Can be used for costs incurred (obligated) by December 31, 2024
  - Must be fully spent by December 31, 2026
- Subrecipients subject to ARPA use restrictions

1. Support COVID-19 Response
2. Replace lost public sector revenue
3. Support immediate economic stabilization
4. Address systemic public health and economic challenges

# Ineligible Uses

- To offset tax decreases
- Payments into a pension fund
- Other restrictions to allowable uses



# Allowable Uses - Replace Revenue Loss

- **Revenue loss is calculated** relative to the expected trend (prior three FY's), beginning with the last full fiscal year pre-pandemic (FY19) and adjusted annually for growth.

|                        |               |
|------------------------|---------------|
| Base Year Revenue      | \$ 27,933,115 |
| Growth Rate            | 9.1%          |
| Counterfactual Revenue | \$ 31,849,065 |
| Actual Revenue         | \$ 28,142,164 |
| Revenue Reduction      | \$ 3,706,901  |
| Revenue Reduction %    | -11.6%        |

- Can expect to capture full \$1.98M ARPA allocation as revenue loss

# Allowable Uses - Replace Revenue Loss Cont'd

- “...for the provision of **government services**.”
- Can include but are not limited to;
  - Maintenance
  - Infrastructure
  - Modernization of cybersecurity
  - Health services
  - Environmental remediation
  - Safety services
- Cannot be used for;
  - P&I
  - Settlements
  - Reserves

# Allowable Uses – Support Public Health Response

- **Mitigation & Prevention:** vaccinations, medical care, testing, contact tracing, support of quarantines, medical access for vulnerable populations, enforcement, public communication, PPE, ventilation, facilities improvements to meet pandemic operational needs.
- **Medical Expenses:** May provide care and services to address these near- and longer-term needs of COVID-19 symptoms.
- **Behavioral Health:** Mental health treatment, substance misuse, behavioral health, crisis intervention, overdose prevention, infectious disease prevention, promoting access to primary and preventative medicine.
- **Public Health and Safety Staff:** Payroll and benefits of public health and safety personnel to the extent that their services are devoted to mitigating or responding to COVID-19 emergency.

# Allowable Uses – Water & Sewer Infrastructure

- Aligns eligible uses with the types of projects eligible under the EPA's Clean Water State Revolving Fund or Drinking Water State Revolving Fund.
  - Wastewater treatment plant improvements
  - Control of non-point sources of pollution
  - Improve infrastructure resiliency to severe water events
  - Green infrastructure
  - Protection of water bodies from pollution
  - Drinking water systems
  - Distribution systems improvements
  - Treatment infrastructure
  - Stormwater treatment
  - Water reuse
  - Cyber security

# Allowable Uses – Broadband Infrastructure

- “Projects designed to deliver service that reliably meets or exceeds symmetrical upload and download speeds of 100Mbps.”
- Mostly directed at underserved rural areas
- Not applicable

# Allowable Uses – Address Negative Economic Impacts

- “...assess whether, and the extent to which, there as been an economic harm, such as loss of earnings or revenue, that resulted from the COVID-19 public health emergency and whether, and the extent to which, the use would respond or address this harm.”  
“...consider whether this harm was caused or made worse by the COVID-19 public health emergency\*.

\*“In assessing whether a household meets this definition you may presume a household that experienced unemployment or increased housing or food insecurity **or is low or moderate income** (<80% AMI) experienced negative economic impacts from the pandemic.”

# Allowable Uses – Address Negative Economic Impacts

- Eligible uses:
  - **Assistance to unemployed workers**
  - **Assistance to households;** food assistance, rent, mortgage, or utility assistance, burials, home repairs, weatherization, or other needs, literacy assistance, job training.
  - **Improve efficacy of economic relief programs** including data analysis, targeted consumer outreach, improvement to technology and impact evaluations.
  - **Small Business and Non-profit assistance** to weather closure or mitigate financial hardships resulting from COVID-19 including loans, grants to compensate for declines in revenues or implement COVID-19 prevention tactics and technical assistance, counseling or other services to assist with business planning needs.
  - **Rehiring government staff**
  - **Aid to impacted industries;** to respond to negative economic impacts of the pandemic in tourism, travel and hospitality, for example: PPE, safe reopening and impacts of required closures.



# Allowable Uses – Equity-Focused Services

- **Investments in housing and neighborhoods**
  - Services to address homelessness
  - Affordable housing development
  - Housing vouchers, residential counseling or housing navigations
- **Educational disparities**
  - Early learning services
  - High-poverty school district assistance
  - Tutoring, summer, afterschool and extended learning programs
  - Social, emotional and mental health programs
- **Promoting healthy childhood environments**
  - New or expanded childcare
  - Home visiting programs to educate and assist in navigating resources
  - Education and training for child welfare involved families

# Allowable Uses – Premium Pay

- “Premium pay to eligible workers performing essential work during the COVID-19 public health emergency....workers that maintain continuity of operation of essential critical sectors including protecting the health and wellbeing of communities.”
- An amount up to \$13 per hour in addition to wages otherwise received not to exceed \$25k per eligible worker. Should prioritize lower income eligible workers performing essential work.
- Such workers include; healthcare staff, workers in food production, janitors and sanitation workers, public safety, childcare, social and human services, workers that have regular in-person interactions or regular physical handling of items that were also handled by others.
