Expanded STAR

With the last couple subcommittee meetings, staff has received feedback and been implementing everything into a newly-designed layout for the expanded 12-page issue. Digital Metrics Report for City's Current Website

A Digital Metrics Report is being produced each month from mid-month to mid-month, in this case, Sept. 14 – Oct. 14, 2025. It details the website's Top 25 Page Views and Search Terms, Mobile/Tablet vs. Desktop, a breakdown of Organic Search, Social Media, and Direct Traffic, and Top Operating System by Users (see Attachment 2). This report will continue to be updated and distributed to the full Council by the middle of each month.

Progress of New Website

Staff has been receiving training on various modules of the City's new website with CivicPlus, as well as comparing migrated pages with what's currently on the site to ensure information and documents are fully reflected on the new website. In addition to a new website will also be a new agenda meeting management system, which will make its debut in January 2026. It's expected that the new website will launch with in mid-November, 2025. Prior to its launch, we could host a 60-minute "bug bash" involving the subcommittee, staff, and local volunteers. This all-hands-on-deck session would be a proactive way to identify any remaining issues and ensure a smooth launch.

Now in his 80s, he still serves on the CAFE Task Force and especially enjoys volunteering with the CHP. His humility and dedication have made him a cornerstone of our community.

Our Youth Volunteer of the Year, Sebastian Bousquet, proves that leadership starts early. A longtime volunteer at local events like Spring Thing and the Derby,

Sebastian also serves on the Youth Advisory Committee, now in his second term as President (2024-2026). energy, vision, and civic engagement inspire peers and adults alike. Beyond Brisbane, he volunteers with Christian Service at St. Anthony's and supported the 2022 parcel tax campaign.

CROSSWALK SAFETY EDITION

Welcome to the inaugural edition of Street Beat, your new go-to section dedicated to making our streets safer! Each edition, we'll delve into important topics concerning traffic safety, pedestrian rights, and what we can do to make a safer community.

Crosswalk Safety: Pedestrians Have the Right of Way!

It's crucial to remember that pedestrians have the right-of-way when they are within a marked or unmarked crosswalk.

According to the California Vehicle Code (CVC) Section 21950 (a), The driver of a vehicle shall yield the right-of-way to a pedestrian crossing within any marked or unmarked crosswálk at an intersection.

For detailed information on pedestrian and driver laws in California, consult the oCalifornia Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) Driver Handbook, available online at dmv.ca.gov.

Tips for Drivers:

- Be Alert: Always be on the lookout for pedestrians, especially near schools, parks, and shopping areas.
- Yield to Pedestrians: If a pedestrian is in the crosswalk, stop and allow them to cross safely.
- Slow Down: Reduce your speed when approaching crosswalks, even if no pedestrians are visible.
- Avoid Distractions: Put away your phone and focus solely on driving.

Tips for Pedestrians:


- Use Crosswalks: Always use marked crosswalks when available.
- Make Eye Contact: Try to make eye contact with drivers to ensure they see you before stepping into the crosswalk.
- Be Visible: Wear bright clothing, especially at night, and consider carrying a flashlight.
- Stay Alert: Avoid distractions like cell phones while crossing the street.

- No Texting and Driving: A vital reminder about the dangers and illegality of texting while driving.





IDEA Committee Update

At their October 2nd City Council meeting, the City's Inclusion, Diversity, Equity & Accountability Committee presented their 2025-26 Workplan to the Council as well as the Committee's newly-developed Vision, Mission, and Principles (see poster at right). The Council unanimously approved the Committee's workplan, with Councilmember Davis citing, "as a fledging Committee, you've really been able to get a great foundation going, which will inform all the work you will do."

In January 2026, the IDEA Committee plans to develop a diversity grant program for community members and/or organizations to apply for potential funding, and lead planning for an MLK Jr. discussion at the Library around his principles. Another item of interest the community are the flags in the Community Park. The IDEA Committee will be taking a closer look at the display schedule to see if adjustments could result in greater recognition for the flags being flown.

So We Live Near an Airport

During City Council Meetings, under Mayor and Council Matters, the City Councilmembers report out on their Countywide assignments.

Councilmember O'Connell serves as Vice Chair on the Airport Community Roundtable, and at the Oct. 2nd meeting explained why residents had recently experienced higher-thannormal aircraft noise.

"Brisbane has the bonus and the curse of being close to the ultra-busy San Francisco International Airport (SFO). While it offers us convenient access to flights all over the world, it also subjects us to the noise that comes with that convenience."

Recently, there were many complaints to the City about disruptive flights at all times of the day and night.

It was investigated and determined that

due to the weather in Oakland and in San Jose, SFO flights had to go into REVERSE FLOW, causing planes to take off and land in unusual patterns.

This will also happen when our weather is stormy, foggy, or the winds are coming from the opposite direction; additional noise can be expected during these events. And it will be the case due to nearby airports' operations, as well.

WHAT TO DO?

SFO has a great website, <u>noise.flysfo.com</u>, that can help you understand the noise, see the flights that are causing the noise events at your home, and report them in real-time to SFO. From the website, go to Contact, then download either the Noise Report App or the WebTrak Noise Tracker.

Download the app or go online and you will have interactive, real-time flight maps, noise events, and lots of



data and reports. You will be able to see all the planes in the sky approaching and departing, and the ability to report the loud ones directly to SFO, which will be included in their monthly reports of noise complaints.

If you'd like to phone in a noise complaint to SFO, you can do so by dialing 650-821-4736.

Tree of Heaven Added to Invasive Species List

The City of Brisbane has added the Tree of Heaven (Ailanthus altissima) to its Invasive Species List. This decision follows growing concerns from residents and San Mateo County Parks about the plant's rapid spread from private properties onto public lands.

Known for its fast growth and aggressive root system, Tree of Heaven can damage infrastructure, outcompete native plants, and pose a fire risk. Due to its increasing impact, the City Manager has amended Regulation 15.44.120 under fire code authority to include it.

This update allows the City to take proactive steps in managing and removing the species, especially in high-risk areas. Property owners may be contacted if Tree of Heaven is identified on their property, and we encourage everyone to help prevent its spread.

FIRE-RESILIENT YARDS:

Protecting Homes Without Losing Our Shade

Depending on whom you talk to, the proposed new defensible space rules for "zone zero" will either help save homes in very high fire hazard severity zones, or decimate much of California's cooling urban tree canopy without really deterring the types of wildland fires that destroyed so many homes over the last few years.

How do I balance seemingly conflicting messages about fire resiliency? While Brisbane has not been designated as a "zone zero," we cannot ignore the threat of wildland fire. However, fire-smart landscaping does not mean cutting down all of your trees! Shade trees offer valuable benefits that actually enhance fire safety, but all vegetation requires careful management.

While trees provide much needed shade and cooling, it is important to regularly assess tree health. To maintain a healthy tree canopy, it is vital to deep water trees during extended dry periods.

Brisbane's Annual Winter Clean-up is Nov. 15-16. Dumpsters will be placed around town to dispose of yard waste. Here are some fire-resilient yard tips to help!

- Clear dead weeds, leaves, pine needles, dead grass, and debris; check roofs, gutters, and outdoor areas
- Keep branches trimmed 10 feet away from chimneys and stovepipes and rune flammable plants and shrubs near windows
- Clear flammable vegetation and any firewood or wood debris from under decks, balconies & stairs

Brisbane Adds F-150 Lightning to City Fleet



With the federal Commercial Clean Vehicle Credit expiring at the end of September, the City of Brisbane took action to procure a Ford F-150 Lightning electric pickup truck by the deadline. This move aligns with the City's broader commitment to electrifying its vehicle fleet and reducing greenhouse gas emissions as outlined in the City's Climate Action Plan.

The F-150 Lightning acquisition is just one component of a multi-year fleet electrification strategy. In collaboration with Optony, a clean

energy consulting firm, the City developed a comprehensive Fleet Electrification Strategic Plan. This includes designs for EV charging infrastructure and a phased vehicle deployment roadmap including the goal of electrifying 30% of its light-duty vehicles by 2030 and 100% by 2040.

The City is expected to integrate the F-150 Lightning into its operational fleet shortly. The vehicle will serve in a public works capacity, helping the City reduce fuel costs & emissions while maintaining service reliability.


