Why? If the decision was to make the North Shore a major employment center, I wanted that decision discussed in the context of a downtown facing real challenges. I wanted this planning decision to consider how it would effect the fate our most-capable Downtown, including the mill's next great chapter.

The Vision Statement adopted by the Planning Commission provides clarity about the whole of Camas, and contains sufficient recognition and protection of our Downtown.

Point 6 provides: Favor local-serving businesses. Encourage small businesses such as restaurants, cafes and grocers that serve North Shore residents and businesses while not harming the economic viability of Downtown Camas.

Point 8 recognizes Camas' small-town feel. A major employment center built on the North Shore would not be consistent.

The Planning Commission's Vice-Chair and Commissioner Mahsa Eshghi stated Point 8 has another critical protection as they defended against an effort to remove it. It would direct future City investments be appropriate, e.g. not building a roadway designed to serve a major employment center.

These points together recognize Camas' small town feel is based on an urban design centered on a small, central, and effective Downtown managed through an active private partnership. Thank you DCA.

The outcome ensures the North Shore is a shadow of Downton Camas, and not its new star.

Most heartening of this process was the public confirmation by the primary landowner. Mr. Lynn Johnston comments captured by the Post-Record included:

"My family owns most of the employment land in the North Shore area..."

The Post Record article continues explaining Mr. Johnston's position on the draft Vision Statement:

"Having now seen what the community values having in the area, Johnston said he is open to making adjustments that would better align with the community vision for the North Shore."

Mr.Johnson is quoted 'Most of the (points) in the vision statement would hinder a large employment center'

The article continues "Johnston said. 'Clearly, priorities have shifted over time'."

The adopted Vision Statement contrasts with the major employment center talked about in 2013. This is not Nike or Intel.

Instead, the vision statement approved by the Planning Commission recognizes the North Shore as several future neighborhoods in Camas, serving an established Downtown.

I support the Vision Statement for the North Shore Plan as adopted by the Planning Commission. I will put this in writing to the Mayor and Council.

If I could add anything it would be sustainability of design. A thought is there about a design that minimizes car trips. This is only the beginning for sustainable development.

Sustainable design can be handled, perhaps more appropriately, in the permitting process consistently through a city-wide process. Perhaps Camas should consider some sort of Sustainability element for future planning. Many are ready to work with you and others on that.

Thank you for your tireless work and pulling this difficult issue together. I think the citizens of Camas are getting a good path forward for their money. I underestimated this process's ability to address the Downtown issue in such a declarative manner. I'm glad it did.
