TIMELINE OF GOOD-FAITH OUTREACH & DOCUMENTED FACTS

4.23.25 – voicemail exchange with Chief Ryan requesting assistance with resolution. Followed up with a Phone call.

4.23.25 (8:04 PM) – Emailed entire Council asking for an apology and resolution.

4.26.25 – Text exchange with Mayor Clarke requesting assistance regarding resolution (followed by phone calls).

4.28.25 – Met with Mayor Clarke for over an hour to discuss paths to civility.

5.02.25 – Texted Chief Ryan reiterating request for peaceful resolution and apology.

5.29.25 – Follow-up outreach to Councilmember Orbach, Chief Ryan, and Mayor Clarke again seeking resolution.

6.12.25 (7:57 PM) – Filed formal Code of Conduct complaint against Councilmember Orbach.

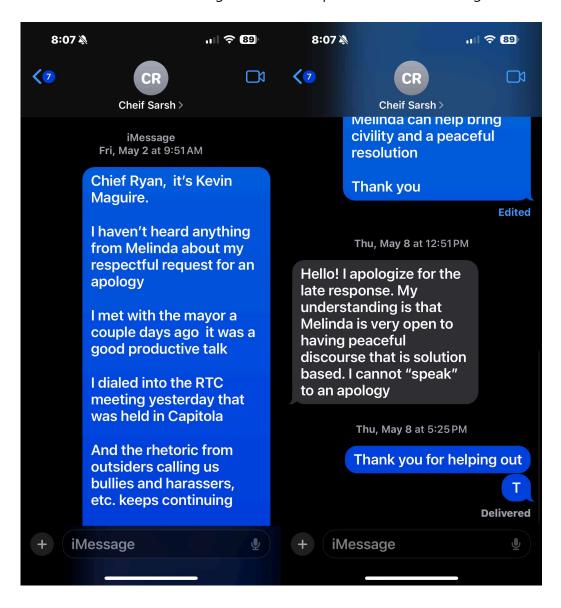
6.26.25 (4:23 PM) – First email from Councilmember Orbach in over two months, mentioning CRC mediation.

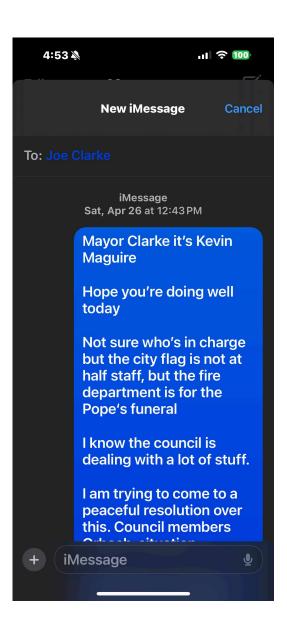
7.16.25 (10:20 AM) – I responded after returning from travel.

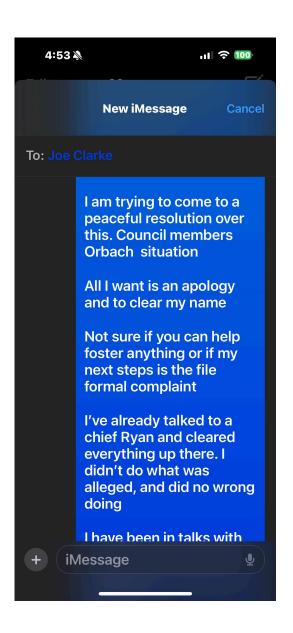
- **7.16.25 (4:18 PM)** Councilmember Orbach replied with a brief 13-word response to my detailed question about how mediation could address the harm.
- **7.16.25 (4:26 PM)** I clarified: open to mediation, but stressed the need for sincerity and acknowledgment of the real impact of her remarks as part of any resolution.
- **7.31.25 (10:51 AM)** Orbach: "You do not start mediation with a set of conditions. That is not how mediation works. If you would like to move forward with mediation, let me know. This is my third and final offer."
- **7.31.25 (8:44 PM)** My reply: "Yes, mediation is a voluntary process... to be honest about the real impact of your public remarks and the need for that harm to be acknowledged at some point in the process, not necessarily at the outset, but as part of any genuine resolution."
- **8.01.25 (2:01 PM)** Orbach replied: 7-word response "Staff from the CRC will reach out."

Key Clarifications

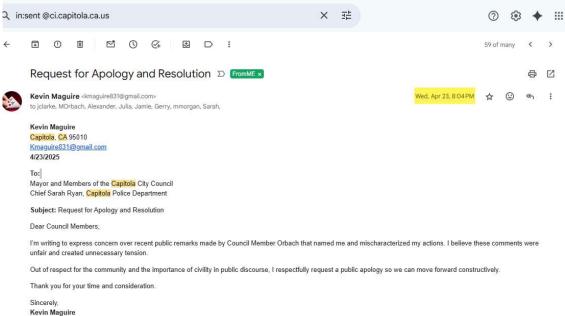
- Orbach's "three offers" were **not three distinct offers**. It was **one ongoing conversation**, in which I consistently affirmed openness to mediation while emphasizing the need for sincerity.
- CRC has since reviewed the matter and **recommended against mediation**, confirming this is not a "misunderstanding" but a case of public harm that belongs with the Council.













Hi Councilmember Orbach.

I hope you're doing well. I wanted to follow up regarding the remarks made during the April 17th council meeting, where I was personally named and characterized in ways that were both

Accusations of harassment and threatening behavior were made publicly, from the dais, without speaking to me, verifying facts, or initiating any investigation. Those words carry weight, and the result has been reputational damage and unnecessary division in our community.

I've taken time to reflect on how we got here. But when harm is done publicly, I believe resolution should be public as well.

That's why I'm respectfully asking for a public apology, not to dwell on the past, but to begin repairing trust. Like you, I believe in doing my homework and coming prepared with facts and notes. In that spirit, I wanted to give you time to consider a short statement at the June 12th council meeting.

I understand the Council is currently reviewing its Code of Conduct, and I believe this moment offers an opportunity to lead by example, showing how we hold ourselves accountable and engage one another with respect.

While I hope we can resolve this respectfully, I've been advised to preserve all legal and formal avenues available to address the reputational and personal harm caused, should this not be resolved constructively.

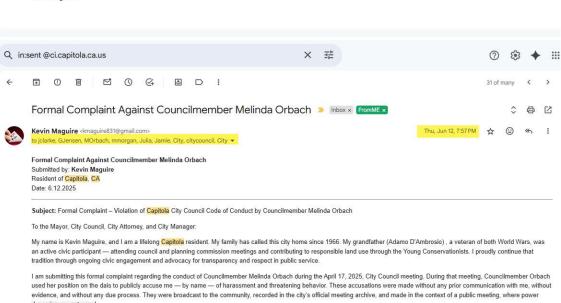
I truly hope it doesn't come to that. Capitola deserves leadership that models accountability and civility, from all of us.

I also want to share that I intend to apply for the vacant council appointment. Since your public remarks, I've felt discouraged from participating in meetings and community discussions, something that's always been important to me. The emotional toll, including anxiety and public embarrassment, has made it more difficult to fully engage in the spaces where I've long felt a sense of purpose and belonging.

If you're open to discussing this further, I'd truly appreciate a response before the June 12th meeting. I believe having some resolution beforehand would help us all move forward in a more constructive and unified way

Thank you for taking the time to consider this. I remain hopeful we can move forward in a way that strengthens our community.

This is not the first instance where Councilmember Orbach has misused the dais — repeatedly using public time and her platform to respond to personal criticism and online commentary, rather than focusing on city business or respectful civic discourse.

Violations of the Code of Conduct

Councilmember Orbach's comments directly violated key provisions of the Capitola City Council Code of Conduct, including:

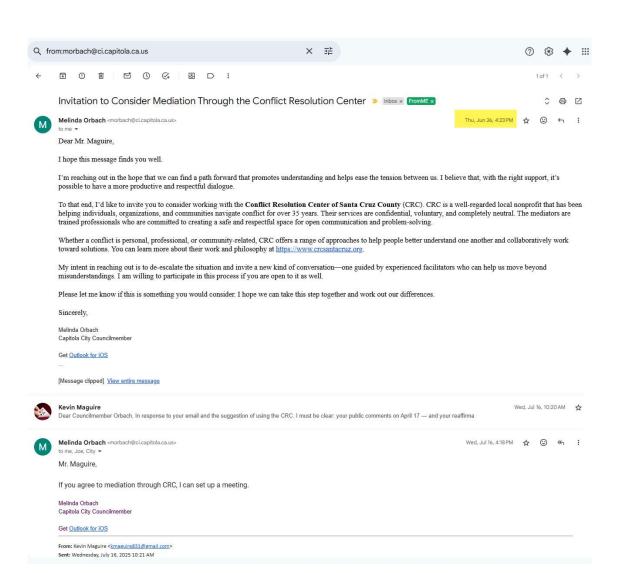
• Section 5.4 - Council Conduct with the Public

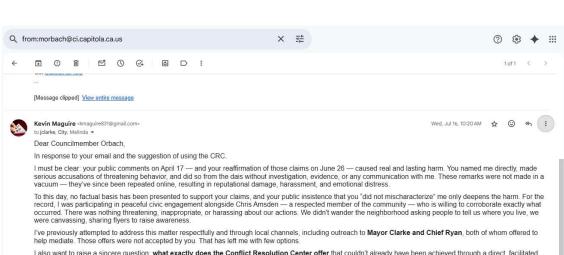
"Councilmembers shall refrain from abusive conduct, personal charges, or verbal attacks upon the character or motives of members of the public."

Section 6.1.2 – Avoiding Impropriety and the Appearance of Impropriety

"Members should not engage in behavior that could be perceived as retaliatory, dismissive, or personally biased."

Councilmembers are also expected to be courteous and responsive to public communications. To that end, I recently submitted a Public Records Act (PRA) request to audit Councilmember Orbach's constituent communication activity over the past six months, seeking to understand her patterns of responsiveness and public engagement.





l also want to raise a sincere question: what exactly does the Conflict Resolution Center offer that couldn't already have been achieved through a direct, facilitated conversation with the Mayor or Chief of Police — two respected, neutral leaders who are rooted in this community and who extended trusted offers to help? A 30-minute meeting could have cleared the air. Their involvement would have allowed us to speak plainly, understand one another, and deescalate things organically. Instead, those offers were rejected, and the conflict escalated.

The core issue here wasn't disagreement — it was your public mischaracterization and accusation, made without due diligence. So I ask in good faith: if local, immediate resolution wasn't an option then, why is CRC the solution now? Chief Ryan is highly trained in conflict resolution, as well as our Mayor's background in law enforcement.

While I remain open to a constructive dialogue, I believe that a public mischaracterization by an elected official warrants public remediation. Mediation through CRC could potentially help, but only if both parties are willing to enter the process with:

- . A shared understanding that feelings are not facts
- · A willingness to acknowledge the impact of one's actions and, where appropriate, accept responsibility
- . A genuine effort to rebuild trust through clear communication and accountability
- A recognition that **public harm requires a public apology** —verbally from the dias, to correct the public record and restore integrity.
 - · Example: "At a previous council meeting, I made comments that named Kevin Maguire and described events based on how I felt at the time. I understand now that my words caused harm—an for that, I sincerely apologize. I hope this statement helps begin the process of restoring trust, and I remain committed to more respectful, evidence-based communication moving forward." (I give cocent to use my name in a public apology - KM)

I will take time to learn more about CRC's process. If it aligns with the values above, and you are genuinely committed to accountability, I would consider participating. Do you have a contact there, or started the process already? Is there a cost to this? Who will bear those costs?

But let me be equally clear: this matter is not about a misunderstanding — it is about public harm. And resolution must reflect that truth.
