# Study Overview

# Study Purposes

- Evaluate potential locations for CV Rail station site and layover facility in Coachella
- Select the City's preferred station location
- For the preferred location, develop:
  - Preliminary engineering plans, architectural drawings, and connectivity plans for the rail station
  - Transit-oriented community plans and economic development strategies for the surrounding area



# CV Rail and the Coachella Station Study

- Final selection of station locations will be determined in the NEPA/CEQA CV Rail Tier II/Project Environmental Document<sup>1</sup>
- Analysis and information in this study will be utilized to help determine the final selection of the preferred alternative during formal NEPA/CEQA process
- Location of tracks for CV Rail are subject to negotiations and agreements with the host railroad
- This study does not commit the City to the approval or construction of any particular station location or design concept

Site 2 in Pueblo Viejo was recommended to City Council because it has good accessibility, the most supportive land use, and the fewest engineering constraints

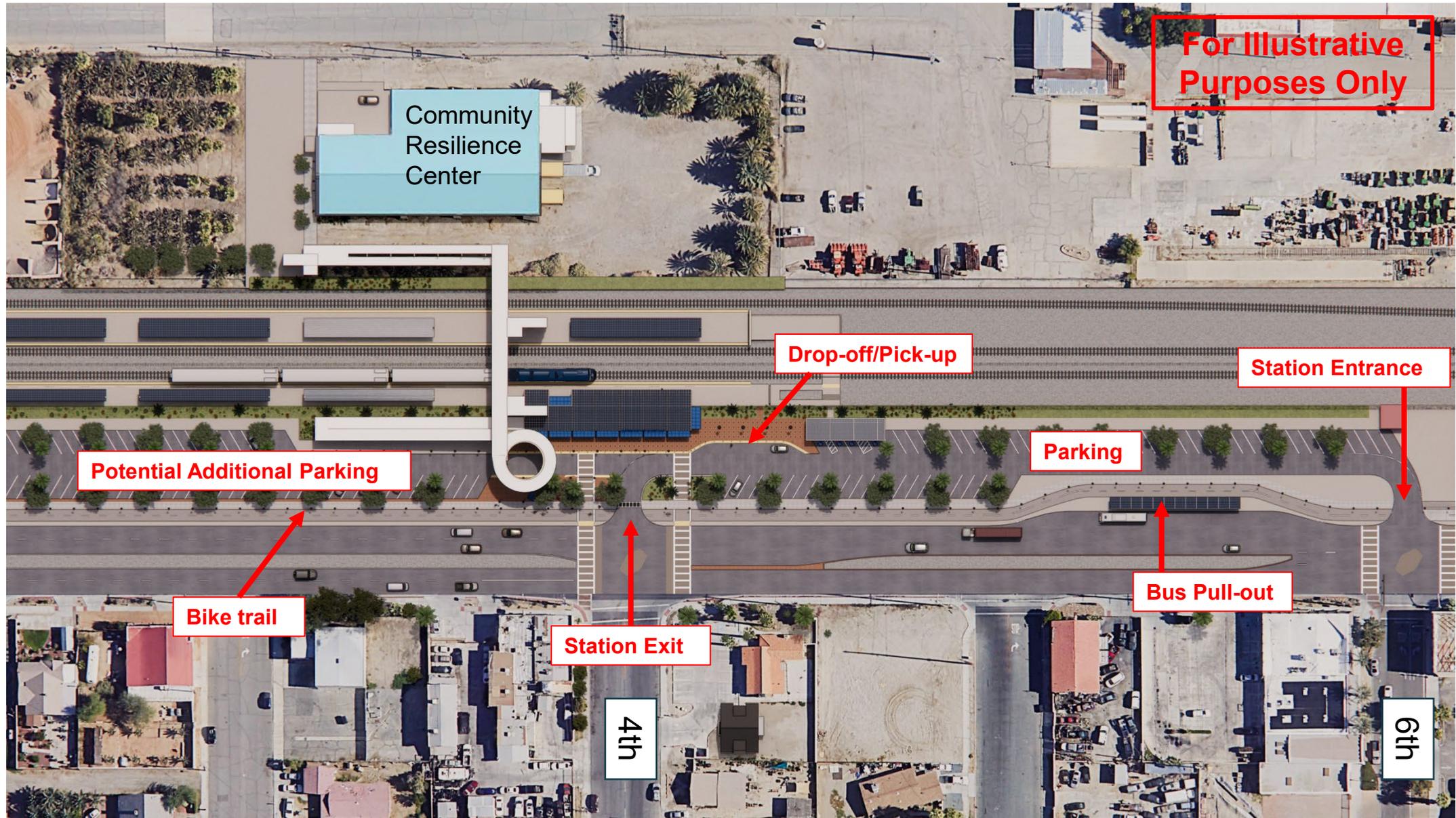


# Layover Facility Location

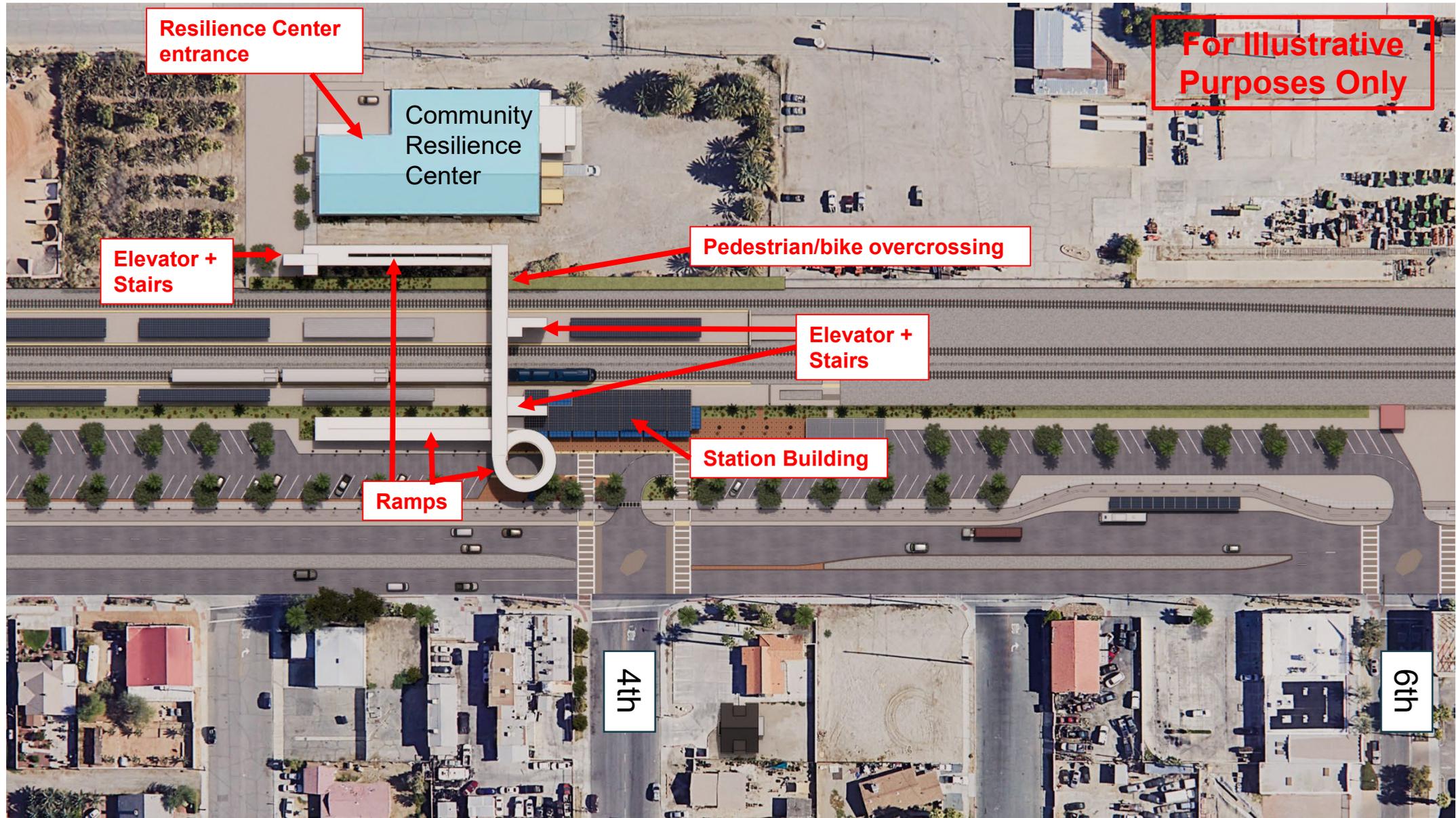
- South of Avenue 52 was determined to be the optimal location operationally
- More land is available on the east side of the railroad to accommodate facility elements:
  - 3 storage tracks
  - Train wash
  - Crew building
  - Truck access and employee parking

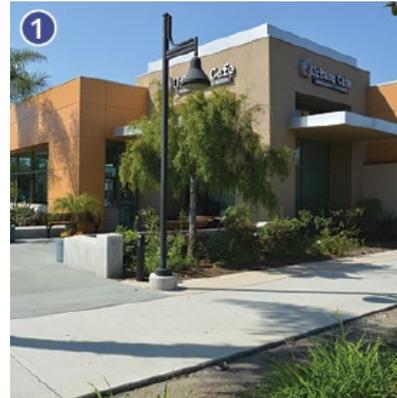

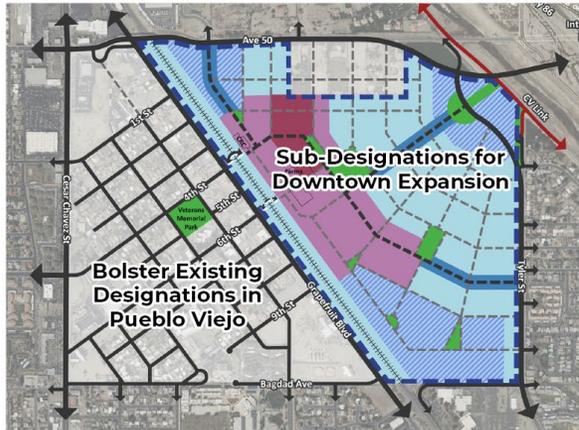

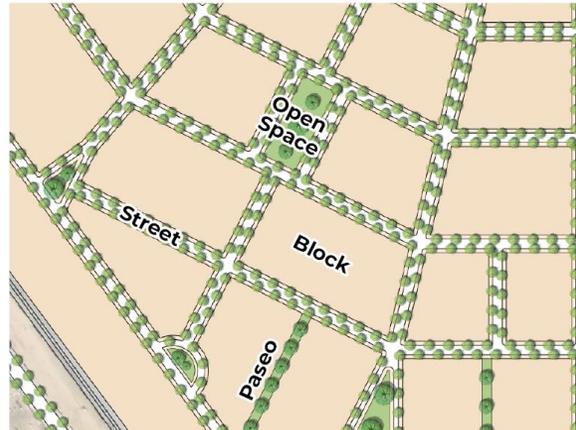

This section describes the attributes of each land use Designation and Sub-Designation applicable to the Plan Area; these descriptions serve as a key to the remainder of the Toolkit.



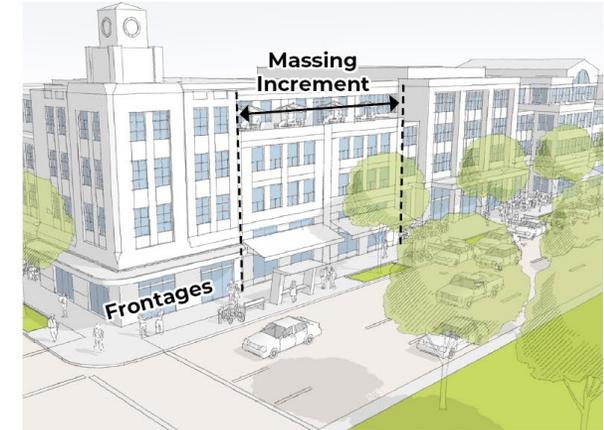
### The Public Realm (Section 3.3)

Once blocks are defined by the Public Realm established per Section 3.3, this section describes how to configure buildings, parking, and utilities on those blocks.



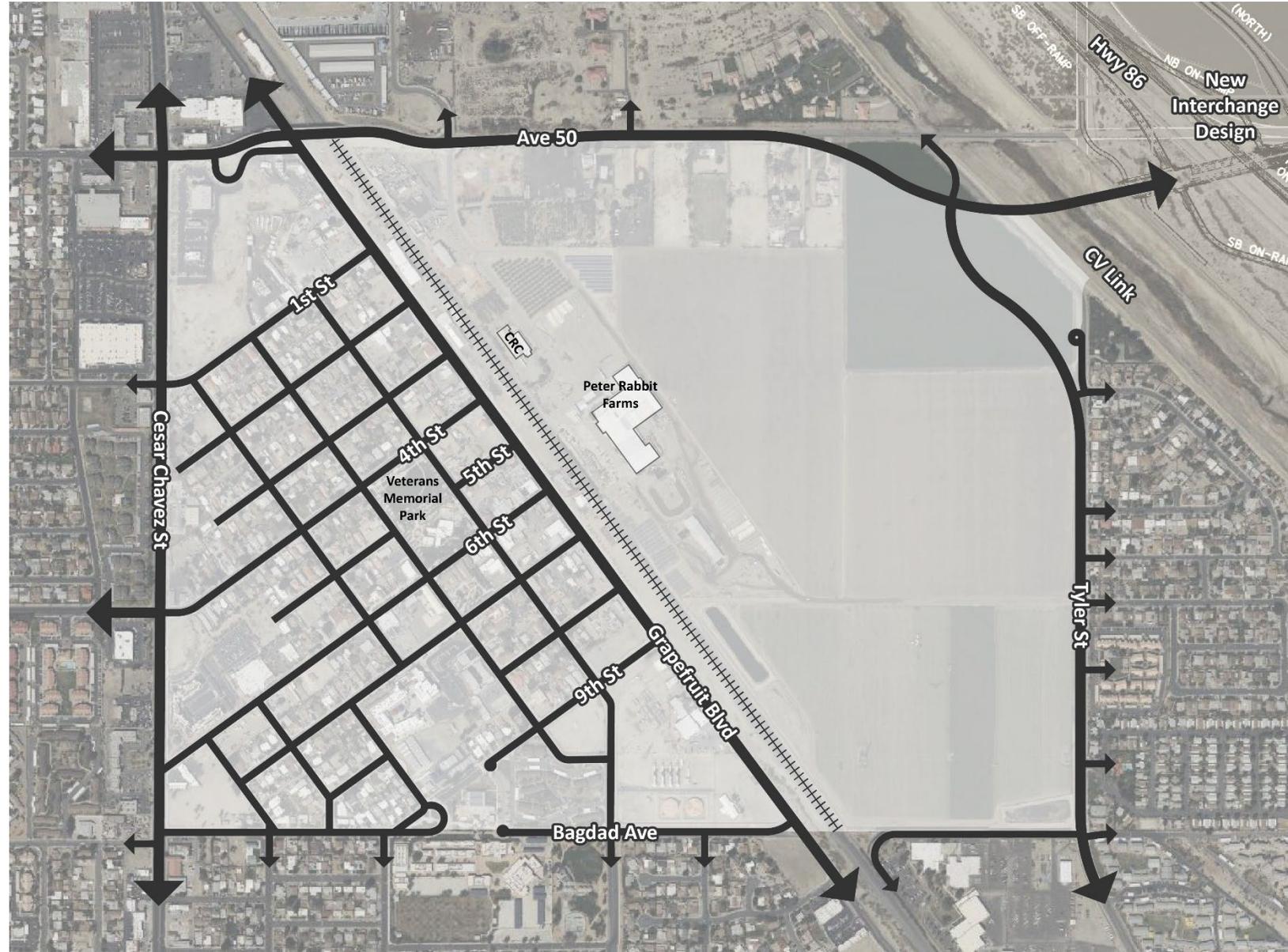
### Building Design (Section 3.5)

# Chapter 4: Implementation

## Phasing

- Contingent upon Many Factors
  - Funding
  - Staffing
- Critical to Success
  - Leadership
  - Coordination and partnerships with state, regional, and local agencies/organizations
  - Clear and flexible development/design standards and a straightforward entitlement process
  - Strategic public realm investments
  - Building Coachella's presence and brand

### Near Term Actions

Near term actions focus on updates to the policy and regulatory framework for the Plan Area, initial coordination with individuals and groups with a stake in the future of the Plan Area, and identification of new funding mechanisms that provide the fiscal and financial resources for catalytic improvements and programs. Updated policies and standards will provide greater clarity and flexibility for the development community, while streamlining the development review process. Initial coordination with stakeholders will foster mutually beneficial partnerships, which in turn will build capacity and create new revenue streams.



### Intermediate Term Actions

Intermediate term actions involve the inception of new programs (e.g., marketing and recruitment campaigns, workforce readiness programs, expanded transit service), the establishment of strategic partnerships, and the implementation of additional public realm improvements in Pueblo Viejo. In many respects, these intermediate term actions move the vision from concept to reality.



### Long Term Actions

Most implementation actions related to Downtown Expansion are categorized as long term, given that there is currently no timeline for the conversion of farmland. Construction of the rail station and the initiation of passenger rail service are also listed as long term implementation actions, as the CV Rail project is still in an early stage of development and funding for construction has yet to be secured. These long term actions will be facilitated by near and intermediate term actions that foster favorable conditions for large-scale change with the planning area.

### 5. History and Cultural Heritage

The development of the Plan Area provides an opportunity to highlight Coachella's history and culture, including its association with Native American and Hispanic communities, the natural resources of the Coachella Valley, regional agricultural industry, and the railroad. The showcasing of Coachella's history and cultural heritage can contribute to efforts to render the Plan Area an attractive and engaging visitor destination.

**Policy 5.1 Native American History and Culture.** Pursue opportunities to acknowledge and celebrate local Native American history and culture.

- Action 5.1.1* Maintain dialogue with local tribal groups and seek their input on appropriate ways to acknowledge and celebrate tribal history and culture. (Near Term)
- Action 5.1.2* Support events that acknowledge and celebrate tribal history and culture. (Near Term)
- Action 5.1.3* Engage Temalpakh Farm on the prospect of establishing a retail and or dining venue in the Plan Area. (Near Term)
- Action 5.1.4* Consider posting a land acknowledgement in a public space within the Plan Area, perhaps as a plaque or monument. (Near Term)

**Policy 5.2 Coachella's Origins as a Railroad Town.** Acknowledge and celebrate Coachella's origins as a railroad town.

- Action 5.2.1* Showcase Coachella's origins as a railroad town through signage, public art, and community events. (Intermediate Term)
- Action 5.2.2* Consider opportunities to establish a railroad museum in the Plan Area, potentially in partnership with Union Pacific and/or other railroad entities. (Intermediate Term)
- Action 5.2.3* Encourage the establishment of a railroad-themed retail and/or dining venue in close proximity to the railroad (e.g., train car restaurant, replica of original Coachella train depot). (Intermediate Term)
- Action 5.2.4* In coordination with Union Pacific, consider establishing a safe and secure public viewing area where residents and visitors can view railroad activity. (Intermediate Term)

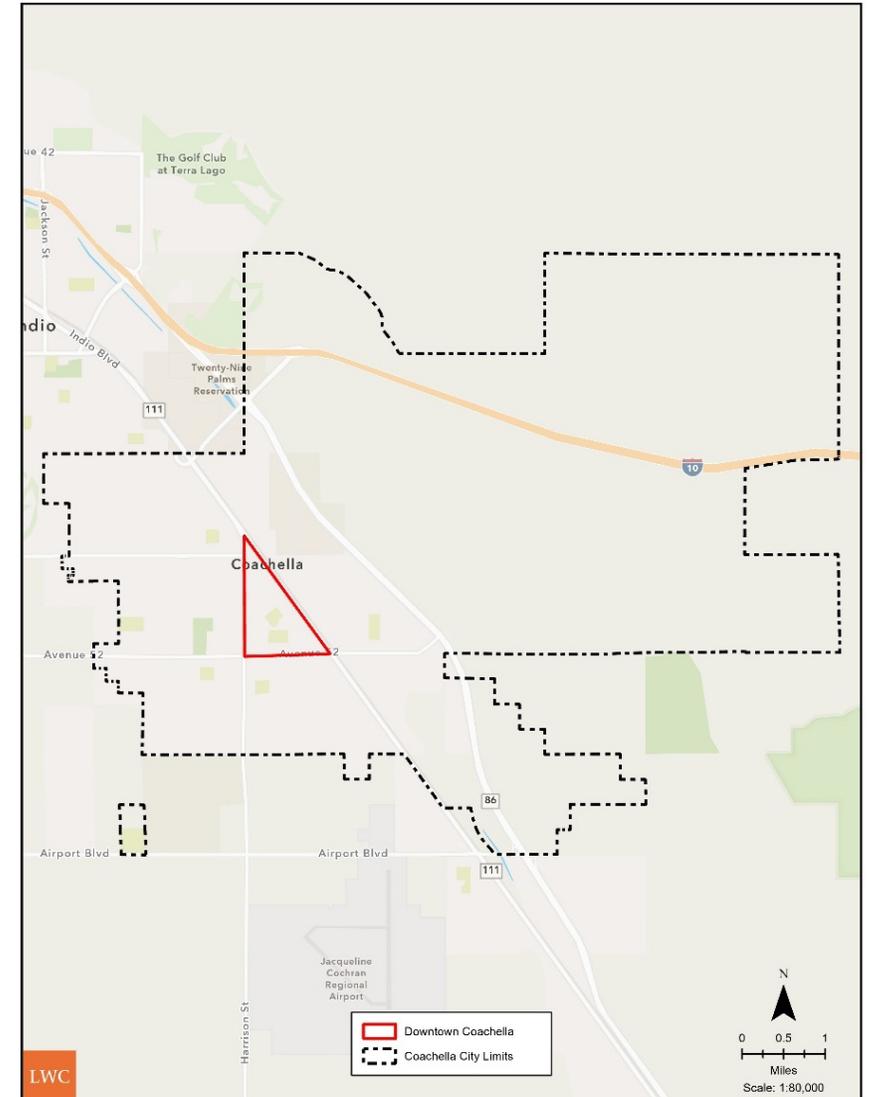

# Market Area Analysis

## City of Coachella vs. Coachella Valley

- Higher share of families with children:
  - 40% of households have children under 18, compared to 24% in the Coachella Valley
- Predominantly Hispanic/Latino community:
  - ~97% Hispanic or Latino (any race) compared to ~52% across the Coachella Valley
- Lower median household income:
  - ~\$68,000 in Coachella vs. ~\$85,000 in the Coachella Valley

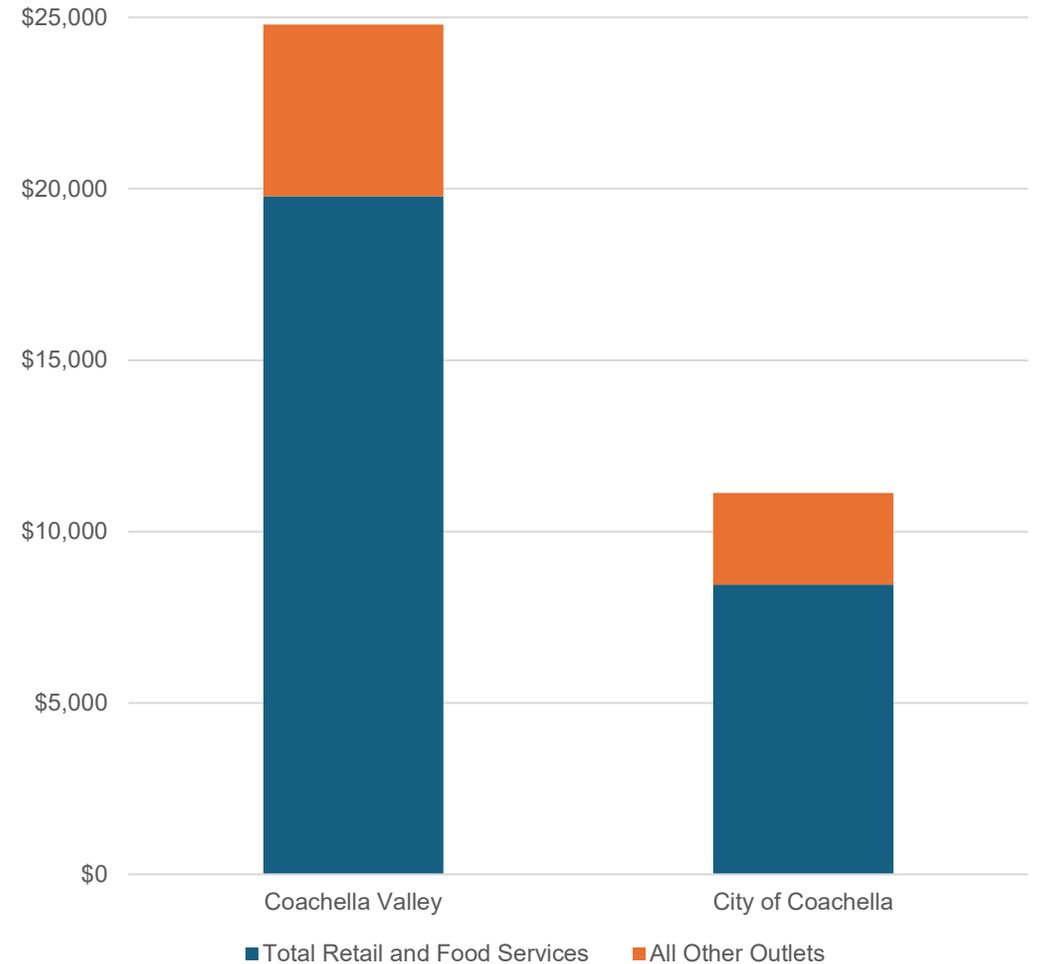


# Market Area Analysis

## Taxable Sales Leakage

- The City of Coachella has a spending gap of **~\$13,600 per capita** compared to the Coachella Valley
- This gap reflects retail sales leakage and represents an opportunity to capture additional local spending.
- Largest Spending Gap Sectors
  - Food Services and Drinking Places
  - General Merchandise Stores
  - Motor Vehicle and Parts Dealers

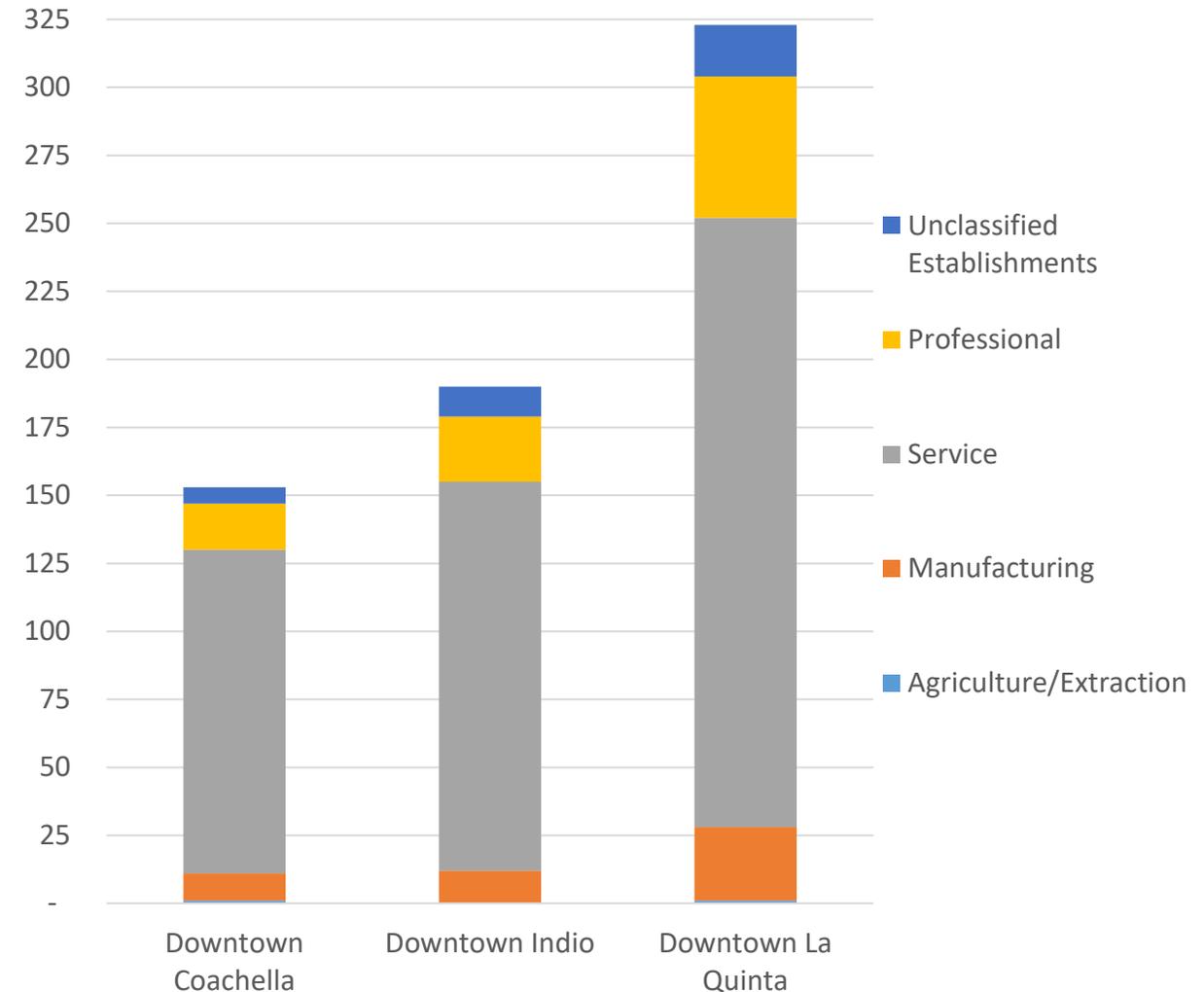
Taxable Transactions Per Capita 2022



# Comparable and Competitive Environment

- Business count by Downtown:
  - Downtown Coachella: 153 businesses
  - Downtown Indio: 190 businesses
  - Downtown La Quinta: 324 businesses
- All three downtowns are service-sector focused
- Downtown Coachella has a higher share of agriculture/extraction related businesses
- La Quinta was viewed as a “one-stop shop” during focus groups

# Comparable and Competitive Environment

- Business density and diversity matter
  - Strong mix of retail, service, and office uses
- Serve everyday community needs
  - Focus groups emphasized the importance of businesses that support daily, routine activities
- Downtown development priority
  - Façade improvement grants
  - Downtown Business Incentive Program
- Placemaking & events programming
  - Activates downtown spaces and supports local businesses
