PRESENTATIONS

9. Special Presentation – Georgia Municipal Association

Georgia Municipal Association Deputy Executive Director Jim Thornton recognized Senator Randy Robertson for his leadership on public safety issues and his legislative advocacy on behalf of Georgia municipalities.

GMA Representative DJ Waller came forward and presented Senator Randy Robertson with the Champion of Georgia Cities Award.

Senator Randy Robertson expressed appreciation for the recognition and credited his local government experience in Columbus with shaping his approach to public service. He thanked City leaders and emphasized the importance of collaboration and putting public service above politics.

Councilor Charmaine Crabb read the proclamation into the record proclaiming Tuesday, September 8, 2026, as *Phenix City 12-U Little League Baseball Team Day*, in recognition of the team's historic advancement to the Little League World Series and its outstanding sportsmanship, teamwork, and representation of the Chattahoochee Valley.

8. Housing Solutions Group Report – Ben Moser, President of United Way of the Chattahoochee Valley, and Tabettha Getz, Executive Director of Regional Prosperity Initiative, Inc.

United Way of the Chattahoochee Valley President Ben Moser presented an overview of the Housing Solutions Group. He explained that the group identified housing mobility challenges and developed the 2026 Housing Solutions Report, with Columbus Ahead leading future housing initiatives and United Way/Home for Good continuing efforts related to homelessness and continuum of care services.

Regional Prosperity Initiative Executive Director Tabitha Getz stated that Columbus Ahead will lead efforts to advance workforce housing initiatives, emphasizing the importance of diverse housing options in supporting the community's goals for job and workforce growth.

Additionally, **United Way President Ben Moser** discussed Columbus' housing mobility gap and recommended addressing zoning barriers, encouraging infill development, and expanding attainable workforce housing.

To address questions and concerns of Councilor Barnes, **United Way Vice President Pat Frey** discussed the need for greater flexibility in zoning regulations to increase housing capacity, including allowing duplexes and other housing options that could support multigenerational families and help residents remain in their communities.

Mr. Moser further reported on the community's homelessness response system and the need for greater coordination among housing, healthcare, public safety, and service providers. He recommended expanding Columbus Correct Care to help individuals move toward stable housing.

Technology Policy Number 210-1000-004. (Mayor Pro-Tem) Councilor Tucker made a motion to adopt the ordinance, seconded by Councilor Chambers and carried unanimously by the ten Council members.

3. **Ordinance (26-041): - 2nd Reading:** An Ordinance (i) amending the Columbus, Georgia Pension Plan for General Government Employees and the Columbus, Georgia Pension Plan for Employees of the Department of Public Safety to reduce the vesting schedule for active participants, add benefit accruals for up to 40 Years of Service, and reduce mandatory contributions for employees hired after July 1, 2012, and (ii) amending the Columbus, Georgia Employees' Deferred Retirement Option Plan to remove the three-year suspension period for new participants. (Councilor Davis) Councilor Davis made a motion to adopt the ordinance, seconded by Councilor Crabb and carried unanimously by the ten Council members.
4. **1st Reading:** REZN 07-26-1357: An Ordinance amending the Zoning Atlas of the Consolidated Government of Columbus, Georgia, to change certain boundaries of a district located at **3604 Arkansas Drive** (parcel # 068-023-001) from Single Family Residential – 2 (SFR2) Zoning District to Residential Multifamily – 2 (RMF2) Zoning District. (Planning Department and PAC recommend approval.)(Councilor Crabb)

Jackson Wells, Applicant, stated that the proposed rezoning would allow for the development of a three-story apartment building focused on student housing, featuring updated units, gated access, and an emphasis on safety.

5. **1st Reading:** REZN 07-26-1395: An Ordinance amending the Zoning Atlas of the Consolidated Government of Columbus, Georgia, to change certain boundaries of a district located at **1119 Neill Drive** (parcel # 031-045-007) from Neighborhood Commercial (NC) Zoning District to Residential Multifamily – 1 (RMF1) Zoning District with Conditions. (Planning Department and PAC recommend approval.) (Councilor Garrett)

James A. Williams Jr., Applicant, explained that his longtime residence was destroyed by fire and requested approval to rebuild a smaller 860-square-foot home on the property.

6. **1st Reading:** REZN-08-26-1510: An Ordinance amending the Zoning Atlas of the Consolidated Government of Columbus, Georgia, to change certain boundaries of a district located at **4803 Ingram Ave** (parcel # 032-016-017) from General Commercial (GC) Zoning District to Single Family Residential – 4 (SFR4) Zoning District.(Planning Department and PAC recommend approval.) (Councilor Garrett)

Ryan Clemens, Applicant explained that NeighborWorks Columbus is sponsoring the rezoning to allow two adjacent parcels to be gifted to the homeowner at 4803 and consolidated into one parcel under the same zoning classification.

Councilor Garrett announced an All Hands on Deck Campaign scheduled for September 29 from 5:00–6:30 p.m. at Harvest Coffee on Second Avenue to tour District 8 and surrounding areas and identify and address blight concerns.

CITY MANAGER'S AGENDA

1. Memorandum of Understanding Between the City of Columbus, the Juvenile Court of Muscogee County, and the Georgia Office of the Child Advocate

Resolution (257-26): - A resolution authorizing the City Manager to execute a memorandum of understanding between the City of Columbus, the Juvenile Court of Muscogee County, and the Georgia Office of the Child Advocate for participation in the Quality Legal Representation IV-E Program. Councilor Tucker made a motion to approve the resolution, seconded by Councilor Crabb and carried unanimously by the ten Council members.

Judge Thomas Tebeau III requested approval of a memorandum of understanding to participate in the Quality Legal Representation Program, which would allow the City to receive reimbursement for a portion of attorney fees paid for children and qualifying parents in Juvenile Court cases.

2. 2026 Georgia Trauma Commission EMT Grant

Resolution (258-26): - A resolution authorizing the City Manager or his designee to accept a grant for equipment in the amount of \$12,000.00, or as otherwise awarded, from the Georgia Trauma Commission EMT Grant Program. These funds will be utilized to replace equipment and support our EMS programs, which provide emergency medical services to the citizens of Columbus and

surrounding counties. Councilor Tucker made a motion to approve the resolution, seconded by Councilor Crabb and carried unanimously by the ten Council members.

3. Firehouse Subs Grant

Resolution (259-26): - A resolution authorizing the City Manager or his designee to apply for and accept, if awarded, a grant from the Firehouse Subs Public Safety Foundation in the amount of \$18,400.00, or as otherwise awarded, to support the acquisition of twenty stationary bikes, with no matching funds required. The multi-governmental fund will be amended by the amount of the award. Councilor Tucker made a motion to approve the resolution, seconded by Councilor Crabb and carried unanimously by the ten Council members.

4. State Criminal Alien Assistance Program Grant

Resolution (260-26): - A resolution authorizing the City Manager, the Mayor, or their designee to submit and accept, if awarded, the BJA FY 2026 State Criminal Alien Assistance Program (SCAAP) funding from the U.S. Department of Justice, in the amount of \$30,000 to 35,000, or as otherwise awarded, for fiscal year 2027, with no local match required, and amend the SCAAP Project budget by the amount awarded. Councilor Tucker made a motion to approve the resolution, seconded by Councilor Crabb and carried unanimously by the ten Council members.

5. Georgia Statewide Afterschool Network BOOST 2.0. “Building Opportunities for Out-of-School Time”

Resolution (261-26): - A resolution authorizing the city to apply for the Boost Grant and, if awarded, accept the monies granted by the Georgia Statewide Afterschool Program network “building opportunities for out of school time” Boost Grant 2.0, in the amount of \$200,000, or as otherwise awarded, with no local match required, and amend the multi-governmental fund by the amount of the award. Councilor Tucker made a motion to approve the resolution, seconded by Councilor Crabb and carried unanimously by the ten Council members.

6. Dero Fixit Stations Donation

Resolution (262-26): - A resolution authorizing the city to approve and accept the donation of 4 additional Dero Fixit Stations from River Valley Regional Commission, Bicycle Columbus and Dragonfly Trails, Inc. Councilor Tucker made a motion to approve the resolution, seconded by Councilor Crabb and carried unanimously by the ten Council members.

7. Columbus Police Department: Donation

Resolution (263-26): - A resolution to accept a donation of \$1707.00 from Joanne Cogle to use towards the purchase of additional ballistic vests or other equipment for the CPD K9 unit.

Councilor Joanne Cogle disclosed that she had donated to the Police Department for ballistic vests for its K-9s and requested to recuse herself from voting on Item No. 7, a Police Department donation

Councilor Crabb made a motion to allow Councilor Cogle to recuse from the vote, seconded by Councilor Tucker and carried unanimously by the ten Council members.

C. One (1) F-450 Flatbed Dump Truck for Public Works - Georgia Statewide Cooperative Contract Purchase

Resolution (266-26): - A resolution authorizing the purchase of three (3) CXT Prefabricated Bathrooms for Parks and Recreation locations from CXT Incorporated (Spokane Valley, WA) in the amount of \$339,916.93. The purchase will be accomplished by cooperative purchase via Sourcewell Contract #052725-CXT. Councilor Tucker made a motion to approve the resolution, seconded by Councilor Crabb and carried unanimously by the ten Council members.

D. One (1) Water Truck 4,000 Gallon for Public Works – Omnia Partners Cooperative Contract Purchase

Resolution (267-26): - A resolution authorizing the construction of foundation pads for three (3) CXT Prefabricated Bathrooms from Freeman & Associates, Inc. (Columbus, GA) in the amount of \$113,932.00. Councilor Tucker made a motion to approve the resolution, seconded by Councilor Crabb and carried unanimously by the ten Council members.

- E. One (1) New Way Viper 11 Yard Rear Loader Refuse Body for Public Works – Sourcewell Cooperative Contract Purchase

Resolution (268-26): - A resolution authorizing the agreement with Aaron & Clements, Inc., (Columbus, GA), for Project Management Services for Columbus Parks and Recreation SPLOST Park Renovation Projects, in the amount of \$495,000.00. Councilor Tucker made a motion to approve the resolution, seconded by Councilor Crabb and carried unanimously by the nine members present, with Councilor Garrett being absent from the meeting.

Resolution (270-26): - A resolution authorizing to expend the appropriated funds to Liberty Vote USA (Denver, CO) for the provision of election supplies, ballots, expendable items and other related election equipment and services for the estimated amount of \$150,000 per year. Expenditures each fiscal year are contingent upon the number of elections required to be held. Councilor Tucker made a motion to approve the resolution, seconded by Councilor Crabb and carried unanimously by the ten Council members.

- H. Contract Extension for Leather Items (Annual Contract) - RFB No. 20-0013

Resolution (271-26): - A resolution authorizing the construction of the Comer Recreation Center Splashpad from Freeman & Associates, Inc. (Columbus, GA) in the amount of \$737,849.77. Councilor Tucker made a motion to approve the resolution, seconded by Councilor Crabb and carried unanimously by the ten Council members.

- I. Fifteen (15) Z930 Zero Turn Mowers for Public Works – Georgia Statewide Contract Cooperative Purchase

Resolution (272-26): - A resolution authorizing an annual contract for the purchase of automatic external defibrillators (AEDs) and accessories on an as needed basis, for Risk Management, from AED Brands (Kennesaw, GA). The purchase will be accomplished by Cooperative Purchase via BuyBoard Contract #798-26 and BuyBoard Contract # 804-26. Councilor Tucker made a motion to approve the resolution, seconded by Councilor Crabb and carried unanimously by the ten Council members.

Resolution (273-26): - A resolution authorizing the purchase of three Firearms Examination Management Software for the Police Department from Versaterm Public Safety (Meza, AZ) in the amount of \$66,357.76. The purchase will be accomplished by Cooperative Purchase via State of Georgia/Georgia Bureau of Investigation (GBI) Contract #PE-47100-SS-2024-000000037. Additionally, approval is requested for future payments of the annual maintenance/license fees and software upgrades. Councilor Tucker made a motion to approve the resolution, seconded by Councilor Crabb and carried unanimously by the ten Council members.

A. Revenue Update - Angelica Alexander, Finance Director

Finance Director Angelica Alexander provided the third-quarter 2026 Revenue Division update, reporting that more than 7,400 licenses had been processed, representing a 5% increase over 2025. She also discussed delinquent accounts, online tax services, occupation tax collections, and continued efforts to improve automation and evaluate the City's occupation tax fee structure.

B. Tax Commissioner Report – Tax Commissioner David Britt (ADD-ON)

Tax Commissioner David Britt provided an update on 2026 property tax billing and collections, advising that property tax bills have been issued with a December 1 due date and multiple payment options. He also reported that qualifying homesteaded properties will receive a one-time Homeowner Tax Relief Grant.
