


# Colusa Police Department



### Monthly Statistics



- There were 275 calls for service for patrol officers with 20 agency assists. The call volume in December was slightly lower than November's.
- During December, there were 13 in-custody arrests. There were 5 citations issued in lieu of a subject being booked in jail. There were 3 domestic violence related incidents reported. This does not include calls for service involving verbal altercations. There were 50 reports initiated.
- During the month of December, officers initiated 181 traffic enforcement stops. There were 33 citations issued. The most frequent violation cited were stop sign violations. There were 3 reportable traffic collisions, all without injuries. 'Hit and Run' collisions are not included in these statistics but instead are included in crime statistics. There were 3 DUI related arrest.
- The Police Services Manager handled 55 calls for service during the month of December. These calls for service don't include telephone calls handled by the Police Services Manager.

### Items of Interest/Year in Review



- The call volume for 2025 was slightly higher than 2024. There were 3,626 calls for service. The number of traffic enforcement stops nearly doubled with the year-end total being 2,607. Just as with the number of traffic enforcement stops doubling, the number of citations have done so as well totaling out at 701. The number of reports taken has remained consistent for the last 5 years. The final total was 517 whereas 2024 yielded 434.
- The department welcomed 5 new officers during 2025. Officers Lambgino, Herrera, and Sanchez completed field training in March after graduating from the academy in December 2024. In July, Officers Azevedo and Rodriguez began the academy at Butte College. They graduated in December and began their field training program. They are anticipated to complete training and be solo officers by March. With more officers comes the ability to be more proactive and target specific areas of enforcement such as traffic.
- With the patrol staffing bulking up, we were able to designate a full-time detective. A detective is invaluable in investigations that extend well beyond the patrol level. Additionally, the detective is assigned to work with the Colusa County Task Force.
