With the Hurricane, we anticipate the fields being wet for all of next week. With the regulation change, the ground water levels have changed to what is now acceptable. (More now than just standing water on the fields)

Also, was explaining to Curt that Deseret has decided to pull their land application permits and will no longer allow Class B material to be spread on any of their 70,000 acres here in Central Florida. The new regulations are just too much to comply with. We have also found alternative resources for our land application customers too.

Foreseeable the need to find a long-term solution is the answer.
