Subject: Fire Chief's Report – Commission Meeting May 28, 2024

The following is the Fire Chief's report for the upcoming commission meeting. This report will follow the same flow of my prior reports, which is aimed at highlighting information pertinent to the city's main public safety concerns: Fire Rescue Incidents, Fire Apparatus/Station concerns, Fire Prevention, Community Outreach, and CERT.

This month reflects the fastest unit response of 1 minute 38 seconds. This was a fire alarm incident at the Chabad of SW Broward located at 5960 SW 106 Avenue. The responding apparatus, Q28, responded Code 3 (lights and sirens) from Station 28. The longest response time was 10 minutes 02 seconds. This medical incident was a Code 3 response by R28 from the fire station to an Adult Living Facility located at 2580 Pine Island Road. Out of the 137 incident responses, the average response time was 5 minutes 12 seconds.

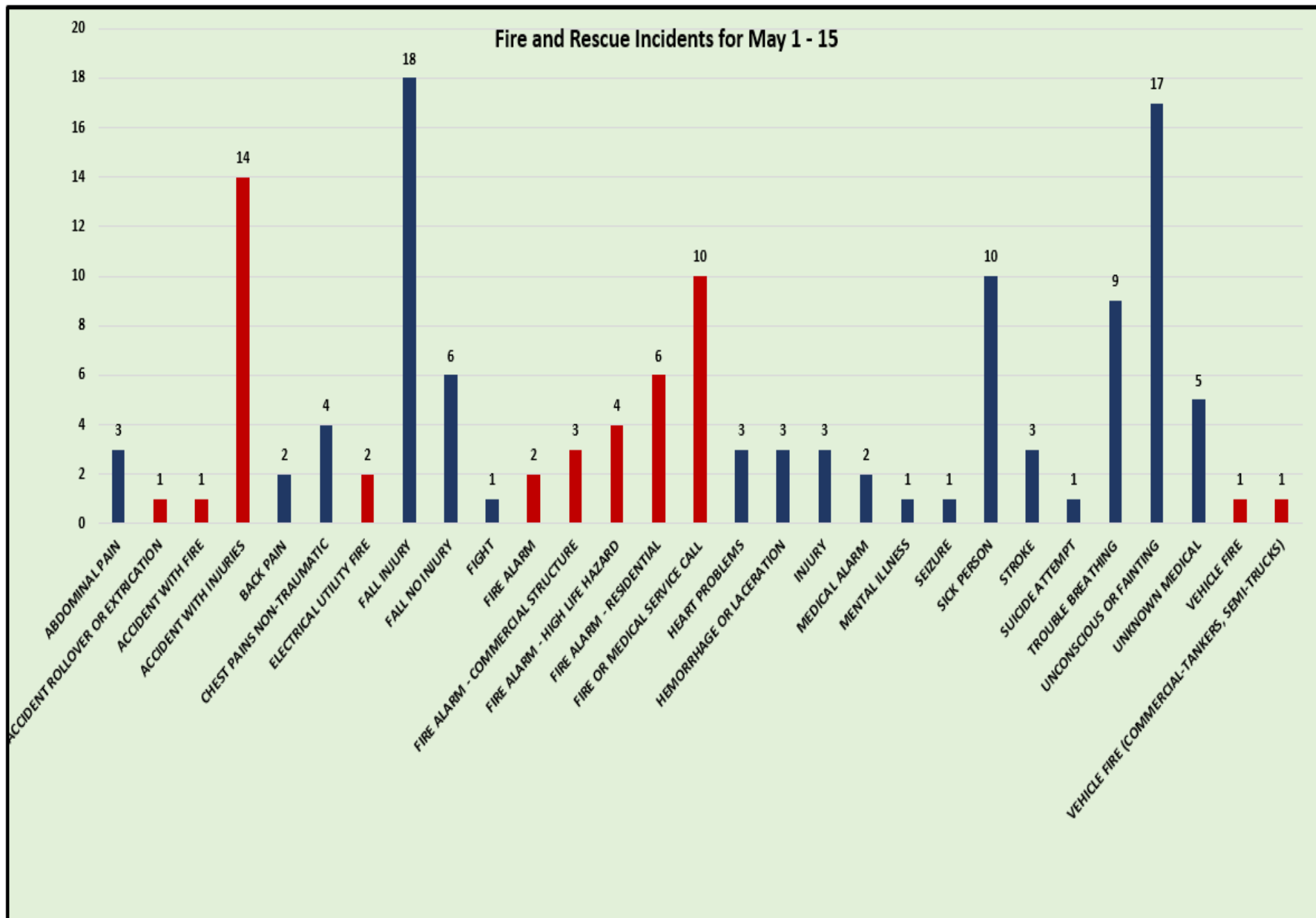
VI. Community Outreach Report

- May 1, 2024, BSO Life Safety Educators conducted a fire safety presentation at Monterra for the Infrastructure management services company, Inframark.
- May 3, 2024, the architect company of Currie, Sowards and Aguila surveyed Fire Station 28 for possible solutions to upgrading the station.
- May 6, 2024, a special meeting was held to determine direction to find a new city manager.
- May 7, 2024, BSO Life Safety Educators provided Car Seat Installation for residents.
- May 7, 2024, Chief Harrington attended training on new Pre-Fire Plan software to be implemented as soon as the crews have documented training.
- May 14, 2024, BSO Life Safety Educators provided Car Seat Installation for residents.
- May 14 and 15, Chief Harrington attended a class on Human Resources and Labor Relations hosted by Tamarac Fire Department.
- CERT is continuing to canvas the businesses within Cooper City to see which businesses maintain an AED on-site. CERT will obtain pertinent information from the AEDs so that they may be installed into the PulsePoint AED app.

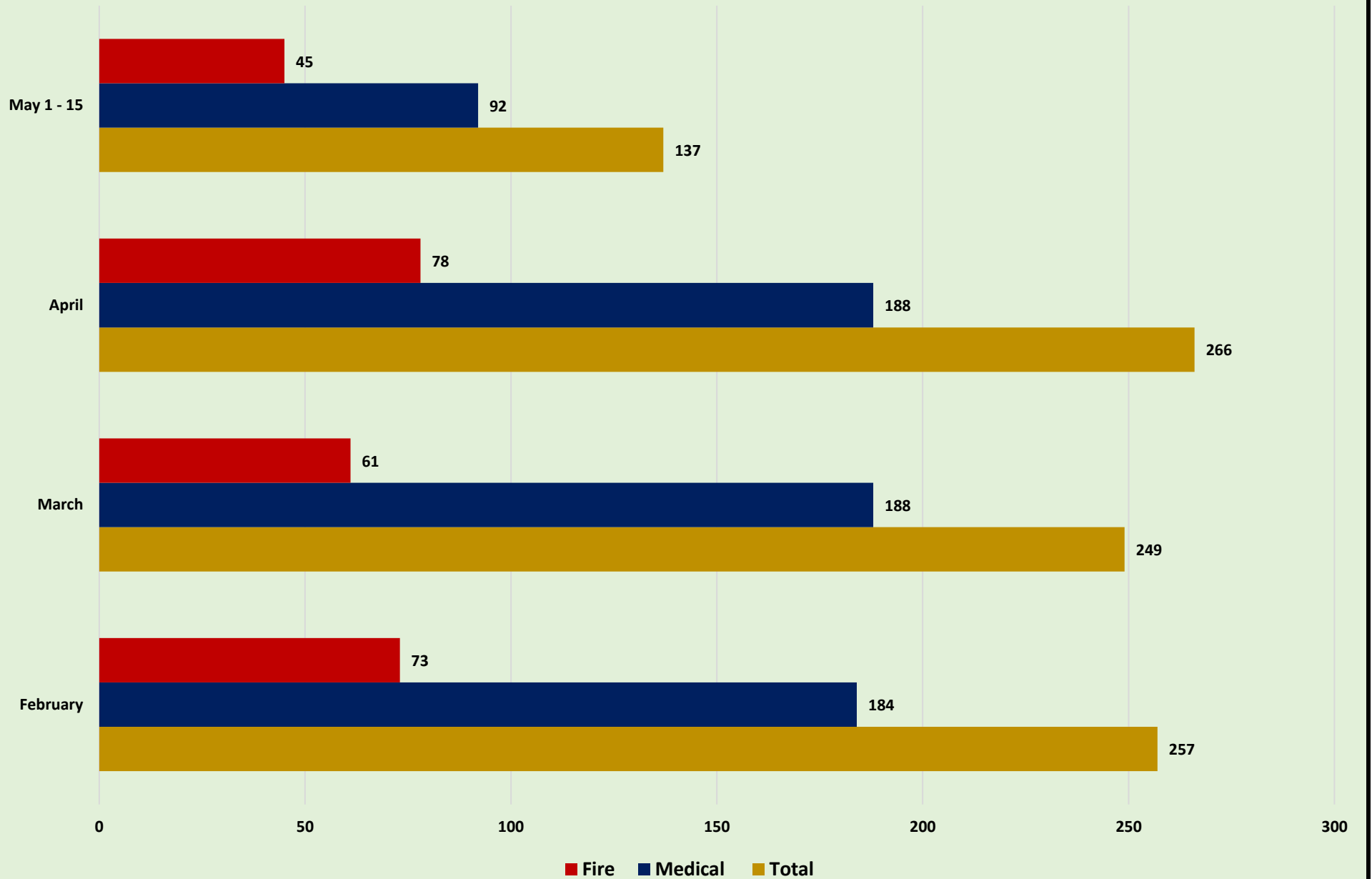
FIRE HYDRANT DESIGN UPDATE:

I have met with representatives from numerous schools and the utility department is in the process of cleaning and painting the chosen hydrants white as a base coat. I have also met with the management of Sherwin Williams to secure the proper paint and supplies for the art students at a discounted rate.

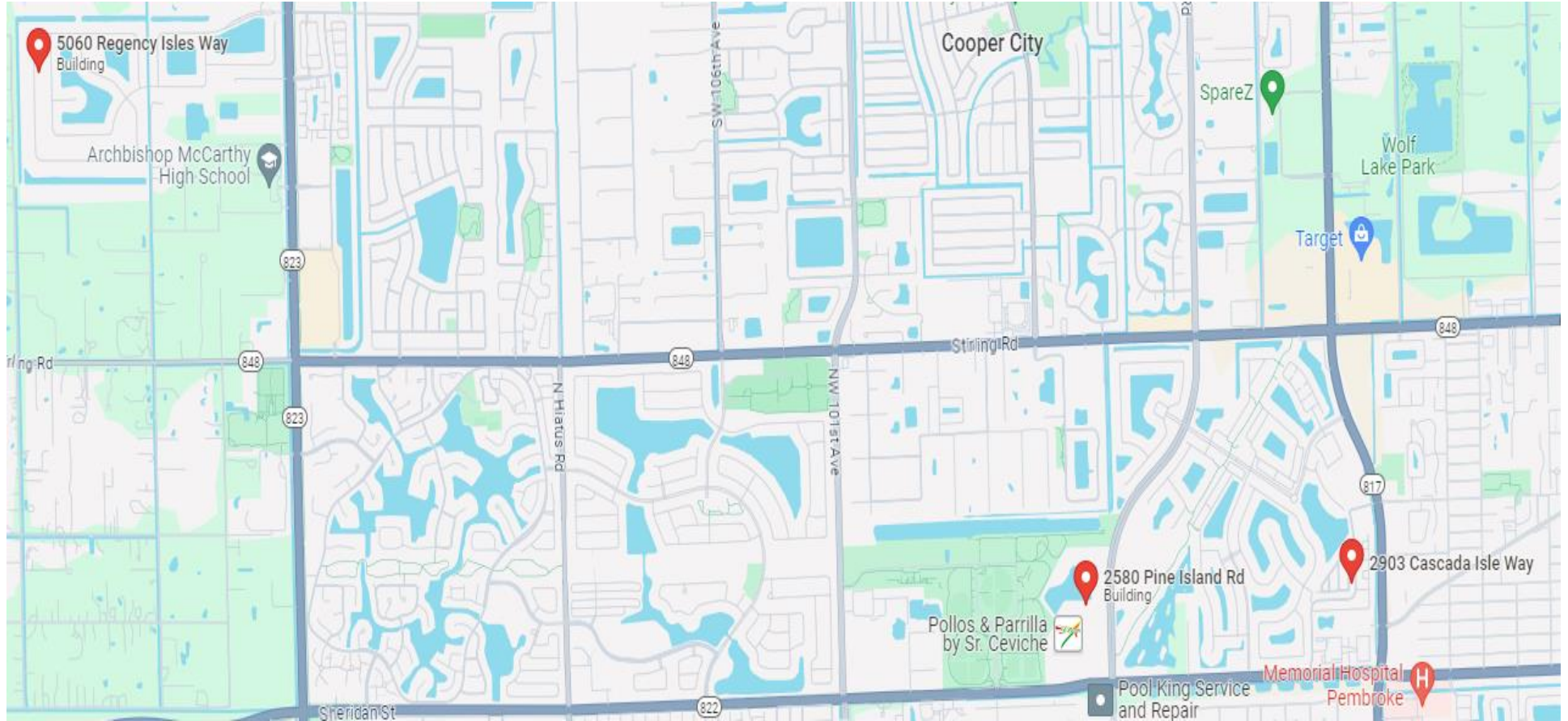
- To date, Franklin Academy fire hydrant designs have been completed. Pictures have been posted in the newsletter/website by Mike Cobelo.

- The Cooper City teen council has completed painting their hydrant designs on the fire hydrants in front of the Community Center and City Hall.
- Cooper City High School will be next for the students to paint their designs.
- The hydrants in front of Memorial Park are planned to be painted by art students at the community center this summer.
- I will be working with the remaining schools to establish a schedule for their students to participate in the program. The staff and students at all the schools I met with are very enthusiastic about this program. I am looking forward to this initial program being a success and then we will consider a possible expansion of this program.
