Commissioner Mallozzi pulled items 5 and 11.

**MOTION:** Commissioner Katzman moved to approve the consent agenda with the exception of items 5 and 11. Commissioner Green seconded the motion which prevailed by a unanimous roll call vote. (4-0) *Commissioner Shrouder was not present on the dais.* 

### 5. Resolution 24-38 (Administration)

City Attorney Horowitz read "A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF COOPER CITY, FLORIDA, APPROVING AND ADOPTING A COMMISSION MEETING SCHEDULE FOR FY2024-2025, ATTACHED HERETO AS EXHIBIT "A" AND INCORPORATED HEREIN, PURSUANT TO SECTION 2-21 OF THE CITY'S CODE OF ORDINANCES; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICTS; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE" by title.

Commissioner Mallozzi asked that for the months being proposed as one meeting be held on the third Tuesday.

Commissioner Shrouder would like to table the item for the new Commission to review.

City Manager Rey said he would like to approve October and November.

Consensus was reached to cancel the November 26<sup>th</sup> meeting and the Regular meeting will be held on November 12<sup>th</sup>. The remainder of the calendar is tabled until after the election.

11. Motion to approve the Agreement with GovTemps for Interim Capital Improvement Project Manager for Public Works – **Administration** 

Commissioner Mallozzi would like to change the notification of termination date from 30 to seven days.

Commissioner Mallozzi made a motion to approve the Agreement with GovTemps for Interim Capital Improvement Project Manager for Public Works changing the termination date from 30 to seven days. Commissioner Green seconded the motion for discussion.

Commissioner Green asked if the 30 day termination cause is standard. City Attorney Horowitz answered the general provision is 30 days but that date has been adjusted in the past. Commissioner Green proposed a friendly amendment for a 15 day termination clause.

Commissioner Mallozzi would like the seven day termination clause to allow for room if needed.

Commissioner Shrouder said the seven days is irrelevant.

City Manager Rey believes 15 days is sufficient.

Commissioner Mallozzi accepted the friendly amendment at 15 days.

**MOTION:** Commissioner Mallozzi moved to approve the Agreement with GovTemps for Interim Capital Improvement Project Manager for Public Works changing the termination date from 30 to 15 days. Commissioner Green seconded the motion which prevailed by a unanimous roll call vote. (5-0)

### **REGULAR AGENDA**

# **ORDINANCES ON FIRST READING**

14. Ordinance 24-22 - (Commission) - FORTHCOMING

City Attorney Horowitz read "AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF COOPER CITY, FLORIDA RATIFYING AND CONFIRMING A RETIREMENT HEALTH INSURANCE BENEFIT FOR CERTAIN FORMER MEMBERS OF THE CITY COMMISSION; CONFIRMING A RETIREMENT HEALTH INSURANCE BENEFIT FOR CURRENT AND FUTURE MEMBERS OF THE CITY COMMISSION; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICTS; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE" by title.

City Manager Rey spoke on the backup. Staff provided different options in terms of elected official's benefits with costs. They documented all the elected officials back to 1990 noting the dates they served including how old they were when they finished serving. They calculated the cost for individuals that are not currently included using the average retirement age of 55 and serving three terms resulting in nine individuals over the next 20 years totaling \$5 million dollars. He also advised the City not having an employee and spouse selection costs the City more as they are being placed on the family plan. Cleanup language also needs added to address marriage changes.

City Attorney Horowitz said there has been a benefit conferred as least as early as 1999. At the time the benefit was initially conferred, it had met all of the requirements procedurally that were necessary to establish the benefit. Those requirements were changed by referendum in 2002 subsequently personnel manuals which were adopted by resolution, continued to provide for that benefit. The City does have a legal obligation, at least to those who were vested at the time that the benefit was in place, particularly those who were in office at the time prior to 2002, but also moving forward as well. This issue is currently being litigated in another jurisdiction, his recommendation would be not to affect the benefit for those who are currently receiving it.

Commissioner Shrouder would like to define the term vested. The 2012 personnel manual states the policies contained in this manual supersede any and all prior practices, oral and written or statements. I understand nothing contained here may be construed as creating a promise of future benefits, or a binding contract with the City of Cooper City for benefits or for any other purpose. I also understand that these policies and procedures are continually evaluated, and may be amended, modified, or terminated at any time with or without notice. He believes this language states this is not a contract. He believes there is no entitlement to benefits legally. At the time the salary was low but benefits that were very substantial. He believes there is also a fairness element that needs laid out. The electors voted that any benefits given to the Commission must be done by ordinance. If the lifetime benefits carried on at his age he would acquire a million dollars in benefits. He stated there needs to be certain items clarified as there are families receiving benefits when only the elected official and spouse were listed. He also stated there were individuals who were not married at the time they served but have since married and their insurance is covered. Domestic partners were also not clarified. He is okay with leaving the benefits to the individual served. He also wants the benefit to be for individual and spouse only.

Commissioner Green said this benefit was in place since 1999. He asked City Attorney Horowitz if they can remove the benefits from individuals that were not vested. City Attorney Horowitz said what he believes Commissioner Shrouder is suggesting is that the policy from 2010, which is what the 2012 policy references required elected officials to be elected to three terms as a Cooper City elected official and attain the age of 50. What he believe Commissioner Shrouder is saying is that all elected officials who were in office as of 2012, who had been elected three times by 2012, and who were at least 50 years old by 2012 would be considered vested. He is looking to confirm or ratify the benefit for each of those individuals and their spouses, which he agrees the policy provides for the elected official and the elected official's spouse.

Commissioner Mallozzi said one former elected official was 43 when she retired. City Attorney Horowitz said in 1999 the earliest version of the personnel manual includes language that is not included in subsequent versions of the manual that stated if a department head retires, or an elected official completes his or her terms before attaining the age of 50 years he or she and their dependents may remain on the City's health insurance program at 50% of the cost until qualification. That language is not included in subsequent versions of the manual after 1999. In 2012 when the Commission sought to end the benefit read as follows: elected officials or department directors hired or elected prior to January 1, 2012, and who have met the criteria in accordance with policy, 14.06 of the 2010 edition of the manual of personnel policies shall receive fully paid health insurance coverage and associated benefits and the Medicare supplement offered by the City at the City's cost. This provision shall not apply to anyone first elected or hired after January 1, 2012. The 2010 manual reads if a department head retires after achieving 15 years of service or an elected official completes his or her term before attaining the age of 50 with the same language he or she and their dependents may remain on the plan at 50%.

Commissioner Shrouder does not believe the manuals are binding and a decision needs to be made.

Commissioner Green asked City Attorney Horowitz legally those who were vested and met all the requirements in place in 1999, does the City have a legal responsibility to ensure they provide the benefit? City Attorney Horowitz advised his legal opinion is for the City of Cooper City to continue to provide the benefit to those individuals who at a minimum were elected to three terms and had at least reached the age of 50, consistent with the 2012 manual at the time in which the Commission sought to end the benefit. Commissioner Green supports keeping the benefit for all who did serve three terms and reached the age of 50. He thanked City Manager Rey for the information but these numbers are based on ages that may not be accurate. He supports the elected officials moving forward having the availability to remain on the health insurance at the same rate staff pays.

Commissioner Katzman asked if vested includes anyone who was elected to three terms prior to the change in 2012. City Attorney Horowitz said his understanding of the Commission's intent from the last meeting was that anybody who, as of 2012, at the time when the Commission sought to end the benefit, been elected to the three terms of office would have been considered vested for the elected official and their spouse. Commissioner Katzman said he would assume the benefit would end with Debbie Eisinger totaling \$2.9 million for a lifetime cost. The next group that was serving in 2012 is another \$2 million combined. He is not looking at future elected officials as he does not support extending the benefit. He asked the cost of individuals compared to couples. City Manager Rey stated the employee only cost is \$1,264 and the family cost is \$2,612.

Commissioner Mallozzi said insurance rates can change based on age.

City Manager Rey said we are in a group plan so age does not affect the City.

Commissioner Shrouder said Commissioner Katzman's cost could be slightly off because some individuals are probably on Medicare.

Commissioner Katzman asked about the group that was not elected for three terms in 2012. He does not support extending the benefits to the individuals on the dais or future Commissioners.

Commissioner Mallozzi said she has been receiving the benefit for several years and prefers for it to stay as is. She would probably seek a legal route if the benefit is removed.

Mayor Ross asked to limit the lifetime benefit to 65 from 50.

Commissioner Shrouder said insurance in 1999 was different from 2012. The intent in 2012 was to save the City money but this impact would take affect years later. Commissioner Shrouder asked the amount for the vested elected officials at the cost to the employees at 80/20.

Commissioner Green said last week the Commission voted to increase the Commissions salary. He asked to reduce the salary and have the option to receive the health insurance benefit at the staff rate of 80/20. He said the benefit was initiated in 1999 and he was elected into it. He recognizes all the hard work the elected officials do and the time spent away from their families. He also thanked Mayor Ross for his continued service. He believes the benefit should remain in effect for those who were on the Commission in 2012 and he too will file a lawsuit if it is taken away.

Commissioner Mallozzi suggested to include Mayor Ross as he is the only one who has met the requirements.

Commissioner Shrouder said he believes the intent was to save the City money in 2012 but the effects are years out.

Commissioner Mallozzi recommended adding Mayor Ross to the lifetime benefit and officially closing the benefit by ordinance. She would also exclude the spouse option as he is not currently married.

Commissioner Green recommended including Mayor Ross and then bringing the matter to the Charter Review Board.

Commissioner Green made a motion to continue giving the lifetime benefit to those who currently receive it, adding in Mayor Ross as he has met all the requirements.

City Attorney Horowitz said the results of tonight's meeting will be memorialized in the ordinance on second reading.

Commissioner Mallozzi seconded the motion.

Commissioner Katzman said this matter is about the City not individuals.

**MOTION:** Commissioner Green moved to approve Ordinance 24-22 as amended to continue giving the lifetime benefit to those who receive it, adding in Mayor Ross. Commissioner Mallozzi seconded the motion which prevailed by the following roll call vote. (3-2)

YES: Commissioners Mallozzi, Green and Mayor Ross

NO: Commissioners Katzman and Shrouder

Commissioner Green asked if he can convene the Charter Review Board to put forth the question to the voters. City Attorney Horowitz answered the Charter Review Board is convened on a schedule pursuant to the charter, but can certainly be convened more frequently as needed. However, this Commission always has the prerogative to place an item on the ballot without the need for convening a Charter Review Board. The only time the Supervisor of Elections Office will entertain referendum questions for municipalities is in March or in November. The next election scheduled for the City is November 2026.

Commissioner Shrouder said he will seek to revoke this ordinance. He would like to correct some issues that are still outstanding.

Commissioner Green said in 1999 the City Attorney said this benefit was done legally. City Attorney Horowitz said when the benefit was initially established it did not require an ordinance to be adopted. The 2012 personnel manual referenced the benefit in 2010. The 2010 personnel manual was not adopted by ordinance.

Commissioner Shrouder said he will reverse this ordinance if these issues are not corrected by principal.

Mayor Ross said he wants to this to be equal for everyone recommending the supplement after 65.

Commissioner Shrouder said these costs need to be analyzed. He does not believe this was done correctly. It needs to be advertised with costs calculated.

Commissioner Green said last week the Commission raised their salary by 300%. If process is going to be brought up then it all needs done in that matter. Commissioner Shrouder said the salary revision was passed by ordinance. Commissioner Green said he was the only one who mentioned the increase in salary.

Mayor Ross said the Commissioners now will not receive the lifetime benefits.

Commissioner Katzman said there are individuals who he has never heard of receiving more in benefits then he is currently serving the City.

Commissioner Shrouder said in 2012 Commissioner Green did not meet the requirements.

Commissioner Green said in 1999 the Commissioners at the time did not serve three terms.

Commissioner Shrouder said in 2012 the language not first elected by was used. He believes in 2012 it was changed because the voters found out about the lifetime benefits. He understands why the 2012 Commission changed the benefit but it was not done correctly.

Mayor Ross said they now need to address the future. He believes the current Commissioners should not get any more than what he receives which is a supplement.

Commissioner Shrouder does not feel the motion tonight satisfies the issues at hand.

Commissioner Green said he wants to address Commissioner Shrouder's concerns. He suggested placing the question on the ballot to address the concerns.

Commissioner Shrouder said the next election is 2026 and holding a special election cost money.

Commissioner Green said the City has spent money on numerous consultants because it was needed.

Commissioner Katzman does not want the lifetime benefits to be offered to future elected officials so he does not feel it should be a ballot question.

Commissioner Shrouder suggested everyone receiving the same benefit offered to employees.

Commissioner Green said that opens the City up to litigation and that will cost the City money in attorney's fees.

Commissioner Shrouder said the residents have standing to sue if there is a violation of the charter.

Commissioner Katzman recommended they all think about solutions before second reading on October 8, 2024.

Commissioner Shrouder would like to have data with financial impacts.

City Manager Rey said the Commission can let him know what scenarios they want to be ran.

Commissioner Shrouder said they need to add language stating spousal coverage is for the spouse at the time of serving.

Commissioner Shrouder said they all agree the coverage should be for the spouse at the time the elected official served so therefore Philip Sharlet would be excluded.

Commissioner Green said Mr. Sharlet has been included for years.

Commissioner Shrouder said as stated in the personnel manual, these policies and procedures are continually evaluated, and may be amended, modified, or terminated at any time, with or without notice.

Commissioner Mallozzi said currently there is no provision saying they cannot pick up a spouse along the way.

Mayor Ross said it was mentioned earlier that the spouses put up and endure the challenges during the time the individual serves the City.

Commissioner Shrouder suggested the language at the time they start to become eligible to receive the retirement benefits.

Commissioner Shrouder moved to approve benefits for a spouse who was, married to the elected official at the time they are eligible to start receiving the benefits. To take affect retroactively.

**MOTION:** Commissioner Shrouder said moved to approve benefits for a spouse who was, married to the elected official at the time they are eligible to start receiving the benefits. Commissioner Katzman seconded the motion which prevailed by the following roll call vote. (3-2)

YES: Commissioners Katzman and Shrouder and Mayor Ross

NO: Commissioners Mallozzi and Green

Commissioner Shrouder wants to include language stating any future benefits adopted must be accounted for and funded for through reserves.

**MOTION:** Commissioner Shrouder said moved to include any future benefits adopted must be accounted and funded for through reserves. Commissioner Katzman seconded the motion which prevailed by a unanimous roll call vote. (5-0)

Commissioner Shrouder does not believe they saved the City any money tonight.

Commissioner Green said every year the costs of doing business goes up.

Commissioner Katzman said it seems more appropriate that individuals serving at the time are compensated more than individuals who have served in the past. When he is no longer serving he does not expect to be paid by the City.

Commissioner Green said if there is a benefit in place that can protect your family why is it a bad thing to accept it.

Commissioner Katzman does not believe the residents expect that. He does not support the lifetime benefits for future elected officials.

Commissioner Green said he suggested putting it forth to the voters.

Commissioner Shrouder believes the benefits should be tied to the employees. They do not know the costs of these benefits in the future.

Commissioner Green said he put forth an idea to offer the same benefits offered to employees to future elected officials who meet the requirements.

Commissioner Shrouder said he wants the same benefits for everyone not just future elected officials. This will be a self-governing mechanism.

Commissioner Mallozzi said the item can be placed on a ballot and the figures can be there for an informed decision.

Commissioner Shrouder read a section of the 2024 personnel manual as follows: Pursuant to the provisions of section 11208. Employees who retire from the city from city service shall be eligible to continue the group health coverage. They had, in effect, at the time of the retirement, at the same rates paid by the city for single coverage and by employees for dependent coverage absent any supplement from the city for such dependent coverage. The issue he has is the way the lifetime benefit was added to a personnel manual.

Commissioner Green said the \$39,000 salary amount for the Commission was not read into the record.

Commissioner Shrouder said there were two readings of the ordinance.

Commissioner Green said he was the only one who mentioned the amount.

Commissioner Shrouder also does not agree with the Directors receiving insurance for life after serving 15 years.

Commissioner Mallozzi asked how many Directors receive the benefits.

City Manager Rey answered five.

Commissioner Shrouder asked how many of those directors we have a contract with. City Attorney Horowitz believes one. He also stated he plans to look into the managerial pension plan as he does not believe it was passed by ordinance.

Commissioner Mallozzi asked how much money the City has spent in litigation with regard to Commissioner Shrouder's recommendations.

Commissioner Shrouder stated the City first wanted to sue the Broward Sheriff's Office for one million dollars and after his research the City sued for seven million. Also due to his persistence the Broward Sheriff's Office has paid us \$700,000 for assets seizures when they originally offered \$20,000.

### **CITY MANAGER REPORT**

City Manager Rey advised there is no report.

### **CITY ATTORNEY REPORT**

City Attorney advised there is no report.

### **COMMISSIONERS' CONCERNS/REPORTS/ITEMS TO BE PLACED ON NEXT AGENDA**

Commissioner Green asked for a consensus to receive an opinion on how the ordinance passed last week could affect an individual who is elected and is currently in FRS.

Commissioner Katzman commended the Parks and Recreation team for having multiple events happening at the Pool and Tennis Center last weekend as all events were outstanding.

Commissioner Green also commended the Parks and Recreation staff and thanked Commissioner Katzman for representing the Commission.

Commissioner Mallozzi also commended the Parks and Recreation staff and wished everyone a Happy Rosh Hashanah. She also advised she met with FDOT and they came to a resolution and agreed to maintain the wall on Griffin Road. She would like a consensus to host a Town Hall meeting to meet with the residents. FDOT agreed to address any structural issues and paint and clean the Griffin side of the wall every four years. If FDOT was to maintain the interior of the wall they would put up a chain link fence four feet from the wall and mow the grass every six weeks. She did not believe the residents wanted to lose the four feet of their backyard so she wanted to present the option at a Town Hall meeting. She also wanted to present this idea to the Commission as she is only one person.

Mayor Ross said the City Manager should be the one negotiating and clarified she does not need permission to hold a Town Hall.

Commissioner Mallozzi said the City Manager left Mr. Harvell in charge of negotiating and FDOT said they were not going to maintain the wall. She then set up the meeting.

Mayor Ross said the Broward League of Cities did a great job getting all the active school board members to appear at the last meeting. He was able to speak to the new school board member who represents Country Glen and she is more than willing to listen to the concerns. The Chess Tournament event was terrific and staff was raving about the event. He thanked Commissioner Katzman for

accepting the award on his behalf and said it is one of the most beautiful awards he has ever received. Mayor Ross thanked staff and the volunteers as the event was tremendous. The tournament is an amazing event for the children.

# **ADDITIONAL PUBLIC COMMENTS (3 MINUTES)**

Tena Granit, 20-year resident does not agree with lifetime benefits. She also has concerns that anyone who is reelected again then may be considered vested. She also believes a legal opinion should have been received before voting on the elected officials benefits. She also asked that all the backup spoke on tonight be added to the agenda.

Commissioner Green asked if he has consensus on receiving a legal opinion from FRS based on the ordinance passed last week as it pertains to the current election.

City Attorney Horowitz said there is a mechanism through FRS by which we can, or an affected party can request an administrative opinion. This issue is however a speculative issue. If his office is directed to contact FRS for the opinion they will certainly do so he cannot however confirm on whether or not they will answer the question at this time.

Commissioner Mallozzi supports asking for the opinion.

Mayor Ross asked if there is anything prohibiting the affective person in contacting FRS themselves. City Attorney Horowitz answered no.

Commissioner Shrouder does not want to pass rules for individuals. He does not believe the City should get involved as they cannot help who is elected.

Commissioner Green said this ordinance was not in affect during qualifying. He would like an opinion.

Commissioner Shrouder said the person affected needs to contact FRS.

Commissioner Green said they contacted FRS by means of the pension attorney already. City Attorney Horowitz answered yes due to potential impacts to the City. Commissioner Green said this is the same matter.

Commissioner Shrouder said the City Attorney only called the office he did not ask for a binding opinion.

Commissioner Green said he wants a formal or nonformal opinion. City Attorney Horowitz said the only way to receive a binding opinion from FRS is to go through the administrative process through FRS and DMS. Commissioner Green asked if they can ask for a nonbinding opinion. City Attorney Horowitz said a non-binding opinion cannot be upheld.

# ADJOURNMENT

The meeting adjourned at 10:23 PM.
