## MINUTES

### PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mayor Curran opened the meeting at 6:30 PM and led the assembly in the Pledge of Allegiance.

### ROLL CALL

Present were Commissioners Smith, Mallozzi, Katzman, Shrouder, and Mayor Curran.

### CHANGES TO AGENDA/EMERGENCY MATTERS

None.

### PROCLAMATIONS/PRESENTATIONS

#### 1. Pet Adoption - **Commissioner Mallozzi**

Commissioner Mallozzi announced that Kodak (ID 710762), a dog, is available for adoption. Interested parties can contact the Humane Society of Broward County at [www.humanebroward.com](http://www.humanebroward.com) or call 954-989-3977, extension 6.

Commissioner Mallozzi also mentioned the upcoming Pickleball Tournament and Bunko Night, both to raise funds for Relay for Life.

### PUBLIC SPEAKING

#### **Open Public Meeting/Agenda Concerns –**

Marcos Ritter thanked Cooper City businesses and the pickleball community for coming together to provide financial assistance to 38 families through the Brighten A Day Foundation.

Jason Weinrub spoke about statements regarding the Monterra Community Development District at the January 9th Commission Meeting. He advised that Broward County owns the landscaping and irrigation along Pine Island Road. The district has asked the County to improve visibility and maintenance. The district's roadways will also be updated in March of this year.

Commissioner Shrouder said the roadways need maintenance. Mr. Weinrub said the District removed former board members because issues were not being addressed.

Commissioner Mallozzi thanked Mr. Weinrub and appreciates the work the District is doing. She encouraged the District to reach out if they need help.

Commissioner Katzman asked about the delay with the County. City Manager Rey said the item needs to be placed on the County agenda. Commissioner Katzman requested that our County Commissioner add the item to the agenda for an upcoming meeting.

Nina Banchon spoke on items 2 and 3: the proposed Monterra Commercial Self Storage project, the removal of the proposed Southwest entrance, and a reduction of the City's allowable construction hours.

### **Ordinances On First Reading**

#### **2. Ordinance 26-06 (Community Development)**

City Attorney Horowitz read "AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF COOPER CITY, FLORIDA, APPROVING REZONING PETITION #Z 6-1-25; PROVIDING FOR THE REZONING OF THE APPROXIMATELY 2.57 ACRES OF REAL PROPERTY GENERALLY LOCATED ON THE S.W. CORNER OF NORTH UNIVERSITY DRIVE AND SOLANO AVENUE IN COOPER CITY, FLORIDA; REZONING THE SUBJECT PROPERTY FROM PLANNED MIXED USE DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT (PMUD) TO B-3 (GENERAL BUSINESS DISTRICT); PROVIDING FOR AMENDMENT OF THE CITY'S OFFICIAL ZONING MAP; PROVIDING FOR CODIFICATION; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICTS; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE" by title.

Commissioner Shrouder: No campaign contributions. Avi, Jason Weinrub, Max Pulcini, Rick Elsley, Jim Federici, Debbie Eisinger, Brightstar CEO David Diaz, Guy Pedaroro, and the applicant's attorney.

Mayor Curran: Campaign contributions from Greenspoon Marder. Staff, members of the Planning and Zoning Board, and Bright Star.

City Attorney Horowitz swore in everyone who wished to give testimony.

Community Development Director Jason Chockley spoke on the petitions. The rezoning request is from PMUD to B3, and it also includes a request to amend the Monterra Commercial Design Guidelines. The subject site covers approximately 2.57 acres and is the last vacant parcel of the Monterra Commercial tract, located at the southwest corner of North University Drive and Solano Avenue, between the Brightstar Credit Union and the Monterra Apartments. Rezoning is required for the lot to be developed with the proposed building, which includes 114,735 square feet of self-storage facing N. University Drive. This parcel has been designated for commercial use since the creation of the Monterra master planned development. All infrastructure necessary to support a B-3 District on this site has been completed, and the site has been cleared and prepared for development in accordance with plan standards. Policy 1.4.4 of the City's Comprehensive Plan states that city zoning regarding permitted uses and densities must align with or be more restrictive than the requirements of the City Land Use Plan. The applicant's full justification statement, included in the backup, references compatibility with other policies of the City's Comprehensive Plan. Therefore, the request is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan. The proposed B-3 Zoning District aligns with the existing C-Commercial Land Use Plan designation and is compatible with surrounding zoning districts and land uses. The accompanying Site Plan and Plat applications would

allow for up to 116,000 sq. ft. of self-storage uses upon approval of the conditional use request. The area along University Drive features a mix of residential and commercial uses. With a proposed height of 42 feet, this building will blend in with neighboring structures. The Brightstar Credit Union to the north has a building height of 45 feet, and the apartment building to the south reaches 35 feet at the roof peak. The surrounding area will experience mixed effects due to this rezoning request. The property is already zoned for non-residential use. The proposed self-storage use, aside from the building's bulk and size, is generally considered less intense than traditional commercial uses with respect to traffic impacts on neighboring properties. The site plan indicates there will be no outdoor storage associated with the operation. Currently, we do not know which operator will run the facility, but the general operational hours and security measures are reasonable for this location. The new building's 42-foot height is 3 feet below the current 45-foot height limit in the Design Guidelines. The rezoning and conditional use request for the described self-storage facility would significantly reduce daily trips to and from the site, compared with the potential 33,000 sq. ft. of shopping plaza use currently permitted by the plat. The proposed location has access to a primary arterial roadway at University Drive via Solano Avenue, which also connects Sheridan Street to the south. The rezoning request for Parcel C-2B2 in the Monterra Master Plan seeks to update the parcel's Commercial Design Guidelines. Since the Design Guidelines are tied to the zoning district, the changes are technically considered a rezoning. The exhibit titled "MONTERRA Parcel C-2 Design Guidelines" in the backup material provides narrative and graphic descriptions of the proposed changes related to this request. The currently approved Monterra Master Plan shows Commercial Parcel C-2 Block 3, located at the southwest corner of N. University Drive and Solano Avenue, Cooper City, Florida. Under this request and the accompanying Site Plan, the parcel is planned for development of a three-story, 42-foot-tall building with 114,735 sq. ft. of self-storage facing N. University Drive. The design guidelines proposed with this request include: Update the Plat Note restrictions on page 5 and the uses on pages 6 and 7 to reflect the current review of the Plat Note Amendment application. Update Exhibit 2b-2 on page 8 to reflect the circulation as shown in the submitted site plan application. Update Exhibit 4b on page 30 to include the C-1 sign type for the southern parcel. The petitions were heard by the Planning and Zoning Board on October 13, 2025, and received a recommendation for approval.

Dennis Mele, 200 East Broward Blvd, Fort Lauderdale, on behalf of the applicant, gave a presentation. Mr. Mele explained the aerial of the property. Initially, the proposal was for a building with retail on the ground floor and self-storage above. The building was taller and had more traffic. The resident closest to the proposal, who initially opposed the project, has since supported it following the changes. Parking is almost 1.5 times what the code requires. He also heard the residents' comments earlier tonight and will discuss the entrance with her. The height of 42 feet is below the PMUD maximum of 45. They also heard residents' comments on parking issues in Solano and are willing to help. The new plan proposal was passed unanimously by the Planning and Zoning Board and was praised for addressing the changes requested at the project's initial presentation. 16 letters of support are being submitted for consideration tonight, and three additional letters were received today. Mr. Mele spoke on the allowable uses for the property.

Mayor Curran opened the public hearing.

Jake Kiker, a representative of Brightstar Credit Union, does not believe a storage facility aligns with the area's vision.

Greg Malthouse, a longtime Monterra resident, spoke in support of the self-storage facility, noting that other uses could cause issues.

Stephen Feldschuh, a Monterra resident, spoke in support of the storage facility and the Commission's support for area residents.

A Cooper City resident and Brightstar employee spoke about his concerns regarding the proposal and the increase in traffic and crime associated with the storage units.

Nina Banchon said traffic is already an issue in the area and asked the Commission to address construction hours.

Mr. Mele is willing to speak with residents regarding traffic concerns. He also mentioned Brightstar having parking issues in the area. The new facility offers 87 parking spots, as opposed to the required 58. The property was zoned for both residential and commercial use. The storage facility will also be equipped with cameras. A traffic engineer has reviewed the presented traffic data. He also discussed the purchase and sales agreements with Brightstar, which excluded approval from any other financial institutions in the area. However, the storage unit was not included.

Commissioner Shrouder asked about the rezoning criteria. Mr. Mele said the criteria are included in the backup, and it is clear that the storage unit is the lowest traffic generator.

Commissioner Shrouder said they cannot discount the neighboring landowners. Hardship is also not a factor. Mr. Mele said there have been previous amendments to the PMUD. This project has been going on for 20 years. Commissioner Shrouder asked how they could not take into consideration neighboring landowners. Mr. Mele said the concerns of the residential neighbors carry more weight than those of commercial owners.

Commissioner Katzman stated that Mr. Mele indicated Brightstar had the opportunity to prevent the development of storage facilities when purchasing the property, but opted not to do so. However, Mr. Mele designated the area for zoning purposes twenty years ago without including storage facilities. Commissioner Katzman also referenced his tenure on the Planning and Zoning Board, during which a proposal for a self-storage unit across from Embassy Lakes was discussed. He recalled being informed that if the storage unit was not approved, the land could be allocated to any business, potentially leading to complications. He believes residents are being advised that any alternative to the storage unit could cause significant issues. He expressed uncertainty about how adding a self-storage unit would enhance the community's value.

Commissioner Mallozzi asked whether anyone in the room was present when the PMUD use was developed. Director Chockley said the current guidelines were proposed in May 2018 and included Diversified. Commissioner Mallozzi said everyone she has spoken to does not support the petition. Brightstar Credit Union has partnered with schools and organizations within the City. There are eight storage facilities within a two-mile radius. She called five of them, and four had a vacancy rate above 30%. She does not believe a storage unit is the right choice for the City.

Commissioner Smith is concerned that hypotheticals are being presented to community residents. If the storage facility is not built, other unfavorable options could be built. Mr. Mele said the Planning and Zoning Board expressed concerns about the building's height, appearance, and retail level. Commissioner Smith asked if the height was reduced due to concerns about the building. Mr. Mele said the height was reduced in response to comments at the Planning and Zoning Meeting. Commissioner

Smith said Brightstar indicated that they reached out. Mr. Mele was not a part of that discussion. Commissioner Smith asked what the most recent vision was for the area. Mr. Mele said C-2 was removed from 2-G. Shopping Centers are less popular than online options. Commissioner Smith asked whether Mr. Mele has any analytics on storage facilities and how much residents use them. Mr. Mele said the facility is on the very edge of Cooper City. Commissioner Smith asked how many employees are typically employed. Alan Goldberg, CEO of Diversified, said there are three to four employees. Typically, self-storage facilities have a primary market of one to three miles. Commissioner Smith asked about security. Mr. Goldberg said the security is electronic. The facility is also protected by a card or code. He also stated that they will integrate security with the Real Time Crime Center, if possible. Commissioner Smith asked whether they had worked with Brightstar. Mr. Goldberg said they had disagreements with Brightstar from the beginning. Commissioner Smith asked about possible U-Haul rentals. Mr. Mele said outdoor storage is prohibited. Commissioner Smith said that storage facilities often catch fire due to stored items. He asked who controls the storage limitations. Mr. Goldberg said the State controls the storage allowances. Commissioner Smith said his concerns are with the residents to the West. Mr. Mele said he is willing to exclude anything that Fire recommends. Commissioner Smith asked if the applicant was willing to work with Brightstar. Mr. Mele does not believe there is anything they can do other than not changing the use to satisfy Brightstar.

Commissioner Mallozzi asked how often storage facilities ignite and what causes the ignitions.

Commissioner Smith said fires do occur at these facilities.

Mr. Goldberg said this has been a difficult project. They lost every major box tenant and tried to develop a more town-center project, which proved infeasible. They have tried to work with Brightstar to no avail. They spent over \$250,000 on recommendations from the Planning and Zoning Board.

**MOTION:** Commissioner Katzman moved to approve Ordinance 26-06. Commissioner Mallozzi seconded the motion, which failed by unanimous roll-call vote. (5-0)

Commissioner Shrouder commended Mr. Goldberg, stating that his lobbyist performed excellently.

Commissioner Smith pulled item 4.

**MOTION:** Commissioner Mallozzi moved to approve the consent agenda except for item 4. Commissioner Katzman seconded the motion, which passed by a unanimous roll call vote. (5-0)

Commissioner Smith said that now that the Rescue Unit is in Broward County, he wants it delivered as quickly as possible. Fire Chief Brown said the rescue was en route when it developed a mechanical issue, and the apparatus was towed back to Ocala. As soon as the apparatus is delivered, Fleet will inspect it. Commissioner Smith asked whether the apparatus is ready for service following BSO's inspection. Chief Brown said the equipment needs to be mounted, which can take three weeks. Commissioner Smith asked City Manager Rey to update the Commission on the status.

### **REGULAR AGENDA**

13. Motion to approve Task Order No. UTL-26-037D under contract RFQ2024-1-PW for Cooper City's Citywide Entrance Monuments, with Kimely-Horn and Associates, Inc., for an amount not to exceed \$299,080.00 to provide professional engineering services. – **Utilities**

Commissioner Shrouder does not see a timeline for completing the plans. Utilities Director Akin Ozaydin said George Palabin from Kimely-Horn is present to answer questions. City Manager Rey said the plans are specific to each location. Commissioner Shrouder asked whether all locations will be completed or done in phases. City Manager Rey said the plans will be done in phases, with those requiring state approval on the backend. Commissioner Shrouder asked whether the plans would become stale. Commissioner Shrouder wants a guarantee that there will be no revisions if state law changes. City Manager Rey said the items will be designed at different times. Commissioner Shrouder asked when the plans would be ready. City Manager Rey said within 6 months. Commissioner Shrouder said the landscaping firm took three years. Commissioner Shrouder requested that the 6-month timeline be included in the contract.

Commissioner Mallozzi said that, given potential decreases in property taxes, this item is unnecessary.

Commissioner Smith stated that the amount remains below the budgeted level.

Mayor Curran agrees with Commissioner Mallozzi and asked whether our signs are deteriorating. City Manager Rey said they are dated and that he agrees this is not a need but a want. The beautification plan suggested an update. Mayor Curran said that, after the design phase, the project will cost \$3.3 million. The water plant and fire station need updates.

**MOTION:** Commissioner Shrouder moved to approve Task Order No. UTL-26-037D under contract RFQ2024-1-PW for Cooper City's Citywide Entrance Monuments, with Kimely-Horn and Associates, Inc., for an amount not to exceed \$299,080.00 to provide professional engineering services. Commissioner Mallozzi seconded the motion, which failed by the following roll call vote. (3-2)

14. Request to approve entering into a piggyback agreement with FG Construction, LLC for roadway milling and resurfacing services project, in an amount not to exceed \$1,536,396 for the Fiscal Year 2025-26, under Broward County Contract No. PNC2127485B1-1, and to approve expenditures in each subsequent year of the piggyback contract not to exceed the approved budget amount for each respective fiscal year. – **Utilities**

Commissioner Katzman seeks to guarantee that all asphalt projects within the City adhere to Ordinance 23-17, which prohibits the utilization of phosphogypsum. City Manager Rey assured that phosphogypsum will not be used. He has requested that all asphalt projects, whether solicited through bidding or included in an agenda, explicitly state the ban on phosphogypsum within the city. Additionally, he has emphasized the importance of ensuring Monterra's awareness of this regulatory requirement.

Commissioner Shrouder asked whether the map in the backup covers the storm basins. City Manager Rey said yes. Commissioner Shrouder said the asphalt in the Suellen Fardelmann Sports Complex area

looks poor. City Manager Rey said this is a different vendor. Commissioner Shrouder asked where the legal description of the roads is included. Director Ozaydin said staff will double-check every dollar amount. Commissioner Shrouder said that, in the past, the roads were paved, but the storm drains were not completed.

A representative from FG Construction said they follow the Broward County contract, which includes specifications. The City should provide an inspector to ensure compliance. They will mill 1 inch from the existing road, shape it to ensure a 2% slope, and roll the area. The storm drains have been calculated and included in the estimate. City Manager Rey said additional repairs to the parking lot at Suellen Fardelmann would cause further damage.

**MOTION:** Commissioner Katzman moved to approve entering into a piggyback agreement with FG Construction, LLC for roadway milling and resurfacing services project, in an amount not to exceed \$1,536,396 for the Fiscal Year 2025-26, under Broward County Contract No. PNC2127485B1-1, and to approve expenditures in each subsequent year of the piggyback contract not to exceed the approved budget amount for each respective fiscal year. Commissioner Mallozzi seconded the motion, which passed by a unanimous roll call vote. (5-0)

City Attorney Horowitz read “AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF COOPER CITY, FLORIDA, AMENDING CHAPTER 17 OF THE TOWN’S CODE OF ORDINANCES, ENTITLED “TRAFFIC AND MOTOR VEHICLES;” AMENDING ARTICLE I, ENTITLED “IN GENERAL,” BY CREATING SECTION 17-4, TO BE ENTITLED “MICROMOBILITY;” PROVIDING FOR DEFINITIONS; PROVIDING FOR GENERAL PROVISIONS FOR MICROMOBILITY DEVICES; AMENDING CHAPTER 13, ENTITLED “PUBLIC SAFETY,” BY SPECIFICALLY AMENDING SECTION 13-80, ENTITLED “CITATIONS – OPTIONS OF PERSONS CITED;” PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES; PROVIDING FOR CODIFICATION; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICTS; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

City Attorney Horowitz stated that all requested changes at first reading have been incorporated.

Mayor Curran opened the public hearing.

Vinnie Passerino suggested a track where the youth can use e-bikes.

City Manager Rey stated earlier this afternoon that the police department recommended prohibiting the practice of throttling on sidewalks and in City parks.

Police Chief Andrea Tianga read an email from her staff detailing the negative impacts of throttling.

Commissioner Shrouder is unsure how law enforcement enforces non-throttling.

Commissioner Mallozzi supports the recommendation.

Commissioner Katzman clarified that this ordinance provides police personnel with the tools needed to stop dangerous behavior, not to deter all riders. He also asked for clarification on the fines listed as \$50 for a first offense and \$100 for a second offense.

Commissioner Smith wants to include BSO's recommendation on throttling in the ordinance.

City Attorney Horowitz said the ordinance regulates micromobility devices, which are broadly defined to include scooters, e-bikes, and electric personal assisted mobility devices. Throttling may not apply to all of them.

Commissioner Shrouder asked that rear-view lights be included in Section F.

Commissioner Mallozzi stated that the Education Advisory Board would like to help with the e-bike safety program.

**MOTION:** Commissioner Shrouder moved to approve Ordinance 26-02 as amended to prohibit throttling on sidewalks and City parks and include rear view lights in Section F. Commissioner Mallozzi seconded the motion, which passed by a unanimous roll call vote. (5-0)

#### 19. **Ordinance 26-03 (Community Development)**

City Attorney Horowitz read "AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF COOPER CITY, FLORIDA, AMENDING CHAPTER 19 OF THE CITY'S CODE OF ORDINANCES, ENTITLED "UTILITIES;" BY AMENDING ARTICLE IV, ENTITLED "STORMWATER MANAGEMENT UTILITY;" AMENDING SECTION 19-154, ENTITLED "DEFINITIONS;" AMENDING CHAPTER 25, ENTITLED "DEVELOPMENT STANDARDS;" BY SPECIFICALLY AMENDING ARTICLE III, ENTITLED "LANDSCAPING;" SPECIFICALLY AMENDING SECTION 25-47, ENTITLED "SUPPLEMENTAL LANDSCAPE REQUIREMENTS;" ESTABLISHING A FIFTY (50) PERCENT CREDIT TOWARDS IMPERVIOUS COVER FOR POOLS WITH AN ENGINEERED OVERFLOW THAT DRAINS EXCESS RAINFALL FROM THE POOL UNDERGROUND FOR NATURAL INFILTRATION; PROVIDING FOR CODIFICATION; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICTS; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

Mayor Curran opened the public hearing with no one wishing to speak. Mayor Curran closed the public hearing.

**MOTION:** Commissioner Shrouder moved to approve Ordinance 26-03. Commissioner Mallozzi seconded the motion, which passed by a unanimous roll call vote. (5-0)

#### **CITY MANAGER REPORT**

##### 20. Well Pump #8

City Manager Rey notified the Commission that the purchase was made on a non-emergency basis and that the three quote requirement was waived.

##### 21. Flooding & Sea Level Rise Resilience Plan Application Ranking

City Manager Rey stated that through the Florida Resiliency Program, the City submitted an application for our electrical plant. Assuming the State continues its past practices, our city's project will be funded at \$10.3 million.

Commissioner Katzman expressed appreciation to all individuals involved in preparing the application.

#### **CITY ATTORNEY REPORT**

City Attorney Horowitz stated yesterday that he forwarded a copy of the motion filed by our special counsel, Bob Klausner, in the City's litigation against the Broward Sheriff's Office regarding disputed pension funds. Mr. Klausner has decided to withdraw from Council. He has been working to secure

alternative counsel for the City, specifically special litigation counsel to handle the remaining claim in that matter. He has a proposed fee engagement agreement with the Shaw Lewenz Law Firm and recommends that the City Commission consider retaining the Firm for the remainder of this litigation.

**MOTION:** Commissioner Mallozzi moved to approve a fee engagement agreement with the Shaw Lewenz Law Firm. Mayor Curran seconded the motion, which passed by a unanimous roll call vote. (5-0)

**COMMISSIONERS' CONCERNS/REPORTS/ITEMS TO BE PLACED ON NEXT AGENDA**

Commissioner Smith thanked Renee Wilson, the City's Grants Administrator, for her hard work. He also addressed the microphone issues and expressed his disappointment with Griffin Elementary's lack of interest in engaging with the City to address traffic concerns in our community. City Manager Rey said the City has contacted everyone possible at the Broward School Board.

Commissioner Shrouder asked whether Code Enforcement could issue citations to the school buses.

Commissioner Smith said the School Board of Broward County has lost its vision for community engagement.

Commissioner Shrouder asked that correspondence be sent to the Commissioner of the Department of Education for the State of Florida.

Commissioner Mallozzi requested that the correspondence be sent to the Governor as well.

Commissioner Smith asked whether the City has any plans to provide seating at Suellen Fardelmann near the multipurpose fields. Parks and Recreation Director Joshua Rhodes said they will look into additional benches.

Commissioner Mallozzi thanked Renee Wilson, the City's Grants Administrator, for her hard work. She also expressed her dismay about the ongoing microphone issues. She also requested that a table be placed next to the podium for presentations and that the Do Not Block pavement signs be addressed, as they are peeling up from the road. She wished everyone a Happy Valentine's Day.

Commissioner Katzman wants to follow up with Senator Geller to advance the landscaping plan for the Monterra CDD. There is a fundraiser for Best Buddies at Embassy Creek Elementary on Wednesday, February 18, at Luv'n Oven, and everyone is encouraged to support a great cause. He thanked the Education Advisory Board for their work on the Civics Program and the staff for their work on the Framers Market, including representatives from Arc Broward.

Commissioner Shrouder thanked Brightstar Credit Union for attending multiple meetings. He also asked about the PH Consulting approval on tonight's agenda. City Manager Rey explained that three departments were using the same contract. The software we currently have in place does not include alerts when the budget is 90% used. There was also no notification to alert staff that the contract had expired. He said internal controls are being implemented, but it takes time and staff with expertise.

Commissioner Shrouder asked about the Accela system and the vendor's failure to meet contracted dates.

Commissioner Smith asked City Manager Rey to let the Commission know if he needs anything from them to help move the program forward. City Manager Rey stated that he can contact a neighboring municipality and has also been interviewing candidates for the Innovation Director position.

Commissioner Katzman wants the Innovation Director to lead the Accela launch.

Mayor Curran said the concrete near the Do Not Block areas is in poor condition.
