NLC Membership

Cities with populations **30,001–40,000**

Membership offers access to national reports, research, and municipal best practices that can support Cooper City's strategic planning.
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Program & Tour Takeaways

Salt Lake City Olympic Tour

Insights:

- Physical venues matter, but **people and culture drive the most lasting impact** for large-scale events.
- The city provides **free transportation for students participating in sports**, encouraging youth activity and accessibility.
- Olympic-style **community watch parties** strengthen civic pride and participation.

Potential Applications for Cooper City:

- Explore city-supported **transportation options** for youth sports programs.
 - Host **large-scale community watch events** for major sporting or cultural events.
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Trails & Parks Tour

Innovations Observed:

- **Story Trails:** Children's stories along trails curated by local librarians.
- **Peace Garden:** Plots maintained by cultural groups or countries to showcase diversity.
- **In-ground trash cans:** Deeper, less frequently serviced containers (Sybertech, Canada).

- Community garden budget: **Approx. \$10,000/year**, with ability for supplemental fundraising.

Applications for Cooper City:

- Partner with local schools or the library for **story-based trail or playground enhancements**.
 - Explore establishment of a **Peace Garden** to highlight cultural inclusion.
 - Evaluate **in-ground waste systems** to reduce long-term maintenance costs.
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Film Industry Tour

Observations:

- Utah maintains a **Film Store App**, enabling residents to register their homes as filming locations.

Recommendation:

- Propose that **Broward County** or the County Film Commission develop a similar platform to support local economic activity from film production.

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AI Opportunities for Cooper City

Operational & Administrative Uses

- Use AI to **summarize policies, ordinances, and laws** for public-facing communications and staff efficiency.
- Develop a **formal AI policy** for the city.
- Update procurement practices: require vendors to disclose **AI usage**; ensure contracts include safeguards and transparency requirements.

Public Safety & Emergency Services

- Use AI for **fire station call modeling**, leveraging call history to optimize response times.
- Predict and detect **water usage anomalies** (leaks or delinquency patterns).

Permitting & Development

- Implement AI tools that conduct **preliminary permit application reviews** and manage back-and-forth clarifications before staff intervention, improving turnaround time.

Public Works & Utilities

- AI-based **workforce and field-service scheduling** for utilities, maintenance, and other field operations.

Vendor Resources

- **GovAI Coalition**: Helps municipalities vet and select reliable AI vendors.
- **InnovateUS**: Emerging “Yelp-style” review platform for government technology solutions.

Tackling Extreme Heat – Adaptation Strategies

Key Recommendations:

- Invest in **EV charging infrastructure**.
- Transition city equipment fleets to **electric-powered models**.
- Provide **free transit passes** for youth and one parent to support sports participation and reduce heat exposure from walking/commuting.
- Use **economic arguments** (not environmental) when advocating for sustainability initiatives in politically mixed environments.

- Expand **bike lanes and trail networks** to encourage alternative transportation.
 - Offer **incentives for environmentally friendly development**.
 - Equip **police and fire stations with solar energy systems** to reduce heat-related power vulnerability.
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Utility Improvements & Water Infrastructure

Funding Opportunities

- Consider creating a **special district** to fund large-scale water improvements.
- **WaterNow Alliance** (Cynthia Koehler) is a strong resource for funding and guidance.

Federal Funding Options

- **State Revolving Funds (SRF)**: Low-interest EPA-supported financing.
 - **WIFIA**: Larger-scale financing for major water infrastructure projects.
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Methane & Waste Innovations

Case Study: Toledo

- Partnership with Northwest Renewables to convert **landfill methane into natural gas**.

Applications for Cooper City

- Evaluate opportunities to use methane generated from:
 - **Cooper City Water Plant operations**
 - **Landfill or organic waste streams**
 - Consider sending **food waste to digesters**, prolonging landfill life and reducing emissions.
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Summary – High-Priority Recommendations for Cooper City

1. **Develop a City AI Strategy** (policy, procurement, use cases).
2. **Evaluate AI for permitting, fire station optimization, and public works scheduling.**

3. **Explore methane-to-energy options and regional partnerships.**
4. **Advance trails, peace gardens, and library-collaboration concepts.**
5. **Investigate EV infrastructure, electric fleet transition, and solarization of stations.**
6. **Partner with Broward County to create a film-location registry/app.**
7. **Explore funding tools (SRF, WIFIA, WaterNow Alliance).**
8. **Plan community-wide Olympic/special event watch parties.**

Additional Summary: Civility & the Dignity Index

Civility in government emerged as a key theme at the 2025 NLC City Summit, most notably in a session anchored by **Anthony Shriver** (UNITE) on the **Dignity Index**, followed by a bipartisan governors' conversation on "Bridging Our Divides."

Highlights & Key Takeaways

1. The Dignity Index

- The Dignity Index is an eight-point scale that measures *how* people talk to one another in disagreement — from an absence of dignity (1) to full recognition of inherent human worth (8). [The Dignity Index+2campaignforkindness.com+2](#)
- Developed by **UNITE** (co-founded by Timothy Shriver), the Index is grounded in the belief that contempt fuels division, while dignity eases it. [The Dignity Index](#)
- Core insights from implementing the Index include:
 - **Electrifying effect:** people want to be trained, learn, and spread dignity. [The Dignity Index](#)
 - **Mirror effect:** individuals use it to self-reflect on their own rhetoric. [The Dignity Index](#)
 - **Agency effect:** people realize they can reduce contempt in their communication and communities. [The Dignity Index](#)
- There is a practical guide for dignified conversations, such as "*be curious, not furious*," pause when upset, listen to understand, and challenge ideas (not people). [campaignforkindness.com](#)
- UNITE is scaling the movement — through training, curriculum, and even a proposed AI tool to flag contempt in writing. [The Dignity Index+1](#)

2. Governors' Panel: "Bridging Our Divides"

- **Utah Gov. Spencer Cox** and **New Mexico Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham** appeared together to model how civility and moral clarity can coexist in high-stakes politics. [Deseret News+2KSL+2](#)
- Cox's "Disagree Better" initiative:
 - Encourages *healthy conflict* — not sugarcoating disagreements, but engaging respectfully. [Deseret News](#)

- His simple but powerful tool: “Tell me more about why you feel this way.” [Deseret News](#)
- He argues local leaders (you and your commission) are on the front lines — “you have the ability ... to show people ... we can actually work through our differences.” [KSL](#)
- Lujan Grisham emphasized empathy and relationships:
 - She said “it’s really hard to be mad at someone that you like.” [Deseret News](#)
 - She described marathon town halls where she listens until “every person has asked their question.” [Deseret News](#)
- On **political violence**, both governors made a plea:
 - Cox: “Trust is something you have to build early ... speak with moral clarity ... don’t be afraid to call things what they are.” [Deseret News](#)
 - Lujan Grisham: Leaders must “call out” dehumanizing rhetoric and center the suffering of real people. [Deseret News](#)
- Their joint message: civility isn’t weakness — it’s courageous, and it’s essential. [Deseret News+1](#)

Recommendations for Cooper City

Based on these insights, here are some actionable recommendations for our city leadership:

- **Adopt the Dignity Index internally:** Consider training for commissioners, city staff, and community leaders on the Index and its practices.
- **Incorporate dignity principles into public forums:** Use the conversation tools (“be curious,” “listen to hear”) in town halls, meetings, and public engagement.
- **Model “Disagree Better” in our polity:** When we deliberate contentious issues, we should explicitly frame discussions around respect, not just policy.
- **Promote civic resilience:** Encourage trust-building initiatives within Cooper City, especially among residents with polarized views.
- **Monitor civic discourse and behavior:** Use dignified communication as a metric in performance evaluations or community feedback mechanisms.
