## 4. ADMINISTRATION/FINANCE

# A. Dickinson Parks and Rec - DSU for the NDPRA Partnership Award for Sanford **Sports Complex.**

Executive Director Benjamin Rae presents a plaque to the City of Dickinson and to the Commissioners for the successful partnership with Dickinson State University. He states each year Parks and Rec select someone to have recognized honors that DSU has developed a successful partnership and increases the community quality of life. The selected SDSU Sanford Sports Complex as partnership award winner. He states there were over 100,000 visits to the sports complex last year and the month of May, 2024 there were 26,000 visits. He states facilities are important for the community and economic impart for the region. Director Rae gives President Scott Decker the plaque.

# B. 2025 Proposed Budget

Deputy City Administrator Linda Carlson presents the 2025 budget for the second reading. She reviews the general fund recap expenditures by departments which has raised 1.9% from the current year. General fund expenses are \$27,556,249 for 2025. There would be a 2% step increase for the employees but no COLA for 2025. The 2025 general fund balance is \$479,000 which is cash on hand. She states there will be no new personnel in 2024.

# D. Amendment to South Heart Reuse Water Contract

City Administrator Dustin Dassinger presents a South Heart Reuse Water Contract. He states currently the City is selling water to the City of South Heart for irrigation of their golf course. At this time the City of Dickinson is charging \$1.25 per 1,000 gallon of reuse water. The amendment to the contract will charge \$6 per every 1,000 gallons of water that is provided and the reuse water will be delivered for fracking purposes. South Heart will provide sampling report each month and will have meters installed to record the number of gallons along with a monthly report for irrigation for fracking purposes. The contract is directly with the City of South Heart and not ND Energy.

# 1. 2023 Year End Report

Assistant Police Chief Matt Hanson highlights the year end report for 2023. He thanks Mike Hanel for creating the book. He states this was the first year for Chief Joe Cianni. Chief Cianni has been in law enforcement for 31 years and the 2023 was the most challenging year. There were 11 promotions; the tragic loss of Sergeant Jason Wallace, change in organization and added several positions. At this time there are 73 fulltime employees and the budget is fairly neutral. He visits about the calls for service. He states Abby Johnson received Officer of the Year for the Dickinson Police Department. He states she had almost 400 traffic stops. He discusses the training hours, SWAT Team, K-9 Unit, Narcotics Task Force and others. Chief Hanson ends with the officers who received awards, promotions and retirees.

# A. Rezone Request - Woodworth

City/County Planner Josephson presents a request for approval of a zoning map amendment from General Industrial (GI) to Agricultural (AG) for an unplatted parcel of land located within the City of Dickinson's ETZ and is generally located between 10<sup>th</sup> Ave SE and the Heart River, approximately ½-mile north of 8<sup>th</sup> Street SE. Planner Josephson states this was in front of the Commission in April but due to advertising requirements it is brought back today. # **B.** Community Development Monthly Report

Engineer and Community Development Director Joshua Skluzacek presents the monthly Community Development report to include 42 individual pre-application meetings, 8 lot modification and states three will be no Planning and Zoning meeting in October. He reviews the projects which have been completed and others that are still being worked on. He also discusses Museum Drive and the construction in that area. Director Skluzacek states if anyone is interested in "Adopt a Hydrant" program the city has more information on this program.

President Scott Decker visits about North Industries and possible cost partition from the City.

Director Skluzacek state the project estimate for the SID is \$1,375,000 and the City's contribution is \$609,997.77. He states the assessed amount will be \$755,128 which will be spread out with linear foot of the residential properties. The city is also taking into consideration the property taxes that were paid by the residents in this area.

Commissioner John Odermann asks if the SID can be amended at a later date.

City Attorney Christina Wenko states if the City wants to lower this would not be an issue but if there is an increase in special the residents would need to know.

President Scott Decker would like to look to possibly not have the residents pay for the SID.

Commissioners John Odermann states that it has taken the City 10+ years to get to this point and feels fixing the mistake by putting the specials onto the property owners is not appropriate. He states this also happened to Sundance Coves lighting project. He states when the City does not follow through, we put the burden on the property owners in the area. He states a collective solution is that the City needs to spread this along to everyone as this improvement positively impacts everyone.

Commissioner Joe Ridl agrees with Commissioner Odermann that it is tough to go along with the philosophical tough to punch them for being annexed into the City. It is a tough thing to even consider looking at what is being presented right now because as Mr. Odermann states there was a screw up from the City 10 years ago and how can we hold the residents to be accountable for the mistake.

# C. Introduction of Senior Engineer – Kris Keller

Engineer and Community Development Director Joshua Skluzacek introduces Kris Keller as the new Senior Engineer.

Kris Keller has been working for the City for the past six months and thanks the City for the opportunity to serve the City at a higher level.
