What Is A Community Plan?

- Appendix to Comprehensive Plan
- Like Comprehensive Plan, has a 20-year horizon
- Deals with a specific geographic area
- Sets an overall vision for that defined area
- Contains goals and policies
- Guidance document for land use, but does not contain approval criteria




What Is Tumalo?

- Unincorporated Community per OAR 660-022
- Specifically, a Rural Unincorporated Community per OAR 660-022-0010(7)
- Administered under Deschutes County Code (DCC) 18.67 (Tumalo Rural Community)
- TCP does not propose any changes to DCC 18.67




Where Is Tumalo?



County Plans That Affect Tumalo

- County has multiple planning efforts
- These overlap in terms of time
- Staff has worked to ensure coordination





Other Activities in Tumalo

- County funded a request for sewer feasibility study
- ODOT constructing two-lane roundabout at U.S.
 20/O.B. Riley-Cook
- County approved multiuse path going underneath U.S. 20 at 4th St. down to Strickler to provide easy route for pedestrians and bicyclists to cross the highway




Why Update 2010-2030 TCP?

- Typically plans are updated at the halfway mark
- Population growth
- Rise of local businesses such as food carts, artisan goods, cideries, and others
- Small sewer system and new neighborhood south of US 20
- US 20/Cook-OB Riley roundabout (2022-23)
- Increase in traffic on US 20, Cook Ave/Cline Falls Hwy



Public Outreach to Tumalo for TCP

- Flyers prior to first Open House
- Website for TCP
- Story Map
- Three Open Houses
- Developed contact list for email
- Meet A Planner sessions
- Stakeholder interviews
- Planning Commission Public Hearing
- Notice for December 4 Board hearing



Topics raised by the public

- Fear of losing rural or small-town feel amid rapid growth
- Code amendments for multi-family dwellings
- Signage and vehicle safety in Tumalo
- Need to protect the Deschutes River
- Various views on recent economic development
- Drawbacks of tourism
- Concerns about sewer costs and effects
- Roundabout art and other public art



TCP 2020-2040 response to public

- Kept Vision Statement
- Added 3 new goals; 17 new policies
- Changes to 3 existing goals; 26 existing policies
- No changes to 9 existing policies
- Deleted 10 outdated policies or irrelevant text
- See color-coded version of TCP Goals and Policies
- See spreadsheet of 2010 vs. 2020 TCP for specifics



Planning Commission Recommendation

- Remove Policies #10 and #11 from the Natural Resources, Open Space, and Recreation Policies section of the TCP's goals and policies. (5 Commissioners in favor, 1 Commissioner in opposition, 1 Commission abstained)
- Add a policy to explore legislative changes to <u>limit multi-family housing to 4 units</u> in Tumalo. (7 Commissioners unanimously in favor)



Planning Commission Recommendation

- Support for <u>public art</u> in Tumalo. (7 Commissioners unanimously in favor)
- Encourage residents and community groups to reach out to Deschutes County for <u>updates and information</u>. (5 Commissioners in favor, 2 Commissioners in opposition)



Why colors for goals, policies

- Using <u>underline</u> and <u>strikethrough</u> made draft unreadable
- Green = No change between 2010 and 2020 TCP
- Blue = 2010 TCP text modified in 2020 TCP
- Yellow = New text for 2020 TCP
- Red = 2010 TCP text deleted
- Spreadsheet has verbatim 2010, 2020 TCP text
- Spreadsheet has notes explaining changes



Next steps for TCP Update

- Board holds public hearing on December 6, 2023
- Potential open record period following public hearing
- Board holds deliberations on date yet to be set
- Staff sends post-adoption notice to DLCD, assuming Board approval of TCP
