








Jurisdiction




Deschutes County Growth*

Planning Commission

- Appointed by the Board of County Commissioners
- Citizen Involvement Committee (Goal 1)
- Serves the unincorporated area of Deschutes County
- Volunteers
- Powers, Duties, Roles:
 - Encourage and gather public input on land use planning, transportation, economic development, and natural resource issues
 - Evaluate and make recommendations on land use policy and land use code changes to the Board of County Commissioners
 - Carry out comprehensive planning program, using citizen involvement and public hearings and coordinate activities with other jurisdictions, planning bodies and districts
 - Evaluate and make recommendations on Annual Planning Division Work Plan following public hearing(s)
 - Implement the Work Plan Long Range Planning Projects
- Meeting Schedule: 2nd & 4th Thursdays each month



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Planning Commission

- No more than 2 members may be engaged in the same kind of occupation, business, trade or profession or be members, officers, or employees of any partnership or corporation that engages principally in buying, selling or developing of real estate for profit
- Term limits: Two 4-year terms or 10 years (if filling a vacancy)
- Be representative of the various geographic areas of the County, as much as possible:
 - 2 members from Bend Area
 - 1 member At-Large
 - 1 member from Redmond Area
 - 1 member from Sisters Area
 - 1 member from South County (La Pine/Sunriver area)
 - 1 member from Tumalo Area



Relating to land use; creating new provisions; amending ORS 215.055, 215.510, 215.515, 215.535 and 453.345; and appropriating money.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

PART I INTRODUCTION


SECTION 1. The Legislative Assembly finds that:
(1) Uncoordinated use of lands within this state threaten the orderly
evelopment, the environment of this state and the health, safety, order,
onvenience, prosperity and welfare of the people of this state.

(2) To promote coordinated administration of land uses consistent with comprehensive plans adopted throughout the state, it is necessary to establish a process for the review of state agency, city, county and specia district land conservation and development plans for compliance with state-wide planning goals and guidelines.

(3) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (4) of this section, tiles and counties should remain as the agencies to consider, promote and sanage the local aspects of land conservation and development for the est interests of the people within their jurisdictions.

(4) The promotion of coordinated state-wide land conservation and evelopment requires the creation of a state-wide planning agency to rescribe planning goals and objectives to be applied by state agencies, tities, counties and special districts throughout the state.

(5) The impact of proposed development projects, constituting activities of state-wide significance upon the public health, safety and welfare, requires a system of permits reviewed by a state-wide agency to carry out state-wide planning couls and suitelings, respectived for anotheriton for


Upholds legality of local zoning powers

- Senate Bill 100 (1973)
 - Protect farm and forest land
 - Citizen involvement
 - Statewide Planning Goals
 - Cities and counties required to adopt comprehensive plans
 - Land Conservation and Development Commission
 - Land Use Board of Appeals
- Fasano v. Board of County Commissioners of Washington County (1973)
 - Required zoning to be consistent with comprehensive plans
- Deschutes County Comprehensive Plan
 - Comprehensive Plan amended in 1979 to comply with Statewide Planning Goals



County Planning History

1965	Zoning ordinance established for part of Count Repealed by voters in 1968
1970	County adopted first Comprehensive Plan
1972	Adopted zoning ordinance that applied countywide
1979	Updated Comprehensive Plan addressing Statewide Goals
1981	State approved Comprehensive Plan
1988	Periodic Review initiated
1992	Farm Study Plan Amendment
2000	Regional Problem Solving Plan Amendment
2011	Comprehensive Plan Update






Long-Range Planning Conference for 1968

Current Planning

- Implement Comprehensive Plan and County Code on a daily basis
- Review land use planning applications in rural areas to determine if they comply with County regulations and State laws
- Respond to public inquiries about development proposals
- Review building and septic permits for consistency with land use regulations






Long Range Planning

- Develop land use policy and regulations through:
