The annual goals and objectives for the 2022 program year of entitlement were targeted towards public facility improvements at Castro Park located within Census Tract 9 of Douglas City limits. The proposed projects include: shading within Castro Park, bandshell and stage improvements and "Friendship House" improvements.

- Participation and outreach were conducted via public meetings and public hearings to determine pressing community needs.
- Established and submitted the Annual Action Plan to HUD for approval.

In the current funding year, the City of Douglas began the environmental review process for the activities to be undertaken at Castro Park. The environmental review process is still ongoing, with SHPO clearance to move forward still pending. As the project is only in the concept phase, necessary details have not yet been finalized and the information is required by SHPO to provide approval to proceed.

During the FY22 program year, the City did continue to progress on and complete several prior year activities to include FY18 activities, which consist of public facilities improvements to Veterans' Park. The activities funded in FY18, public facilities improvements to Veterans Park, were 75% complete going into the FY22 program year and through staff hard work and commitment were completed on March 17, 2023. FY19 activities, consisting of public facilities improvements to the Aquatic Center, specifically the installation and operation of the new dehumidifier system, came to near-completion by the end of the program year, at 95% complete. Activities for FY20 program year, infrastructure improvements including the installation of curbing, sidewalks and ADA ramps in low-mod areas of the City were fully completed during the FY22 program year, on September 19, 2022. Activities for FY21, public facility improvements to Joe Causey Park, to include walkways/sidewalks, LED lighting, seating and shading (including covered ramada seating areas and natural shading using native plants/trees) or as funding allows, are approximately 40% complete. The walkways/sidewalk installation began in January 2022 and is near-completion. The LED lighting was ordered and will be installed by staff once received. The other activities will be dependent on available funds after completion of the walkways/sidewalk and lighting.

We remain committed to ensuring that entitlement funds are used in a manner that best benefits the citizens of our community. The City continues to devote substantial staff and time to prioritize CDBG-funded projects and maximize our ability to remain in compliance with meeting all grant requirements.

Discuss the difference between goals and outcomes and problems encountered in meeting these goals.

CDBG FY22 funding has been allocated towards public facilities improvements to improve/revitalize neighborhoods and add to the quality of life of our residents. The City's goal for 2022 was to make improvements to Castro Park located in Census Tract 9 within the City of Douglas. Proposed activities are to install shading and seating areas for use by residents and to make improvements to the stage/bandshell area and/or the building housed within the park, known as the Friendship House. City staff is in the Environmental Review process for these activities, still pending SHPO approval to move

forward with improvements to the historic park, listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Staff expects to finalize the ER process and complete all activities within the FY23 program year.

CDBG-CV3 funding carryover from prior year was used in public service activities to help prepare for, respond and prevent Coronavirus. To date, the City has expended \$77,432.04 of the CDBG-CV3 funds and the City remains committed to completing proposed activities, utilizing all of the funding that has been allocated for these purposes.

Discuss how these outcomes will impact future annual action plans.

The City will continue to work towards eliminating barriers to affordable housing by improving the infrastructure of antiquated neighborhoods, thereby improving the value of homes and neighborhoods. Allocation plans for the funding year include public facilities improvements to the City's Castro Park located in a historic neighborhood within Census tract 9 in the city limits of Douglas, AZ, to include shading and seating areas within the park for use and enjoyment by all community residents, as well as improvements to the stage/bandshell area and the building located within the park, also known as the Friendship House.

The City is also committed to ensuring that all CARES Act allocations are utilized efficiently and effectively while providing much-needed relief to our local community and its residents.

Narrative Information

The City has allocated CDBG FY22 funds to complete public facility improvements within one of the City's major parks located in a historic neighborhood within census tract 9 with a high percentage of low- to mod-income households. The City's focus remains on making improvements in areas that will benefit the community's residents as a whole. The proposed public facility improvements will greatly improve, both physically and visually, the low-mod areas within our city by providing shading, seating and lighting within and around the perimeter of one of our main parks, as well as improvements to the stage/bandshell area and the Friendship House. These improvements will be utilized and enjoyed by thousands of residents living within the City.

The City feels that it is imperative that the focus remains on the public facility and infrastructure aspects of the plan. The City continues to believe that meeting these basic needs will help build a strong, safe, and healthy community that will, hopefully, encourage a variety of economic opportunities and contribute to an enhanced quality of life for the residents, particularly the low and moderate-income residents.

CDBG-CV3 funds will be expended entirely for the purposes/activities identified in the Substantial Amendment to FY Annual Action Plan and Consolidated Plan 2019-2023.

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The City is constantly working with local and regional organizations to identify and meet the needs of homeless persons and those threatenend with homelessness. The needs of homeless persons require a wide range of specialized services and the City does not possess the resources to address this problem at this time. The City relies upon other entities to provide services such as housing, mental health counseling, employment training and case work services. There is one shelter in the city which is targeted towards men, women and children who are victims of domestic violence. The closest homeless shelter is in Bisbee, Arizona which is approximately 30 miles from Douglas.

The City of Douglas participates in the Point in Time (PIT) count annually, and works closely with the provider agencies in our Continuum of Care (CoC). The City of Douglas also provides shelter in the way of cooling/warming shelters during extreme temperatures in our jurisdiction.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The City works in partnership with the House of Hope Domestic Violence Crisis Shelter in providing their residents with a preference point on the Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher waiting list. The Cochise County Housing Authority provides housing assistance to homeless veterans through their VASH program. Veterans can use those vouchers within Cochise County, including the City of Douglas. St. Vincent de Paul, a local non-profit agency, also offers emergency lodging assistance to homeless persons. The City of Douglas provides referrals for the services mentioned here to all homeless persons who contact City staff for information.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

As mentioned above, the City works in partnership with several agencies who provide these services. In addition, the City has in the past, administered the Housing Rehabilitation and Emergency Home Repair programs which are aimed at helping low income residents make necessary repairs to their homes in order to avoid becoming homeless. These programs have been put on hold due to lack of funding.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The City of Douglas has some funding for Emergency Rental Housing assistance from the FY16 CDBG program activities and is working with local landlords, property management professionals and the Housing Authority of Cochise County to let persons/families who may be in need of this temporary rental assistance of its availability.

Actions taken to address the needs of public housing

The City does not have any public housing developments; however, the Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher program is offered in the City by the Housing Authority of Cochise County. Each CDBG plan year, the HACC is consulted in regards to Housing needs; however, due to our very limited resources the City's focus remains on infrastructure and public facility improvements.

Actions taken to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

The City of Douglas does not have public housing; however, through the Housing Authority of Cochise County's Section 8 program, participants are encouraged to sign up for the Family Self-Sufficiency Program. The FSS program offers referrals to homeownership counseling to those participants who express an interest in becoming homeowners.

Actions taken to provide assistance to troubled PHAs

The Housing Authority of Cochise County is in good standing with the U.S. Department of HUD and is not a troubled PHA.

Douglas does not put any limitations on growth. Through vehicles such as zoning ordinances, subdivision controls, permit systems, and housing codes and standards, the City has attempted to ensure the health, safety and quality of life of its residents.

In order to facilitate the development of affordable housing, the City may consider assisting developers by waiving or deferring impact fees.

The City of Douglas has made progress and actively continues to work on updating zoning ordinances and the City's General Plan to allow for development of multiple types of affordable housing options within the City.

Actions taken to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

As mentioned above, the Ctiy of Douglas has worked in partnership with several developers in order to seek permanent funding for the construction of affordable family housing apartment complexes. The Douglas Housing Corporation I (DHC I) helped two local affordable housing apartment complexes get established within our community by acting as the non-profit Managing General Partner for several years.

The City is actively continuing to market the availability of Emergency Rental Assistance to local eligible households using FY16 CDBG funds. A large portion of the CDBG-CV and CDBG-CV3 funds was utilized on homelessness prevention by providing mortgage/rent/utilities assistance to local households whose ability to pay was impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic.

Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The primary objective is the provision of a suitable living environment and the provision of services for low and moderate income persons. This includes a wide range of programs and activities, focusing on housing conditions and infrastructure improvements. The Housing Authority of Cochise County, through their Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Program, provides information to owners/landlords on lead-based paint hazards and enforces lead-based paint requirements for all households receiving Section 8 assistance through the program.

Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

Economic Development is crucial to the growth and revitalization of Douglas. Improvement of infrastructure is necessary in order to attract new businesses to the community. The City's infrastructure is older and in need of upgrades to make the City attractive for business expansion and development. Public Facility and Infrastructure improvements are a large focus of CDBG activities for the entitlement cycle 2019-2023.

In an effort to help address the needs of poverty-level families, the City used a great portion of the CV and CV-3 funding allocations to address the needs of the underserved population by providing assistance for rent, mortgage, utilities and nutrition.

Actions taken to develop institutional structure. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of Douglas Neighborhood Resources and Grants Department is the lead agency for Consolidated Plan activities, and has developed working relationships and contacts with several service providers, non for profit organizations, housing developers and agencies at the state, regional and local levels.

The City of Douglas works closely with the Housing Authority of Cochise County to offer housing assistance. The Housing Authority of Cochise County offers Section 8 HCV, as well as special programs to include VASH, HOPWA and Emergency Housing Vouchers (EHV). The City also works closely with the Continuum of Care and refers local residents to the non-profit agencies who provide services through the CoC.

Actions taken to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of Douglas does not have any public housing; however, as mentioned before, has developed programs for Housing Rehabilitation, and Emergency Home Repair (both are currently un-funded) and works in partnership with several agencies that provide social and housing services.

Identify actions taken to overcome the effects of any impediments identified in the jurisdictions analysis of impediments to fair housing choice. 91.520(a)

Impediments identified were as follows: 1) Need for increased awareness, outreach and education regarding Fair Housing. The City of Douglas Public Housing Authority (PHA) displays fair housing materials at City Hall, and provides free copies of materials to the public. In addition, the Mayor of the City issues a Fair Housing proclamation every year in April, which is identified as National Fair Housing month. The PHA, through coordination with the Fair Housing Council of Tucson, Arizona, offers Fair Housing training workshops to local residents, housing providers and realtors. The Fair Housing logo is included in all of the PHA's correspondence and forms.

2) Limited supply of affordable housing. The City will continue to use all available federal and state

resources and programs to address high priority housing needs for rehabilitation, preservation, and development of affordable housing units. Currently, the City of Douglas PHA administers approximately 193 Section 8 Housing Choice vouchers.

- 3) Government Policies. Impediments here were deal with issues relating to the development of land including housing that is available to a wide range of persons and income levels in disparate locations. Partnerships with developers, such as the partnership formed to build Sun Ray Family Apartments, in which the City obligated funds from the General Fund towards its development and deferred development fees, serve as an incentive for future development of affordable housing.
- 4) Awareness of Potential Discrimination. Although no specific incidents of discrimination have been noted, the Analysis of Impediments identified potential discrimination due to the age of the City's housing stock which may cause potential discrimination incidents in the rental market. Disabled persons may face discrimination or difficulties in finding appropriate housing due to the small number of adaptable units. Also, there is a high percentage of family households that are slightly larger in size than the national norm, indicating a demand for larger housing units. The recommendation here is to increase housing choice alternatives for the disabled families and families with children by encouraging the construction of affordable, and especially rental housing.

For contract years FY 2019-2023, the City does not anticipate having any sub recipients of CDBG entitlement funding (regular CDBG funds). All projects will be done in-house. The City of Douglas Neighborhood Resources and Grants Department is the lead office which will monitor the progress of all projects, with the assistance of the Finance Director, who will monitor spending and budget allocations. We will continue to monitor our progress and comply with completing the required projects and financial reporting.

For program year 2022 the City continued with ensuring that remaining CDBG-CV3 funding allocations are utilized to undertake public service activities to prepare for, prevent or respond to the Covid-19 pandemic continued to be used for the identified activities. Not much progress was made in utilizing the remaining funds during the program year; however the City of Douglas continues to monitor the progress of all projects on an ongoing basis, with the assistance of the Finance Director, who monitors spending and budget allocations. Our ultimate goal remains to comply with completing the required projects and financial reporting.




