Sample

The sample was compiled from data obtained from the San Diego County Registrar of Voters. We called, emailed, and texted voters. We matched the demographics of City of Escondido likely General Election voters.

Data Collection Explained

Interviews were conducted by phone (33%) and online (67%) modes. Phone interviews were conducted via landline (66%) or mobile (34%). Online participants were invited by email (50%) and text message (50%) for the online method.

Respondents in all modes chose their preferred language, English (92%) and Spanish (8%).

The online survey was accessible by computer, tablet, and smart phone.

Security measures precluded individuals from completing the survey more than once.






Respondent demographics by gender, age group, ethnicity, party preference, education level, City Council District, vote propensity, home type and birth origin






Measure: Prop S



47% vote no on increasing housing limits in Escondido's residential-zoned lands

Question 38: Like all cities in California, Escondido has a General Plan which governs future development in the City. Proposition S, approved by Escondido voters in 1998, prohibits the adoption of General Plan Amendments and Specific Plans which increase residential density, change General Plan residential land use categories, or change certain residential designations such as Rural, Estate, Suburban, and Urban to a commercial or industrial designation without voter approval. Repealing Proposition S would allow the City Council to approve new residential development projects that would otherwise require voter approval and would bring local laws in line with state law



53% oppose building higher density housing projects in areas where Prop S restricts it


Question 41: In general, would you support or oppose building higher density housing projects in areas where Proposition S restricts it?





55% would like to see more parks and open space in Escondido


Question 42: Which type of development would you like to see more of in Escondido? Select all that apply.

Question 43-50: Agree or Disagree






48% agree with statement 2 "Let's keep our Escondido how we like it"




Measure: Cannabis







Among those who would <u>vote yes</u> on the local cannabis business measure, 25% cite new City revenue









Among those who would <u>vote no</u> on the local cannabis business measure, many cite public safety risks and excessive drug use in the City









The message about tax revenue will remain in Escondido garnered the highest most likely to vote for




50% agree with statement 2 that "allowing the retail sale of cannabis in Escondido is a good idea"




Measure: Sales Tax



56% vote yes on the citizen sales tax initiative








Among those who would vote yes to approve the sales tax, 23% cite the funding is needed/necessary








Among those who would vote no to approve the sales tax, 44% cite taxes being too high already


Question 35: Why would you vote no, against the measure? [IF ANSWERED 'VOTE NO' TO Q33] [OPEN-ENDED RESPONSE]





28% would vote for both the local cannabis business measure and the one-cent sales tax initiative


Question 36: If both the local cannabis business measure and the one-cent sales tax initiative were on the November ballot, which would be your choice?



Question 1: In your own words, what do you feel is the most important issue facing the City of Escondido today? [OPEN-ENDED RESPONSE]






55% rate the overall quality of life in Escondido as good. While 58% are satisfied with the job the City of Escondido is doing to provide city services

Question 2: How would you rate the overall quality of life in Escondido?


Question 3: Generally speaking, are you satisfied or dissatisfied with the job the City of Escondido is doing to provide city services?





Addressing homelessness and maintaining streets and roads are most important to Escondido voters


Question 4: Now we have a list of possible priorities you might have for the City of Escondido, please indicate which you think are very important to you personally. Select all that apply.

Question 5: Thinking of the same list of possible priorities you might have for the City of Escondido, please indicate which you are personally satisfied with. Select all that apply.







The city's effort in keeping Escondido safe is rated the highest. Effort in addressing homelessness is rated poorly


