Purpose

- To discuss Boards and Commissions in an effort to:
 - Increase the City's capacity to adapt to changing conditions
 - Address staff concerns about resourcing
 - Consider evolving issues and demands
 - Address difficulty in filling member positions, including student engagement, leading to a lack of quorum and inability to conduct business



- Forest Grove has 12 Boards and Commissions. Of all cities between 10,000-50,000 people in the Metro area, the most Boards and Commissions of any city is 8.
- Most Commissions meet once a month and every Commission is staffed by one or two city personnel.
- Each Commission requires approximately 10-15 hours a month or about 5-7% of a positions duties.
- Staff would like to bring the number of Boards and Commissions in line with our peers.



- As prescribed in the Council Rules, the purpose of Boards and Commissions is to: "...encourage broad-based community representation and to advise City Council on public policy issues affecting Forest Grove and Council-adopted Goals and Objectives."
- All Boards and Commissions must be established by City Council and any amendments to them must be approved by City Council.



- As prescribed in the Council Rules, each Board and Commission has a Council liaison and a staff liaison.
- The Council liaison is non-voting and their role "...is to collaborate between the Council and the B/C to assure each group's collective interest is accurately and effectively represented to the other. This includes actively attending and reporting to each entity at their regular scheduled meetings."
- The role of the staff liaison is to orient new members, review the agenda, minutes, meeting packet and post the same, submit legal notices, and keep the website current.

Considerations

- Focus on B/C with similar functions/purpose.
- Changes to B/C in city code would require a code amendment.
- Mindful of recruitment challenges and vacancies.
- Mindful of B/C purpose, projects, and programs.



Definitions

- For the purposes of discussion, the following definitions apply:
 - Ad-Hoc: created for a specific purpose and/or task assigned by Council. Ad-Hoc can be a "standing" committee over time.
 - Task Force: same as Ad-Hoc regarding a specific task but also has a specific timeframe.
 - Public Meetings Laws apply to any B/C appointed by Council.



Discussion

- Before discussing ideas posed by staff, what are Councilors thoughts on:
 - Are there Boards/Commissions that have served their purpose and are no longer needed?
 - Are there Boards/Commissions that share a similar purpose and could possibly be combined?
 - Are there Boards/Commissions that could be changed to Ad-Hoc?



Commonalities

- Staff recommends Council consider the following B/C commonalities:
 - HLB and Planning
 - CCI and Planning
 - URAC and Economic Development
 - Community Forestry and Parks and Recreation
- Discuss each



Considerations

- Staff recommends Council consider the purpose and/or program(s) of B/C's not required by state law or in city code:
 - Public Arts
 - Economic Development
 - Sustainability
 - Urban Renewal Advisory Commission
 - Community Policing



Considerations

- Notwithstanding discussion, staff recommends Council consider:
 - Reduce membership on all B/C's to 9 or less. If directed, staff can prepare bylaw changes for each Commission.
 - Formalize the Mayor's Youth Advisory Council and remove student members from each B/C.



Timeline and Process

- Changes would require amendments to B/C bylaws and/or city code.
- Concepts from work session would be discussed with applicable B/C for feedback and then refinement with City Council at another work session.
- Changes should be made prior to the member recruitment cycle.



Outside Agency Appointments

- Questions have arose about appointments to outside agencies, i.e., non-profits boards.
- Only those appointments that require Council approval are placed on the list of appointments for Council approval.
- Council may choose to appoint Councilors to outside agencies, however, it should consider possible precedents prior to doing so.
