RE: Poudre River Public Library District Board Appointment recommendations: Alyssa Acevedo and Jaclyn Menendez

Dear Ms. Venkatesh,

Poudre Libraries has **two (2) openings on its Board of Trustees**: both are mid-term vacancies of varying term lengths. One seat was vacated by Anuja Riles who stepped down this past August due to other time commitments. The remainder of Riles' term runs through March 2026. The second seat will be vacated by Josh Fudge after December 31, 2025 due to his election to Fort Collins City Council. The remainder of Fudge's term runs through March 2028.

The Board received 103 applications and interviewed six excellent candidates. The Board of Trustees would like to recommend the following for Library Board appointments:

- 1. **Alyssa Acevedo** to complete Anuja Riles' unfinished term, beginning January 12, 2026, and ending March 31, 2026. Per the Board of Trustees Bylaws, Acevedo can be considered for reappointment to two, full 4-year terms after March 31, 2026.
- 2. **Jaclyn Menendez** to fill Josh Fudge's unfinished term, beginning January 12, 2026, and ending March 31, 2028. Per the Board of Trustees Bylaws, Menendez can be considered for reappointment to one additional, 4-year term after March 31, 2028.

Ms. Acevedo is a teacher at Rocky Mountain High School and is working toward a master's degree in city planning, both urban and rural. She believes that it is "important for everyone in the Fort Collins community to have equitable access to information, resources, and lifelong learning opportunities." Acevedo envisions a Library District that will keep evolving with our changing environment by continuing to be "an inclusive, innovative, and accessible community hub...Gaps in access and representation will slowly close as the Library District continues to partner with local schools and community organizations, representing all people in our city."

Ms. Menendez believes the community's most pressing needs are "strengthening connection in an increasingly digital world and ensuring equitable access" to resources. She is an adjunct professor

at CSU and workplace psychologist who recently served as a board member on the City of Fort Collins' Disability Advisory Council.

The Library Board of Trustees respectfully requests that the City of Fort Collins City Council Members approve these appointments at its earliest convenience. We hope to seat the new members at our January 12, 2026 regular meeting.

I would be thrilled to lean on him where appropriate to get his perspective on challenges for this demographic and ways that the library might better reach this population. Additionally, growing up with a family member who has a disability taught me that everyone, regardless of their starting point or the obstacles they face, has a fire inside to learn and grow.
