ORDINANCE NO. 2022-

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FRUITA, COLORADO REPEALING AND REPLACING CHAPTER 2.70 OF THE FRUITA MUNICIPAL CODE CONCERNING A CODE OF ETHICS FOR CITY OFFICIALS

WHEREAS, the City of Fruita (the "City") is a home rule municipality duly organized and existing under Article XX of the Colorado Constitution and the Fruita City Charter ("Charter"); and

WHEREAS, Chapter 2.70 of the Fruita Municipal Code ("Code") outlines the City's Code of Ethics for City Officials; and

WHERAS, C.R.S. § 24-18-101, et seq., provides state-wide ethics standards that have been subject to uniform interpretation, and Article XXIX § 3 of the Colorado Constitution contains certain gift bans; and

WHEREAS, there are conflicts between the City's Code of Ethics and C.R.S. § 24-18-102 and the Colorado Constitution; and

WHEREAS, to promote consistency in ethics rules across the State of Colorado, the City Council desires to repeal and replace the City's Code of Ethics to conform to state-wide standards as set forth below.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FRUITA, COLORADO, as follows:

<u>Section 1. Recitals. The above recitals are hereby incorporated as findings of the City Council in support of the enactment of this Ordinance.</u>

Section 2. Repeal and Replace. The City Council hereby repeals Chapter 2.70 of the Fruita Municipal Code in its entirety and replaces it as set forth in Exhibit A, attached hereto.

Section 3. Severability. If any portion of this Ordinance is found to be void or ineffective, it shall be deemed severed from this Ordinance and the remaining provisions shall remain valid and in full force and effect.

Section 4. Safety Clause. The City Council hereby finds, determines, and declares that this Ordinance is promulgated under the general police power of the City, that it is promulgated for the health, safety, and welfare of the public, and that this Ordinance is necessary for the preservation of health and safety and for the protection of public convenience and welfare. The City Council further determines that the Ordinance bears a rational relation to the proper legislative object sought to be obtained.

Section 5. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall become effective thirty (30) days after final adoption in accordance with Section 2.13(G) of the Charter.

Section 6. Publication. The City Clerk shall publish notice of this Ordinance in accordance with Chapter 2.13(F) of the Code.

<u>2.70.010 POLICY</u>. Public confidence and respect can best be promoted if every public official, whether paid or unpaid, and whether elected or appointed, will uniformly treat all citizens with courtesy, impartiality, fairness and equality under the law; and avoid both actual and potential conflicts between their private self-interest and the public interest. (Ord. 1986-9, S4)

2.70.010 PURPOSE. The City Council recognizes the importance of promoting public confidence in the City government and that those citizens who hold public office or are employed by the City may have conflicts arise between their public duty and their personal and or financial interests. Therefore, to promote consistency in ethics rules across the State of Colorado, the City Council desires to conform to state-wide ethics standards as set forth in C.R.S. § 24-18-101, *et seq.*

2.70.011 2.70.20 **DEFINITIONS**. The terms As used in this ordinance are hereby defined as follows Code of Ethics, unless the context otherwise requires:

- A. Official Any person elected or appointed to any public office or public body of the city whether paid or unpaid and whether part time or full time.
- (1) "Board" means the boards, commissions, committees, or other authorities operating on behalf of the City as the City Council may, from time to time, create.
- B. Public Body Any agency, board, body, commission or committee, of the city.
- (2) "Board member" means a member of any Board, including regular and alternate members, but does not include any Employee of the City.
- C. **Financial interest** Any interest which shall yield directly or indirectly, a monetary or other material benefit (other than the duly authorized salary or compensation for his services to the city) to the official or to any person employing or retaining the services of the official.
- (3) "Business" means any corporation, limited liability company, partnership, sole proprietorship, trust or foundation, or other individual or organization carrying on a business, whether or not operated for profit.

- D. Personal interest Any interest arising from blood or marriage relationships or from close business or political association whether or not any financial interest is involved.
- (4) "Compensation" means any money, thing of value, or economic benefit conferred on or received by any person in return for services rendered or to be rendered by himself or another.

(5) "Council Member" means a duly elected member of the Fruita City Council.

2.70.015 FAIR AND EQUAL TREATMENT.

- (6) "Employee" means any temporary or permanent employee of the City, except an employee under contract to the City.
 - A. No official shall grant or make available to any person any consideration, treatment, advantage or favor beyond that which it is the general practice to grant or make available to the public at large.
 - (7) "Financial interest" means a substantial interest held by an individual which is:

(a) An ownership interest in a business;

B. No official shall request, use or permit the use of publicly owned or publicly supported property, vehicle, equipment, labor or service for the personal convenience or the private advantage of himself or any other person. This rule shall not be deemed to prohibit an official from requesting, using or permitting the use of such publicly-owned or publicly-supported property, vehicle, equipment, material, labor or service which it is the general

practice to make available to the public at large or which is provided as a matter of stated public policy for the use of officials in the conduct of official business.

- (b) A creditor interest in an insolvent business;
- (c) An employment or a prospective employment for which negotiations have begun;

2.70.020 CONFLICT OF INTEREST. Financial (d) An ownership interest in real or personal interest.property;

- A. No official, either on his own behalf or on behalf of any other person shall have any financial or personal interest in any business or transaction with any public body unless he shall first make full public disclosures of the nature and extent of such interest.
 - (e) A loan or any other debtor interest; or
- B. Disclosure and disqualification. Whenever the performance of his official duties shall require any official to deliberate and vote on any matter involving his financial or personal interest, he shall publicly disclose the nature and extent of such interest and disqualify himself from participating in the deliberation as well as in the voting.
 - (f) A directorship or officership in a business.
- (8) "Immediate family" means spouse and any dependents living in the City official or employee's household.
 - C. Incompatible employment. No official shall engage in private employment with, or render services for, any private person who has business transactions with any public body unless he shall first make full public disclosure of the nature and extent of such employment or services.
 - D. Representation of private persons. No official shall appear on behalf of any private person, other than himself, before any public body in the city.
- E. Gifts and favors. No official shall accept any gift, whether in the form of money, thing, favor, loan or promise, that would not be offered or given to him if he were not an official.
- (9) "Official act" or "official action" means any vote, decision, recommendation, approval, disapproval, or other action, including inaction, which involves the use of discretionary authority.
 - F. Confidential information. No official shall, without prior formal authorization of the public body having jurisdiction, disclose any confidential information concerning any other official or employee, or any other person, or any property or governmental affairs of the city.
 - (10) "City" means the City of Fruita, Colorado.
- G. Whether or not it shall involve disclosure, no official shall use or permit the use of any such confidential information to advance the financial or personal interest of himself or any other person.
 - (11) "City Council" means the duly elected Fruita City Council.
- H. Nepotism. No elected official shall appoint or vote for appointment of any person related to him by blood or marriage who is a member of the officials household, under the same roof, and any parent, stepparent, grandparent, spouse, child, grandchild, brother, sister of the official or any child, parent, stepparent, or grandparent of the official's spouse, regardless of residence, to any clerkship, office, position, employment or duty, when the

salary, wages, pay or compensation is to be paid out of public funds.

(12) "City official" means an elected or appointed official of the City and includes any Board member, but does not include any Employee of the City.

<u>2.70.025 BOARD</u>2.70.30 <u>PUBLIC TRUST – BREACH OF ETHICS</u>FIDUCIARY

<u>DUTY</u>.A. There is hereby created and established a board of ethics consisting of five persons who shall hold no other office or employment under the city. All members shall be residents of the city.

- B. The members shall be appointed by the mayor subject to confirmation by a majority of the whole number of the council, whenever a sworn complaint or request for advisory opinion pursuant to Sections 2.70.040 and 2.70.30 herein is received by the council. The Board of Ethics shall serve until its final written opinion on the matter before it has been issued, thereafter it shall automatically dissolve. (Ord. 1986-9, S4)
- A. The holding of public office or employment is a public trust, created by the confidence which the electorate reposes in the integrity of local government officials and employees. A City official or employee shall carry out their duties for the benefit of the people of the City.
- <u>2.70.030 ADVISORY OPINION</u>. Upon the written request of the officer concerned, the board shall render written advisory opinions based upon the provisions of this ordinance. The board shall file its advisory opinions with the city clerk or mayor, but may delete the name of the officer involved. (Ord. 1986 9, S4)
- B. A City official or employee whose conduct departs from their fiduciary duty is liable to the people of the City as a trustee of property and shall suffer such other liabilities as a private fiduciary would suffer for abuse of their trust. The City Attorney may bring appropriate judicial proceedings on behalf of the people. Any moneys collected in such actions shall be paid to the general fund of the City. Judicial proceedings pursuant to this section shall be in addition to any criminal action which may be brought against such City official or employee.

2.70.40 ETHICAL PRINCIPLES FOR CITY OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES.

- <u>A.</u> <u>The principles in this section are intended as guides to conduct and do not constitute violations as such of the public trust of office or employment in local government.</u>
- <u>B.</u> <u>A City official or employee should not acquire or hold an interest in any business or undertaking which they have reason to believe may be directly and substantially affected to its or its immediate family's economic benefit by official action to be taken by an agency over which they have substantive authority.</u>
- C. A City official or employee should not, within six months following the termination of their office or employment, obtain employment in which they will take direct advantage, unavailable to others, of matters with which they were directly involved during their term of employment. These matters include rules, other than rules of general application, which they actively helped to formulate and applications, claims, or contested cases in the consideration of which they were an active participant.
- <u>D.</u> <u>A City official or employee should not perform an official act directly and substantially affecting a business or other undertaking to its economic detriment when they have a substantial financial interest in a competing firm or undertaking.</u>
- E. <u>City officials and employees are discouraged from assisting or enabling members of their immediate family in obtaining employment, a gift of substantial value, or an economic benefit</u>

tantamount to a gift of substantial value from a person whom the officer, official, or employee is in a position to reward with official action or has rewarded with official action in the past.

2.70.50 RULES OF CONDUCT FOR CITY OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES.

- A. Proof beyond a reasonable doubt of commission of any act enumerated in this Section is proof that the actor has breached their fiduciary duty and the public trust. A City official or employee shall not:
 - 1. <u>Disclose or use confidential information acquired in the course of their official duties in order to further substantially their personal financial interests; or</u>
 - 2. Accept a gift of substantial value or a substantial economic benefit tantamount to a gift of substantial value:
 - (a) Which would tend improperly to influence a reasonable person in their position to depart from the faithful and impartial discharge of their public duties; or
 - (b) Which they know or which a reasonable person in their position should know under the circumstances is primarily for the purpose of rewarding them for official action they have taken.
- <u>B.</u> <u>An economic benefit tantamount to a gift of substantial value includes without limitation:</u>
 - 1. A loan at a rate of interest substantially lower than the commercial rate then currently prevalent for similar loans and compensation received for private services rendered at a rate substantially exceeding the fair market value of such services; or
 - 2. The acceptance by a City official or employee of goods or services for their own personal benefit offered by a person who is at the same time providing goods or services to the City under a contract or other means by which the person receives payment or other compensation from the City, as applicable, for which the official or employee serves, unless the totality of the circumstances attendant to the acceptance of the goods or services indicates that the transaction is legitimate, the terms are fair to both parties, the transaction is supported by full and adequate consideration, and the official or employee does not receive any substantial benefit resulting from their official or governmental status that is unavailable to members of the public generally.
 - 3. The following are not gifts of substantial value or gifts of substantial economic benefit tantamount to gifts of substantial value for purposes of this Section:
 - (a) Campaign contributions and contributions in kind reported as required by C.R.S. § 1-45-108;
 - (b) An unsolicited item of trivial value;
 - (b.5) A gift with a fair market value of sixty-five dollars (\$65.00) or less that is given to the City official or employee by a person other than a professional lobbyist.

- (c) An unsolicited token or award of appreciation as described in Section 3 (3)(c) of Article XXIX of the Colorado Constitution;
- (c.5) Unsolicited informational material, publications, or subscriptions related to the performance of official duties on the part of the City official or employee;
- (d) Payment of or reimbursement for reasonable expenses paid by a nonprofit organization or state and local government in connection with attendance at a convention, fact-finding mission or trip, or other meeting as permitted in accordance with the provisions of Section 3 (3)(f) of Article XXIX of the Colorado Constitution;
- (e) Payment of or reimbursement for admission to, and the cost of food or beverages consumed at, a reception, meal, or meeting that may be accepted or received in accordance with the provisions of Section 3 (3)(e) of Article XXIX of the Colorado Constitution;
- (f) A gift given by an individual who is a relative or personal friend of the City official or employee on a special occasion.
- (g) Payment for speeches, appearances, or publications that may be accepted or received by City official or employee in accordance with the provisions of Section 3 of Article XXIX of the Colorado Constitution that are reported pursuant to C.R.S. § 24-6-203 (3)(d);
- (h) Payment of salary from employment, including other government employment;
- (i) A component of the compensation paid or other incentive given to the City official or employee in the normal course of employment; and
- (j) Any other gift or thing of value a City official or employee is permitted to solicit, accept, or receive in accordance with the provisions of Section 3 of Article XXIX of the Colorado Constitution, the acceptance of which is not otherwise prohibited by law.
- <u>C.</u> The provisions of this Section are distinct from and in addition to the reporting requirements of C.R.S. §§ 1-45-108 and 24-6-203, and do not relieve an incumbent in or elected candidate to public office from reporting an item described in subsection (3) of this Section, if such reporting provisions apply.
- <u>D.</u> The amount of the gift limit specified in paragraph (b.5) of subsection (3) of this Section shall be identical to the amount of the gift limit under Section 3 of Article XXIX of the Colorado Constitution, which is adjusted for inflation from time to time by the Colorado Independent Ethics Commission.

2.70.60 INTERESTS IN CONTRACTS, SALES, OR PURCHASES.

A. <u>City officials or employees shall not be interested in any contract made by them in their official capacity or by any body, agency, or board of which they are members or employees. A former employee may not, within six (6) months following the termination of their employment,</u>

contract or be employed by an employer who contracts with the City involving matters with which they were directly involved during their employment. For purposes of this Section, the term:

- (1) "Be interested in" does not include holding a minority interest in a corporation.
 - (2) "Contract" does not include:
 - (a) Contracts awarded to the lowest responsible bidder based on competitive bidding procedures;
 - (b) Merchandise sold to the highest bidder at public auctions;
 - (c) Investments or deposits in financial institutions which are in the business of loaning or receiving moneys;
 - (d) A contract with an interested party if, because of geographic restrictions, the City could not otherwise reasonably afford itself of the subject of the contract. It shall be presumed that the City could not otherwise reasonably afford itself of the subject of a contract if the additional cost to the City is greater than ten percent (10%) of a contract with an interested party or if the contract is for services that must be performed within a limited time period and no other contractor can provide those services within that time period.
 - (e) A contract with respect to which any City official or employee has disclosed a personal interest and has not voted thereon or with respect to which any member of the governing body of a local government has voted thereon in accordance with C.R.S. §§ 24-18-109 (3)(b) or 31-4-404 (3). Any such disclosure shall be made to the City Council, for City officials and employees.
- <u>B.</u> <u>City officials shall not be purchasers at any sale or vendors at any purchase made by</u> them in their official capacity.
- <u>C.</u> Any contract made in violation of this Section shall be voidable at the instance of any party to the contract except the City official or employee interested therein.
- **2.70.70 VOLUNTARY DISCLOSURE.** A member of a board, commission, council, or committee who receives no compensation other than a per diem allowance or necessary and reasonable expenses, a City official, or an employee may, prior to acting in a manner which may impinge on their fiduciary duty and the public trust, disclose the nature of their private interest. Such disclosure shall be made in writing to the City Manager and City Attorney, listing the amount of their financial interest, if any, the purpose and duration of their services rendered, if any, and the compensation received for the services or such other information as is necessary to describe their interest. If the Board member, City official, or employee then performs the official act involved, they shall state for the record the fact and summary nature of the interest disclosed at the time of performing the act. Such disclosure shall constitute an affirmative defense to any civil or criminal action or any other sanction.

2.70.040 HEARINGS 2.70.80

ENFORCEMENT

AND

conduct under the provisions of this ordinance, the Board of Ethics shall conduct a public hearing in accordance with the requirements of the due process of law, and, in written findings of facts and conclusions based thereon, make a determination concerning the propriety of the conduct of the subject official.

- A. The City Council and Boards have the duty to bring a matter concerning an alleged violation to the City Council.
- B. All such quasi-judicial hearings shall provide for the following:
- B. Any Council members found to have violated any provision of this Code of Ethics, by clear and convincing evidence, shall be subject to a public reprimand by the City Council and may be subject to a censure if deemed appropriate by the City Council.
 - 1. A notice of hearing setting forth the allegations of the complaint and service of said notice on the alleged violator by personal service or by mailing said notice to his or her last known address by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested;
- <u>C.</u> Any Board members found to have violated any provision of this Code of Ethics, by clear and convincing evidence, shall be subject to a public reprimand by the City Council and may be subject to a censure if deemed appropriate by the City Council. Furthermore, upon such a finding, the City Council shall have good cause to remove such Board member from the Board upon which they sit.
 - 2. The representation of an accused official by a person or attorney of his or her choice at his or her own expense;
- <u>D.</u> The penalties contained herein shall not limit the City from bringing any action at law or equity, including civil or criminal action under federal, state, or local law for violation of this Code of Ethics, a breach of public trust, a breach of fiduciary duty, or any other related violation. The City shall be entitled to its costs and expenses in pursing such action, including reasonable attorneys' fees.
 - 3. The administration of oaths to all parties or witnesses who appear for the purpose of testifying upon factual matters;
 - 4. The cross-examination of all witnesses by the interested parties or their representatives;
 - 5. The stenographic or other verbatim reproduction of all testimony presented in the hearing;
 - 6. A written decision by the Board of Ethics setting forth the factual basis and reasons for the decision rendered.
- C. All decisions by the Board of Ethics shall be final and not subject to further review by the city council. Appeal from the decision of the Board of Ethics shall be to the District Court of Mesa County, Colorado.

2.70.050 SANCTIONS.

- A. If the Board of Ethics finds that an official has willfully violated any of the provisions of this code of ethics said official shall be discharged from his or her position with the city.
- B. If the Board of Ethics finds that an official has negligently violated any of the provisions of this code of ethics it shall issue a written warning to said official.
