RE: BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS APPOINTMENT - A REQUEST TO

APPROVE THE APPOINTMENT OF JARED PROCHNOW TO THE DOWNTOWN ADVISORY BOARD FOR A THREE-YEAR TERM TO

EXPIRE IN APRIL OF 2025

BACKGROUND

Pursuant to Resolution 2021-28 that established the Downtown Advisory Board, the membership of the board shall consist of seven (7) to twelve (12) members. The board's by-laws state the same.

The Downtown Advisory Board currently has four (4) vacancies. Between two and five vacancies have consistently been advertised since January of 2021, and one application was received from Ethan Noah, who was subsequently appointed by the City Council at the February 15, 2022 Council meeting.

On April 8, 2022, staff received an application for appointment to the Downtown Advisory Board from Jared Prochnow, a City Council candidate for the 2022 Regular Municipal Election who was not elected but states in his application that he still would like to serve in some way. Mayor Joel Kincaid and Council Liaison to the board Ken Kreie responded via email to staff that they approve of appointing Jared Prochnow to the board for a three-year term to expire in April of 2025.

If Jared Prochnow is appointed, there will be three (3) remaining vacancies on the Downtown Advisory Board.
