Historical Neighborhood Sign Policy

The Grand Prairie Historical Neighborhood Sign Program has the goal of honoring historic neighborhoods to increase their visibility and highlight their rich history. Any neighborhood or subdivision that is 70 years or older is deemed historical and may apply to receive funding for the neighborhood sign markers. The neighborhood also must have more than 30 homes. If approved, the City of Grand Prairie will provide up to \$10,000 to fund the sign toppers. The neighborhood is required to match 25%, up to \$2,500. If sign toppers for a neighborhood are requested by the Mayor or current Council Member, then the match requirement can be waived.

Historical Neighborhood Sign Markers would be placed on top of pre-existing signs at neighborhood entrances and main intersections.

The City is responsible for the design, creation, and installation on the signs. The City reserves the right to remove any signs that are in disrepair.

Historical Neighborhood

Grand Prairie defines a Historical Neighborhood as one that is 70 years or older as of 2022.

Application process

Applications are accepted year-round, and the requirements include:

- Contact information for the applicant representing the neighborhood
- Exact locations where sign toppers are requested to be installed
- Total number of sign toppers requested

Design Specifications

The City of Grand Prairie will create and maintain a standard design template for Historical Neighborhood Sign Markers. The name of the neighborhood will be printed on the neighborhood designation markers and the design will be the same for each sign.

PIDs, HOAs, and Neighborhood Associations

Per City Ordinance (Sec. 23-6), PIDs, HOAs, or other Neighborhood Associations that are not deemed as historic must comply with the existing ordinance and bear the cost of sign toppers in their neighborhood. The City of Grand Prairie will fabricate and install the signs and has the right to remove any signs that are in disrepair.
