RE: Measure B

Dear Council Members,

I have recently corresponded with City staff. One purpose of this letter is to provide a copy of those letters and email. In addition, I am including a summary of my findings and relevant commentary.

First, I would like to thank Mr. Kiser for his speedy response to my most recent request.

The question at hand is did the City's presentation of Measure B, both on the March 5 ballot and as published in the Nevada County Voter Information Guide comply with the California Elections Code, specifically Section 13119?

Section 13119 refers to the "measure" on the ballot. In the case of Measure B, the whole of the measure is Ordinance No. 826.

Referring to subsection (a) the regulation requires the ballot include the question: "Shall the measure (stating the nature thereof) be adopted?", i.e. the BALLOT QUESTION.

Section 13119 provides further instruction for the BALLOT QUESTION in that it "... shall be a true and impartial synopsis of the purpose of the proposed Ordinance and shall be in language that is neither argumentative nor likely to create prejudice for or against the measure." (Please refer to my May 14, 2024, letter to Mr. Kiser for further edification of the above paragraphs.)

As you are aware, the BALLOT QUESTION for Measure B contained the following phrase: "... reducing the risk of catastrophic wildfire and extreme weather by funding additional firefighters, vegetation management, and emergency evacuation planning...". This phrase was not contained in the measure (Ordinance No. 826).

Elections Code, Section 13119 requires a description of the nature of the measure, nothing more. It also requires the statement be a true and impartial synopsis of the purpose of the measure. There is no leeway given. It cannot be argued that the offending phrase is part of the nature of the measure, or a true or impartial synopsis of the measure as it cannot be found in the Ordinance. In addition, the obvious purpose of including the phrase was to create prejudice for the measure.

From the above analysis, it is clear that the BALLOT QUESTION for Measure B as presented to the voters was unequivocally out of compliance with State of California Elections Code, and as such, the BALLOT QUESTION most certainly misled the voters.

In addition, the City Attorney's "Impartial Analysis" of the measure also contained the same phrase, the phrase notably not found in the measure being analyzed. And finally, you, acting as a member of the City Council, guaranteed the voters that "Measure B will fund FIREFIGHTERS, WILDFIRE RISK REDUCTION, and VEGETATION MANAGEMENT for Grass Valley", a guarantee also not found in the measure.

The voters of California approved Proposition 62 in 1984. Proposition 62 declared that "All taxes are either special taxes or general taxes. General taxes are taxes imposed for general governmental purposes. Special taxes are taxes imposed for specific purposes." There is no middle ground offered. The City of Grass Valley used the official ballot in an attempt to persuade voters that the tax revenue raised by Measure B would be used for the special purpose of reducing the risk of wildfire, all the while taking advantage of the lower total-vote threshold offered by a general tax initiative. This "middle ground" approach does not conform with Proposition 62.

It is true that the courts have emphasized that law must be interpreted to favor the will of the voters. Measure B has, at least for the time being, passed by a very slim majority. However, the City's conduct in the preparation of the ballot, and the publishing of the "Impartial Analysis" and the Council's "Argument in Favor of Measure B", both found in the Voter Information Guide, eviscerated the will of the millions of Californians who voted in favor of Proposition 62 which made a clear distinction between a general and a special tax.

Given these findings, the City Council must now set aside Ordinance No. 826 and begin the process anew, taking extreme measures to keep the entire process as either a general fund tax initiative or a special tax initiative.

It may not have been your initial intent to mislead the voters; however, should you choose to continue with Measure B, knowing its procedural flaws, then one might assume it was your intention from the beginning.
