HAMBURG

- 1 The Potawatomi spent summers in this
- 2 area for centuries before the 1831
- 3 arrival of the first Euro-American
- 4 settlers—Felix Dunlavy, Heman Lake,
- 5 Jesse Hall, Calvin Jackson, Cornelius
- 6 Miller, and their families. In 1835 E. F.
- 7 Gay and Amariah Hammond purchased
- 8 land along Horseshoe Creek and built a
- 9 dam and the area's first sawmill. They
- later sold their interests to the Grisson
- brothers—emigrants from Hamburg,
- 12 Germany—who added a gristmill, a
- store, and a hotel later known as the
- 14 Hamburg House to the village. A fire
- destroyed the hotel in 1968. In the
- 16 1880s the Ann Arbor and Grand Trunk
- 17 Railroads laid tracks through Hamburg.
- 18 This spurred economic growth and
- drew tourists to the nearby lakes. In the
- 20 1950s and 1960s, the development of
- 21 I-96 and U.S. 23 prompted an influx of
- 22 residents that made Hamburg Township
- 23 the largest municipality in the county.

EDWIN B. WINANS

- 1 Edwin B. Winans (1826-1894) was the
- 2 first Democrat to be elected governor of
- 3 Michigan after the Civil War. Serving a
- 4 two-year term starting in 1891, he
- 5 instituted the secret ballot system. A
- 6 New York native, Winans had moved
- 7 to Livingston County, Michigan, at the
- 8 age of eight. He attended Albion
- 9 College before leaving the state to join
- the California Gold Rush. After success
- as a miner, he became a banker there. In
- 12 1858 he returned to Michigan and
- purchased a four hundred acre farm in
- 14 Hamburg. Winans enjoyed an active
- 15 political career. He served as state
- representative (1861-65), constitutional
- 17 convention delegate (1867), township
- supervisor (1872-73), probate judge for
- 19 Livingston County (1877-81), and as
- 20 U.S Congressman (1883-87). On July
- 4, 1894, he died at his Winans Lake
- 22 home in Hamburg Township, where he
- 23 had lived for thirty-six years.
