Why This Matters Nows



The Problem

Direct & Impactful

Only two local centers currently accept infants. This shortage forces parents to commute out of town or leave the workforce entirely, deepening economic stress and gender inequity.

Emotional Appeal

Working parents must choose between employment and safe childcare.
When care isn't available or affordable, parents, especially mothers, scale back or quit jobs, reducing household income and community productivity.

Jefferson City families can't find affordable, full-day, infant-to-pre-K care. Most childcare options are part-time or for older toddlers, leaving working parents without consistent, quality care they can rely on.

Comparative Framing

Nelson Merry Park sits idle while the need grows. A historic, city-owned space with classrooms and play areas is underutilized, representing a missed opportunity to meet urgent childcare and community needs.

The Solution: Turning Need into Opportunity

Transform Nelson Merry Park into a Preschool and Community Hub:

Renovate the existing park to include licensed classrooms, safe playgrounds, and gathering spaces, creating a full-day, faith-rooted early education center that meets families where they are.

Build Sustainable Support Systems Around Families:

Pair childcare with mental health workshops, nutrition programs, food distribution, and senior activities addressing not just education but the overall well-being of the community.

RENOVATE


Transform Nelson Merry Park into a safe, modern facility with updated classrooms, restrooms, and playgrounds designed for early learning and community use.

LAUNCH

Open a licensed, full-day preschool serving infants through Pre-K, supported by Carson-Newman University educators and enriched with programs in mental health, nutrition, and family wellbeing.

EXPAND

Grow youth and family programming in partnership with Jefferson City Housing and create an online hub connecting residents to local resources, workshops, and long-term support.




Community Snapshot

Jefferson County is home to nearly 58,000 residents, with 16.7% of children living in poverty. Families face limited access to affordable childcare, healthcare, and social resources, especially in rural areas.
