IX. PUBLIC HEARINGS & CONSIDERATIONS

A. Public Hearing regarding Conditional Use Permit Application **#26-CUP-001**, submitted by Tapestry School, Inc. The request is to operate a public charter school serving students in grades 6–10. The property is located at 142 College Street, Jonesboro, GA 30236, parcel 13241C C014.

Director Akuta stated that the request meets five of the six Conditional Use Requirements, with the only exception being the street classification, as the property is located on a local street rather than a collector or higher. The conditional use requirement is mitigated because the school will operate within an existing church education building with established access, circulation, and parking. Staff recommend approval with the Condition that a traffic management and drop-off pick-up plan be submitted and approved prior to the issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy to ensure safe student arrival and dismissal while minimizing neighborhood impacts.

XII. OLD BUSINESS

A. Council to consider the creation of an Ordinance by City Attorney Wiley Establishing Quarterly Reporting from City Boards, Authorities, and Committees to the Mayor and Council.

City Attorney Wiley made a recommendation for this matter to be tabled or be removed until there is a better understanding on what the City's Charter provides as allowable duties and powers of the mayor. She read Section 2.27 of the Charter (paragraph 9). "As the Chief Executive of this City, the mayor shall require any department or agency of the City to submit written reports whenever he/she deems it expedient." That is one of the executive powers that is granted to the City's mayor to determine when written reports have to come up to this body.

Attorney Wiley further stated whenever we're doing these ordinances and are making revisions to them, we always go back. The first step when you're doing an ordinance is to make certain that you are not doing something that is in conflict with existing law or that's in conflict with the Charter. If it's in conflict with an ordinance, then we can simply revise the ordinance. But we can't revise the Charter by reducing powers that are granted to the Chief Executive Officer. "As we get into retreats or training, I think all of these things will become clearer to everyone and hopefully we can clarify and understand what the limits of what the body is as a legislative body and then the Chief Executive Officer as determined by the Charter."

In conclusion, "Jonesboro's Charter sets the Mayor up as the Chief Executive Officer and Chief Administrative Officer of the City. The City Council cannot legislate by ordinance anything that conflicts with the direct power given to the CEO of the City. That arguably would be weakening or diminishing the expressed power of the CEO under the Charter.

If you were to create an ordinance that says we're requiring these agencies/entities to bring quarterly reports to Council, that's arguably interfering with the powers and duties of the Mayor under the Charter which says as CEO of the City, the Mayor shall require any department or agency to do that. It's in the purview of the Mayor to do that and the City Council can't enact an ordinance. The Charter prevails. Ordinance cannot be in conflict with the Charter.

Article II Government Structure - Section 2.27, # 9-10 Powers and Duties of Mayor.

(9.) require any department or agency of the city to submit written reports whenever he deems it expedient; and (10.) perform such other duties as may be required by law, this charter, or by ordinance.

A motion was made to postpone the item indefinitely due to it being in conflict with the Charter.

Councilmember A. Dixon shared he would like to table the item until Mayor and Council could have a retreat to further discuss and/or gain a better understanding regarding the matter.

Mayor Sartor made the following statement – "Moving forward, if there are reports from certain ones, as always, send me an email. I am not opposed to getting those reports. We typically check

in, but if there's one based on something that has happened, just reach out to me and I'll make sure we get those reports. We can get that information to Council without having it mandated.”

B. Council to discuss Forensic Audit Updates.

City Attorney Wiley advised Mayor and Council that she invited forensic auditor (Michelle McHale) to attend tonight’s meeting. However, Michelle was not able to attend but would be available on April 13, 2026 to present her findings. Also, Michelle would let the City Attorney know how much it would cost to complete the forensic audit. She already had the FY 22 credit card statements.

Councilmember Curney asked if a Special Called Meeting (at 6:00 p.m.) could be held if the forensic auditor is available sooner. City Attorney Wiley said Michelle would be available April 13, 2026. Mayor Sartor asked City Attorney Wiley to follow up with Michelle by mid-week.

It was noted again that grants were removed from the scope and per the contract, the City would like to see a draft of the forensic audit before April 13, 2026.

C. Council to discuss the Newsletter.

Mayor Sartor clarified that the City does not outsource content, only graphic design services. She noted that businesses have requested opportunities to advertise, and that a quarterly newsletter would require sufficient time to establish an advertising pattern and ensure equity. The Mayor also shared that citizens have requested a digital newsletter or the ability to receive a link electronically. She stated, “We can bring the newsletter back, but it must be grammatically and mechanically correct.” Mayor Sartor discussed using a mail house, subscriptions, or a digital sign-up process. The goal would be to release the first newsletter by mid-April or May 1, with electronic copies available.

Councilmember Messick commented that many residents would want to receive the newsletter in their mailboxes.

Mayor Pro-Tem Miller stated that she supports the creation of a Newsletter Committee.

Councilmember Fox suggested alternating with residents one month and businesses the next. She explained that this was a key reason for proposing a committee—to brainstorm ideas and develop a workable plan. Lastly, she spoke regarding business advertising.

Councilmember Curney requested clarification on whether the discussion was focused on forming a committee or bringing back the newsletter itself.

Mayor Sartor responded that she could establish a committee and appoint its members. She added that anyone interested in serving as committee chair should email her to express interest. Councilmember Fox will schedule a meeting with Mayor Sartor and Tavis Thomas in order to develop a plan for distributing the newsletter.

At this time, City Attorney Wiley spoke regarding the Charter - Article II, Government Structure. Section 2.19(b). "All committees and committee chairpersons of the city council shall be appointed by the mayor and shall serve at his pleasure. The mayor shall have the power to appoint new members to any committee at any time."

This would eliminate the need for public meetings or public notices if Mayor does the appointment of the committee. The City of Jonesboro has a strong mayor form of government. The committee and the committee chairperson’s appointment belong to the mayor.

If this council approves a committee, creates a formal committee, then that committee has to meet in public and have to do the same notification and meeting process as your public meetings. This charter provision section 2.19(b) puts that power in the hands of the mayor would eliminate the need for having public meetings. You don't have to have public notices and the committee

that's established is not that's formed by Council. It's one that has been done under the administrative powers of the mayor per the Charter.

Councilmember Curney cautioned the Council against taking actions that would diminish /minimize the mayor's authority, noting that similar past efforts led to restraining orders, costly lawsuits (approximately \$300,000.00), and repeated court losses. She emphasized the importance of adhering to the City Charter to avoid unnecessary legal expenses and taxpayer burden, and warned that legal counsel is prepared to intervene if needed.

Councilmember Fox replied that she was not sure where the comment by Councilmember Curney came from and that it went "way left field and was unnecessary." However, she said she does not have a problem with meeting regarding the creation of a newsletter.

Councilmember A. Dixon asked if a plan was in place as it relates to a meeting date and time for the Newsletter Committee. Mayor Sartor replied not yet. Once Mayor Sartor, Councilmember Fox, and Tavis Thomas meet, then they will have a plan regarding the newsletter.

City Attorney Wiley spoke about Ordinance requests that were made last week. She explained that once an ordinance request is received, research is done to determine what is permissible, what limitations apply, and define the parameters of the proposed law. This process often requires more time than a one-week turnaround. She suggested that a 30-day timeframe would be more appropriate. With additional time, she would be able to consult with Councilmembers to address concerns and collaborate more effectively, except in cases requiring immediate action.

XIII. FINANCE REPORT

A. Financial Report as of January 31, 2026 by Karen Slaton-Dixon.

Director Slaton-Dixon stated that the bank reconciliations were up to date. Mayor Sartor wants the Financial Reports completed around the 15th, 20th, or 21st of each month.

Mayor Sartor shared that the Financial Report will be part of Work Session packet for review and the final report will be in the Regular Council Meeting packet.

XIV. NEW BUSINESS

A. Council to consider a resolution to amend the FY25 budget to close out the fiscal year.

The Finance Director explained that FY 2025 had to be formally closed (“hard close”) in order to upload the FY 2026 budget, as required by the financial software. During the FY 2023 audit, it was noted that some departmental budgets were over in certain categories, and similar items were anticipated for FY 2024 since those years were already closed. To avoid repeating audit findings, budget amendments were made during FY 2025 closeout. Rather than pulling funds from prior fiscal years, adjustments were made within existing departmental line-items. Because auditors review budget categories rather than individual line-items, funds were reallocated to ensure categories such as personnel and benefits were not over budget. In total, the proposed budget adjustments amounted to approximately \$966,302.00.

These amendments ensured that the Mayor and Council budget, and the overall FY 2025 budget, were no longer over budget. The adjustments were included in the meeting packet for Council review. The Finance Director noted that this type of cleanup is standard at the end of a fiscal year and emphasized that future budget adjustments would be made throughout the year rather than waiting until year-end.

B. Council to consider approval of invoices for Juneteenth and July 2, 2026 events.

Shelby spoke regarding Fireworks – need approval up to \$22,000.00 to cover both events (Deep South Fireworks – Quote for Juneteenth \$8,500.00 and July 2nd \$1,250.00 for a 10-minute display (discount rate: \$1,050.00 for a 10-minute display).

Pyro Technico – Quote for \$8,000.00 for Juneteenth (10-minute show) and \$12,500.00 quotes for (12-minute show). Still negotiating the price for a 10-minute show.

Councilmember Messick asked why 4th of July celebration is not being held on July 4th since it is America’s Birthday. Mayor Sartor said everything is higher on July 4th, vendors are limited, it is on a Saturday, and July 3rd is staff’s holiday. Mayor Sartor shared that staff wanted to do July 2nd.

Councilmember Curney said she would like staff to have July 3rd off to spend time with their families and maybe the City can promote Clayton County’s 4th of July event so residence will have a place to go on that specific day.

At this time a conversation took place regarding Freedom Fest and the GMA Convention (June 26-30, 2026). Taylor mentioned there were no availability from vendors and Council would be attending the GMA Convention.

A motion was made for Council to consider approval of Fireworks for both events (Juneteenth and July 2nd) up to \$22,000.00 (with American 250 being slightly elevated) and authorization for Mayor Sartor and City Attorney Wiley to execute both contracts regarding Fireworks.

Mayor Sartor clarified the \$25,000.00 will not come from the City Events line-item. It can only equal the amount of sponsorship raised for Juneteenth.
