Background

The playground equipment at Pioneer Ridge Elementary is in disrepair. Our facilities staff is doing all they can to keep it usable and relatively safe for students and the neighborhood, but it's lagging far behind where it should. Frankly, the equipment just needs to be replaced. Most of the community considers the school playground to be a town park, so we are hoping to work with the town to find a solution for the equipment.

<u>Cost</u>

Our facilities team has reached out to a couple of different equipment suppliers, and they expect the total cost to be somewhere around \$800,000. Several bids from equipment suppliers are attached.

Funding options

The district is working on a couple of grant options to fund the replacement of the playground equipment. One of them (GoCo) requires that the funds go to a municipality, not to a school district.


• If we apply for this grant, can the town and the district work together to administer the grant?


The other (Weld Trust) requires the district to have found partnerships with other entities to fund the request. Our PRE PTO has already raised about \$8,000 and is planning some other fundraisers, but you can imagine that would take more time than we realistically have.

• If we apply for this grant, are their funds available from the town to show commitment from community groups.

Additional info

Currently there are no deadlines, as the district has not yet applied for grant funding. Both grants that we are considering have fall timelines, so applications would be placed in the next few months.







FLAGSHIP GRANTS

What does a Flagship Grant look like?

- Typically larger (\$750,000 and greater) although they can be smaller
- Used toward a significant community impact project
- Strongly aligns with The Weld Trust mission to promote excellence in health and education in Weld County
- Aligns within one of The Weld Trust's seven Key Funding Initiatives
- Addresses a fundamental cause with substantive solutions showing clear and measurable outcomes that will be demonstrated over a long period of time
- Demonstrates community- or county-wide partnerships focused on scaling innovative or proven solutions to clearly identified problems
- Demonstrates a business or revenue model for sustaining the initiative
- The organization must show an ability and willingness to pursue other funding sources to leverage additional resources.
- The flagship grant may be for capital needs.
 - In rare cases, a Flagship Grant may be used to support operational needs.
- The grant may be a one-year or multi-year grant.
- Strong consideration will be given to rural communities challenged with accessing resources that are more commonly available in larger communities.

<u>Guidelines</u>

Eligible applicants must be tax-exempt organizations under Internal Revenue Service 501(c)(3) or operate under the fiscal sponsorship of a tax-exempt nonprofit, including schools and public organizations.

PLEASE NOTE: <u>Only</u> nonprofit organizations, schools and government agencies located in Weld County or whose program is exclusively for Weld County residents in the areas of health or education are eligible to apply.
