RE: FY26 Capital Improvement Plan

I am pleased to present the Parks & Recreation Department's Draft Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) for FY2026-31. We are also providing the FY2025-30 CIP for comparison. The Parks & Recreation Department is responsible for over \$200 million in public parks, recreational facilities, and related infrastructure. Pursuant to CBJ 57.15.030, the Department is required to maintain a plan for needed capital improvements over the next six years. Projects identified for the next fiscal year are included in the Department's budget request to the Assembly.

The FY2026-31 Parks & Recreation CIP identifies \$29.2 million in projects, including \$7,050,000 for FY26. This is a significant reduction from the FY2025-30 CIP, which identified over \$48 million in projects. This decrease is due primarily to (1) completion of major projects thanks to voter-approved funding and (2) reassessment of several longstanding projects.

Examples of major projects from the FY2025-30 CIP that are complete or in-progress include:

- Dimond Park Field House Elevator
- Riverside Rotary Park Lighting
- Kaxdigoowu Heen Dei Bridge Replacement
- Jackie Renninger Memorial Park Planning & Design

Additionally, several large projects were removed or reassessed, including:

- Multipurpose Community Center (removed due to acquisition of FDMS & MDMS gyms)
- Treadwell Ice Arena Expansion (changed to a feasibility study and market analysis)
- Pickleball Courts & Elder Fitness Equipment (consolidated with Jackie Renninger Park Improvements)
