African Americans' work and talents have been transformational throughout the United States, Africa, and the Diaspora; and

WHEREAS, African American History Month, allows us to draw inspiration from this legacy as we continue together on the path toward equality, liberty, and opportunity for all, and that history shows that we rise and fall together.
