



Housing Strategies Discussion

- Bird Drive purchase
 - Evaluating using grant funds
 - Effort to preserve OPP resources
- In-lieu funds forecast and formula changes
 - · Math calculation to be updated
 - No formula changes planned
- OPP funding availability
 - Current funding vs. FY 2026 (10/1) funding
 - · Grant usage allows current year program funding
 - Without grant usage, OPP appropriation fully spent
 - Release in-lieu fund balance for current year funding?

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DISCUSSION/FEEDBACK AT THE BUDGET WORKSHOP

- City Council was supportive of a more stable art funding source each year (including funds for maintenance)
- Additional discussion needed regarding any percentage or cap changes
 - The CIP is already underfunded
 - Mature the planning process where art is part of the scoping discussion of a project?
- Staff introduced the idea of going to a set amount for art each year
 - With the ability to allocate art funding for CIP projects that may benefit from an artwork installation

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ART FUNDING OPTIONS EVALUATED BY THE CITY COUNCIL AND THE ARTS COMMISSION IN JUNE

- 1. Option 1: Guaranteeing funds are awarded for the cap amount of \$1,000,000 with Council discretion to award additional funds above for spending above the cap.
- **2. Option 2:** Guaranteeing funds are awarded for an increased cap amount of \$2,000,000 with Council discretion to award additional funds for spending above the cap.
- 3. Option 3: Fund art programming annually through LOT/CIP funding.

Preferred by both the City Council and the Arts Commission

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Preferred Funding Plan by Council/Arts Commission

FUND ART PROGRAMMING ANNUALLY THROUGH LOT/CIP FUNDS, not tied to specific projects


• Beginning FY 2026: Increase annual Arts Commission funding to \$35,000 (a \$25k increase). Current funding is \$10,000 annually.


PROS

- Decouples art with CIP projects (including the purchase of Community Housing property)
- Assigns art funding to a voter-approved LOT use and/or other CIP funds
- Reduced administrative time and costs
- · Less complicated

CONS

 Arts Commission would have to save annual funds over a couple of years to pursue largescale installations, unless additional funds are approved by Council









Animal Resistant Trash Cans

- Preliminary quote from Clear Creek Disposal:
 - Monthly increase of ~\$3.50
- Pending rate increase from transfer station (October 1)
- Pending ordering lead time & public outreach
 - Fall implementation?
 - Spring implementation?

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- FY 2026 Budget can accommodate modest changes if desired
- Current Pay
 - Per Ordinance 1023 effective January 2008
 - Mayor: \$50,350 annually • Council: \$27,973 annually
- Ketchum status quo: By Ordinance, the Mayor and Council will receive an increase equal to what is allotted to General employees.
 - 3% annually recently
- Any changes must be by Ordinance "at least 75 days before any general city elections." → August 21, 2025
 - State statute 50-203









Policing Services Contract

- Initial financial review
 - Awaiting final proposal from ICRMP (insurance)
 - In-House Option can be accomplished
 - · Similar staffing
 - Net Neutral financial impact
 - <\$100k start-up costs
- Operational/legal analysis underway
 - · Council direction on topics?
