The interred members are still being research and we do not currently know what impact they may have had on this area just yet.

Ground Penetrating Radar (GPR): a non-invasive geophysical technique that uses radar pulses to image what lies beneath the surface to detect disturbances in the soil that may indicate the presence of graves, even if there are no visible markers.

Clearing and Vegetation Management: Remove overgrown vegetation, debris, and invasive species from the cemetery grounds; Prune or remove trees that may pose a risk to the cemetery's integrity.

Grave Restoration: Repair and restore damaged grave markers, headstones, and monuments. Straighten and stabilize leaning or tilting grave markers. Replace missing or broken markers, if possible.

Fencing: Install or repair boundary fencing and gates to secure the cemetery and protect it from vandalism and unauthorized access.
