Year 4 / Progress To Date



Goal 1 / Increase well-being, resiliency, and community healing through community-based, participatory approaches

Objective	Progress
Continue to engage the ReCAST Advisory Board and meet 4 times by the end of Year 4	11 members; 6 meetings
Provide 3-4 trainings on violence prevention to law enforcement staff and mental health professionals by the end of Year 4. <i>Note: an additional webinar is scheduled for Sept 11 to achieve the training goal</i>	4 trainings, 35 trained
Increase violence prevention knowledge, skills among staff	Survey results indicate increased knowledge



Goal 2 / Increase community and youth engagement, leadership development, improved governance, and capacity building by creating community change through community-based, participatory approaches

Objective	Progress
Continue to engage 20 high-risk youth in civic engagement and leadership in the youth advisory council, the Lawrenceville Legacy Leaders	48 Legacy Leaders
Youth continue to provide 4 annual trainings and workshops to educate and engage 200 of their peers in civic education and opportunities for participation in local government	2 trainings; 1036 trained



Goal 3 / Increase access to trauma-informed community behavioral health resources through more equitable access

Objective	Progress
Continue to engage a Belonging Council comprised of 6-10 city employees.	11
By the end of Year 4, include citizens in the Belonging Council and integrate Council recommendations into city policies.	Achieved
By the end of Year 4, provide 6 community culture trainings to community members. Note: two additional trainings are planned at Discovery High School this month.	5 trainings, 128 community members trained
Increase knowledge/skills among trainees.	Survey results indicate increased knowledge



Goal 4 / Increase the level of cultural competency of the City of Lawrenceville's employees and citizens to promote understanding and developmentally appropriate city-led policies and programs

Objective	Progress
Refer/screen 400 families, 80 annually, using the PsRI-30 to measure resiliency and social determinants of health. <i>Note: Innovations are planned to increase awareness and program reach.</i>	30 families screened 13 new individuals served
Refer/connect 400 families, 80 annually, experiencing homelessness, food insecurity, childcare needs to direct assistance.	217 referred
Create referral process to connect 300 families, 60 annually, to workforce development services.	102 individuals referred 69 applied for services on Better Work Portal and 27 found employment



Goal 5 / Strengthen the integration of community-based services addressing the social determinants of health for high-risk youth and their families

Objective	Progress
Assess and provide therapeutic and supportive service to 750 Lawrenceville residents in need, 250 in Year 4.	336 individuals including 70 new and 366 active individuals received a total of 522 therapy sessions
Improve behavioral health outcomes among those receiving services (individuals who made progress toward their individualized goals at discharge)	80 have made progress towards their goal at discharge
