

The Sumter County Public Safety Buildings consists of two buildings that will serve as public safety buildings for Sumter County. One building is located in Wildwood, FL in the Villages and one building, which will serve as the "back up" public safety building, is located in Bushnell, FL. The Villages Public Safety Building serve as the principle safety facility for the county. It houses the following departments and functions:

The development of these two facilities required the integration of programming, phasing, security, and vulnerability, all within highly restrictive cost controls. In order to achieve the final design, CRA conducted multiple meetings with stakeholders, resulting in a detailed program for each stakeholder area. The programming included integrating existing as well as state of the art approaches to communications, and security. This information in turn was translated into design documents that were in turn used to construct the buildings. The design of the EOC must consider the central purpose of occupying department and by its design must symbolize the department's mission and contribute to its realization, goals and challenges. Our team's focus and approach will be to provide a functional, cost efficient, energy efficient, durable, and quality facility that offers straight forward circulation, modern best practice technologies, a facility that enhances strong retention of staff; segregated public and secured parking; and if desired the opportunity for collaboration spaces.


Below is a list of the typical work tasks we undertake when working designing a new EOC. Because we have worked with Levy County in some preliminary planning on this project previously, some of these items may not be necessary or desired by the County. We offer them as a menu of options and will proceed as directed by Levy County.

#### SPACE NEEDS ASSESSMENT/PROGRAM VERIFICATION

Our approach is to work together with you in determining your needs and finalizing the best building program you will need in order to move forward. Our first step will be to confirm with the County if they consider the program spaces outlined and allotted in our previous design concept remains current or if they believe they needs updating. If the document provided is considered still current and appropriate, we will immediately proceed to fine tune the plans. We know that every department is unique and brings a great deal of expertise of their own to the project. It is our responsibility and duty to facilitate and translate what you know about your functions and personnel into a functional and creative facility. Should you require our programming or programming verification services, our methodology for this portion of the assessment is to do Data Gathering, Workshops, Review, Final Report and Design. We would first gather data that includes physical inspections and all department data (inventory, organizational structure, growth projections, requirements etc.) to help us first understand the departments at their current state. To facilitate fruitful communication, CRA has developed programming questionnaire forms that help our clients develop an overall listing of their current and anticipated future needs. We meet with our clients and review these forms and then compile them into a concise programmatic scope for the project. This scope becomes the basis for design. We then develop "bubble diagrams" that visually indicate adjacencies and overall flow and function within the facility. Interviews with stakeholder departments will be conducted to develop a space summary which identifies each desired space by functional name and square footage. Total Assigned Square Footage (ASF) will be determined. A grossing factor will be applied to the ASF to determine the Total Gross Square Footage (GSF). Overall adjacencies for the building and adjacencies within individual departments will be determined and documented.

In the workshops we interact with stakeholders and users of the facility to take that data gathered and gain a further understanding of the functionality of the department, what works and doesn't, understanding the needs and providing ideas on solutions for the issues and getting immediate feedback. The feedback we get helps shape the program decisions made. We then review with Levy County the information from data gatherings and workshops to ensure it is correct before delivering a Final Program Report. Our Final Program will clearly outline data gathered and show the defined spaces, functions, space sizes and blocking diagrams showing adjacencies relative to the other spaces that were identified in the process.

For Emergency Operation Centers it is critical to consider how the building or space functions as well as how it works in tandem with the other County facilities. CRA views design as a marriage of function and aesthetic. After determining the basic program requirements and adjacencies, we begin to examine and develop the overall aesthetic for the project. As with programming, aesthetics requires consideration of existing areas and surrounding buildings, as well as future needs and desires. Our goal is to create an EOC that provides the County with a timeless identity of suitable architecture stature while utilizing current concepts, materials and systems. This provides our clients with highly innovative and yet functional facilities.



#### SITE ANALYSIS

Characteristics such as site size, site preparation costs, site accessibility to staff, site configuration, topography, environmental concerns, zoning, landscape development regulations and the like will drive the preparation of a viable solution the site(s). The site(s) will possess unique characteristics, and each will be documented without bias. These considerations will be interwoven to balance the needs of the County providing a solution that is functional for the intended use and inclusive of the goals established by the County and end-user group.

#### **CONCEPTUAL DESIGN & ANALYSIS**

The critical information assembled during the assessment and planning process is the basis for our work in developing the preliminary design. However, before we begin the design process, we will lead you through an interactive exercise of visioning which allows us to discuss your vision of the final project while interactively discussing and debating the relative merits of each facility component. This exercise allows us to understand your specific goals of each component and to better understand your philosophy; we in turn gain a deeper understanding of your needs. At the conclusion of this effort, we will have a preliminary design that helps define, in broad terms, the essence of your project and program. We will develop conceptual floorplans and elevation drawings focusing on building plans and site plans fitted to the selected site. We will also advise on the pros and cons of various building materials and systems as well as the optional construction methods. #### **Building Issues**

Space configuration; operations assessment; cutover and relocation planning; budget planning and estimation; threat risk analysis; building hardening; ability to promote communications both visually and verbally while segregating response groups or policy group; segregation of public and private spaces; secure and unsecured zones; dedicated safe rooms; procedures for processing; critical areas in most secure area of facility; acoustics and sound reducing materials; raised access flooring and cable and power pathways; plumbing is routed outside of critical operations area; windows are specified with force protection and minimal glare; human and comfort factors are addressed; adjacencies that promote ease of communication, natural circulation consistent with operational chain of command and functionality; training facilities; future expansion capability; food service and support functions to accommodate sustained operations; enhance interoperability between departments through ease of communication and comfort.

#### Site Security & Layout

Fencing (if desired) that is distant from the facility and visually pleasing; landscaping that compliments a safe, secure campus; lighting that compliments CCTV monitoring functions; access control that restricts access by defined "layers" of circulation; directional and facility identification signage kept to a minimum; earth berms that integrate both aesthetics and physical security; turn radius for large vehicles.

#### Electrical Power Distribution System

Emergency and backup power; assess utility service reliability and routing method by analyzing potential risk factors (overhead versus underground); N+1 redundancy for critical systems to determine utility service; entails quality of service for generator(s); UPS maintenance by-pass, internal by-pass and harmonic filtering; static load transfer; grounding and surge protection; emergency power capacity and fuel; anticipated load density (inter-building power and low-voltage cabling pathway distribution methods (overhead versus under floor); VESDA; lightning protection.

#### HVAC, Fire Protection and Plumbing

N+1 redundancy for air side and chilled water side; reliable and maintainable systems; strategic location for valves and water systems; leak detection and containment systems; indoor air quality to support sustained operations; energy conservation/setback; zones for 24/7 sustained operations; double interlock protection versus chemical fire protection system; reserve plumbing water supplies; system life-cycle planning.

Other systems to consider are HVAC, water supply, and wastewater. With outdoor conditions being extremely hot in the summer, it will be critical to provide air conditioning systems to allow for comfortable working conditions and protect sensitive equipment. Additionally, today's Joint Use Service Centers are highly dependent on technology-based systems that have large heat loads and require continuous uptime.

#### Furniture and Consoles

Ergonomics, safety, durability, comfort and appearance; "24-Hour" chairs; Consoles with identical arrangements, local controls and adjustments; Console configuration that provides technology capability while also promoting face-to-face communications.

Service Center integration as desired; wired and wireless voice / data systems that facilitate and support communication; redundant 911 trunk feeds and communications systems; address switch-over needs to maintain continuous operation; engage stakeholders to migrate potential chaos into organized means and methods; external connectivity concepts that mitigate potential risk; audio/visual applications to enhance situational awareness; let business needs drive technology versus the other way around; expandable and flexible system solutions; synchronized clocks.

Design flexibility will also be critical to allow for new technology systems that may be employed over the life of your facility(s). Considerations could include special sizing of conduit runs, raised flooring for routing and distribution of wiring and other systems.

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#### **TAB 3: TECHNICAL APPROACH**

#### **Technology**

The most critical task in the process that we endorse is the needs assessment. This task helps ensure the County is provided with the "right-sized" systems, to help prevent operational and security vulnerabilities. We will work with Levy County to help provide the project with solutions that protect the County's assets and personnel by means of logical security measures, protection of infrastructure, and strategic control of traffic both vehicular and pedestrian traffic. Our team deploys CPTED (Crime Prevention through Environmental Design) as well as active electronic security to ensure the facility and its personnel are protected against any possible threat.

#### **Building Security**

Appropriate "layers" of security/access control; segregation of public and nonpublic spaces; electronic security and CCTV systems. Security and protection from emerging threats is critical to this type of facility. It must be prepared for many types of threats that may occur during the lifetime of the facility. Layered levels of security are always a good route to take.

Access control in the form of card readers, fencing, gates, security checkpoints and biometric devices might be appropriate. Cameras are cost effective measures for access control and as a deterrent to surveillance operations against your facility.

#### Lighting

Lighting design plays a key role in creating a comfortable environment; perceived lighting levels, color, and glare are controlled to minimize fatigue and complement the body's circadian system. By utilizing indirect lighting, photo-controlled dimming, and tunable fixtures while providing appropriate light levels at the worksurface the lighting system can enhance comfort allowing staff to function effectively for long periods.

All team members will be involved in the project from start to finish, an approach which will offer Levy County an ideal blend of ingenuity, readily available creative problem solving, and project management rigor. Our collective understanding of the local community and key design issues will further facilitate the smooth progression of this important project.

#### QUALITY CONTROL

As mentioned earlier, Total Quality Management (TQM) at CRA is a way of life. Everything we do, all of our training, services and deliverables are focused on our results-driven goals to produce work that is right the first time and achieves maximum client satisfaction. Quality Control is any procedure where a unique quality factor or a group of related factors is inspected, evaluated and reported. Quality Assurance is a comprehensive management system that acts to detect and optimize all quality factors. CRA utilizes the REDICHECK Interdisciplinary Review system to enhance our standard quality control methods. REDICHECK is a construction document review system specifically designed to address points of interface, enabling a predetermined, objective and experienced Quality Assurance reviewer to locate coordination discrepancies between disciplines. This system saves the client time and money by eliminating design conflicts between disciplines prior to construction.

The reviews will consist of constructability assessments, specifications checks, completeness and coordination of documents, ease of bidding by contractors or subcontractors, and a back-check to ensure that all prior design review comments have been appropriately addressed and future contractual claims have been avoided.

The best change order prevention plan involves having the team take the time to perform an independent check of the drawings. We know that the number of change orders experienced on a project is directly proportional to the amount of time spent in the TQM and constructability review process. Consequently, we consider this to be one of the most critical services we will provide.

#### DETAILED DELIVERY SCHEDULE

CRA will update the project delivery schedule at project kick-off after obtaining more of the Owner's input. This schedule will be developed with all members of the client and consultant team including the Client, the A/E team, and local agencies as required. This schedule will establish major milestones and meeting dates that will be attended by all team members. This schedule will help to ensure that all key participants (1) are calendared well in advance, (2) will be well informed of project events and key dates, (3) will know who will be leading, participating and deciding, and (4) will know who will be required to follow up with the meeting's resultant action items.

#### **3D DESIGN & COMMUNICATION**

After the program and design concept has been approved by all parties and we have established square footage for your new building, we will start to address what the building design will look like. This process is accomplished with multiple charrettes and workshops where we will present 3-D images that visually represent your project. Using programs such as Sketchup, Revit (BIM) and other rendering software, we have the capability of presenting both the exterior and interior designs in real time. Multiple options and schemes will be provided until your vision is represented. In this phase we will also develop floor plans, elevations, site plans, building sections, wall sections.

Public presentation of our results and drawings to the County or at specially called workshop meetings will be provided as needed. We understand that projects of this type involve a certain amount of consensus building with regards to the problems and solutions that this project is attempting to address. #### **CONTRACT ADMINISTION**

During construction, our construction administrator visits the site as often as is necessary. We are highly accessible and travel in the immediate area regularly.

The role of our office during Construction Phase of the project is to administer the contract and to assist the Builder by interpreting the intent of the Construction Documents and responding to questions as required to facilitate the timely progress of the project's construction within the project's budget. Our team's solid professional relationship with many area contractors continues to bring value to each project that we administer, while also laying the foundation for a successful and enjoyable design and construction process.

Our office and involved consultants will attend on-site construction meetings, conduct in-the-field inspections of work in progress, and confirm that the work is in general conformance with the Construction Documents. Any areas of the work requiring the attention of the Builder, or discrepancies in construction, will be communicated to the Builder and your confirmed representatives. In addition, a monthly progress meeting is held especially for review of job progress, airing and resolution of problems, and review and approval of monthly pay requests.

The Builder may issue Requests for Information (RFI's) to ask construction related questions. We will respond to such RFI's within three days and if necessary, will submit an Architect's Supplemental Instruction (ASI) to "officially" issue revisions to the Construction Documents.

Our project team will review and comment on construction product related Shop Drawings as received from the Builder for conformance with the Construction Documents. The Architect shall also manage all Shop Drawings that are forwarded to consultants for review regarding their individual disciplines.

Near the completion of construction, CRA (in conjunction with consultants) shall perform in-the-field Punch List Inspections of the work completed and issue an Inspection Report that categorically identifies all specific areas of deficiency to be repaired by the Builder. We will also reference "as-built" field drawings provided by the Builder in the preparation of "Record Drawings" that will be submitted to Levy County on CD at the end of the project, as part of the closeout process if desired. Substantial completion and final completion inspections result in "punch lists" of incomplete or incorrectly completed items. When this list is reduced to zero, the final payment is made, and permission is granted for occupancy.



#### CLOSING

Our team brings an extensive understanding of all the many variables, including operational and facility design requirements, associated with Emergency Operation Centers. We not only understand the "big picture" planning, but this entire team also understands the details, products, and systems necessary to achieve a quality EOC environment. Beyond the functional requirements for a EOC, you will note from example past projects that we carry no preconceived idea of what the Center should look like. 




