

Emergency Management in conjunction with Fleet Management developed a plan to enhance the preparedness, response and recovery efforts. The plan focuses on identifying specific needs and providing targeted support for the animal shelter, its operations, and staff to ensure effective emergency practices. The project includes, but is not limited to the following:

- * Transfer the generator from the former Development Srvs. Bldg. to the Landfill Bldg.
- * Enhance the electrical systems to the Animal Services and Landfill facilities.
- * Transferred a 500-gallon water wagon to Animal Services to support the emergency plan.






Know Before You Go

- Cats and Dogs Only
- · First Come, First Served
- Pets will only be accepted from owners staying in a Levy County shelter.
- · Owners remain responsible for their pets and must provide care for them (weather permitting).

Required Items for Owners to Provide

- Written proof of the following up-to-date vaccinations: Rabies, Bordetella, & Distemper with
- <u>Lepto 4</u>. Vaccinations can be administered by on-site staff for a \$10 (card or check only) fee per vaccine.
- · Proper ID on animal collar and on all belongings
- Carrier/cage of sufficient size for the animal to stand, stretch, and turn around (will have owner's name, address, pet name, and other pertinent information clearly and securely labeled)
- Leash
- Ample water/food supply (with bowls) & any necessary medication(s)
- Newspapers, plastic disposable gloves, & trash bags for handing waste
- Favorite toy
- If possible, provide a photo of you and your pet

Disaster Planning for Pets LEW COUNTY



Create a Pet Disaster Supply Kit

If you evacuate out of the area with your pet, you will need essential supplies to care for them. Keep items in an accessible place and store them in sturdy containers that can be carried easily (duffle bags, covered trash containers, etc.). Make sure all pets wear collars and tags with up-to-date ID. Your pet's ID tag should contain their name, your telephone number and any urgent medical needs. Be sure to also write your pet's name, your name, and contact information on your pet's carrier.

Your pet disaster supply kit should include the following:

- Pet first-aid kit and guide book (ask your vet what to include)
- 7-10 days' worth of canned (pop-top) or dry food (be sure to rotate every two months)
- Disposable litter trays (aluminum roasting pans are perfect)
- Cleaning supplies: litter, paper toweling, liquid dish soap, disinfectant, garbage bags, etc.
- Pet feeding dishes and water bowls
- Extra collar or harness as well as an extra leash
- Photocopies and/or USB of medical records and a two-week supply of any medicine your pet requires (Remember to routinely rotate food and medication out of your emergency kit)
- At least seven days' worth of bottled water for each person and pet
- · A traveling bag, crate or sturdy carrier, ideally one for each pet
- Flashlight
- Blanket
- Recent photos of your pets (in case you are separated and need to make "Lost" posters)

Finding A Safe Place

- Contact hotels located outside of an evacuation zone to check policies on accepting pets and restrictions on number, size, and species. Ask if "no pet" policies could be waived. Keep a list of pet friendly places and call ahead for reservations.
- · Ask others outside the area if they could shelter your animals.
- Make a list of boarding facilities and vets who could shelter animals in an emergency. Many vet facilities have disaster boarding policies, so contact them early to find out the medical requirements for boarding your pets during a disaster.
