Re: Engagement Letter for Interim County Attorney Legal Services

Dear Ms. Harper,

We are pleased that you have asked GrayRobinson, P.A. to provide legal services to Levy County, Florida ("County", "Client", or "you"). I appreciate the confidence you have placed in our firm, and I look forward to working with you.

It has been our experience that things go more smoothly if both our client and we have a clear understanding in writing of the scope of the engagement and the role we have agreed to play. Consequently, our representation is limited to the matter as described below. This engagement letter will also govern all subsequent matters in which we may become involved on your behalf unless a separate arrangement is made that differs materially from the terms of this engagement letter.

SCOPE OF REPRESENTATION

The scope of our engagement will be to provide Interim County Attorney legal services to Levy County, including providing legal counsel at public meetings and agenda review, as well as legal services related to land use and procurement matters, contracts, ordinances, and other legal needs of Levy County as requested. We will confirm each request with you in writing by email to the above address. However, this engagement does not include any representation in litigation. Representation for litigation will be covered by a separate, written agreement.

BILLING, FEES AND EXPENSES

Our firm proposes a monthly flat fee of \$20,000.00 for general legal services. This flat fee will cover routine services, including in-person attendance at Board of County Commissioners and Planning Commission Meetings, responding to general legal inquiries, preparing routine ordinances and resolutions, and reviewing agreements and policies as to form and legality. Specialty assignments are outside the scope of the general legal services flat fee and will be billed either on an hourly basis or, if agreeable to the Firm, for a flat fee separately negotiated with the County. "Specialty assignments" are of a nature that requires recognized expertise, experience, or specialized subject matter knowledge and are otherwise above and beyond routine legal services, including:

- Providing legal advice, research, and assistance on extraordinary administrative or operational matters, negotiations, contracts, or ordinances;

- Drafting significant amendments or re-writes to the County's code, comprehensive plan, or land development code;
- Rendering written opinion memoranda on extraordinary matters, including but not limited to those that require extensive time or expertise, experience, or specialized subject matter knowledge;
- Providing advice on feasibility and legal sufficiency of statutory and home rule alternative revenue sources, including the development or implementation of special assessments, impact fees, user fees, extraordinary revenue, utility fees and structures, or other rate programs;
- Negotiating, preparing, obtaining, delivering, and filing all document in connection with the closing on any acquisition, contribution, sale, exchange, or disposition of real property, or any significant County assets or systems;
- Acting as a lobbyist or appearing before any legislative, administrative, or executive branch of government other than the County;
- Legal formation, negotiation drafting and implementation of specific or significant programs or initiatives and agreements, including but not limited to interlocal agreements with other governmental agencies;
- Prosecuting or defending litigation, including pre-suit efforts and advice on potential litigation, mediations, validation proceedings, administrative actions, arbitrations, DOAH proceedings, or other proceedings before county court, circuit court, federal court, and other tribunals, and appeals at every level (litigation, once filed, will be further subject to a separate written agreement between the parties);
- Labor and employment advice and disputes;
- Public Private Partnerships (P3) proposals, whether solicited or unsolicited;
- Civil rights and constitutional claims;
- Special district creation and administration; and
- Assignments which require ten (10) or more hours of attorney time.

I will serve as lead attorney with respect to this representation. My current rate is \$665.00 per hour; however, I have agreed to a discounted rate of \$495.00 per hour for this local government representation. Additionally, Shareholders Byron Flagg, Nikki Day, and Heather Ramos will assist with providing Interim County Attorney legal services at a discounted hourly rate of \$495.00 per hour. Senior Associates will assist at \$395.00 per hour, Associates at \$295.00 per hour, and Paralegals at \$195.00 per hour. We reserve the right to utilize other members of the firm whenever, in our discretion, we deem it appropriate. If requested, we will be glad to provide you with a schedule of rates presently in effect for all individuals performing work on this matter. Additionally, our professional hourly rates will automatically increase on October 1 of each year by the change in consumer price index for all urban consumers for Gainesville, Florida as of August of that year. Issuer's Counsel Opinions, if any, will be paid a flat fee to be negotiated prior to the incurrence of debt, at an amount determined to the satisfaction of both parties based on the facts and circumstances, including without limitation the size of the indebtedness and opinion requirements, which sub will be paid at the time the bonds or notes are issued.

In addition to our professional services, we will bill the County for all disbursements and out-of-pocket expenses made or incurred on behalf of the County. These typically include such items as document reproduction, mileage, mailing charges, courier services, and filing or recording fees. We may also use computerized research or other technology services, including generative technology services, to assist in handling your matters. Those services will be used when we believe that it is appropriate to do so. Expenses

incurred or advanced on your behalf will be itemized on our billing invoice. Please note, if we anticipate that substantial expenses will be incurred, we will require that you pay the vendor directly and/or we may require a deposit from you in order to cover such expenses.

You will be billed periodically, usually monthly for the time incurred in the prior month. We are happy to discuss our billing invoice with you at any time and will welcome the opportunity to address any questions you may have. In the event you should disagree with or question any amount, you agree to communicate such disagreement or question to us, in writing, within thirty (30) days of the invoice date. Any disagreement you may have with a bill that is not communicated to us within that period shall be deemed waived.

RETAINERS

We are not requesting an advance retainer for any professional fees and/or costs associated with this matter. The firm also reserves the right to require an additional or increased retainer in the future based upon the scope of service anticipated. Retainers will be held without interest in the firm's Trust Account until disbursed. Such funds may be applied in payment of professional fees owed or expenses incurred. Additionally, you may be required to replenish the funds as they are used.

DISPUTE RESOLUTION

Should there arise any dispute concerning fees and costs earned and owed to the firm and, if it becomes necessary for this firm to retain an attorney or otherwise utilize the firm's own attorneys to collect such fees and costs, the prevailing party to such dispute will be entitled to recover its attorney's fees, costs and expenses necessarily incurred. In addition, the County and the firm each hereby waive any right to a jury trial for any controversy, dispute or claim arising out of or related to this firm's representation of the County and/or this Agreement.

NO REPRESENTATION OF CORPORATE AFFILIATES

This will also confirm that unless we reach an explicit understanding to the contrary, we are being engaged by and will represent the County, and that we are not being engaged to represent any officers, directors, members, partners, shareholders or employees individually.

Payment of Invoices

In the event that our invoices are not timely paid, or that payment terms satisfactory to us are not established, we reserve the right to renegotiate the terms of this engagement and/or to pursue our other remedies, including the right to charge you interest of 1½% per month for any invoice which has not been paid within 30 days of the date the invoice is mailed or emailed to you. We also reserve the right to withdraw as your counsel in the event you fail to honor your agreement with respect to our legal fees or for any just reason as permitted or required under the Florida Code of Professional Responsibility or as permitted by the rules of courts of the State of Florida. In the event of our withdrawal, you will promptly pay for all services rendered by us prior to the date of withdrawal.

Electronic Data

This will serve as our disclosure that the Firm does presently and will continue to maintain confidential and privileged information in electronic form. This practice will be followed in our work on this matter. The Firm does take measures that it understands to be reasonable and consistent with current business practices to protect that information.

Outcome or Result

We will strive to do our best to meet your needs in this and other any matter we subsequently undertake for you. Either at the commencement, or during the course of our representation, we may express opinions or beliefs concerning the litigation or various courses of action and the results that might be anticipated. Any such statement made by any attorney, consultant or employee of our Firm is intended to be an expression of opinion only, based on information available to us at the time, and should not be construed as a promise or guarantee. We cannot and do not make any representations, warranties or guarantees concerning the outcome of this or any representation we undertake. File Retention

Following the termination of the representation/engagement, any otherwise nonpublic information you have supplied to the Firm (unless previously removed or destroyed by specific request) will be retained by us and kept confidential in accordance with applicable rules of professional conduct, and the Firm reserves the right to send such materials to off-site storage at any time. Any retrieval of material once the file is closed may incur an expense for which you will be responsible. However, the firm will comply with all provisions of section 119.011(2), Florida Statutes, as may be applicable.

REQUIRED CONTRACT CLAUSES

As a mandatory condition precedent to entering into this Agreement and in compliance with Section 448.095, Florida Statutes, GrayRobinson and any of its subcontractor shall register with and use the E-Verify system to verify work authorization status of all employees hired after January 1, 2021. GrayRobinson shall require each of its subcontractor to provide GrayRobinson with an affidavit stating that the subcontractor does not employ, contract with, or subcontract with an unauthorized alien. GrayRobinson shall maintain a copy of the subcontractor's affidavit as part of and pursuant to the records retention requirements of this Agreement. If the County, GrayRobinson, or any subcontractor has a good faith belief that a person or entity with which it is contracting has knowingly violated Section 448.09(1), Florida Statutes, or the provisions of this section, then they shall terminate the contract with the person or entity. The County, upon good faith belief that a subcontractor knowingly violated the provisions of this section, but GrayRobinson otherwise complied, shall promptly notify GrayRobinson and GrayRobinson shall immediately terminate the contract with the subcontractor. A contract terminated under the provisions of this section is not a breach of contract and may not be considered such. Any contract termination under the provisions of this section may be challenged pursuant to Section 448.095(5)(d), Florida Statute, GrayRobinson acknowledges that upon termination of this Agreement by the County for a violation of this section by GrayRobinson, GrayRobinson may not be awarded a public contract for at least one (1) year. GrayRobinson further acknowledges that GrayRobinson is liable for any costs incurred by the County as a result of termination of any contract for a violation of this section. GrayRobinson or any of its subcontractors shall insert in any subcontracts the clauses set forth in this section, including this subsection, requiring the subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower tier subcontracts. GrayRobinson shall be responsible for compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with the clauses set forth in this section.

Pursuant to Section 287.135, Florida Statutes, contracting with any entity that is listed on the Scrutinized Companies or Other Entities that Boycott Israel List or other or that is engaged in the boycott of Israel, that is listed on the Scrutinized Companies with Activities in Sudan List, that is listed on the Scrutinized Companies with Activities in the Iran Petroleum Energy Sector List, the Scrutinized Companies with Activities in Iran Terrorism Sectors List, or is engaged in business operations in Cuba or Syria (collectively the

"Scrutinized Companies' Lists") is prohibited. GrayRobinson shall certify that the company is not on any of the Scrutinized Companies' Lists. If this Agreement is for One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) or more, it may be terminated at the County's option if it is discovered that the GrayRobinson submitted false documents of certification or is listed on any of the Scrutinized Companies' Lists. If this Agreement is less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000), this Agreement may also be terminated at the County's option if the company is listed on the Scrutinized Companies or Other Entities that Boycott Israel List or engaged in the boycott of Israel. By entering into this Agreement, GrayRobinson is certifying that they are not on any of the Scrutinized Companies' Lists and are not participating in a boycott of Israel. Submitting a false certification shall be deemed a material breach of contract. The County shall provide notice, in writing, to GrayRobinson of the County's determination concerning the false certification. GrayRobinson shall have ninety (90) days following receipt of the notice to respond in writing and demonstrate that the determination was in error. If GrayRobinson does not demonstrate that the County's determination of false certification was made in error, then the County shall have the right to terminate the contract and seek civil remedies.

As a condition precedent to entering into this Agreement and in compliance with Section 787.06(13), Florida Statutes, a duly authorized officer or representative of GrayRobinson must attest under the penalty of perjury that GrayRobinson does not use coercion for labor or services as defined in Section 787.06, Florida Statutes. The required affidavit is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

Pursuant to Section 287.138, Florida Statutes, the County cannot knowingly enter into a contract with an entity which would give access to an individual's personal identifying information if the entity is owned, controlled, organized, or operating in a foreign country of concern, which include the People's Republic of China, the Russian Federation, the Islamic Republic of Iran, the Democratic People's Republic of Korea, the Republic of Cuba, the Venezuelan regime of Nicolás Maduro, or the Syrian Arab Republic, including any agency of or any other entity of significant control of such foreign country of concern, and any contracting entity that may be given access to an individual's personal identifying information must have a duly authorized officer or representative attest under the penalty of perjury that said entity is not owned by the government of a foreign country of concern, that the government of a foreign country of concern does not have a controlling interest in the entity, and that the entity is not organized under the laws of nor have its principal place of business in a foreign country of concern. 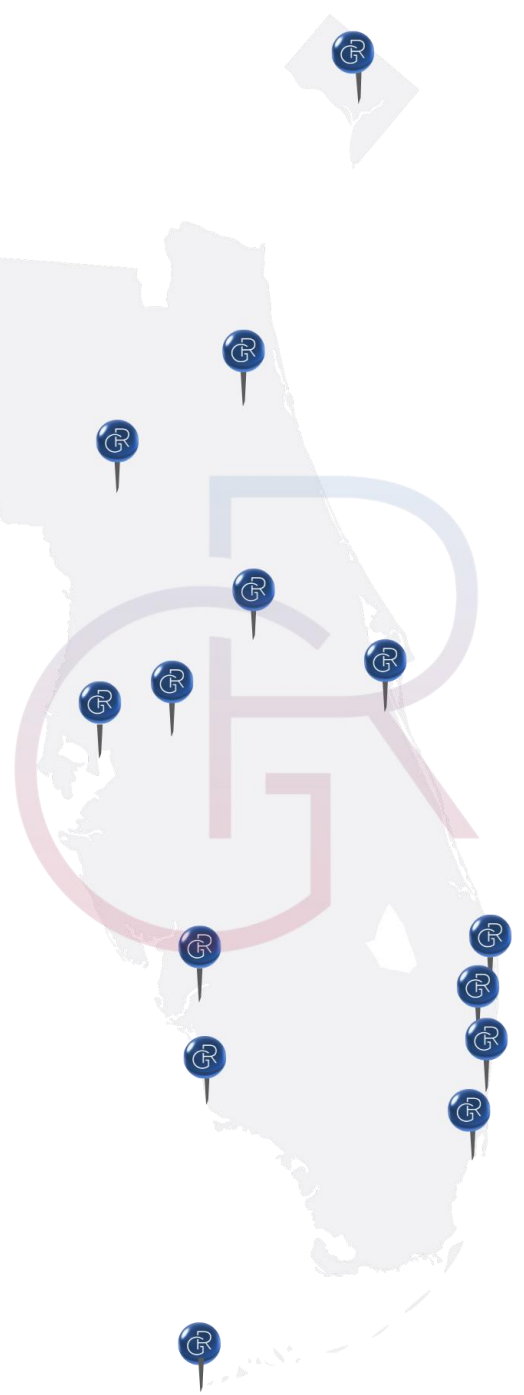
