# JOINT WORKSHOP MEETING LEVY COUNTY BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS & PLANNING COMMISSIONERS October 7, 2025

The joint workshop meeting of the Board of County Commissioners was held on October 7, 2025 at 1:00 P.M. in the county cafeteria meeting room.

Madam Chair Desiree Mills called the joint workshop meeting to order at 1:00 P.M.

All Commissioners less Comm. Rock Meeks were in attendance. All Planning Commissioners were in attendance. The County Manager and County Attorney were in attendance.

## **Meeting Overview**

The workshop, held on October 7, 2025, marked the kickoff for updating the county's comprehensive plan, aimed at guiding development through 2050. The meeting focused on establishing a shared direction among the board, planning commission, and public, while outlining the process, schedule, and public participation strategies.

#### **Key Attendees**

- INFRASTRUCTURE CONSULTING & ENGINEERING Christopher Brimo: Led the meeting, emphasizing transparency and public input.
- Michael Field: Infrastructure expert, assisting with technical aspects. (not present- but mentioned as part of team that will assist in process)
- **David Boston**: Housing and economic development specialist, previously conducted a county analysis in April. (not present- but mentioned as part of team that will assist in process)
- County Staff, Commissioners, and Public: Provided input and feedback.

#### **Purpose**

- Establish Direction: Set a collaborative vision for the comprehensive plan update.
- **Public Engagement:** Introduce the public participation process and gather initial feedback.
- **Review Schedule**: Outline workshops and milestones from November 2025 to March 2026, with plan adoption targeted for December 2026.
- Compliance: Ensure the plan aligns with Florida statutes, addressing recent legislative changes (e.g., Live Local Act, SB 180).

## **Key Discussion Points**

#### 1. Public Participation Plan:

 A project website will be hosted on the county's page, providing updates, schedules, and materials vetted by county staff.

- Interactive workshops will use real-time polling via smartphones or tablets for live feedback.
- Contact forms were available for attendees to stay informed about the process.
- Surveys include:
  - General community survey (short and long versions) covering growth, housing, economy, resilience, and conservation.
  - Youth survey (ages 12–18) to engage future leaders on their vision for the county.
  - Senior survey to address specific needs of older residents.
- Surveys are anonymous, with optional demographic sections, and available in paper and online formats.

#### 2. Plan Objectives:

- Guide county development for the next 10–15 years, balancing growth, conservation, and quality of life.
- Address housing affordability, infrastructure needs, and economic development while preserving rural character and natural resources (e.g., springs, state parks).
- Ensure compliance with Florida's evolving planning laws, including provisions for affordable housing and recent legislative changes.

# 3. Challenges and Opportunities:

- Housing: Concerns about affordability, with some residents living in sheds or cars. The
  term "affordable housing" was debated, with a preference for "housing affordability" to
  address broader needs.
- **Infrastructure**: Limited water and sewer systems hinder growth in certain areas. Suggestions included planning for future infrastructure to support development nodes.
- Economic Development: Emphasis on attracting industries (e.g., agriculture technology) to boost the tax base and retain local talent. Concerns raised about 70% of residents commuting out of county for work.
- Agriculture and Conservation: Importance of preserving farmland and water quality, especially for the shellfish industry. Conservation easements and programs were suggested to maintain agricultural land.
- Legislative Impacts: SB 180 and the Live Local Act were noted as contentious, with ongoing challenges to balance local control with state mandates.

# 4. Community Feedback:

- Desire for evening workshops to increase public attendance.
- Importance of reviewing existing 2024 survey data to avoid duplication and incorporate prior resident input.
- Suggestions to engage civic groups (e.g., rotary clubs, churches) and schools to distribute surveys and foster participation.
- Concerns about managing growth to avoid sprawl, protect water quality, and maintain rural character.
- o Interest in learning from other Florida counties (e.g., Volusia, Alachua) that have successfully managed growth.

# 5. Proposed Actions:

• Review 2024 survey results to refine new surveys and avoid redundancy.

- Develop interactive tools, such as land use maps with stickers or digital displays, to visualize development preferences.
- Explore agricultural technology and research hubs (e.g., UF/IFAS extension programs) to enhance economic viability.
- Address density and land use compatibility to guide development to areas with existing or planned infrastructure.
- Consider transportation solutions, such as cooperative shuttle systems, to support workers commuting to urban areas.

## **Next Steps**

- **Survey Distribution**: Finalize and distribute surveys (general, youth, senior) within three weeks, incorporating 2024 survey insights.
- Website Setup: Launch the project website for transparent access to materials and updates.
- **Workshops**: Begin workshops in November 2025, focusing on visioning, land use, and economic development. Evening sessions will be added for broader participation.
- **Strategic Sessions**: Prioritize discussions on infrastructure, transportation, and agricultural preservation to align with community goals.

## Closing

The workshop emphasized collaboration, transparency, and community-driven planning. The project manager committed to integrating public feedback and ensuring the plan reflects Levy County's unique needs and rural character while meeting state requirements.
