Department Highlights

During the second quarter of 2025, our organization achieved several milestones in service expansion, public engagement, and animal welfare outcomes. We were selected to receive funding from Best Friends Animal Society through Jacksonville Humane Society, which directly supports our goal of increasing our live outcome rate. This enabled the hiring of our new Live Outcome Coordinator, Montana Hartshorn, through our partnership with Operation Catnip.

This quarter, we have been working diligently to improve the conditions of our office and kennels. The decision was made to renovate the standing office to ensure that we could make the best use of current structures, while providing a safe office for staff and visiting community members alike. While we are currently still operating out of the mobile unit office, we are excited by the progress being made on our original structure. Additionally, we launched an Amazon Wishlist to streamline donations, resulting in an influx of supplies such as pet beds to improve the comfort of our kennel spaces for the animals that find their way to us.

Our partnership with SCaRS (Second Chance at Rehabilitation Services) continues to yield strong results. Following the graduation of our first two dogs, Trigger and Ruger, on April 6th, we sent ten additional dogs for training. Our second class of dogs graduated on June 26th, eight have since been adopted. Our third class of ten dogs began their training on June 30th, and includes our longest-term residents. Luckily, they are already making great strides with training, and we are optimistic they will be ready for forever homes by the time they graduate next quarter!

Medical outcomes also improved significantly thanks to support from VCOP, which allowed us to treat four dogs for heartworm and fund critical surgeries for other animals, including a mastectomy and FHO procedure. These medical services were previously unavailable to us. We already have another four heartworm positive dogs in our facility and foster homes that are committed to pursuing heartworm treatment through VCOP in the next quarter!

We strengthened our regional partnerships with organizations including Big Dog Ranch Rescue, SPCA Lakeland, Labrador Retriever Rescue of Florida, and others. Internally, we welcomed a new Animal Control Officer, Danny White, and have opened recruitment for a full-time veterinarian position to further expand our in-house care capabilities. We also celebrated Animal Control Officer Appreciation Week in recognition of the dedicated service of our field



staff. As we move forward, our focus remains on improving live release rates, expanding access to veterinary care, and strengthening community outreach and collaboration.

We participated in the BISSELL Pet Foundation's national "Empty the Shelters" adoption campaign and the Petco Love Florida Mega Adoption Event, resulting in the successful adoption of 11 dogs combined. Through our social media outreach, we reunited numerous lost pets with their owners and increased awareness around the importance of microchipping. Additionally, we transferred dogs back to Citrus County Animal Services that we had transferred in during our second quarter.

Levy County Animal Control accepted many new intakes throughout the quarter, including strays and cruelty case intakes alike. As we remain committed to persecuting animal abusers in Levy County, we are pleased to report convictions in both the Timothy Sparks and Pedro Perez cruelty cases. We have accepted another large seizure of dogs with the Judy Cary case, but luckily all healthy dogs were able to find rescue with the rescue partners listed above!
