In the spirit of collaboration, I recommend that the Los Altos City Council consider an ancient story, the <u>Tragedy of the Commons</u>, in deliberation over the dilemma posed by the conceptual plan to construct a Library Reading Patio partially within the boundary of the Heritage Apricot Orchard, a City Landmark. As this project is at a conceptual stage, I will outline three possible scenarios of how it might unfold. In conclusion, I recommend that the Planning Services Director initiate a process to develop a Comprehensive Site Plan for the Civic Center landscape.

The Tragedy of the Commons story illustrates how individual rational decisions about the use of a communal resource can lead to degradation that no longer serves the community. In tangible terms, loss of 5% of the trees in an orchard may not be considered a negative impact by one individual. However, if the case is repeated five times, then experts likely would consider the community resource to be degraded. Generally, the Commons dilemma is resolved by placing the resource in the trust of a governing body that encourages mutual restraint by consensus. In this case, City Council established the Heritage Apricot Orchard as a City Landmark in Resolution 81-23 and defined the boundaries in Resolution 91-31. The conceptual plan for the patio extends within the boundary of the City Landmark.

### Scenario 1. Current Conceptual Design- construction inside the Landmark boundary

The responsibility of the City Council to protect historical assets is established in Ordinance 90-22513. Relevant statements are:

- "(a) Safeguard the heritage of the City by providing for the protection of irreplaceable historic resources representing significant elements of its history"
- "(c) Encourage public knowledge, understanding and appreciation of the City's past, and foster civic and neighborhood pride and sense of identity based upon the recognition and use of the City's historic resources".

One of the duties of the Historical Commission (established in Ordinance 78-16) was specified in Ordinance 90-22513 as

"(c) Recommend to the appropriate City agencies or departments, projects and action programs for the recognition, conservation, enhancement and use of the City's historic resources, including standards to be followed with respect to any applications for permits to construct, change, alter, remodel, remove or otherwise affect such resources".

Logically, if the permit application for the patio project includes construction within the boundary of the City Landmark, then this will trigger a process involving the duties of the Historical Commission. As with any construction project, there also is a wider footprint involving soil compaction by heavy equipment, materials storage, construction debris and risk to existing trees. The combined impacts of the construction and construction footprint would need to be considered.

#### Scenario 2. Design a transitional softscape between the hardscape and greenscape

If the permit application specifies a transitional softscape between the existing hardscape of the plaza and the greenscape of the orchard, then a separate set of issues would need to be considered by experts in landscape design and maintenance of historical apricot orchards. Standards for care of the living assets within the Historical Landmark would be needed.

Decisions will need to be made regarding tradeoffs between "enhancement and use of the City's historic resources" and "conservation" of said resources. By establishing clear guidelines for weighing the risks and benefits of construction in this case, City staff will be setting a precedent for analyzing future permit applications for construction within these landmark boundaries.

A major challenge for City staff will be consideration of the cumulative effects of construction within the boundary of this City Landmark. Since expertise in maintenance of an historic apricot orchard may be beyond the experience of current staff, I recommend engaging expert opinion available within the networks of this extended community.

Scenario 3. Design a hardscape outside the boundary of the City Landmark

If the permit application is for construction outside the boundary of the City Landmark, then the sole consideration would be the potential impacts of the construction footprint. For example, existing procedures specify that a certified arborist would be identified to prepare the tree protection plan for the construction phase.

During construction, a monitoring procedure would be needed to ensure compliance with the tree protection plan. Decisions would need to be made for effective compliance monitoring and consequences for non-compliance.

In summary, I want to see this proposal through to a successful conclusion that is embraced by advocates for protection of historical assets and urban green space as well as advocates for expansion of library services. A key question will be:

"How does this project fit into the bigger picture of developing a comprehensive landscaping site plan for the urban green space at the Civic Center?"
