Subject: OPPOSITION to CUP Modification - 16769 Farley Road (WVMA)

Dear Planning Commission,

I am writing as a concerned resident to formally oppose the proposed modification of the Conditional Use Permit (CUP) for 16769 Farley Road.

The primary purpose of R-1 zoning is to protect the quiet enjoyment, safety, and character of a residential neighborhood. By definition, a 'Single-Family' zone is designed for low-density living, where the infrastructure—narrow streets, limited street lighting, and minimal drainage—is built to support households, not regional institutions.

When an R-1 property is granted a Conditional Use Permit (CUP), it is an exception, not a right. That exception must remain subordinate to the primary residential use of the area. Allowing a site to become a destination for thousands of visitors transforms a quiet neighborhood into a de facto regional hub. This creates several critical failures:

1. Infrastructure Strain: Residential streets like Farley Road are not engineered for the high-volume 'peak' traffic seen during Friday services or holidays. This creates safety hazards for local children and pedestrians.
2. Environmental Incompatibility: The noise, light pollution from late-night arrivals, and constant turnover of parked cars are inherently at odds with the 'tranquility' that R-1 zoning is legally intended to preserve.
3. The 'Point' of Zoning: If a Single-Family Residential zone can host thousands of people and operate outside standard residential hours, the zone effectively ceases to exist. It becomes a 'General Commercial' or 'Assembly' zone without the proper tax contributions or infrastructure upgrades those zones require.

To allow such an intensive use in an R-1 zone is to ignore the Town's own General Plan, which promises residents that the character of their homes will be protected from high-intensity, non-residential encroachment.

The WVMA's own [Strategic Planning Update \(January 2026\)](#) confirms a trajectory toward becoming a regional hub, citing a 'strong desire for unity across Saratoga and Los Gatos' and 'scenario testing' for increased capacity. This planned intensification is fundamentally incompatible with R-1 zoning. A Conditional Use Permit is a narrow exception, not a mandate for regional expansion. Allowing this modification would ignore the Town's General Plan and permanently degrade the residential character of Farley Road.

We ask for a denial of this modification to protect the established rhythm of our neighborhood.

Community Endorsement for WVMA's Permit Modification

I write on behalf of Evergreen Islamic Center to express our strong support for the West Valley Muslim Association's application to modify its Conditional Use Permit. As a mosque that has operated in a residential neighborhood for over three decades, we understand both the challenges and the responsibilities that come with serving a faith community while being a good neighbor. We speak from decades of experience of co-existing in a vibrant Evergreen community that highlights Christian, Sikh, Buddhist, and Islamic places of worship all within a two-mile radius.

A Mosque in a Residential Neighborhood: Our Story

Evergreen Islamic Center is located on Ruby Avenue in San Jose, nestled within a residential neighborhood much like WVMA's location on Farley Road. Single-family homes line our street. Our neighbors include young families, retirees, and long-term residents who have watched our community grow over the years. We have learned—through experience, through dialogue, and sometimes through trial and error—what it takes for a mosque to thrive while respecting the neighborhood around it. We have supported other faith communities, helping Buddhists build their center on Ruby Avenue and assisting the Sikh Gurudwara in renaming their street.

Communication and Proactive Solutions

The key we have found is communication, responsiveness, and a genuine commitment to addressing concerns before they become conflicts. When a neighbor raised concerns about headlights shining into their bedroom during evening prayers, we adjusted our parking lot lighting and added landscaping. When street parking became an issue during Friday prayers, we implemented a parking management plan with volunteers directing traffic and ensuring our congregants used designated areas. When Ramadan brought larger crowds, we proactively reached out to neighbors, provided our schedule in advance, and gave them direct contact information to reach us with any concerns.

Managing Parking and Overflow: It Can Be Done

We know that parking and traffic are often the primary concerns when a religious institution seeks to expand its hours of operation. We take these concerns seriously because we live with them every day. At EIC, we have developed comprehensive protocols for managing high-attendance events. During Ramadan Taraweeh prayers—when our attendance can triple—we deploy volunteer parking attendants, establish overflow parking arrangements with nearby businesses, coordinate arrival and departure times to prevent bottlenecks, and station volunteers at key intersections to ensure smooth traffic flow.

These measures work. Our neighbors have come to understand and appreciate that we take their concerns seriously. Many have told us that they barely notice the difference between Ramadan and the rest of the year because our management is so thorough. We share this not to boast, but to illustrate that a mosque can absolutely operate extended hours—including pre-dawn and late-evening prayers—while being a responsible neighbor. We are confident that WVMA, which has already demonstrated its commitment to neighbor relations through extensive outreach and accommodation efforts, will do the same.

Building Trust with Our Neighbors

Over the years, our relationship with our neighbors has evolved from cautious coexistence to genuine friendship. We invite neighbors to our community iftars during Ramadan. We participate in neighborhood clean-up days. When a neighbor's home was damaged by fire, our congregation organized meals and donations. When the pandemic struck, we distributed food boxes not just to our members but to anyone in the neighborhood who needed help. This is not ancillary to our mission—it is central to it. Islam teaches us that the rights of neighbors are sacred, and we take that teaching seriously.

We have observed WVMA engage in similar efforts. They have replaced fencing to enhance privacy, planted trees to reduce light and noise, hired traffic guards during Ramadan, and maintained open lines of communication with their neighbors. These are the actions of an organization that understands its responsibilities and is committed to fulfilling them.

Why Congregational Prayers and Taraweeh Are Essential

At Evergreen Islamic Center, we offer all five daily congregational prayers and Ramadan Taraweeh prayers because that is what a mosque exists to do. The congregational prayer is not an optional gathering—it is a religious obligation that distinguishes a mosque from a mere meeting hall. When Muslims stand shoulder to shoulder in prayer, facing the same direction, reciting the same words, they experience a unity that transcends individual worship. This is especially powerful during Taraweeh, when families spend the nights of Ramadan together in prayer, when children absorb the rhythms of their faith by watching their parents and grandparents worship, and when the entire community is bound together by shared devotion.

A Place Where Our Youth Can Belong

Finally, we must speak to what the mosque means for our young people. Muslim children and teenagers in America face a unique burden. They are often the only Muslims in their classrooms. They field questions about their faith that range from innocent curiosity to outright hostility. They see their religion portrayed in ways that bear no resemblance to the Islam they know at home. They absorb, consciously or not, the message that they are somehow suspect, somehow other, somehow less than fully American.

The mosque is where that burden lifts. It is where a young person walks in and sees hundreds of people who share their faith. It is where they are not the exception but the norm. It is where they form friendships with other Muslim youth who understand their struggles. It is where they develop pride in their identity rather than shame. At Evergreen Islamic Center, we have

watched young people transform when they find this sense of belonging. We have seen anxious teenagers become confident young adults. We have seen children who felt isolated discover a community. WVMA provides this same sanctuary for the Muslim youth of Los Gatos, and restricting its hours would diminish its ability to serve this vital function.

Conclusion and Recommendation

Based on our decades of experience operating a mosque in a residential neighborhood, we can attest that extended hours of operation—including early morning prayers, evening prayers, and Ramadan Taraweeh—are entirely compatible with being a good neighbor. It requires effort, planning, and genuine commitment to the community, but it can absolutely be done. WVMA has demonstrated that commitment, and we urge you to approve their Conditional Use Permit modification.

Subject: Official Opposition: Scale and Procedural Failures at 16769 Farley Road

Dear Mayor Moore, Vice Mayor Ristow, and Members of the Council and Commission,

As a resident of the impacted R-1 neighborhood, I am writing to formally oppose the CUP modification for 16769 Farley Road. While the applicant presents this as a "neighborhood-scale" request, the data shows a Regional Hub attempting to force an incompatible 20-hour operation into a quiet residential zone.

I ask the Town to deny this modification based on the following:

1. Statistically Invalid Noise Data

The 2025 noise study was conducted between January 31 and February 11—outside of peak Ramadan hours. Relying on "off-peak" data to approve a 4:00 AM expansion is statistically reckless. It fails to measure the true impact of 1,200+ people arriving in a quiet residential cul-de-sac while families are sleeping.

2. The "Honor System" is Not a Binding Mitigation

The applicant's plan relies on "reminders" and "signs" for 35% of its proposed mitigations. The Town has no legal mechanism to enforce a "reminder." A Conditional Use Permit must be based on physical, enforceable controls, not an applicant's promise to "self-police."

3. Shifting the Fiscal Burden to Taxpayers

The applicant admits their expansion will require increased police patrols and Town-funded speed bumps. This is a "taxpayer externality"—shifting the financial burden of a private regional hub onto the residents of Los Gatos. Private convenience should not be funded by public tax dollars.

4. Temporary Fixes for Permanent Impacts

The applicant admitted that certain noise-reducing measures, like the removal of gate tracks, are temporary. It is a "bait-and-switch" to grant a permanent hour extension based on temporary physical changes.

5. Outreach Failure (57% Gap)

The applicant's "Neighborhood Outreach" report is deceptive. Of the 35 identified properties, nearly 57% were never successfully contacted. There is no community consensus for this expansion; there is only a lack of engagement from the applicant.

6. The Power Imbalance: Professional Outreach vs. Resident Reality

It is important to note the massive disparity in resources here. The applicant is a formal, professional organization with a regional reach, a dedicated staff, and the communication tools to mobilize thousands of constituents from across the Bay Area. We, the neighbors, are individual residents - families and retirees operating without a PR firm or a professional campaign. We do not have the means to "out shout" a regional organization, but we are the only ones who will suffer the 4:00 AM consequences.

We ask the Town to protect its residents from this regional-scale pressure and uphold the R-1 zoning standards.

Please protect our neighborhood and deny this modification.

Subject: Infrastructure Deficit and Safety Demand - 16769 Farley Rd

Hi Michael, Members of the Town Council, and Planning Department,

I am writing to formally contest the Town's repeated denials of our neighborhood's traffic calming petitions. This correspondence serves as a formal notification that the Town is currently prioritizing "applicant convenience" over a documented public safety liability.

1. The "85th Percentile" Fallacy: It Only Takes One

In your previous emails, you denied speed bumps because studies showed an 85th percentile speed of 26 mph. This metric is a statistical distraction that ignores the speeding 15%. On a street with no streetlights, no sidewalks, and multiple blind spots, it only takes one vehicle from that 15th percentile to cause a fatal accident. If the Town admits it has "limited" police resources to manage current speeders, it is an act of gross negligence to even consider a 4:00 AM/11:30 PM surge of 1,200+ people into this dark residential zone (CUP FOR 16769 FARLEY ROAD).

2. The "Launchpad Effect" and Infrastructure Failure

Our street serves as a high-speed "feeder" where drivers from the association turn from Farley onto Flintridge and "speed away" to reach the light at Chirco.

- Blind Spots: Our street has dangerous curves where visibility is severely limited.
- The Darkness Hazard: Speeding at 4:00 AM is infinitely more lethal than at 4:00 PM.
- The Parking Deficit: The applicant admits to a 41% parking shortfall. This guarantee of overflow parking on narrow shoulders creates a dangerous "slalom" effect for speeding cars, endangering residents exiting their own vehicles.

3. Formal Demand for Safety Measures and Denial of Expansion

The Town cannot have it both ways. You cannot claim our street is "too quiet" for speed bumps while simultaneously re-zoning it into a 20-hour commercial-scale thoroughfare.

Because the current infrastructure is already failing to protect residents from existing traffic, we formally request the following:

- Immediate approval and installation of speed bumps on Flintridge Drive to mitigate the 15% of drivers who are currently speeding and endangering our children.
- Full denial of the CUP Modification. If safety infrastructure was "not an option" for

taxpaying residents, then a 4:00 AM/11:30 PM expansion cannot be an option for a regional center that creates the hazard.

The Town must stop shifting the burden of this private expansion onto the safety of our families.

Hi Cortney,

Thank you for your email and your patience. As you may recall, the Town's Neighborhood Traffic Calming Program has criteria which the neighborhood must meet or pass to qualify for a traffic calming project review. The initial speed study conducted on Flintridge Drive between Farley and Chirco showed an 85th percentile speed of 25.1 mph, which does not exceed the posted speed limit by 5 mph or more and does not meet the criteria. We have scheduled another speed study before school is out and will let you know the results next month. There are also three neighborhoods ahead of you in the queue at this time. Please let me know if you have any questions.

Hello Cortney,

Thank you for your email regarding traffic calming on Flintridge Drive. The Town has a traffic calming policy for addressing speeding issues on residential streets and requires a petition initiated by the residents along the street. Attached is a copy of the Town's Neighborhood Traffic Calming Program (NTCP) and two sample petitions.

If you are interested in pursuing this option, the next step is for you and your neighbors to prepare and submit a Neighborhood Petition with over 50% of the households on Flintridge Drive signing the petition. The NTCP process is first-come-first-serve and there are currently three neighborhoods who have submitted petitions and are pursuing the NTCP for their respective streets. Please note on your petition that "this process is first-come-first-serve and may take several years." Please see item 2 under Process for further details.

Subject: Fw: URGENT: Formal Opposition to 16769 Farley Road – A Regional Stadium in an R-1 Zone

Dear Mayor Moore, Vice Mayor Ristow, and Members of the Council and Commission,

We, the residents of the Farley Road neighborhood, formally oppose the request to expand hours at 16769 Farley Road. The applicant is attempting to treat an R-1:8 residential zone as a high-traffic commercial thoroughfare. We ask the Town to prioritize the safety and "quiet enjoyment" of the families who live here over the convenience of those who do not.

1. The 20-Hour Neighborhood Workday

An hour and a half before sunrise is as early as 4:00 AM. When factoring in arrivals and departures, this proposal creates a commercial-scale operation running from 3:30 AM until midnight. This is a 20-hour workday forced upon a quiet neighborhood where residents—not visitors—must live with the consequences of predawn traffic and noise.

2. A Regional Stadium in a Residential Cul-de-Sac

The WVMA website explicitly calls this their "primary regional center." With a capacity of 1,217 people, this facility is larger than Fisher Middle School. We would never allow a school-sized event to start at 4:00 AM in a neighborhood with no streetlights or sidewalks. Numbers don't change physics: forcing hundreds of cars onto dark residential shoulders is a recipe for tragedy.

3. Critical Safety & Infrastructure Failures

- 41% Parking Deficit: The site is 124 spaces short of Town Code. This guarantee of "overflow" parking will drop street widths below the 20-foot Fire Code minimum, blocking emergency access.
- The Broken Gate: The applicant admitted their commercial exit gate is inoperable. You cannot safely host 1,200 people with broken fire-exit hardware.
- Unenforceable "Honor System": 35% of the applicant's mitigations rely on "reminders." The Town cannot legally enforce a "pinky swear."

4. Neutrality of Law vs. "Auspices"

Zoning must be content-neutral. If a 24-hour gym or a social club asked for a 4:00 AM start here, they would be denied instantly. It has been suggested that those under the Town's "auspices" (visitors) have as much to offer as residents. We disagree. Zoning exists to protect the people who sleep here, not the "convenience" of regional commuters who drive away at the end of the night.

5. Preference Over Necessity

The applicant admits they have access to the Saratoga Prospect Center but find it "logistically challenging." Under Town Code, applicant convenience is not a legal justification for a CUP

modification that permanently destroys a neighborhood.

We urge you to uphold the precedents set for local businesses and schools. Deny this expansion

I write on behalf of the South Bay Islamic Association (SBIA), the longest-running mosque in the South Bay, to express our wholehearted support for the West Valley Muslim Association's application to modify its Conditional Use Permit. As an institution that has served the Muslim community since 1978, we understand deeply what it means to be a mosque—and we can state unequivocally that the ability to offer congregational prayers at their appointed times is not optional. It is the very essence of what a mosque exists to do.

Congregational Prayer Is the Heartbeat of a Mosque

In Islam, congregational prayer is not merely encouraged—it is a defining characteristic of Muslim communal life. The Prophet Muhammad, peace be upon him, said that prayer in congregation is twenty-seven times more rewarding than prayer performed alone. This is why, throughout Islamic history, mosques have opened their doors before dawn and remained open until the last prayer of the night. At SBIA, we offer all five daily congregational prayers without restriction. Our doors open for Fajr prayer before sunrise and close only after Isha prayer is complete, regardless of how late sunset occurs in the summer months. This is what every mosque in the world does. This is what it means to *be* a mosque.

Ramadan Taraweeh: A Sacred Tradition

During the holy month of Ramadan, Muslims gather each night for Taraweeh prayers—extended congregational prayers in which we recite the entire Quran over the course of the month. These prayers begin after Isha and can extend until midnight. At SBIA, hundreds of worshippers—men, women, children, and the elderly—fill our prayer hall each night of Ramadan. The spiritual atmosphere is unlike anything else in the Islamic calendar. Families come together, children experience the beauty of their faith alongside their parents, and the entire community is united in worship. We cannot imagine Ramadan without Taraweeh. To deny a mosque the ability to hold these prayers is to deny its congregation the very experience

that defines Ramadan.

A Sanctuary for Our Youth

There is another dimension to this matter that weighs heavily on our hearts. Our young people face challenges that many outside our community may not fully appreciate. Muslim children in America grow up navigating two worlds. At school, they may be teased for their names, questioned about their faith, or made to feel like outsiders in their own country. The statistics are alarming: nearly half of Muslim students in California report experiencing bullying tied to their religious identity. The psychological toll is real—anxiety, depression, and a crisis of belonging that no child should have to endure.

The mosque is where these young people find refuge. It is the one place where they are not judged for who they are. It is where they see adults who share their faith, where they make friends who understand their struggles, where they learn that being Muslim and being American are not contradictions. When a teenager attends Taraweeh prayers with their family, when they see hundreds of people standing shoulder to shoulder in worship, when they feel the power of community—that experience shapes their identity in ways that last a lifetime. WVMA provides this sanctuary for the youth of Los Gatos. Restricting its hours of operation would diminish its ability to serve this vital function.

We respectfully urge you to recommend approval of WVMA's Conditional Use Permit modification. Allowing WVMA to hold pre-dawn prayers, evening prayers, and Ramadan Taraweeh is not granting a special privilege—it is simply allowing a mosque to function as a mosque. Every other Islamic center in the Bay Area, including SBIA, operates under these conditions because they are essential to our faith. WVMA's congregants deserve the same opportunity to practice their religion that Muslims throughout our region already enjoy.

I write on behalf of the Muslim Community Association (MCA) — the largest mosque in the San Francisco Bay Area, serving over 5,000 families drawn from more than 70 nationalities — to express our strong, considered, and unequivocal support for the West Valley Muslim Association's (WVMA) application to modify its Conditional Use Permit. I respectfully urge the Planning Commission to approve Application U-24-010 in its entirety. The stakes of this decision extend well beyond a land use determination: they bear directly upon the ability of Muslim residents of Los Gatos to exercise a foundational constitutional right — the free practice of their religion.

MCA's Operational Experience and Its Bearing on This Application

MCA operates two facilities in Santa Clara: our primary mosque at 3003 Scott Boulevard and a neighborhood facility at 1755 Catherine Street, the latter situated in the heart of a residential community in a manner directly comparable to WVMA's Los Gatos property. We have operated the Catherine Street location continuously since 1986 — nearly four decades. During that time, we have navigated the full spectrum of challenges inherent to operating a house of worship within a residential neighborhood: managing early morning and late evening prayer times, coordinating peak-attendance events during Ramadan, maintaining constructive relationships with adjacent homeowners, and working cooperatively with the City of Santa Clara to address any concerns as they have arisen.

This history is not offered as mere institutional biography. It is offered as evidence. Four decades of successful coexistence between a mosque and its residential neighbors — without the imposition of the very restrictions that currently constrain WVMA — demonstrates conclusively that the concerns animating those restrictions are manageable, not intractable. With appropriate operational protocols, transparent communication, and genuine goodwill, a mosque can be an exemplary neighbor. WVMA has demonstrated exactly that disposition, and this Commission should take confidence from it.

The Indivisible Bond Between Our Communities

MCA and WVMA do not merely maintain a cordial inter-organizational relationship. We share the same families. A substantial proportion of our congregants reside in Los Gatos, Saratoga, Monte Sereno, and the communities of the West Valley. During the working week, they worship at MCA because our Santa Clara facility lies within convenient proximity to the tech corridor of Silicon Valley. In the evenings, on weekends, and during the sacred period of Ramadan, these same individuals and families make their way to WVMA — the mosque of their neighborhood, their schools, their streets, and their community ties. Due to the short amount of time available between breaking of the fast and Ramadan nightly prayers, it is critical for families to save time by going to their neighborhood Mosque, rather than drive 30 minutes or more, increase traffic & congestion, and develop close bonds with families and school mates.

This is not a matter of logistical convenience. It is a matter of belonging — of the deep, irreplaceable sense of place that sustains a community's identity across generations. These families chose Los Gatos deliberately: for its outstanding schools, its civic culture, its safety, and its quality of life. WVMA is not incidental to those choices. For Muslim families in that community, WVMA is the institution through which faith, identity, and civic life are woven together. To constrain WVMA's operating hours is, in effect, to exclude Muslim families from the fullness of civic belonging that every other religious community in Los Gatos takes for granted.

The Religious Necessity at the Heart of This Application

The Commission should understand with precision what is being asked — and what is at stake if it is denied. Islam prescribes five daily prayers at times determined by the position of the sun. These are not customs that may be adapted to the convenience of municipal operating schedules. They are obligations, as firmly embedded in Islamic practice as Sunday worship is in Christian tradition or Shabbat observance is in Jewish life. During the summer months, Fajr — the dawn prayer — must be performed before sunrise, which in California may be as early as 5:30 a.m. Isha — the night prayer — falls well after sunset, at times extending past 9:00 p.m. during certain seasons.

Beyond daily prayers, Ramadan — the holiest month in the Islamic calendar — brings with it the communal practice of Taraweeh: evening prayers performed collectively after the breaking of the fast. This practice has united Muslim communities in congregation for over fourteen centuries. It is not supplementary to Islamic observance; it is central to the lived spiritual experience of Ramadan. The current restrictions on WVMA's hours render these obligations functionally unperformable at the mosque nearest to these families' homes. The Commission should consider carefully whether it wishes to be the instrument by which that deprivation is perpetuated.

WVMA: An Institution That Has Earned This Commission's Confidence

WVMA is the sole mosque serving Los Gatos. Its role in the lives of the Muslim families it serves extends well beyond the provision of a prayer space. It is a refuge for young people navigating the complexities of faith and identity in contemporary America. It is a support network for families enduring hardship. It is a bridge to the broader Los Gatos community through interfaith engagement, service programs, and civic participation. These are not peripheral functions — they are the core of what a community institution does and why it matters.

Through our close and longstanding relationship with WVMA, MCA has observed firsthand the exceptional care and conscientiousness with which WVMA conducts itself as a neighbor. WVMA has made significant and sustained investments in noise mitigation, traffic management, landscaping, and neighbor relations.

During Ramadan — the period of highest congregational attendance — WVMA deploys volunteer traffic coordinators and implements structured parking protocols to reduce any impact on the surrounding streets. This is not the behavior of an institution indifferent to its context. It is the behavior of an institution that has internalized the responsibility of being a neighbor and takes that responsibility seriously.

It would be a profound disservice to that record of good faith — and to the families who depend on WVMA — for the Commission to deny an application that asks for nothing more than the operational latitude necessary to perform religious obligations that Muslim communities around the world fulfill as a matter of course.

The Broader Significance of This Decision

Planning decisions of this nature carry weight that extends beyond the immediate facts of the application before the Commission. They signal — to residents, to prospective residents, and to the wider community — what kind of town Los Gatos is and aspires to be. A decision to approve this application affirms that religious diversity is a civic asset, not a zoning problem. It affirms that Muslim families — like Jewish families, Christian families, and families of every other faith tradition — deserve the institutional conditions necessary for the free exercise of their religion. It affirms that the constitutional guarantee of religious liberty is not a formal abstraction but a practical reality for every resident of this community.

MCA therefore respectfully and emphatically urges the Planning Commission to grant WVMA's Conditional Use Permit modification as requested — authorizing morning prayers before sunrise, evening prayers after 10:00 PM, and Ramadan Taraweeh prayers until 11:30 PM. These are not extraordinary privileges. They are the minimum conditions for the free practice of Islam. They are what WVMA's congregation is owed.

We stand without reservation beside WVMA, and we trust that the Planning Commission of Los Gatos will stand with us.

I am writing to you as a concerned resident regarding the proposed modification of the Conditional Use Permit for 16769 Farley Road (West Valley Muslim Association).

To better understand the implications of this request on our neighborhood, I have conducted extensive independent research into the project's compliance with Town Code, Fire Code, and the potential impacts on residential "quiet enjoyment."

I respectfully request that the attached data and analysis be included in the Planning Commission packet for the upcoming hearing. Furthermore, I ask that the Planning, Fire, and Public Works departments carefully consider these specific points during their review:

- **Life Safety and Fire Code Violations:** My research indicates that a 41% parking deficit will result in overflow on Farley Road, likely dropping the unobstructed roadway width below the 20-foot legal minimum required by CA Fire Code 503.2.1.
- **Technical Flaws in Studies:** The 2025 noise study was conducted "off-peak," failing to capture the impact of 1,200+ people arriving during predawn hours.
- **Infrastructure & Zoning Incompatibility:** The site is a Regional Assembly Center operating at a "high-school scale" (1,217 capacity), which is incompatible with the R-1:8 residential zoning and the lack of streetlights/sidewalks on Farley Road.
- **Enforceability Concerns:** Roughly 35% of the proposed mitigations rely on non-binding "reminders," which do not meet the standard for a binding Conditional Use Permit.
- **Neighborhood Standing:** While this proposal may draw support from thousands of congregants, the vast majority do not live in this immediate neighborhood. I ask that the Town prioritize the "quiet enjoyment" and safety of the R-1:8 residents who will live with these impacts 24 hours a day, rather than the opinions of those who do not reside in the impacted area.

I have attached my full "Pillars of Opposition" and detailed data breakdown for your review. Thank you for your time and for ensuring that the voices and safety of the local residents are represented in this process.

Background and Overview

Conditional Use Permit

16769 Farley Road

Application Summary:

Consider a Request for Approval for Modification of an Existing Conditional Use Permit for Expanded Hours of Operation in an Institution for Religious Observance (West Valley Muslim Association) on Property Zoned R-1:8. APN 424-21-062. Categorically Exempt Pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15301: Existing Facilities.

Changes Requested:

Nighttime hours: From 10 p.m. to 10:30 p.m.

- During the 30-day month of Ramadan: From 11 p.m. to 11:30 p.m.
- Morning hours: Daily dawn (Fajr) indoor prayer service starting an hour and 15 minutes before Sunrise

Pillars of Opposition

Pillar 1: Life Safety & Fire Hazard (The "Veto" Argument)

- Confirmed 41% Parking Deficit: The applicant admits to a capacity of 1,217 people (~304 vehicles) but only has 180 spaces. This 124-car shortfall guarantees overflow onto narrow R-1:8 streets.
- Fire Code Violation (Access): Under CA Fire Code 503.2.1, a 20-foot unobstructed path is required. Overflow parking on both sides of Farley Road drops the width below this legal minimum, blocking emergency access.
- Egress Hazard: The applicant admits their commercial-grade gate is inoperable (Item #1). Operating a high-occupancy facility with broken exit hardware violates CA Fire Code 1004.1.
- Dangerous "Darkness" Gap: Unlike the Saratoga Musalla, which sits on a fully lit major arterial, Farley Road has no streetlights and no sidewalks. Forcing hundreds of vehicles onto dark, shoulder-only roads at 4:00 AM creates an extreme pedestrian-vehicle hazard.

Pillar 2: Technical Flaws & Oversight Avoidance

- Flawed "Off-Peak" Noise Study: The 2025 study was conducted outside of peak Ramadan, making it irrelevant for evaluating the impact of 1,200+ people arriving in the predawn hours.
- Outreach Failure (90% Gap): There are over 115 neighbors in the impacted area, yet the applicant only identified 35 and contacted 15. Nearly 90% of the neighborhood was ignored.
- Oversight Avoidance: The applicant finds the Saratoga Prospect Center "logistically challenging" (Item #16). In reality, that site is City-owned and strictly limits them to 150

people. They are seeking to expand in Los Gatos specifically to avoid the strict capacity and noise monitoring enforced by the City of Saratoga.

- Unenforceable "Honor System": 35% of proposed mitigations rely on "reminders." Under Town Code, these are non-binding and offer no real protection for neighbors.

Pillar 3: Zoning Incompatibility & "Regional" vs. "Neighborhood" Scale

- Regional Hub Admission: The [WVMA website](#) confirms Los Gatos is their primary and largest center. A facility drawing 1,200+ people from across the South Bay 20 hours a day is a Regional Assembly Center, misplaced on a narrow residential road.
- Zoning Mismatch: The Saratoga Musalla is in a CH Commercial Zone designed for 24-hour traffic. The applicant is asking the Town of Los Gatos to treat an R-1:8 residential zone as if it were a high-traffic highway commercial thoroughfare.
- 1990 Infrastructure Ceiling: The site's infrastructure is frozen at 1990 standards. A 35-year-old permit for a small neighborhood use does not grant a "blank check" for a modern, 1,200-person, 24-hour operation that ignores today's density.
- Incompatible Scale: At 1,217 people, this operation is larger than Fisher Middle School (~1,100). Residential "quiet enjoyment" (Town Code 29.20.190) cannot be maintained with high-school-scale crowds arriving at 4:00 AM.

The Data

1. Outreach Limitation: Only 15 of 35 neighboring properties were contacted, leaving nearly 57% unengaged. This significant gap indicates a limitation in the outreach effort.
2. Unenforceable Mitigation (35% "Honor System"): 6 of the 17 proposed actions (35%) rely on "reminders" rather than physical controls. Because the Town cannot legally enforce "reminders" or "signs," these measures fail to meet the standard for a binding Conditional Use Permit.
3. Mitigation Reversion Risk: The applicant admitted that noise-reducing changes—like the gate track removal—are only temporary. Granting a permanent prayer hour extension based on temporary removals creates a "bait-and-switch" risk for the neighborhood's noise levels.
4. Insufficient Coverage (8.5% Reach): While 35 properties were identified as impacted, only 3 neighbors (8.5%) received physical noise barriers (fences). The remaining 91.5% of the neighborhood remains exposed to the noise and light of expanded operations.
5. Taxpayer Externalities: The applicant admits the need for increased police patrols and Town-funded speed humps to manage their traffic. This shifts the financial and safety burden of a private expansion onto public resources and Los Gatos taxpayers.
6. Preference Over Necessity: The applicant confirmed the availability of the Saratoga Prospect Center. Their desire to expand at Farley Road is based on the "burden" of setting up mats elsewhere; however, applicant convenience is not a legal justification for impacting residential "quiet enjoyment."

7. Confirmed 17% Parking Deficit: With a capacity of 1,217 people, the facility requires
8. 304 parking spaces by Town Code, but only has 180. This creates a massive 41% parking deficit (124 missing spaces) that will force hundreds of cars to "spill over" onto narrow residential streets, blocking emergency access and creating noise during sleeping hours. Even at the lower 869-seat capacity, the applicant admits to a 17% shortfall, proving the site is already over-capacity for this neighborhood.
9. Flawed "Off-Peak" Noise Study: The 2025 noise study (Jan 31–Feb 11) was conducted outside of peak Ramadan hours. This data does not accurately represent the true impact of 1,200+ people arriving at 4:00 AM, making the study statistically irrelevant for the requested hour extensions.
10. Incompatible "High-School" Scale: With a capacity of 1,217 people, this operation is larger than the student body of Fisher Middle School (~1,100). High schools have massive traffic management teams and are rarely located on narrow residential "feeder" roads like Farley. Operating a "high-school-sized" assembly in a quiet R-1 residential zone at midnight and predawn violates the core intent of the Town Noise Ordinance.
11. Unsafe Parking "Fixes": The applicant's plan to squeeze in 20–30 more spots using "compact" spaces in a lot with "significant root damage" is a safety risk. Cramming more cars into smaller, broken spaces will lead to more idling, door-slamming, and noise as drivers struggle to navigate the lot in the dark.
12. Preference vs. Necessity: The applicant admits they have access to the Saratoga Prospect Center but find it "logistically challenging." Their personal convenience is not a legal justification for a Conditional Use Permit modification that permanently destroys the "quiet enjoyment" of the neighborhood.
13. Fire Hazard" & Life Safety: Under California Fire Code Sections 1004.1 and 503.2.1, any assembly over 50 people requires strict "Means of Egress" and a minimum 20-foot unobstructed roadway for fire engine access. The applicant admits to a standing capacity of 1,217 people (~304 vehicles) but only has 180 parking spaces, creating a 41% deficit (124 missing spaces). This shortfall guarantees overflow parking on both sides of Farley Road, dropping the street width below the legal 20-foot minimum and blocking emergency vehicles. Furthermore, the applicant's admission that their commercial-grade gate is inoperable is a direct violation of fire exit requirements, creating a massive public safety liability for the Town of Los Gatos.
14. Neutrality of the Law (The "Religious Land Use" Counter): The Town's Noise Ordinance and Zoning Laws are "content-neutral." If a secular 24-hour gym or a late-night social club applied for these same hours in an R-1:8 zone, they would be denied instantly. Granting an exception based on religious "norms and practices" (as cited on Page 2) would actually be preferential treatment, not "inclusivity."
15. Intensity of Use vs. Diversity (The "General Plan" Counter): Diversity does not override Density. The General Plan also mandates "Neighborhood Compatibility." A facility with a 1,217-person capacity (which is 40% short on parking) is functionally a Regional Assembly Center, not a neighborhood-scale house of worship. You are opposing the size and timing of the surge, not the faith of the people.

16. The "Fixed Time" Fallacy: While the times are fixed by faith, the location is a choice. The applicant admitted (Item 16) that they have access to the Saratoga Prospect Center. If the Farley Road site cannot accommodate these "fixed times" without violating the Town's Noise Ordinance, the applicant should use the alternative site that is better suited for high-intensity use.
17. "Essential Use" vs. Residential Quiet Enjoyment: There is no "essential public welfare" benefit to having 300+ cars descend on a quiet residential street at midnight or 4:00 AM. In fact, the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) identifies late-night noise and traffic in residential zones as a "significant impact" on public welfare.
18. The "1990 Precedent" Counter: The 1990 permit for the Jehovah's Witnesses strictly capped hours at 10:00 PM. The site's infrastructure is frozen at 1990 standards, yet the applicant is trying to force a 2025 "Regional Scale" volume into a 35-year-old design. While the building hasn't changed, the applicant now proposes a massive occupancy of 1,217 people (~304 vehicles) operating at all hours. A 35-year-old permit for a small neighborhood use does not grant a "blank check" for modern intensification that ignores today's traffic, fire safety, and neighborhood density.
19. Data from the [West Valley Muslim Association \(WVMA\)](#) indicates the 16769 Farley Road location operates as a regional hub serving multiple cities, rather than a neighborhood-scale facility, contradicting R-1:8 residential zoning.
20. Rules are applied regardless of organization mission:
 - a. A draft permit for a Main Street (The Club at Los Gatos) commercial establishment (U-20-012) strictly limited all operations and live entertainment to a 10:00 PM cutoff, seven days a week, to protect nearby residents.
 - b. Construction Limits: Residents are prohibited from performing construction or repair activities on their own property outside of 8:00 AM to 8:00 PM.
 - c. Youth Curfew: Even the [Los Gatos Youth Commission](#) enforces a 10:00 PM curfew for minors on public streets.
 - d. Even public institutions like [Los Gatos High School](#) are subject to strict time and parking limitations to manage neighborhood impact.
 - i. The Denial of Expansion: In late 2025, Town staff recommended against changing on-street parking time limits near the high school, citing the need to prioritize "small-town charm" and prevent overflow into residential zones.
 - ii. Strict Loading Zones: The Town recently adjusted passenger loading hours to exactly 7:30–8:30 AM and 2:00–3:00 PM to ensure school traffic does not "bleed" into other hours of the day.

Dear Planning Commission Members and Senior Planner Jocelyn Shoopman,

I am a resident of Farley Road and live at [REDACTED], in close proximity to the facility at 16769 Farley Road. I am writing to express concerns regarding the proposed modification to expand operating hours and activity levels at this location.

Under the Los Gatos Municipal Code, a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) may only be approved when the Planning Commission can make specific findings demonstrating that the proposed use is compatible with surrounding uses and will not adversely impact the neighborhood. The Town's zoning framework recognizes that certain uses may be appropriate only if carefully regulated and compatible with their location; however, the existence of a conditional use listing does not guarantee approval if the impacts are inconsistent with the surrounding zone. (<https://www.losgatosca.gov/997/Conditional-Use-Permit-Table>)

Because I cannot find street parking near my house during mosque events and based on circulated community information, I am concerned that the proposed expansion may conflict with several required CUP findings.

1. Incompatibility With Surrounding Residential Neighborhood

The surrounding area consists primarily of residential streets intended for neighborhood-scale uses. Los Gatos zoning policy emphasizes that land uses should be [mutually compatible with surrounding residential development](#).

The proposal would expand activity late into the evening and introduce early-morning operations, including pre-dawn arrivals between approximately 4:00 and 5:00 AM. These hours

are inconsistent with the typical expectations for quiet residential neighborhoods and may create ongoing disturbances for nearby residents.

2. Parking Deficiency and Neighborhood Traffic Impacts

Community materials indicate the facility may accommodate approximately 1,217 occupants but provide only 180 parking spaces, representing a significant parking deficit. Such a disparity suggests that overflow parking would inevitably spill onto nearby residential streets including Farley Road and adjacent streets. This raises several planning concerns:

- Traffic congestion on narrow residential streets
- Obstruction of emergency vehicle access
- Increased noise and activity during late evening departures and early morning arrivals

Planning approvals typically require that projects demonstrate adequate infrastructure capacity and parking availability to support the proposed use without degrading neighborhood conditions.

3. Life Safety and Emergency Access Concerns

The streets surrounding the facility are narrow residential streets. If overflow parking occurs, emergency vehicle access could be impeded. Municipal planning processes typically require consideration of public safety impacts and emergency access before approving expanded use intensity. When an event ends, traffic on Farley Rd can crawl to a standstill. The Mosque has tried to mitigate this by employing traffic guards to direct traffic exiting its driveway but this doesn't solve the issue and only highlights the mismatch between the property's current use and the surrounding neighborhood.

4. Scale of Use Relative to Neighborhood Context

The materials circulated locally describe a facility capable of serving more than 1,200 people, suggesting a regional-scale assembly use rather than a neighborhood-scale facility.

The Town's zoning framework is intended to ensure that uses located within or adjacent to residential zones remain compatible in scale and intensity with surrounding neighborhoods. Substantial increases in hours of operation and attendance levels may fundamentally change the intensity of use at this location.

Request for Careful Evaluation

For these reasons, I respectfully request that the Planning Commission carefully evaluate whether the proposed modification can satisfy the required findings for Conditional Use Permit approval, including:

- Compatibility with surrounding residential uses
- Adequacy of parking and traffic circulation
- Protection of neighborhood quiet hours
- Preservation of emergency vehicle access and public safety

If these findings cannot be clearly demonstrated, the Town should consider maintaining the current operating limitations or requiring additional mitigation measures to protect the surrounding neighborhood.

I appreciate the Planning Commission's careful consideration of land use decisions and its commitment to balancing community needs with neighborhood livability.

My name is Hadiya Aziz and I work in Los Gatos. I moved here from Santa Clara with my family 10 years ago. I was brought to this area to be closer to a deaf/hard of hearing inclusion school for my daughter. I was able to find a lot of diversity and support with our deaf peers and families. But we left the major Muslim place of worship in Santa Clara to be here so I was really concerned about my kids' connection to our faith.

As WVMA has started running a mosque in Los Gatos, me and my family were able to go to the center more often and it strengthened my children's Muslim identity (which is not always easy).

A lot of our communities and connections suffered in a post pandemic world. Being Muslim, having community is a central part of our faith. While we pray 5 times a day, we are required to have a communal prayer weekly.

I want to thank the planning department and the commission for all their hard work. I would love to have WVMA's request for additional use in the morning, night and Ramadan granted.

Dear Ms. Whelan and Ms. Shoopman,

I understand that Los Gatos might be facing a RLUIPA challenge by WVMA on Farley Road in a residential neighborhood.

Although I don't live in the immediate neighborhood, I do live in a similar area. I don't want the protections I enjoy as a resident to be compromised if a new precedent is set on Farley Road. If the CUP modification is allowed (and violations of the current CUP go unchecked), this would allow some organizations to operate under different conditions than others. I live very close to a quiet church property (on Old Blossom Hill Road) that currently has minimal impact on our neighborhood. The current church complies with the Town's noise ordinance, but hypothetically, that could change, especially if this CUP modification request is granted.

The request from the organization on Farley Road worries me because they seem to be asking for disparate treatment with respect to other religious and secular organizations located in residential neighborhoods. I don't believe RLUIPA mandates disparate treatment; rather, it protects against it.

The proceedings of CUP modification requests by other institutions in residential neighborhoods, such as Hillbrook School and Faith Lutheran serve as good background to establish equal treatment.

I found some excellent advice for municipalities on these matters while researching this topic, which I hope you will review in preparation for the upcoming Planning Commission hearing. I've attached a pdf below to the document that you can find at <https://www.rluipa-defense.com/wp-content/uploads/sites/30/2017/02/Avoiding-and-Defending-Against-RLUIPA-Claims-w-002-9215.pdf>

The 9th Circuit has found that towns have a compelling interest when they have legitimate zoning concerns, including preservation of the quiet residential character of the neighborhood and addressing traffic/noise/disturbance issues from residents. (*Pentecostal Church of God v. Avoiding and Defending Against RLUIPA Claims

A Practice Note discussing how local governments can avoid liability under the Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act (RLUIPA). This Note discusses strategies for preventing and defending against substantial burden, unreasonable limits, and equal terms claims, using the safe harbor provision, addressing public statements, and educating government officials about the law.

The Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act (RLUIPA), enacted in 2000, is a federal law that prohibits municipalities from implementing zoning and other land use regulations that impose a substantial burden on a person's or group's religious exercise. In addition to injunctive relief, a prevailing plaintiff can recover its legal fees, which in addition to the municipality's own legal fees can reach the hundreds of thousands or millions of dollars.

This Note discusses how municipalities can avoid RLUIPA claims and, if unavoidable, how to defend against these claims, including placing municipalities in a better position to negotiate an acceptable settlement.

REGULATION OF RELIGIOUS LAND USES

The best way to avoid a RLUIPA claim is to plan for religious use. Regulation of religious uses and RLUIPA compliance are not mutually exclusive. Religious uses are not exempt from zoning. A religious group "has no constitutional right to be free from reasonable zoning regulations nor does [it] have a constitutional right to build its house of worship wherever it pleases" (*Alger Bible Baptist Church v. Township of Moffatt*, 2014 WL 462354, at *6 (E.D. Mich. Feb. 5, 2014)). Courts have consistently recognized "that land-use regulation is one of the historic powers of the [s]tates" (*City of Edmonds v. Oxford House, Inc.*, 514 U.S. 725, 744 (1995)).

Prohibiting religious uses from certain zones is generally permissible as long as a municipality does not:

- Impose a substantial burden on the religious exercise of a person unless the action is the least restrictive means of advancing a compelling governmental interest (42 U.S.C. § 2000cc(a)(1)).
- Treat religious uses worse than analogous secular assembly uses (42 U.S.C. § 2000cc(b)(1)).
- Discriminate based on religion (42 U.S.C. § 2000cc(b)(2)).
- Totally exclude religious uses from locating anywhere in the municipality (42 U.S.C. § 2000cc(b)(3)(A)).
- Unreasonably limit the opportunity for religious groups to locate within its jurisdiction (42 U.S.C. § 2000cc(b)(3)(B)).

However, this does not mean that religious uses must be permitted in any zoning district or that their proposed use of property is allowed as of right. Rather, municipalities can allow religious uses as special permit uses (also known as conditional uses or special exception uses).

COMPREHENSIVE PLANNING AND REGULATING RELIGIOUS USE

Municipalities regulate land with zoning and other controls based on their comprehensive plans, which outline the municipality's long-term goals and policies that guide local land use decisions and operate as the blueprints for development. As with most other uses, municipalities typically allow religious and other assembly uses in certain zones and exclude them from others.

These types of restrictions, including those on religious use, further the municipalities' comprehensive plans. Courts have cited deference to local planning principles to reject unreasonable limits and substantial burdens claims.

For example, the US Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit deferred to local planning in a case involving a religious group that sought to operate a year-round Bible camp in an exclusively residential zone. The court noted that the proposed camp would be permitted in 36% of the county, with seasonal recreational camps permitted in 72% of the county. In rejecting the religious group's unreasonable limits claim, the Seventh Circuit found that

prohibiting the Bible camp use on the subject property advanced the comprehensive plan's goal to uphold the rural and rustic nature of the town, including the specific area surrounding a prominent lake in the residential zone. The group also had a reasonable opportunity to locate the camp on other suitable property in the county. (*Eagle Cove Camp & Conference Ctr., Inc. v. Town of Woodboro*, 734 F.3d 673 (7th Cir. 2013).)

AVOIDING AND DEFENDING SUBSTANTIAL BURDEN CLAIMS

The most common RLUIPA claim is where a religious group asserts that government action has substantially burdened its religious exercise. To claim a substantial burden, the applicant must first show one of the following:

- The substantial burden is imposed on a program or activity that receives federal financial assistance.
- The substantial burden affects interstate commerce.
- The government has made an individualized assessment on the proposed religious use by imposing or implementing a land use regulation, which is the most common.

If the religious group can establish that government action substantially burdens its religious exercise, the government can only avoid liability if it can show that its action advanced a compelling governmental interest using the least restrictive means possible. (42 U.S.C. § 2000cc(a).)

Municipalities should understand the needs of the religious group. RLUIPA suits turn on whether an adverse zoning decision truly infringes religious exercise or is only a matter of preference or convenience for the religious group. Courts have repeatedly rejected claims of “financial cost and inconvenience, as well as the frustration of not getting what one wants” as constituting a burden on religion (*Castle Hills First Baptist Church v. City of Castle Hills*, 2004 WL 546792, at *11 (W.D. Tex. Mar. 17, 2004); see also *Midrash Sephardi, Inc. v. Town of Surfside*, 366 F.3d 1214, 1227 (11th Cir. 2004) (rejecting the argument that having to walk a few blocks farther to a synagogue, even if some congregants were ill, or very young or old, constituted a substantial burden)).

In one case, members of a synagogue claimed that requiring that it locate in a specific zone substantially burdened its religious exercise because its congregants, including those who were ill, very young, or very old, would be required to “walk farther.” The court was not persuaded: “While we certainly sympathize with those congregants who endure Floridian heat and humidity to walk to services, the burden of walking a few extra blocks, made greater by Mother Nature’s occasional incorrigibility, is not ‘substantial’ within the meaning of RLUIPA.” (*Midrash Sephardi, Inc. v. Town of Surfside*, 366 F.3d 1214, 1227 (11th Cir. 2004).)

CREATE A SURPLUS OF LAND FOR RELIGIOUS USE

Conducting an annual inventory of all land available for religious use may help to plan for these uses and to avoid or defend against RLUIPA claims. The more land available for religious uses, the better a municipality’s chances of defending against substantial burden and unreasonable limits claims. For both types of claims, some courts consider whether there are feasible alternative properties available

for religious use. (*Chabad Lubavitch of Litchfield Cty., Inc. v. Litchfield Historic Dist. Comm’n*, 768 F.3d 183, 195 (2d Cir. 2014).)

A surplus can also help municipalities defeat claims brought under RLUIPA’s total exclusion provision, which provides that “[n]o government shall impose or implement a land use regulation that ... totally excludes religious assemblies from a jurisdiction” (42 U.S.C. § 2000cc(b)(3)(A)). Claims under this provision are defeated by making some land available for religious use.

The more alternatives there are, the more difficult it is for a religious group to show that an adverse decision has caused it to modify or forego its religious behavior. For example, the US Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit found a substantial burden where a village in New York denied an Orthodox Jewish group’s special permit to expand its coeducational day school because of a lack of feasible alternatives. The court credited the testimony of the day school’s experts, who testified that the planned location of the school expansion “was the only site that would accommodate the new building.” (*Westchester Day Sch. v. Village of Mamaroneck*, 504 F.3d 338, 352-53 (2d Cir. 2007).)

Reevaluating Land Designated for Religious Use

To help avoid and defend against substantial burden and unreasonable limits claims, a municipality’s annual inventory should determine how many lots are:

- Vacant.
- Available for sale.
- Zoned to allow religious use.

If few parcels are available for religious use, municipalities should consider whether amendments to the text of the zoning regulations or to the official zoning map would make more land available for religious use.

Real estate experts and planners can help municipalities better understand the realities of the marketplace and determine whether they should amend their zoning maps to make more land available for religious use. If a municipality chooses to vigorously defend a RLUIPA suit, real estate and planning experts may be able to convince a court that other sites are available for the religious group to use.

However, despite the provision’s clarity, some religious groups attempt to use an alleged lack of other sites to attack an adverse zoning decision as substantially burdening their religious exercise when the groups simply prefer a specific site.

PLAN FOR A COMPELLING INTEREST

According to the US Supreme Court, compelling interests are interests of the “highest order” (*Church of the Lukumi Babalu Aye, Inc. v. City of Hialeah*, 508 U.S. 520, 546 (1993)). Although the legal standard for demonstrating a compelling interest is high, existing case law provides several examples, including:

- Protecting public health and safety objectives (*Wisconsin v. Yoder*, 406 U.S. 205 (1972)).
- Preserving the rural and rustic, single-family residential character of a residential zone (*Eagle Cove Camp & Conference Ctr., Inc. v. Town of Woodboro*, 734 F.3d 673 (7th Cir. 2013)).

- Enforcing zoning regulations to ensure the safety of residential neighborhoods (*Murphy v. Zoning Comm'n of New Milford*, 289 F. Supp. 2d 87, 108 (D. Conn. 2003), vacated, 402 F.3d 342 (2d Cir. 2005)).
- Preventing crime (*Harbor Missionary Church Corp. v. City of San Buenaventura*, 642 F. App'x 726 (9th Cir. 2016)).

A compelling interest must be more than pro forma reliance on traditional zoning interests. It must be supported by a complete and comprehensive record of the municipality's interests, and local action must be tailored to meet those interests. Creating a complete and comprehensive record is especially important to defeat substantial burden claims, which are the perhaps the most fact-intensive type of RLUIPA claim.

If a religious institution shows that a government action has substantially burdened its religious exercise, a government can avoid liability only if its actions were taken to advance compelling interests using the least restrictive means possible. Municipalities therefore need to strongly consider the compelling interests they seek to promote when enacting a regulation or acting on an application. Municipal counsel should speak with the responsible planner and other officials to identify these interests in advance because courts do not look favorably on after-the-fact justifications for government action.

REGULATE RELIGIOUS USE BASED ON SIZE AND IMPACT

Municipalities can treat religious uses differently than other uses based on size and impact and still comply with RLUIPA. Limiting the focus to the size and impact of proposed uses, including the compelling interests the government seeks to advance, can have significant impact when defending against RLUIPA claims, for example:

- A Hindu group claimed that a local zoning code treated religious uses worse than secular uses. The court denied summary judgment because the zoning code did not discriminate against religious uses in favor of secular uses, but against large-scale uses in favor of small-scale uses. (*Adhi Parasakthi Charitable, Med., Educ. & Cultural Soc'y of N. Am. v. Township of West Pikeland*, 721 F. Supp. 2d 361, 378 (E.D. Pa. 2010).)
- A court denied summary judgment to a church, finding that the city's hostility toward the church arose not from religious discrimination but from concerns over its size and proposed growth, which "threatened to outstrip the character and size of the city" (*Castle Hills*, 2004 WL 546792, at *14).

ENCOURAGE REAPPLICATION AFTER A DENIAL

Encouraging modifications to a proposed religious use and suggesting that the applicant resubmit its proposal can increase a municipality's chances of defeating a substantial burden claim. However, disingenuously leaving open the possibility of modification and resubmission is not likely to insulate municipalities from substantial burden claims. To better defend against these claims, a municipality can express on the record a genuine willingness to entertain a modified application for a similar proposal. For example, one court found a town's stated willingness to consider a church's future application was not genuine. There was sufficient evidence that the town wanted to derail the church's project after the church

refused to make a payment in lieu of taxes, and the town had manipulated the statutory environmental review process to that end (under the State Environmental Quality Review Act or "SEQRA"). (*Fortress Bible Church v. Feiner*, 694 F.3d 208, 219 (2d Cir. 2012).)

An honest effort to develop alternatives may be the best approach for municipalities to avoid a RLUIPA violation and the potential for protracted and costly litigation. However, when engaging in dialogue over possible uses, it is important to impress on applicants that approval is not guaranteed, even though the agency may be more receptive to a modified proposal that incorporates the specific recommendations of the reviewing agency. Having the applicant and the municipality jointly engage a mediator may make sense in some cases. For those municipalities that do not want to encourage reapplication, identifying compelling interests advanced using the least restrictive means possible is key to defeating the claim.

AVOIDING EQUAL TERMS CLAIMS

Municipalities must be careful to avoid the perception of unequal treatment when excluding religious uses from certain zones. RLUIPA requires that religious uses be treated as well as any comparable secular assembly use (42 U.S.C. § 2000cc(b)(1)). Imposing a different, more onerous application process on a religious institution can support a violation of the equal terms provision.

Different courts have established different tests to determine unequal treatment (see *Elijah Grp., Inc. v. City of Leon Valley*, 643 F.3d 419, 422-23 (5th Cir. 2011)). Several courts have found violations where zoning codes prohibit religious uses but allow secular assembly uses, such as:

- Clubs.
- Meeting halls.
- Community centers.
- Auditoriums.
- Theatres.
- Recreational facilities.

(*Midrash Sephardi*, 366 F.3d at 1231-32.)

USE THE SAME PROCESS AND PROCEDURES

If religious uses are prohibited in a particular zone, be careful to similarly prohibit analogous secular assembly uses. Violations have been found where religious uses are allowed but subject to different, more stringent standards.

Municipalities should develop comparable regulations for broad classes of similar uses. Classify assembly uses together and, if possible, permit them all in the same zones under the same standards and prohibit all of them from the same zones. Regulating for broad classes may also help municipalities to:

- Establish the neutrality and general applicability of their respective codes.
- Demonstrate that they do not impermissibly target religious use.

Carefully scrutinize the zoning code to determine which uses could potentially be considered assembly uses, because assembly uses may not be obvious. For example, codes that identify municipal uses may not appear to qualify as secular assembly uses, but they

can include public schools, libraries, and museums (see Cautionary Example of Unequal Treatment).

If it is unclear whether a particular use could be considered an assembly use, err on the side of caution, and regulate it in the same manner as the rest of the grouped assembly uses.

Cautionary Example of Unequal Treatment

Important lessons can be taken from the case, *Corp. of Catholic Archbishop of Seattle v. City of Seattle*, where a federal district court ruled that municipal uses were assembly uses (28 F. Supp. 3d 1163 (W.D. Wash. 2014)). The court found that the city violated RLUIPA's equal terms provision by requiring a Catholic high school to apply for a variance to put up 70-foot-high light poles for its athletic field in a residential single-family zone, while allowing public schools to do the same by special exception. The city argued that the differential treatment would promote the provision of public facilities by government agencies (*Catholic Archbishop of Seattle*, 28 F. Supp. 3d at 1168). Making it easier for these light poles to be placed at public athletic fields may encourage members of the public to use the public fields over private fields without the same lights.

The court rejected this argument because the city's justification for the unequal treatment did not relate to "accepted zoning criteria" (one type of equal terms tests). The court noted that objective zoning criteria contained in the city's land use code for a single-family zone included "light, tree coverage, density, structure height, traffic, parking, aesthetic considerations and occupancy" but did not include the municipality's justification. The city's justification, instead, appeared in external sources, such as the State of Washington's Growth Management Act (Wash. Rev. Code Ann. Ch. 36.70A). (*Catholic Archbishop of Seattle*, 28 F. Supp. 3d at 1169.) Therefore, municipalities should include any justifications for different treatment in their respective zoning codes.

AVOIDING EQUAL TERMS CLAIMS: ARTICULATE JUSTIFICATIONS FOR USING DIFFERENT STANDARDS

There may be justifiable reasons why a municipality does not want to regulate broadly, and reasons may be acceptable if they are carefully articulated. The municipality should be mindful of the court's decision in *Catholic Archbishop of Seattle*, which held that municipalities must articulate any justifications for unequal treatment in the applicable sections of the zoning code itself to avoid the claims of subjectivity (see Cautionary Example of Unequal Treatment).

Justifications that have defeated, or courts have held could potentially defeat, equal terms claims include:

- Creating parking space.
- Controlling traffic.
- Generating municipal revenue.
- Limiting a commercial zone to commercial use.

(See *River of Life Kingdom Ministries v. Village of Hazel Crest*, 611 F.3d 367, 373 (7th Cir. 2010).)

CONSIDER THE IMPACTS OF ALL USES IN COMMERCIAL ZONES

Municipalities should be cautious when creating a pure commercial district in name, and then allowing non-commercial secular

uses while rejecting religious uses. When identifying potential justifications for different treatment, carefully consider what other uses are allowed, and whether these uses could cause the same impacts the municipality seeks to alleviate by using different standards for religious uses. If allowed uses cause the same or similar impacts as religious uses excluded from the zone, the municipality may be subject to a colorable equal terms claim.

This problem arose in a reverse urban blight case in the US Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit, where a city sought to create an entertainment district (*Centro Familiar Cristiano Buenas Nuevas v. City of Yuma*, 651 F.3d 1163, 1165 (9th Cir. 2011)). The city required churches, but not other secular uses, to obtain a conditional use permit because a state statute prohibited the issuance of new liquor licenses to businesses operating within 300 feet of churches. The Ninth Circuit rejected the city's stated justification for the unequal treatment promoting the development of the entertainment district because "many of the uses permitted as of right would have the same practical effect as a church of blighting a potential block of bars and nightclubs" (*City of Yuma*, 651 F.3d at 1174-75).

PUBLIC STATEMENTS AS EVIDENCE OF DISCRIMINATION

Discriminatory comments made by government officials or consultants reviewing a religious group's land use proposal, especially when made in the public record, can be particularly damaging to municipalities defending against these claims. Even if a comment was made in jest, it is important to remember that words may appear very different on paper than they sound when spoken.

Plaintiffs' lawyers can and do construe any relevant comment as an example of overt discrimination. One court found a town's "open hostility" to religious use, in support of finding a violation of RLUIPA's substantial burden provision, was evinced in part by:

- Agency members' comments that they opposed the application because it was "another church."
- The agency's instruction to the town planner to "stop" and "kill" the project.

(*Fortress Bible*, 694 F.3d at 214, 219-20.)

Some courts consider whether an agency's decision was arbitrary and capricious when evaluating RLUIPA claims (*Westchester Day Sch.*, 504 F.3d at 351). Discriminatory comments made by public officials could support a finding that an agency's decision was arbitrary and capricious.

Even comments from municipal lawyers that are not carefully considered are subject to being misconstrued. For example, for a local historic district commission, apparently wanting to emphasize that the religious use should be treated like any secular use, said that the Jewish Orthodox group's plans should be "reviewed as if it were a strip joint." The point the attorney was attempting to make could have succeeded by using the example of a private club, such as ones operated by the Veterans of Foreign Wars or the American Legion, instead of a strip club. The comment followed both the attorney and client throughout the case. (Third Amended Complaint ¶ 57, *Chabad Lubavitch v. Borough of Litchfield*, No. 3:09 CV 1419 (JCH) (D. Conn. Apr. 26, 2010).)

CURE DAMAGE FROM AGENCY MEMBER STATEMENTS

There are steps that can be taken to cure the damage caused by comments that are alleged to be evidence of discrimination. Agency members should immediately and publicly renounce on the record any comments that could be construed as discriminatory and should be clear that the applicant's religious beliefs play no part in their review of the application.

If a discriminatory comment is made, the agency's chair should consider requesting that the offending member recuse herself from further review of the application, noting on the record that the reason for recusal is due to the discriminatory comments of the agency member and again affirm that religion plays no part in its review.

Even if the meaning of a statement is unclear but could be construed in an unfavorable light, the record should be clarified. It may also be helpful to ask how the applicant would like to proceed. If the applicant makes a suggestion and the agency acts on the suggestion, such as an official resolution condemning the statement, the applicant may have waived any opportunity to challenge the comments. While it is difficult to predict whether this would be enough to cleanse the record, as each case is highly fact-specific, it would demonstrate good faith efforts on the part of the municipality.

AVOID AN ATMOSPHERE OF HOSTILITY AT PUBLIC HEARINGS

Just as public officials need to watch what they say to avoid having their comments construed as discriminatory, they also need to be cognizant of discriminatory comments made by members of the public or risk agency members being found complicit in or, more consequentially, persuaded by, these comments. This is what happened in *City of Cleburne v. Cleburne Living Center*, where the city denied a special permit for a group home for persons with developmental disabilities due to residents' prejudices against those individuals (473 U.S. 432 (1985)). The city's deference to the negative attitudes and unsupported fears of these opponents supported a finding of discrimination under the Equal Protection Clause. Although not a religious land use case, the same principle applies. As the court in *Cleburne* noted, "[p]rivate biases may be outside the reach of the law, but the law cannot, directly or indirectly, give them effect." (*Cleburne Living Ctr.*, 473 U.S. at 448.)

There are several ways that public officials can prevent the public from making discriminatory comments, including:

- Preparing a statement to be read at the opening of the public hearing to let the public know that the religious applicant may submit evidence about its religion, particularly regarding what its beliefs require and the space needed to accommodate its exercise of religion.
- Informing members of the public that they should not challenge the applicant's religious beliefs, even if they disagree about whether the proposed use is religious, and asking them to limit their comments to zoning issues, not religion.
- If discriminatory comments are made, immediately:
 - instructing the speaker to limit her comments to zoning issues;
 - renouncing these comments; and
 - stating again on the record that religion plays no part in their review.

DENOUNCE DISCRIMINATORY PUBLIC STATEMENTS

Different problems arise when members of the public make incendiary and discriminatory comments outside of the hearing itself. Although these comments are not part of the record, local officials who are aware of them should denounce them in a public forum to help avoid an atmosphere of hostility. For example, in response to a proposal by a Muslim group to construct a 27,000-square-foot mosque and multipurpose hall on a 1.5-acre parcel of land located in a residential neighborhood, members of the public voiced their opposition on blogs and in the comments sections of local online media, such as:

- "Mosques are weapons bunkers, terrorist training centers, and places of incitement."
- "Yay, just what the USA needs, another house where they teach to kill those that disagree with their ideology."
- "Why don't the locals just defile the ground with pork products."

(Second Amended Complaint at 57, *Al Madany Islamic Ctr. of Norwalk, Inc. v. City of Norwalk*, No. 3:12-cv-00949-MPS (D. Conn. May 6, 2013).) While these public comments outside a hearing are not directly relevant to governmental liability, they can taint the public debate and color an eventual denial of use.

One federal court has recently ruled that public comments is one factor to be considered under a RLUIPA nondiscrimination provision claim (*Chabad Lubavitch*, 768 F.3d at 195). The nondiscrimination provision states, "No government shall impose or implement a land use regulation that discriminates against any assembly or institution on the basis of religion or religious denomination" (42 U.S.C. § 2000cc(b)(2)). Although few courts have interpreted or applied this provision, the court in *Chabad Lubavitch* found that the provision looked to many of the same factors under the Equal Protection Clause, including statements made by community members. Plaintiffs can also support nondiscrimination claims by pointing to other religious groups that have been treated more favorably. However, religious animus (express or implied) is required to prove any nondiscrimination claim.

CORRECTING IMPERMISSIBLE REGULATION UNDER RLUIPA'S SAFE HARBOR PROVISION

The availability of land for religious uses alone may not be enough to defeat an unreasonable limits or substantial burden claim. The US Department of Justice (DOJ), which investigates allegations of discrimination across the country and sometimes sues to enforce RLUIPA, cautions that courts have found violations of the unreasonable limits provision "where regulations effectively left few sites for construction of houses of worship, such as through excessive frontage or spacing requirements, or have imposed steep and questionable expenses on applications" (DOJ, Civil Rights Division: Statement of the Department of Justice on the Land-Use Provisions of the Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act (RLUIPA), at Question 15 (Dec. 15, 2010)).

There may be no opportunity to make more land available for religious use. In these situations, municipalities may want to incorporate specific mechanisms into their zoning codes that allow exceptions for religious uses having difficulty finding land.

RLUIPA contains a safe harbor provision that authorizes municipalities to exempt religious land uses from certain policies or practices that might otherwise violate the statute (42 U.S.C. § 2000cc-3(e)). Although this provision does not detail what municipalities must do to avoid liability, it gives them broad authority to act. Municipalities should add this provision verbatim to local codes.

The safe harbor provision may be used to address several issues. Where a religious group claims that a zoning denial, coupled with the realities of the real estate market, have imposed a substantial burden on religious exercise, the safe harbor provision appears to allow municipalities to reconsider the denial (see *Riverside Church v. City of St. Michael*, 2016 WL 4545310 (D. Minn. Aug. 31, 2016)). A municipality could use the provision to reverse the denial and approve it subject to reasonable conditions. In this regard, municipalities should work with religious applicants to determine which conditions would be acceptable for all involved. If this is impossible, be sure that all conditions of approval are reasonable in scope and further compelling interests (public health and safety) in the least restrictive means possible.

If a RLUIPA suit is filed after a denial, or even an approval with conditions, the municipality may consider using the provision to reopen the hearing, inform the applicant of an acceptable development design, or review the application again if the former hearing was full of religious animus. The provision has been used with some success relating to possible facial violations of RLUIPA's equal terms provision. In these situations, municipalities have amended zoning codes to ensure that religious uses are treated the same as secular uses.

PREVENTING CLAIMS BY EDUCATING AND COUNSELING GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS

RLUIPA is not easy to understand, and even courts interpret the statute differently. Proper training of local officials before they begin to review a religious use application is essential to avoiding and defending against RLUIPA claims. Educating local officials during the review process itself is not ideal because it may lead officials to focus too much on the statute instead of the proposed use.

One factor courts consider is whether a land use agency's decision was arbitrary and capricious or supported by substantial evidence in the record. This is particularly relevant to substantial burden claims. A finding that a decision was arbitrary and capricious weighs in favor of finding a RLUIPA violation. One court found a violation of the substantial burden provision in part because of the arbitrariness of the municipality's decision-making process, noting that:

- The planning board members "lacked legal training and possessed little to no knowledge of RLUIPA."
- There was "no attempt by the City to educate the [planning board] regarding RLUIPA."
- "To the extent members of the RBPB were even aware of RLUIPA's existence, the evidence indicates that their understanding of the law was flawed."

(*Grace Church of N. Cty. v. City of San Diego*, 555 F. Supp. 2d 1126, 1137 (S.D. Cal. 2008).)

Educating local officials about RLUIPA compliance before application review can be part of a compliance effort that avoids RLUIPA violations. Even if this training is not necessary or feasible, municipal counsel should offer refresher training tailored to the issue relevant to the specific proposal either:

- When a municipality learns that it will be receiving an application for a proposed religious land use.
- After it receives the application but before it opens the related public hearing.

If municipal counsel is involved in the review of the application to assist the agency members, it may be most effective for training to come from an outside source. Outside training can also help maintain the confidentiality of the attorney-client relationship. Non-privileged actions and statements from municipal counsel, likely the municipality's agent, will be part of the record if a RLUIPA claim is ever litigated. However, there are preventative measures that municipal counsel can offer, such as:

- Providing annual courses to update members on new developments in the law.
- Updating zoning handbooks.
- For municipalities without handbooks, making copies of the DOJ's RLUIPA reports, which are freely available to decision makers (for the most recent report, see DOJ: Update on the Justice Department's Enforcement of the Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act: 2010-2016).
- Administering mandatory trainings and pop quizzes for municipal officials based on their review of the handbook or other materials.

MOCK APPLICATION EXERCISES

Municipalities can create an exercise to find the weak spots in their regulations by enlisting public officials to take on roles as potential applicants and make hypothetical applications. Script the applications and build in as many teaching points as possible. Assign roles to some participants but not others. The municipality might develop a scenario regarding an application for a house of worship with a private, religious school in a residential neighborhood. Add more complexities to the example, such as:

- The religious group seeking the mixed use uses hallucinogenic tea as part of its faith.
- Part of the school is used for only religious classes and the other part for only secular classes.
- Within the past few years, the agency has approved both secular and religious high schools in the same zone of varying sizes.
- Agency members:
 - have a conflict of interest; or
 - have made questionable comments.
- There are angry neighbors.

After the exercise is complete, bring in the experts, identify the issues, and critique the agency's decision and its handling of the public hearing.

REAL-TIME ADVICE

City or special counsel should be present at all meetings or hearings where religious land use proposals are considered. Some of the

factors under RLUIPA may conflict with certain aspects of the normal discretionary review process. For example, while financial hardship generally cannot form the basis for variance relief, a religious applicant's financial situation is relevant to substantial burden claims (see *Westchester Day Sch.*, 504 F.3d at 352-53). Consideration of the applicant's ability to find ready alternatives may not be relevant to most other types of applications but are relevant to religious and other uses that have First Amendment protection, such as adult entertainment. The municipality should consider whether:

- There are other sites where the religious group could locate without unreasonable delay or uncertainty.
- The group has explored other alternative sites.

If an agency member makes a comment that is clearly inconsistent with RLUIPA, for example, that the agency cannot consider the availability of alternative sites when deciding a special permit application, it may be necessary for counsel to step in and provide real-time advice to avoid a decision that may later be found to have been arbitrary and capricious.

IS THE PROPOSED USE RELIGIOUS EXERCISE? RELIGIOUS EXERCISE

RLUIPA defines "religious exercise" as "any exercise of religion, whether or not compelled by, or central to, a system of religious belief" (42 U.S.C. § 2000cc-5(7)(A)). The statute applies to "[t]he use, building, or conversion of real property for the purpose of religious exercise" (42 U.S.C. § 2000cc-5(7)(B)).

The statute's reach is broad. RLUIPA applies to just about any type of use alleged by an applicant as a form of religious exercise, even if nontraditional, as long as the beliefs are sincerely held. Courts are not in the business of deciding what is and what is not religious exercise. (*United States v. Ballard*, 322 U.S. 78, 86-87 (1944).)

While municipalities are free to challenge the sincerity of religious beliefs, they should not opine on what they view and do not view as religious exercise. Challenging whether an applicant's proposed use is a form of religious exercise could also raise a red flag of discrimination.

One court recently considered when mixed use is religious exercise. The court applied the segmented approach, under which, for each room or facility in a multi-use building, the court:

- Applied the substantial burden analysis to those rooms that were used for both secular and religious purposes.
- Did not apply the substantial burden analysis to rooms or facilities used only for a secular purpose.

(*Chabad Lubavitch v. Borough of Litchfield*, 2016 WL 370696, at *6-7 (D. Conn. Jan. 27, 2016).)

CORPORATE RLUIPA CLAIMS AFTER HOBBY LOBBY

In the wake of the Supreme Court's decision in *Burwell v. Hobby Lobby Stores, Inc.*, it is unclear whether privately held corporations can now bring RLUIPA claims (134 S. Ct. 2751 (2014)). In *Hobby Lobby*, the Court found that corporations were "persons" and could sue under RLUIPA's predecessor, the Religious Freedom Restoration Act (RFRA) (42 U.S.C. §§ 2000bb to 2000bb-4). While this decision has had its critics, including Justice Ginsburg in her dissent, and

the case law ruling on claims from corporations is not yet mature, municipalities should cautiously analyze corporate claims and suits under RLUIPA and RFRA. Out of an abundance of caution, municipalities should proceed as though the statute does apply.

ADDITIONAL PROCEDURES AND PREPARING FOR A RIPENESS DEFENSE

RLUIPA claims must be ripe to be adjudicated by a court. The Supreme Court set out the most common test to determine ripeness in *Williamson County Regional Planning Commission v. Hamilton Bank*, which requires that an applicant obtain a final, definitive position about how it can use its property, including exhaustion of the variance process (473 U.S. 172 (1985)). Under this test, courts have dismissed RLUIPA suits for lack of ripeness where the religious entity or individual did not seek variance relief.

RELAXED RIPENESS

Another test to determine ripeness, which must be considered before the *Williamson County* test, is the relaxed ripeness test. Under the relaxed test, a court adjudicates RLUIPA claims, even if the religious entity or individual did not seek a variance, if both:

- The religious entity suffered immediate injury from the government's actions.
- Additional administrative remedies would not further define the alleged injuries.

(*Dougherty v. N. Hempstead Bd. of Zoning Appeals*, 282 F.3d 83, 90 (2d Cir. 2002).)

For example, one court concluded that a property owner's failure to appeal a cease and desist order to a local zoning board of appeals left the owner's asserted immediate injuries ill-defined (*Murphy v. New Milford Zoning Comm'n*, 402 F.3d 342, 352 (2d Cir. 2005)).

When weighing additional procedures and to preserve the ripeness defense, municipalities should therefore consider establishing either:

- An administrative procedure to allow an aggrieved religious land use applicant to appeal an adverse zoning decision to the zoning board of appeals or another agency.
- A formal process of reconsideration for land use decisions, especially one that is required before a further administrative appeal.

Generally applied, additional procedures could place municipalities in a position to:

- Show that an alleged immediate injury is ill-defined absent an appeal of an adverse decision.
- Prompt an adjudicating court to dismiss a lawsuit, especially where the religious group did not seek a variance or other relief.

A religious group may sue after both an initial denial of its desired use and after the reconsideration or appeal, raising the possibility of two lawsuits. However, having an additional round of review has some advantages for municipalities. Municipalities using these types of additional procedures can:

- See the claims in the first challenge, allowing them to know what they may be up against in later lawsuits.

- Carefully tailor their decisions to specifically address the claims raised by the religious group in its complaint. For example, if a group alleges that its application should be approved because the municipality approved similar secular assembly uses, the municipality can study those other approved uses and distinguish them from the proposed religious use.
- Have another chance to identify compelling interests and apply the regulations in the least restrictive means possible.

Dear Jocelyn Shoopman,

We are writing to follow up on the recommendation we received from the Planning Commission Chair and Vice Chair at last week's Planning Commission meeting (Tuesday, January 27, 2026) encouraging us to engage with other positions and departments to inform them of our concerns.

For context, last week our neighborhood community (Jim Ratcliff) spoke during the Verbal Communications agenda item, sharing our concerns about our community's safety and the non-compliance concerns related to West Valley Muslim Association's (WVMA) upcoming 30-night Ramadan celebration (February 17- March 18, 2026) and ongoing year-round activities violating the existing CUP.

We are disheartened to learn that the members of the Planning Commission knew nothing of our plight despite the fact that over the past two years, the Town has received 15 letters from concerned neighbors on five streets bordering WVMA's property over the past two years; we have provided the Town with numerous emails, video documentation, presentations, data, etc. and had many meetings with numerous elected officials serving on the Town Of Los Gatos' local government and office personnel.

As a result, we are working to communicate with the Town of Los Gatos departments and all of the critical roles that support our Town and community, to actively help us get this item on the radar.. We are sharing a consistent message about the impact on our neighborhood's safety and CUP violation concerns. We are doing this through written communication, in person meetings and participating in public forums. The goal is to get the right level of attention so we can collaboratively establish an action plan.

For your part, we are asking for your support with this effort, and **asking for your availability to meet for 15-20 minutes to get your input and guidance.** We believe this will support getting alignment of the parties involved and affected, while creating a consistent set of expectations and accountability.

We truly feel this is a compatibility issue. By way of example, some of the key issues being raised are reflected in The Town's Codes (i.e. 16.20.010 (a)(1), 16.20.015). The existing CUP (U-24-010), revised in 2020, and as restated in a letter from the Town Of Los Gatos (dated 7/5/2025) responding to WVMA, reads that the property is to be maintained as an "existing church facility"; that worship is extended to 11PM only during Ramadan, and is limited to 10-25 people during the added hour, and only for that specific 30 day period. For the remainder of the year, services are permitted until 10 PM.

We look forward to your response to our request and would be happy to answer any questions you have.







WVMA Traffic Noise Level, 4:40am-6:00am, Wednesday, 6/18/2025

Subject: WVMA concerns

- To Whom It May Concern:

We're writing to request that the following information about our neighbor, the West Valley Muslim Association, be included in the Planning Commission meeting packet. The information WVMA provided for my wife, Ann, did not accurately reflect how Ann and I feel. It is essential to establish a clear set of boundaries for WVMA's CUP modification to prevent the organization from continuing to negatively impact the character of our small, quiet residential street.

On July 12, 2024, and July 19, 2024, I was approached by one of WVMA's representatives who was conducting traffic and parking control on Farley Road. This traffic control has happened very infrequently since the above dates. The attendee asked if I had any concerns. My major concern was the lights from the exiting cars shining right into our front window and bedroom.

They offered to plant trees or hedges on our property to block the light. I replied that that wouldn't work due to the offset of driveways. What was left out of my response in the Neighborhood Report submitted to the Town by WVMA was my suggestion to reverse the direction of driveways at the entrance and exit points. I also suggested a stop sign to slow down the continuous flow of cars leaving the mosque. On the 7/19/2024 interaction, I was again approached by the same rep asking if had thought about her suggestion of planting trees or hedges. I again stated that it would not work to alleviate the light from hitting our front window. I again asked about my suggestion, she would bring it to the Board. To date, as of 7/20/2025, I have not heard back from any WVMA representative.

On 11/25/24, two WVMA reps came to our door and spoke with Ann Bundlie (wife) to seek feedback about her concerns. Again, Ann mentioned the lights, traffic, noise, and the speed of cars leaving and entering the mosque. The attendees promised to remind the community. All problems still exist as of this date 7/20/25.

On 3/14/2024, a WVMA rep approached Mary Hogan (sister-in-law) who lives in a cottage on the property. She was asked about her concerns with the attendees of the Mosque. Mary voiced her concern about the sudden acceleration/noise made by members leaving the mosque. The rep promised that attendees would be reminded of concerns.

Since our last interaction with attendees from the Mosque on November 25, 2024, there has been no follow-up regarding our concerns. Our concerns have increased:

1. WVMA's Maintenance/Gardening crew runs a gas blower (violation of city ordinance) for at least 2 hrs. a week.

2. WVMA's attendees' vehicles constantly turn around in our driveway, day and night. Clearly, the communication they mention in their CUP modification, asking members to respect neighbors, is not working.
3. During Friday prayers and special events, vehicles routinely block our mailbox and driveway.
4. During Friday prayers and special events, vehicles routinely park in front of the fire hydrant across the street. The next hydrant is located over 100 yds away.
5. There is constant weekend traffic from activities in our neighborhood, as well as lots of screaming and yelling in WVMA's parking lot. It's as if no adults are supervising.
6. Attendees congregate in groups on the street, some with loud voices, including during Ramadan as we tried to sleep. Attendees chat, fold up strollers, chirp their car alarms to unlock vehicles, etc.
7. Once the services end during Friday prayers and other events, the constant stream of vehicles on Farley Road prevents us from leaving our home. There is no yielding on behalf of the attendees. At times, my wife or sister-in-law has to get out of the car and physically stop vehicles in the road.

I'm sure that none of the WVMA members would want this to happen to them. We have endured a great deal over the past two years, in terms of being negatively impacted by WVMA. Their neighborhood report in the CUP modification application does not accurately reflect how we, as neighbors, feel.











Shoopman:

The Muslim Legal Fund of America's Legal Division is a nonprofit law center dedicated to defending the constitutional rights of Muslims in America. We offer guidance to the Town of Los Gatos regarding the West Valley Muslim Association's (WVMA) application to extend its hours of operations in its conditional use permit (CUP) to allow it to hold early morning and evening prayers as required by Islam.

Prayer (*salah*) is one of Islam's Five Pillars, meaning that Muslims are obligated to observe daily prayers and cannot waive this requirement without good cause. Islam requires Muslims to pray a minimum of five times per day at pre-determined times that depend on the sun's placement in the sky— approximately dawn (*fajr*), early afternoon (*dhuhr*), later afternoon (*asr*), sunset (*maghrib*), and night (*isha*). As the sun's placement in the sky fluctuates over the course of a year, so too do the times for daily prayers. *Fajr* prayers will take place earlier in the summer than in the winter, while *maghrib* and *isha* prayers will occur later in the summer than in the winter. Additionally, fasting during Ramadan (*sawm*), the ninth month of the Islamic calendar, representing another mandatory Pillar of Islam. During Ramadan, Muslims increase their religious observance by performing extra prayers after the nightly *isha* prayer called *taraweeh*. These prayers usually involve reading one chapter of the Quran each night so that the prayer can complete all 30 chapters of the Quran during Ramadan, and therefore can last multiple hours. Because the Islamic calendar is a lunar calendar, the month of Ramadan does not align with a month in the Gregorian U.S. standard calendar and therefore changes every year. To fulfill their religious obligations under Islam, WVMA's Muslim community will need access to a communal space to pray during *fajr*, *isha*, and *taraweeh* prayers during these times that vary throughout the year.

As you are aware, the Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act (RLUIPA) prohibits local governments from implementing a land use regulation in a manner that imposes a substantial burden on the religious exercise of a person, including a religious assembly or institution. 42 U.S.C. § 2000cc(a)(1). Both the current CUP and the Town of Los Gatos's request that WVMA modify its worship schedule substantially burden WVMA's ability to operate its mosque in accordance with the Islamic faith. The times set for prayer are mandated by the Quran and are therefore not subject to change. While the current CUP prohibits WVMA from offering worship activities after 10PM during most of the year, except for the 30-day period of Ramadan during which worship activities are prohibited after 11 PM, Muslim worshippers are obligated to worship at specified times that may extend past the hours of 10 PM and 11 PM. As WVMA stated in its Letter of Justification, WVMA is the only mosque in Los Gatos, CA and the largest mosque in the area, with the next largest mosque being north of San Jose, nearly 12 miles away. If WVMA cannot hold space for Muslim worshippers to pray during religiously obligated times— indeed, the primary

function of any mosque—the Muslim community of Los Gatos and neighboring counties will not have a space to exercise their religion and will instead need to incur a substantial burden to attend the nearest facility that offers prayers during a schedule compliant with Islam. *See Bethel World Outreach Ministries v. Montgomery Cnty Council*, 706 F.3d 548, 558 (4th Cir. 2013) (holding that considerable evidence that current facilities inadequately serve religious needs is sufficient to show substantial burden).

Under RLUIPA, the Town of Los Gatos must show that the imposition of this burden on WVMA and its Muslim community furthers a compelling government interest and is the least restrictive means of doing so. 42 U.S.C. § 2000cc(a)(1)(A)–(B). Courts do not consider bans on noise disturbances to be a compelling government interest sufficient to prohibit a religious assembly from operating. *See Guru Nanak Sikh Soc’y v. County of Sutter*, 456 F.3d 978, 991–92 (9th Cir. 2006) (holding county did not show a compelling government interest when it cited noise, traffic, and environmental concerns as reasons for prohibiting construction of a temple). And even if it was, banning all communal worship after 10 PM (or 11 PM during Ramadan) to comply with a town ordinance prohibiting noise disturbances does not constitute the least restrictive means of furthering that interest, especially in light of the importance of religious freedom and exercise enshrined in RLUIPA.

Note that RLUIPA separately forbids local governments from imposing or implementing a land use regulation in a manner that treats a religious assembly less equally than a nonreligious assembly or that discriminates against an assembly on the basis of religion. 42 U.S.C. § 2000cc(b). WVMA has made multiple significant modifications to its premises and operations in good faith to comply with all applicable regulations and satisfy neighbor complaints, even when those complaints were not made in good faith. To continue to demand that WVMA further modify its observances in ways not asked of any other religions or nonreligious assemblies ignores WVMA’s obligations as a Muslim organization, and also violates RLUIPA’s nondiscrimination provisions, as well as its substantial burden provision.

Due to the requirements of Islam, WVMA requests a modest extension of its operating hours to 10:30 PM most of the year, and to at most 12 AM during only the 30 days of Ramadan depending on the applicable time of sunset. We hope that the Town of Los Gatos, now better informed, will respect WVMA’s religious rights and those of others, as well as its own legal obligations. We are happy to address any questions, and we look forward to hearing your response. Thank you for your prompt consideration and response.

**Re: Public Comment in Support of Application for Modification of
Conditional Use Permit at 16769 Farley Road**

Dear Mr. Mullin:

We write on behalf of the ACLU and the ACLU Foundation of Northern California regarding the West Valley Muslim Association’s (WVMA) pending Application for Modification of Conditional Use Permit at 16769 Farley Road. WVMA seeks to extend the hours of its conditional use permit to allow for indoor, non-amplified morning and evening prayers, in addition to nightly Ramadan prayers in accordance with the Islamic faith. In its staff technical review, Los Gatos (“the Town”) identified several alleged deficiencies in WVMA’s application. Most concerning is the staff’s request that WVMA explain how it will avoid any noise disturbances between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m. We write to ensure that this request and others do not reflect an intent to deny the modified permit outright or to impose conditions that would unlawfully prevent the congregation from engaging in morning and evening prayers.

Specifically, we write to remind the Town of its obligations under the Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act (RLUIPA).¹ For decades, cities and towns across the country improperly denied zoning permits and other approvals for houses of worship and congregations seeking to use their property for religious purposes.² These denials were often rooted in discrimination against a particular faith or religious practice, even as local officials cited ostensibly “neutral” reasons—such as noise, traffic, or parking concerns—for their decisions.³

To put an end to these harmful zoning procedures, Congress passed RLUIPA. Under the statute, if denying a zoning permit would substantially burden an applicant’s religious exercise, the government must demonstrate that the burden is “in furtherance of a compelling governmental

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interest” and “is the least restrictive means of furthering that compelling governmental interest.”⁴ This legal standard, known as “strict scrutiny,” is “rigorous” and “exceptionally demanding.”⁵ Indeed, “it requires the government to show that it lacks other means of achieving its desired goal without imposing a substantial burden on the exercise of religion.”⁶ Generalized and speculative concerns relating to traffic, parking, noise, safety, or other factors will *not* overcome the applicant’s religious-freedom rights.⁷

RLUIPA also mandates that “[n]o government shall impose or implement a land use regulation in a manner that treats a religious assembly or institution on less than equal terms with a nonreligious assembly or institution.”⁸ And it prohibits the government from imposing or implementing “a land use regulation that discriminates against any assembly or institution on the basis of religion or religious denomination.”⁹

I. RLUIPA applies whenever a zoning decision imposes a “substantial burden” on religious exercise.

RLUIPA prohibits the imposition of substantial burdens on religious exercise, including actions that effectively bar the use of a particular property for religious activity.¹⁰ Here, denying the modified permit or imposing conditions that would prevent entry to or exit from the facility for pre-dawn (Fajr) prayers, evening (Isha) prayers, or nightly prayers during Ramadan would undoubtedly constitute a substantial burden. Los Gatos’s Staff Technical Review requests an explanation of how the hours of operation for the Conditional Use Permit Application will comply

with the Town Code which states that “no persons shall between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m. make, cause, suffer or permit to be made any noise disturbance[.]”¹¹ While the Town is permitted to have and enforce a neutral noise ordinance, an interpretation of that noise ordinance that would prevent WVMA members from carrying out congregational prayers, as directed by their faith, would “impose a significantly great restriction or onus upon such exercise” under RLUIPA.¹²

There can be no dispute that congregational prayer within the mosque is an integral part of the congregation’s religious practice. The performance of Salah (prayer) is one of the Five Pillars of Islam and is considered by many Muslims to be the most fundamental. Moreover, congregational prayer is deeply rooted in the Islamic faith. In particular, it is highly encouraged for Muslims to pray the pre-dawn (Fajr) and evening (Isha) prayer in congregation.¹³ Therefore, denying the modified permit or imposing other regulations that prevent congregants from engaging in this practice at the mosque would implicate RLUIPA’s religious-freedom protections.¹⁴

II. Los Gatos cannot impose a substantial burden on WVMA’s religious exercise unless the burden is the least restrictive means of furthering a compelling governmental interest.

Under RLUIPA, once a permit applicant shows a substantial burden on religious exercise, the evidentiary burden shifts to the government to “demonstrate[] that imposition of the burden” on the applicant is “in furtherance of a compelling governmental interest” and the “least restrictive means of furthering that compelling governmental interest.”¹⁵ “Demonstrate” means that the

government must meet “the burdens of going forward with the evidence and of persuasion.”¹⁶ Thus, Town officials’ “mere say-so” is not enough.¹⁷ The Town “has the burden of showing that there is evidence supporting its proffered justification” for any denial of WVMA’s application.¹⁸

A compelling governmental interest is an interest of the “highest order.”¹⁹ As noted above, general appeals to public safety, health, traffic, and property values are typically not sufficiently compelling to meet this exacting standard.²⁰ We are not aware of any compelling interest demonstrated by the Town to date that would justify denying the mosque’s request to expand its hours to accommodate pre-dawn and evening prayers. Indeed, it is our understanding that, in WVMA’s recent survey of neighbors, nearly all neighbors surveyed expressed no concerns about expanded hours.

Moreover, even if the town could prove a compelling governmental interest, any decision on WVMA’s modified permit application must constitute the least restrictive means available of furthering that interest. Notably, WVMA has already implemented many mitigation measures in response to any concerns regarding noise and traffic. WVMA has also proposed additional mitigation measures, offering to plant more trees and hedges to help muffle sound. In considering WVMA’s permit application, rather than denying the requested permit outright, the Town must take into account these and any other mitigation measures that could address any concerns while still accommodating the ability of WVMA’s congregation to gather in morning and evening prayers.²¹

In adopting RLUIPA, Congress was especially concerned about the risks to “new, small, or unfamiliar” faiths in attempting to establish their congregations in the face of neighborhood opposition.²² We urge the Town to consider and take seriously the purpose of the statute and its robust religious-freedom protections in rendering a decision on WVMA’s application and to approve the modified permit without delay.

I hope this message finds you well. We are writing to you today in the capacity of the Clinical Educator & Training Director and Operations Manager from Khalil Center's San Francisco Bay Area office, a psychological and spiritual community wellness center advancing the professional practice of psychology rooted in Islamic principles. We are also concerned community members, mothers, and supporters of safe, inclusive spaces that serve our youth and young professionals. We work closely with West Valley Muslim Association (WVMA) in providing critical emotional and mental health support—particularly at a time when anxiety, depression, and suicidal ideation are reaching alarming levels across the nation.

The CDC and other mental health organizations have repeatedly emphasized the growing crisis facing our youth. According to the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), 1 in 6 youth in the US aged 6-17 experience a mental health disorder each year. In Santa Clara County, that's around 68,000 young people. The challenges of navigating identity, belonging, and purpose are being compounded by economic instability, social media pressures, and global uncertainty. For young Muslims today, these issues are often further complicated by feelings of isolation due to being bullied and otherized, cultural disconnection, and a lack of spaces where they feel truly seen and supported.

Mosques like WVMA are far more than just places of worship—they are safe havens, where young people find mentorship, a sense of purpose and community, along with holistic support systems grounded in values of compassion, service, and a concern for others. Numerous research studies highlight the profound impact of having a sense of purpose, demonstrating its wide-ranging benefits in helping young adults navigate the many stressors of college life while enhancing their overall well-being (Pfund, Bono, & Hill, 2020). At WVMA, and in collaboration with Khalil Center Bay Area office, much of the programming caters to the youth and young adult population and offers multitudes of opportunities for them to be involved that fills them with purpose and a sense of responsibility for the wellbeing of others. Additionally, WVMA offers a culturally affirming environment where mental health is not stigmatized but addressed through educational programs, youth mentorship, and spiritually rooted coping strategies that foster resilience. It provides a welcoming space for difficult conversations, leadership development, and most importantly—a sense of belonging.

In an era where we are all striving to develop meaningful, community-based solutions to combat the Muslim youth mental health crisis, supporting and recognizing the work of institutions like WVMA is not just important—it is essential. WVMA's support and programming ensure that we are nurturing a strong generation of youth—rooted in their faith, guided by a sense of purpose and service to their community and country, and grounded in a balanced outlook. WVMA serves as a community-based solution to the mental health crisis involving youth and young professionals today and we proudly work closely with and in support of the efforts of WVMA in tackling this crisis. I respectfully urge you to continue engaging with and supporting WVMA's efforts, and to consider it a vital community partner in your strategies to uplift the well-being of our city's future generations.

As a local branch of the NAACP, we work tirelessly to support and defend the civil rights of all people in our communities. It is our understanding that the West Valley Muslim Association [WVMA] operates the only Mosque in Los Gatos (16769 Farley Road), and thus serves as a critical resource for our Muslim community members for preserving their religious practices and cultural traditions.

It is also our understanding that the WVMA is currently seeking to extend the hours of operation of the Mosque under their conditional use permit [CUP], such that they could hold morning (Fajr) and evening (Isha) prayers in accordance with their faith. *We are writing in full support of their request* (extending the hours of their CUP), as the timing and consistency of daily prayer is fundamental to Islamic spiritual practice, and they are the only organization offering such organized prayer services in the city.

While it is always important to weigh the impacts of such decisions on neighbors and other community members, it seems that WVMA has made every reasonable attempt at public education (to the city and to the community) about the importance of these practices, and have demonstrated a willingness to operate with good faith considerations of noise, traffic, and so forth. Further, we believe that WVMA is within their rights to offer morning and evening prayer service in accordance with their faith under the Federal Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act (2000), which prohibits the government from substantially burdening religious exercise.

Kim,

Thank you for bringing this to my attention. We sometimes have to deal with situations that we cannot control, such as occasional panhandlers who come to benefit from the additional generosity of our community during Ramadan when most of us give out our annual 2.5% of our savings in charity (Zakat). We do not allow these panhandlers on our property, we seek help from the police, advise the panhandlers to file a Zakat application to get help directly and privately from our Mosque, and advise our congregants to not give them directly. The two individuals from our community went out to advise the panhandlers about this and did not appreciate being filmed. On behalf of WVMA, I apologize to you on their confrontational approach to you.

Kim - I want to reach out to you again to get feedback from you and learn what we can do better. As you know, we just completed a month of nightly prayers. Today is the last day of our fasting. We will offer prayers and celebrate Eid-ul-Fitr tomorrow (Sunday) - believe it or not at a parking structure at Vallco Parking Garage in Cupertino this year so as not to inconvenience neighbors (we will pray on the first floor of the parking garage, and park on the 2nd and 3rd). This Ramadan, we had made a number of adjustments, including shortening prayers, using both driveways for exit, placing traffic guards during the entry and exit, multiple repeated announcements to minimize noise, clearing the facility in 20 minutes or less of 180+ vehicles from the parking lot, lowering lights, asking LG police to place a speed radar sign, asked them to increase patrols, blocking the parking spots in front of your home (and anyone else who requested), and many others. I personally stood outside at the exit for the last 10 busiest nights not just observing, but also directing traffic, asking attendees to be quiet, and to help minimize the impact to our neighbors.

I again want to extend my hand to you to meet with you and Jimmy to find solutions that are a win-win for all of us. We are not here to "win" and make you "lose". We want to be part of this neighborhood, practice our faith, and ensure that we are a net positive to everyone around us. A small delegation of 3 or 4 of us, including our clergy (Imam) would welcome an opportunity to learn what worked this past month, and what did not work, and how we can improve and make it even better. Our goal is to work with you in a cooperative rather than an adversarial manner. I have tried that in the past (see screenshots of text messages with Jimmy below). Hope this time the answer is different. Happy to meet whenever, wherever, and with you and anyone you want to include, including Town officials.

Razi,

As you know, we have experienced unreasonable intrusions on our right to quiet enjoyment of our home, which is next door to the West Valley Muslim Association (WVMA) facility for the last 30 nights during Ramadan. Today, on March 28 during WVMA's busy Friday afternoon prayers during which traffic lasts for several hours, a man and his two sons entered our residential neighborhood and stood at WVMA's entrance. They held up signs, and waved to WVMA members as they drove in the entrance in an effort to solicit money. This is not the first instance people have come into our neighborhood and solicited money in front of WVMA.

After reporting this to the Los Gatos-Saratoga Police Department, I documented the situation from my property.

Eventually two men emerged from WVMA's entrance, and spoke to the man and his sons. The two men then walked to our residence, and approached me in a confrontational manner. One began to film me, then spoke to me aggressively. He demanded, "Don't put me on your social media. If you put me on your social media, I will put you, 'The Karen of Farley Road,' on mine. You are the reason that family is here panhandling." I felt threatened by these men. I asked for his name since he appeared to represent WVMA in an official capacity but he said, "You don't need to know my name."

This is the second time a representative of your religious organization has treated me, a woman, in a hostile and disrespectful manner.

Thanks for making an effort to come out to see the situation several times. Last night was especially chaotic on Farley Road. This [10-minute video](#) shows countless vehicles and members streaming by our residence until 10:55 pm. Please take into account this was only 10 minutes of two hour-long disturbances both coming and going and was the 21st consecutive night of such activity. We encourage the staff in your planning departments to watch the video.

Thanks also for your suggestion of meeting with West Valley Muslim Association (WVMA). Many neighbors have met with Razi Mohiuddin, WVMA founder.

Jim and I met with Razi on three separate occasions for a total of six hours, including inviting him into our home and backyard to see how we are affected. He was not amenable to any of our compromises/suggestions, ie., weekend activities appropriate to a residential neighborhood, shuttles for Ramadan, removal of right turn only signs, etc. All, he said, would be inconvenient for members.

I have reviewed [Chapter 16 - NOISE | Code of Ordinances | Los Gatos, CA | Municode Library](#) many times. I hope we can both agree this video illustrates WVMA's Ramadan (and Friday prayer activity) is not "the normal and customary noise and actions involving gatherers" and is not limited to parking onsite at WVMA. There are 50-70 cars parking in our neighborhood at night. The Ramadan curfew extension violates Los Gatos' normal 10 p.m. curfew. Members who come in for early morning prayers as early as 4 a.m. also violate Los Gatos' 8 am quiet hours.

Also, we're unclear as to your statement, *I will leave it to code enforcement in applying when this activity than [sic] crosses into a violation of code*. Does this mean we should ask Town Compliance Officer Allen Meyer to come out and measure the noise? Call the police? The acoustics professional specifically asked me to determine what the Town's measurement requirements are as they differ from Town to Town. Please provide the specifics.

Dear Chris,

We're three-quarters of the way through West Valley Muslim Association's (WVMA) Ramadan, so we thought it would be pertinent to touch base. Although WVMA has complied with its 11 pm curfew so far and hired traffic direction, the noise, traffic, and overflow street parking (50-75 cars per night) continue to be burdensome to us as next-door neighbors and to our neighborhood. This includes 45 minutes of slamming doors and engines revving in WVMA's parking lot as we try to sleep. One recent example: As Jim was walking our senior dog, a member sped around Izorah Way onto Farley Road as he rushed to find parking. Had Jim not shone his flashlight into the driver's windshield, he would've been hit. We reported the incident to LGPD.

Before Ramadan ends next Thursday, March 28, we encourage you, Jocelyn Shoopman, Gabrielle Whelan, Joel Paulson, and Allen Meyer, to experience the traffic and noise congestion so that you can understand what we endure for 30 days. Until you stand on our porch, in our front or backyard or even in any of our three bedrooms, you can not imagine the visceral impact. It's as if 300 cars are barreling through our bedroom every night for an hour, coming and going.

Next Wednesday and Thursday at the very end would be ideal as those were the busiest nights last year, with one WVMA rep telling us, "It's going to get crazy."

Timing is key as 300 cars descend upon our neighborhood and then depart in two concentrated time blocks before and after our street returns to its pin-drop quiet state. I've included [the times](#) for next week here.

Additionally, we'd appreciate help with the following:

We hired an acoustic professional to measure noise levels. He has requested that we provide the Town's designated measuring point (i.e., on our property, inside the residence, etc.).

- At our meeting with you on March 3, you encouraged us to write a letter to WVMA requesting the conditions that would allow us to regain the peaceful enjoyment of our home and neighborhood. We have 20 neighbors who are interested in writing this joint letter. To achieve this and maintain consistency, it's essential to be aware of all restrictions imposed on other religious organizations in Los Gatos, particularly those located in residential neighborhoods, and the reasons behind these conditions. Can you provide us with that information, or should we submit a public records request? CUPs are available online, but they vary significantly in terms of conditions. We will need more detailed information and the most current data.

Thank you for your email response attempting to cast blame in my direction but to no avail, as no blame can be fairly placed on me. Your property manager, Jay Sheikh's egregious conduct on February 23 speaks for itself, as does WVMA's violation of the Town's ordinance(s). What WVMA was doing or allowing to be done that early on a Sunday morning is prohibited. This was no "misunderstanding."

Curiously, you do not refute what WVMA's property manager said to me—"Lower your fucking voice"—so I must conclude that you believe (a) it was okay for him to have said that to a woman or, really, to anyone on behalf of WVMA, and (b) that he then just "ultimately walked away to deescalate the situation," never mind that he was the one responsible for the escalation.

Also, I didn't record on your property on February 23. I have never walked around WVMA's parking lot and recorded your congregation at any gathering. All video documentation we've shared with WVMA and the Town of Los Gatos shows that we filmed from our property or the street.

You mentioned in your email that your leadership is exercising patience. Please know that we, your next-door neighbors and 20 families on five streets, have shown extraordinary patience for the past five and a half months while WVMA has slow-walked its CUP modification application, ignored the six (at a minimum) deficiencies identified by the Town in September 2024, and continued to violate our right to quiet enjoyment of our properties.

Hi Kim,

Thank you for bringing this to my attention. I wanted to take the time to investigate and talk to everyone involved before responding.

There appears to be a misunderstanding. No construction was planned, and no construction took place on Sunday 2/23. We had a team come in to move furniture inside the building, from one auditorium to another. However, you came onto WVMA property and spoke aggressively about how there was no construction allowed, and the team needed to leave. You also demanded to see the facility's occupancy signs, even though I had already shared that information with you in our meeting on 2/20. Even though there was no construction occurring or planned, the property manager respected your request not to have anyone moving furniture internally and asked them to leave. Upon the team leaving, we gave you a courtesy call to let you know that they had left. We hoped that this would resolve the issue, as we accommodated your request.

However, you later returned to WVMA's property without permission and raised your voice at our property manager who repeatedly asked you not to raise your voice at him. He ultimately walked away to deescalate the situation. You also began recording on our property, making people feel uncomfortable.

We have been informed that you have walked around the parking lot and recorded our congregation at various gatherings. Young children have asked their parents why they're being recorded. The WVMA leadership has tried to be patient and accommodating but this is getting very troubling. We ask that you refrain from entering the property without authorization and from troubling our members and workers.

In the future, we ask you to contact me directly at my cell [REDACTED] so we can hopefully resolve any issues directly. I will be your point of contact going forward so that there are no further misunderstandings or miscommunications. Feel free to call me or text me any time.

Subject: WVMA Ramadan Curfew Clarification/Certificate of Occupancy/Removal of Right Turn Only Signage

Dear Chris,

My husband, Jim, and I are requesting to meet with you, Gabrielle Whelan, and Jocelyn Shoopman to discuss our continued frustration that the Town of Los Gatos continues to allow West Valley Muslim Association (WVMA) to operate under a thirty-five-year-old Conditional Use Permit granted to the property's former owner, the Jehovah's Witness Church in 1990. Our right to quiet enjoyment of our home is being compromised daily by WVMA as it continues to ignore the six deficiencies (at a minimum) identified by the Town in September 2024.

At our meeting, we would like to discuss specifically the following urgent issues:

Ramadan Curfew Clarification:

Jim and I asked to meet with Razi Mohiuddin, WVMA Founder, and Lubna Saikh, WVMA Executive Director, on February 20 to discuss their Ramadan 2025 protocol. We attended this meeting in hopes of learning what WVMA has planned so that we are not kept up until midnight again this year as we were in 2024 for 30 consecutive nights as 300 vehicles exited WVMA's facility along a narrow one-way driveway that is within 100 feet of our bedroom.

During our meeting, we were told by Mr. Mohiuddin and Ms. Saikh that WVMA would do their best to have all attendees exit the property by 10:50 pm. during Ramadan 2025. When [REDACTED] and I met with you on February 12, 2025, you told us that WVMA's current CUP curfew extension of 11 pm did not mean all vehicles had to vacate the facility by 11 pm. This appears to conflict with something we read previously. In a letter from Ms. Whelan to WVMA dated July 5, 2024, we found she had written in footnote 1:

"At our meeting, we discussed whether or not the word "operation" includes the time needed for worshippers to enter and exit the facility. Based on the application for the modification, which was approved, the hours of operation include the time needed to enter and exit the facility."

Did something change between Ms. Whelan's meeting with WVMA and our conversation with you? If the answer is no, we ask again what we've been asking for the past two months: How will the Town of Los Gatos enforce WVMA's current CUP which mandates an 11 pm curfew during Ramadan? What are the consequences if violated (i.e., fines, revocation of CUP, etc.) and how are these going to be managed?

Confirmation of Maximum Permitted Occupancy and Status of Certificate of Occupancy:

When [REDACTED] and I met with you, you said that you did not know the maximum permitted occupancy for WVMA but would provide that number to us. We would appreciate receiving that, along with a copy of WVMA's Certificate of Occupancy (C of O) which, according to our research, is required by law when a property changes hands and the occupancy changes. In a Staff Technical Review from Robert Gray, Town of Los Gatos Chief Building Official, to WVMA dated September 24, 2024, Mr. Gray wrote:

"A comprehensive plan review has not been completed for this CUP modification...and compliance with codes have not been verified. No change in the character of occupancy or change to a different group of occupancies as described by the Building Code shall be made without first obtaining a Certificate of Occupancy from the Chief Building Official."

Doesn't this mean that when the property came into WVMA's hands the occupancy changed? In fact, the character and the extent of the occupancy changed from a Jehovah's Witness Church with two small services/week to a 24/7 mosque/community center. We understand that it is illegal for a religious organization to operate without a C of O and have a fine of \$1,000/day.

On February 21, 2025, Henry Read, Town of Los Gatos Planning Technician, emailed us a copy of a Business License Form. This form was submitted by WVMA and approved by the Town. Attached to that form was a letter sent by the Town in 1990 to Keith Marshall, POC for the Jehovah's Witness

Church by then Planning Director Lee Bowman. Mr. Read also attached an Occupancy Clearance form from 1990 that also lists the Jehovah's Witness Church. All departments checked off on this form and the Town seemingly did their due diligence – thirty-five years ago and for the Jehovah's Witnesses. However we received no documentation showing the Town departments checked off on WVMA when the property changed hands, nor did we receive WVMA's actual Certificate of Occupancy. We are asking for clarity: did all Town departments inspect for compliance before approving WVMA's application or did they rely on information from 1990? And does WVMA have a current C of O? (See attached documents sent by Mr. Read.)

Removal of Right-Turn Only Signage on WVMA property:

When we met with you, I requested that the right-turn-only signage erected by WVMA on its interior property be removed as it directs hundreds of vehicles by our home day and night, in particular during Friday afternoon prayers and Ramadan. We have been asking WVMA to remove the signage for the last six months to no avail.

During our meeting, Mr. Mohiuddin indicated that he is willing to remove the signage if the Town (and his lawyer) permits. We ask that the Town strongly encourage WVMA to remove this signage by the start of Ramadan this Friday, February 28 to give us respite from the onslaught of vehicles driving past our residence.

As tax-paying citizens of this Town, we expect our elected and appointed representatives to protect our right to quiet enjoyment of our home. We expect the Town to enforce its curfew and maximum permitted occupancy laws during Ramadan 2025 so that we are not faced with another month-long nightmare of losing sleep in our home, and indeed, a lack of peace and quiet in our neighborhood. We've provided the Town with ample video documentation (document attached; Ms. Shoopman can provide access to the shared Google Drive) showing how drastically WVMA has changed the character of our peaceful neighborhood. We would prefer not to be compelled by the Town's inaction to take legal action.

We will call your office this week to schedule a meeting.

Thank you for your acknowledgment of our email dated January 20, 2025, and for providing us access to the communications between the Town of Los Gatos and West Valley Muslim Association (WVMA.)

We are extremely concerned that there has been no further follow-up from you and WVMA's Ramadan holiday is **25 days away**. To the best of our knowledge, there has been no protocol put in place to address concerns raised below stemming from violations during Ramadan in 2024, nor has WVMA submitted a response to the deficiencies identified by the Town of Los Gatos in response to WVMA's request submitted to modify the [CUP application](#).

Given the urgency with the limited time remaining, our neighborhood is requesting a meeting with you, our neighborhood representatives Kim/Jim Ratcliff and [REDACTED], and the appropriate Town of Los

Gatos staff members to provide details about how the Town will enforce WVMA's existing CUP and manage the safety of our neighborhood during Ramadan.

A response this week, February 3, 2025, would be appreciated.

Our expectation is to have a meeting with you the week of February 10th. This will ensure all involved parties are aligned and, in advance of February 28, provide us with a clear understanding of the plan that will be utilized.

Reference: Concerns Raised by Neighbors as a result of WVMA CUP violations:

Traffic control

1. (document submitted outlining videos, provided to Town of Los Gatos) What traffic control will be implemented to protect residents, pedestrians, and WVMA members? What/Where/How will first responders be provided to ensure clear passage and unobstructed access?
2. During Ramadan 2024, due to gridlock traffic in both directions on our small residential street, it would have been difficult, if not impossible, for first responders to get through.

Noise Curfew

1. Parking

1. What will the Town and/or WVMA do to remedy WVMA's parking overflow beyond their 168 spaces? During Ramadan 2024, there were an excess of 100+ vehicles on Farley Road and adjacent streets. When we met with Gabrielle Whelan in April 2024, she referenced parking enforcement on Farley Road and adjacent streets (i.e. Flintridge, Chirco, Izorah) to ensure residents' safety. Will the Town of Los Gatos put that enforcement in place during Ramadan?

Hello Razi,

My name is Jeremy Braidish and we live at [REDACTED]. We know there have been active conversations between your organization, the town and the neighborhood.

We live 4 or so houses down from the mosque and do not experience some of the noise that others are experiencing. We've experienced issues here and there with parking where members have parked in front of our house and blocking corners of our driveway making it more difficult to get in and out. Again, not all the time, but occasionally.

The biggest issue, BY FAR, is speeding down Farley. Typically on Fridays and Sundays and typically at the top or bottom of the hours and folks are presumably running late. It's coming off of Los Gatos Blvd and going down Farley past our house at very high rates of speed. I cannot imagine those individuals driving the same way in their own neighborhoods particularly when there are children in those homes. We have a 13 year old that likes to jog the neighborhood and we're literally having convos with her re: the best days/times to jog that don't conflict with the times of your services to avoid the reckless drivers.

Those have been our experiences and some are different from other in the neighborhood. We've been good neighbors and acknowledge that your organization has taken steps as well. But, as neighbors, I'd ask that some of your members respectfully treat Farley like their own neighborhood.

Dear Chris,

Almost 20 neighbors have reached out to the Town of Los Gatos since March of 2024 to raise ongoing concerns regarding West Valley Muslim Association (WVMA) operations: usage, hours, safety, and noise. (See partial email thread below.) We are concerned that it has been almost a year since we raised the issues impacting our neighborhood, and there has been very little progress. We're asking for your leadership in defining a plan to address the situation, particularly for the month-long Ramadan holiday (Fri. Feb 28 – Sat. Mar 29, 2025) rapidly approaching.

Jocelyn Shoopman relayed in her most recent response (January 9, 2025) that “staff has been in communication with WVMA regarding concerns of the resubmittal of the CUP application with the Ramadan holiday approaching.” However, it’s doubtful the [CUP application](#) will be resolved in the five weeks until Ramadan. We’re asking the Town of Los Gatos to provide an explicit plan of how the Town will manage the safety of our neighborhood during Ramadan with the influx of excessive traffic, overflow parking, building occupancy limitations and noise curfew violations.

We are requesting that The Town of Los Gatos provide the tools and methods that will be utilized to ensure a safe environment and address critical concerns impacting our neighborhood including:

#1 Traffic control (see document outlining videos, dates attached)

What traffic control will be implemented to protect residents, pedestrians, and WVMA members? What/Where/How will first responders be provided to ensure clear passage and unobstructed access? During Ramadan 2024, due to gridlock traffic in both directions on our small residential street, it would have been difficult, if not impossible, for first responders to get through.

#2 Noise Curfew

Ms. Shoopman indicated that... “if the CUP application has not been heard at a public hearing by the Planning Commission by the start of the 2025 Ramadan holiday, the current CUP will be enforceable which mandates that the hours of operation for the Ramadan holiday shall not extend past 11:00 p.m.” We are looking for clarification as to whether the 11:00 pm curfew means that all vehicles and members must be departed from the property by that time. When we met with Gabrielle Whelan in April 2024, she referenced parking enforcement on Farley Road and adjacent streets (i.e. Flintridge, Chirco, Izorah) to ensure residents’ safety. Will the Town of Los Gatos put that enforcement in place during Ramadan?

In addition, we request access to the documentation related to the deficiencies identified and communicated to WVMA by the Town, and any related correspondence.

We would appreciate a reply by Monday, January 27, 2025. We are open to meeting if you have questions or need any further information to help address our request.

Ramadan To the Town of Los Gatos,

I hope this message finds you well. I write to you both as a concerned resident of Los Gatos and a member of the Los Gatos Anti-Racism Coalition.

It has recently come to my attention that our town is considering restricting our Muslim neighbors' right to practice Ramadan. I understand that is likely not the sentiment that is getting passed around, in so many words. From what I gather, the technical point of contention is whether the West Valley Muslim Association may be permitted to extend their hours of operations during Ramadan.

However, in effect, the town is contemplating denying our Muslim community members' ability to worship as they need in Los Gatos during the holiest month of the year. Generally, practicing Ramadan means—in addition to one's normal sundown obligations—breaking fast, eating dinner, and going to the mosque for evening prayers within the few hours between sunset and lights out. Access is important, and WVMA is the only mosque in Los Gatos.

We espouse inclusion. We say we want to “Develop and implement Town-wide strategies, practices, and services that...acknowledge and reflect diversity” (2040 General Plan, 2-4). If we prevent the sole place of Muslim worship in Los Gatos from offering sacred evening services, I don't see how we can call ourselves a welcoming town. Muslim residents would literally need to drive out of our community to practice their faith.

I ask that we take our commitments to diversity and inclusion to their logical endpoint, take a moment to understand how the legalese of this conditional use permit will impact the lives of the Muslim individuals embedded in our community. To welcome people to Los Gatos means little if we will not support them and their beliefs.

I am disturbed and upset to learn the West Valley Muslim Association is facing the prospect of being denied the conditional use permit they would need to worship during the month of Ramadan. I am not Muslim, but I understand the use of the Mosque which depends on the issuance of this permit is a fundamental component of Muslim religious practice. Granting the permit is a reasonable accommodation to support our local Muslims in practicing their faith.

I notice the Town of Los Gatos has been making a commendable effort to improve its commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion. To deny our fellow community members their right to the full extent of their religious practice would fly in the face of this effort, and specifically the goals outlined in the "Town of Los Gatos Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Plan" accepted by the Town Council on October 17, 2023. Denying this conditional use permit would be a savage blow not only to the trust and unity within our community, but to the town's reputation. It would be a source of grief, shame, and embarrassment to see this violation of my community members' rights transpire in the town I call home.

The West Valley Muslim Association's request is extremely modest: to extend their hours of operation a single hour during a single month of the year. I ardently hope the Town will extend this very basic measure of respect to the WVMA by granting them the conditional use permit as they request. Thank you for your work in making Los Gatos a safe and inclusive place for all its residents.

We're following up on our letter dated December 16, 2024 for which we received no response from you or any Town of Los Gatos government representative (see below.)

Ramadan is only six weeks away (Fri. Feb 28 – Sat. Mar 29, 2025) and we have not seen a proposed remediation plan in almost a year since our original concerns were raised to Alan Meyer and Joel Paulson.

We first reached out to the Town in March of 2024 in the midst of an unprecedented thirty consecutive days and nights of unsafe street conditions, fire and health/safety code violations and curfew noise violations during West Valley Muslim Association's (WVMA) 2024 Ramadan activities. We likened the conditions on our small residential street to Vasona Park's Fantasy of Lights but with no traffic control or any semblance of order whatsoever.

Almost 20 neighbors on four streets have since reached out to the Town with concerns. The Ratcliffs documented code violations and provided videos to the Town. Yet we are still no closer to resolution nor has WVMA been held accountable for violations of their current CUP.

This is unacceptable to us as tax paying Los Gatans.

We do not want our neighborhood or WVMA members to be put in an unsafe position again this year, especially during Ramadan.

As conveyed in our last letter, we are perplexed that no deadline was provided to WVMA to address the identified deficiencies in violation, which the Town of Los Gatos documented and communicated to WVMA. It's imperative that a deadline is put in place so that we do not have a repeat of Ramadan 2024.

We wish to improve our neighbor relations with WVMA. Several of us have met with one on one with Razi Mohiuddin, WVMA founder, who has provided no proposals or action plan addressing how or what improvements will be made to address the list of issues identified – both short term and long term as the organization states its goal is to grow both members and community events.

We are requesting that the Town of Los Gatos government enforce the current CUP as no mitigation plan or mutual resolution has been identified. We request a deadline for WVMA to submit a comprehensive plan proposal to cover the deficiencies and concerns raised by our neighborhood for short and long term commitments.

Based on the current status, we do not see relations improving for our neighborhood if we have a repeat of WVMA Ramadan 2024 issues persisting.

We are requesting a response and inclusion of this matter as part of the next Town of Los Gatos public meeting. If that is not feasible, we recommend a dedicated session with all interested parties by the end of January given the Ramadan 2025 start date.

Although I currently serve on the Complete Streets & Transportation Commission, I write to you simply as a concerned citizen to urge you to allow the West Valley Muslim Association (WVMA) to fully practice Ramadan, according to the Muslim custom.

As a Catholic and longtime resident of Los Gatos, I look back with fondness on the many times over the years that I attended midnight mass on Christmas Eve. I remember my older brothers dressed in their red and white alter boy vestments, carrying red lanterns only brought out on Christmas Eve. These days, St. Mary's offers a 10:00 PM mass instead of the traditional midnight service, the red lanterns are gone, and the alter servers' smocks don't look quite so regal. And while I appreciate the solemnity of today's services, they don't seem to inspire quite as much wonder as in days gone by.

Perhaps that's what makes me admire all the more WVMA's desire to keep Ramadan alive and well, to maintain a centuries' old tradition and keep their community grounded in the wisdom of their forebears.

But beyond any parallels between midnight mass and Ramadan, I wanted to point out another kind of ritual that is quite prevalent in our town. As a downtown resident for nearly 30 years, I can tell you that these streets can sometimes get noisy after midnight, especially around 2 AM when the bars close. It may not happen every weekend, but several times I've been awakened from my slumber by a bar hopper or teen partier celebrating loudly. But I've always acknowledged that if you're going to live downtown, you're going to have to put up with a certain amount of that kind of noise.

I wonder, if this were a Christian denomination celebrating evening Lenten services or an Easter Vigil, would there be such preoccupation with the faithful starting their cars and driving home from nighttime services?

For centuries, our country has touted its founding based on practicing religious freedom. Los Gatos needs to step up and defend the rights of all religions to safely and solemnly practice the rituals handed down to them by their ancestors. To do otherwise is simply un-American.

I hope this email finds you well!

I am writing to you in regards to the West Valley Muslim Association's application for a Conditional Use Permit to extend their hours of operation during Ramadan. It would go against the Town's commitment to becoming an inclusive community to deny this CUP, as Los Gatos has committed to valuing all identities and promoting equitable access to resources.

Hello Jocelyn,

I am writing to you not as a Complete Streets and Transportation Commissioner, but as a private citizen, resident, and president of the Los Gatos Anti-Racism Coalition.

I would like to take some time to reflect on the opening paragraphs of the Town's commitment, *Becoming an Inclusive Community*:

"The Town of Los Gatos is committed to inclusivity. We value all our community members, regardless of religion, immigration status, ethnicity, race, disability, gender, sexual orientation, or gender identity. We strive to ensure all community members feel safe, respected, and comfortable to be themselves and express all aspects of their identities. The Town promotes equal treatment, equitable distribution of and access to resources, and engagement in issues affecting the lives of residents, workers, and visitors."

It has recently come to my attention that the West Valley Muslim Association is currently struggling to obtain a conditional use permit to extend their hours of operation during the month of Ramadan.

I, and many others in our community, believe that failing to accommodate the needs of the West Valley Muslim Association would render the words of our commitment hollow. While I do not practice my faith in any religious institution, I do recognize that religious pluralism and accommodation are both an integral part of our national identity as Americans. It is vitally important for Los Gatos to make reasonable accommodations to members of our religious community.

To deny Muslims in our community the ability to practice the fundamental tenets of their faith represents a failure to uphold their fundamental right to religious expression. The Coalition, and many others in our community, are distraught that Los Gatos might legally prohibit our Muslim community from being able to practice their faith. Regardless of the interpretive lens we take, the fact remains that Muslims will not be able to properly observe Ramadan in Los Gatos if we do not grant a conditional use permit.

The aforementioned assurances to allow residents to "express all aspects of their identities" and to promote "access to resources" are not mere rhetorical turns of phrase. We have to walk the talk. To prevent Muslims from entering their mosque during Ramadan would show our residents and neighboring communities that we are willing to abandon the principles we espouse the moment it becomes inconvenient. If we fail to accommodate people's right to worship, we will alienate our Muslim community and damage our reputation as a town immeasurably.

I ask that we do everything in our power to ensure that Muslims feel welcome and safe here.

We're contacting you again regarding the resubmittal of the West Valley Muslim Association's (WVMA) modification request to the current CUP (Conditional Use Permit) requirements for the 16769 Farley Road facility. We understand that on September 25, 2024 the Town of Los Gatos provided WVMA with a comment letter identifying six deficiencies the organization must respond to, and that the Town has met with WVMA representations several times. Based on communication from WVMA's primary representative, Razi Mohiuddin, we also understood that he was in the process of preparing a response, per meetings he had with members of our neighborhood. It has now been almost three months since the Town provided the letter to WVMA. To date, we do not see any updates on the Town's [pending planning projects pages](#). WVMA has been violating their CUP for a year or more. We want them to be held responsible. Why are we neighbors having to monitor and report the situation? This is frustrating and we do not feel that the concerns and noncompliance is being addressed by our local government. The Town website states there is a 30-day deadline for the modification yet you let us know that there is no deadline for the resubmittal. In this case, how is there accountability and closure to the concerns raised and what is the mechanism to ensure WVMA is compliant to 1) the deficiencies identified by the Town and, 2) the public concerns submitted by the neighborhood? We

feel there is no alignment between the Town, WVMA, and the concerned neighborhood regarding a clear outline of the next steps, timing, process, and ownership. We are looking to you to provide us clarity in a transparent communication that we can share with our neighbors who are asking for an update.

We are also asking for your help to identify the timeline and key milestones so we may avoid the ongoing safety issues and disruption in the future. We first reached out to the Town in March 2024. Ramadan is less than three months away (Fri, Feb 28, 2025 – Sat, Mar 29, 2025) and we would like to know from you what the ETA to address (town council, town meeting, etc.), and if there isn't one, when one will be established and what processes are used to communicate transparently with all interested and involved groups?

Dear Ms. Shoopman,

In an era of epidemic loneliness, places of worship and community centers are protective to the social fabric of our society. They save lives by helping vulnerable people find support systems and build a sense of identity and belonging. The West Valley Muslim Association (WVMA) is an inspiring example of such a critical community space.

My name is Amina Darwish, and I am the Muslim chaplain at Stanford University. My students have a special relationship with the WVMA mosque in Los Gatos. They consistently get zip cars and carpool to WVMA even as they drive past other mosques on the ride over. They joined engaging programs, made friends, and met their life partners. I remember my students sharing excitedly about an AI focused dinner they attended. Two of them left with incredible internship opportunities. They felt safe to connect after the COVID-19 shutdowns had impacted their high school experience, which are critical years for young people to learn social skills and psychologically mature. I encouraged my students to attend the WVMA mosque knowing that the community was inclusive. I also knew that they would directly witness female leadership through the executive director and male allyship through the countless community leaders who respected and supported her.

I ask you to provide the permit for the WVMA mosque to operate at the hours that honor the times of Muslim prayer. The early morning prayer is a deeply spiritual time for Muslims. Ramadan is the Muslim superbowl, where I and countless others have built lifelong friendships. California in general and Los Gatos in particular should not be a place where Muslims are only allowed to worship within regular church hours. This is a mosque, not a church. Not allowing the mosque to operate during Muslim prayer times would be akin to asking Jewish worshipers to move the sabbath to Sunday for convenience or asking Hindu worshipers to pray the Brahma muhurta after sunrise instead of its allocated time. Because Sunday is the day of Christian worship, it is a day off in all Western countries. Other minority religious groups must consistently adjust to a system that is not built around them. For Los Gatos to truly be a multifaith, multicultural community, the mosques, synagogues, and temples must be allowed to worship at the times their religious traditions mandate.

I hope you consider this time adjustment as a means of creating a better Los Gatos community.

Community Dear Jocelyn,

I hope you are doing amazing and that everything is going well! I live in South San Jose right along the Los Gatos border, and I have been coming to WVMA for a few years now.

I have been a resident of the Bay Area for 25 years, and for most of that time my main purpose in life was driven by that 'Bay Area mindset'. Everything I was doing in my life was done with the purpose of driving and investing into my future academics and career. When I finally completed my undergraduate degree and landed my first job, my life finally slowed down for just a moment to allow me to take a second and reflect. I got a head start on my peers and decided to have a mid-life crisis at the age of 22. I realized that because of the fact that I simply focused on academics, I had allowed other parts of myself to slack, and this was highlighted in the circle of people I kept around me at that time. So, I set out to find a fresh start and look for a new community of people that could help guide me on my journey and push to become an answer to the problems I'd always complained about.

The timing of this coincided with Ramadan two years ago, and my family and I decided to spend our Ramadan with this young and growing community that had opened nearby our home. That month was one of the most beautiful and transformational phases of my life. The WVMA community is really like no other. I was engrossed by the strength and connectedness of the community, and the spiritual and moral guidance that was prevalent. I continued to come every night for that month and quickly found myself rooted in a new purpose within just 30 days. And then just as suddenly, the month of Ramadan ended and the evening rituals tied to the month were done. Everyone returned to their normal routines and schedules, still trying to fit the community into their everyday lives while still under pressure by that 'Bay Area mindset'. I continued to come during the early morning and evening congregational prayers, which were the only prayers that worked around my schedule because of my job. I have continued to come and have met some of the most inspiring and wise people I have ever seen in my life, and I truly remain humbled every time I go (which is nearly every day). It is absolutely a miracle that all of these insanely talented and motivated people all come together regularly under this same roof. People who are leaders in not just Islamic or spiritual thinking, but leaders in every field of industry and academic. I personally know dozens of people who come weekly to this community all the way from as south as Monterey and as far up as Sacramento because, like me, they see something special in the WVMA community. I have seen people transformed by this community and have had their lives changed for the better, leading them to become positive influences on their own families and communities. There are no other environments or communities that I can think of in the Bay Area where I am able to connect with the youth and the elderly to the degree that I can at WVMA, and where we all feel at home with each other.

We should not underestimate the impact that this growing community has on its surrounding communities. One of the primary reasons that I fell in love with this community is because it is constantly at the service of its members and the communities around it. The programs are deeply intentional and they are built to provide personal growth amongst all different groups of backgrounds and ages. I have seen programs geared towards building confidence and character in our youth, which I have witnessed become leaders in their own communities all across the Bay Area. I have seen the spiritual programming at WVMA invoke transformations in people that have led them to turn their lives around. I have seen this community step up and take the lead in charity efforts during difficult times to support our local communities, including our local unhoused populations. I have seen scholars and professionals from across the nation, and even across the world, coming to California to visit this specific community, because they see the value in it. I have seen this community step up to global issues and supports people on the other side of the world, especially during this past year during the genocide in Palestine. When members of the congregation were receiving news almost daily of their loved ones and relatives being killed in Gaza, this community was there to support them. When the devastating earthquakes in Turkey and Syria happened last year killing tens of thousands, or whenever tragedy struck other communities around the globe, this community was a source of light for people affected local and abroad. This community has become so deeply connected with its local and global communities in such a short span of time, and the value that it provides its own members and whomever interacts with them is truly immeasurable.

I humbly urge you to modify the use permits for WVMA to allow for the first and last prayers of the day, and to allow this community to observe Ramadan and all of its traditions. This community has become a model for other communities across the nation, and its role in the Bay Area as a leader in the service of others will only increase. I would love for others to have the same opportunity that I had to interact with this community and witness themselves transform into who they want to become.

I was lonely.

I grew up in Campbell, went to Rolling Hills in Los Gatos, graduated from Westmont High, went to Berkeley, graduated in 2019, then came back. I was surrounded by people - school friends, college friends, family friends, work friends, friends I've had my entire life - but I was lonely, and especially so after COVID.

I had started coming to WVMA regularly with my family while in high school (daily in Ramadan, weekly otherwise), and after COVID, I decided to start coming again, this time, by myself, without my family. It was the most profound decision I made in my adult life.

Through WVMA's young professionals' programming (called Siraat), I reconnected with my faith, on my terms, and gained the spiritual fulfillment I was looking for. I also found my community, by fostering meaningful relationships and making lifelong friends with other young professionals in similar stages (and struggles!) of life.

WVMA empowered so many of us young adults to create our own safe space while coming into our own identities. We come together to support each other not just spiritually, but in so many other ways as well.

- *Emotionally*, such as with healing circles, when 2 of our own regulars (young professionals) passed away just months apart earlier this year.
- *Socially*, by facilitating events for to meet like-minded individuals with whom we can grow life-long bonds with.
- *Professionally*, such as through networking while we navigate the challenges of our early careers.
- *Business-wise*, such as how we supported the numerous new local small businesses started by our very own young professional community members, and inspired several more to do the same.
- *Health-wise*, such as through mental and physical health related events.
- *Community-wise*, through volunteering, interfaith events, and other ways of giving back.
- And of course, *spiritually*, as we seek to establish what our religion means to us as we grow into our identities.

And all this is just from WVMA's young professionals group alone - it doesn't include all the programming for children, youth, women, families, seniors, neighbors, and our local Los Gatos community at large.

The community WVMA's young professionals group has built is so strong that some regulars come *weekly* from as far as Richmond, San Francisco, and Gilroy to immerse themselves into the serenity of the City of Los Gatos and WVMA. They make the entire day about it - come early to avoid traffic, drop by a local coffee shop to catch up on work, take a walk along a trail, come to WVMA, then grab dinner from a local joint before heading home. All while dreaming about living in place like this idyllic small town one day.

I would like to thank you and the entire planning department and commission for all the work and service that you do for the community. It's the work that oftentimes goes unnoticed, yet is essential to keep our city such an idyllic one.

It is the time I am able to reconnect with my space and my community. (I did not realize a religious organization had to put in a special permit for parking, but I guess that makes sense. I guess other religious organizations might have to do that let's say for Christmas mass or Easter mass, etc.)

West Valley Muslim Association is a thriving community space, providing invaluable services to an otherwise under-supported segment of our town's population. It serves not only as a place of worship but also as a center for cultural exchange, events, education, and community support. The mosque's presence has enriched our town's diversity and fostered interfaith understanding. And isn't this what the town is wanting to promote inclusivity and diversity?

Ramadan is the most sacred month in the Islamic calendar, and if you are unaware of what it symbolizes to them and are familiar with Lent in the Christian religious calendar, Ramadan is like Lent on steroids. Not trying to be disrespectful, but trying to inform.

WVMA plays a central role in its observance for the Los Gatos Community. As a small town, we are dependent on our local nonprofit organizations to provide support for our community members, and West Valley Muslim Association has been doing so with amazing success. While WVMA is not looking to shut down any streets, they are just looking to have their congregation be able to pray, I support their efforts.

WVMA has taken steps to better support all their neighbors by:

1. Encouraging carpooling and the use of designated parking areas
2. Implementing a quiet zone policy in the immediate vicinity of the mosque
3. Conducting outreach to their congregation to raise awareness about being respectful of neighbors

We understand that being a town means that we support each other's rights to religion and the traffic it may cause, and by approving this permit modification, the Town would be acknowledging the importance of someone else's religious freedom and be truly inclusive.

My name is Negad. I am a husband, father, brother, son, prosecutor, and local resident with a deep commitment to the success of Los Gatos--particularly the neighborhood along Farley Road.

I write you to humbly request your consideration of a small yet meaningful modification to WVMA's use permit.

As you know, WVMA is a religious community space serving the local Muslim community. It hosts many social events, but also serves core religious functions considered sacred and essential to a full practice of the faith. These core functions include five (5) daily prayers (prescribed at specific times of the day) and, during one lunar month of the year, 29-30 days of "late night" prayer worship, which effectively requires congregational access to WVMA until 11:30 pm each night for those 29-30 nights.

These core functions supersede most priorities for the community at large and are therefore a major priority when organizing and operating the space at WVMA.

Hello,

I'm writing to you in regard to the furor our small community based mosque, WVMA on Farley Rd seems to have created.

I'll start off by saying I reside around the corner at the end of [REDACTED] in LG and often walk to the Mosque for prayers and events as do my husband and children. Our immediate neighbors to the right and left are pretty friendly. The rest...like to stare, a lot. The elderly gentleman across the street used to come outside *every* time our car pulled up and just stand and stare on his porch as we got out. This lasted quite a few months until I finally introduced myself and offered assistance as he was on crutches, and that was when it finally stopped. There's another lady who walks her dog past our home regularly and loves to glare the entire time she's facing our home and sometimes even when she walks past. Many others drive by and stare as well. You'd think after our being here a couple of years it would stop, but that hasn't been the case. My daughter got honked at and shouted at when riding her scooter from the high school to our home, because like me, she covers and is visibly Muslim. She's since graduated but my son has had a myriad of issues as well which we've addressed with the principal and admin. It's hurtful, but it's one of those things I've learned to swallow being brown/Muslim in America.

I grew up in small towns like this my entire life. We were always made to feel as if we were outsiders. It's nothing new. I never thought I would move to a place like this and yet here I am. Because this is where my children are provided the resources they need to thrive. WVMA provides a sense of belonging and support for my family as well. I would so appreciate your allowing the modification of their conditional use permit to allow for wider spread hours so we can continue to have a safe place for myself, my family and my community. From what I've experienced living here I'm not surprised a group of neighbors have organized in trying to shut it down likely from a place of intolerance. Just last week my mom was walking to the mosque for evening prayers and was stopped and questioned by a neighbor asking if she'd parked in front of her home and that she was from the neighborhood watch. My mom was kind of startled and responded no and kept walking. I was irritated because one, there is no neighborhood watch and two, even if my mom had parked on the curb it's public parking. I'm tired. I'm tired of being made to feel like we don't belong when we're just trying to make it from one day to the next just like everyone else.

As a parent to a special needs child, now teen, our world can be very limited and isolating. There are very few places we can go as a family or even on my own with my son and be treated with kindness and respect, WVMA is one of those places. My son is completely non verbal and has severe autism as well as an intellectual disability. He vocalizes loudly when anxious, and that gets us a lot of stares when we're walking outside or trying to grocery shop. It's extremely stressful for me and made even more so by the unfriendly attitudes we encounter. From the first moment I peeked inside sort of hesitantly, where the mosque was holding our obligatory Friday prayers, with my son in tow in his wheelchair, I was met with the complete opposite. A guy I'd never seen before in my life came running out and wheeled my son's wheelchair inside asking where we'd be most comfortable and if he could help in any way. I almost cried. Because that type of kindness is so rare, especially in Los

Gatos, or the Los Gatos we've known for the past 3 years we've lived here. The mosque represents community and warmth to us, it's a place where my other 17 year old son goes when he's having a tough day and needs to unwind. He can often be seen walking down the street to attend daily prayers or when he needs some quiet time to reflect. As a matter of fact he did so last week. He disappeared for 2 hours, after seeming upset and just seemed to be having a rough day. He came back relaxed back to his normal self and said he'd spent time at the mosque reading the Quran and reflecting. He was able to do so because it's open to us from morning til night. My family deserves to have a space, to practice our faith and receive the support that we need, same as every other family that has their respective churches and temples in our town. Thank you for your time, I'm sure you will give your decision the utmost care and thought.

As residents of [REDACTED], living next door to the West Valley Muslim Association (WVMA) at 16769 Farley Road, we're following up on the status of WVMA's CUP modification request, which has been under review since August 27, 2024. This has been an ongoing issue for nine months. Because Ramadan starts on **February 28, 2025**, we ask for immediate action, including a public hearing before the Planning Commission.

We share multiple fences with the facility, including WVMA's sole exit, a narrow, single lane driveway that measures 12 ft 8 inches and is located less than 30 feet from our home (Photo 1). WVMA's main building less than 100 feet from us. The unsafe street conditions, constant noise, and traffic generated by WVMA make for an uncondusive living environment (sleeping, relaxing, exiting our driveway) and violate the California Civil Public Nuisance Code.



WVMA is not just a religious organization; it's a community center. It operates 20 hours a day, seven days a week with five daily prayers, countless programs and special events. In fact, WVMA publicizes on its website that "our doors are always open." (Photo 2) This leaves us neighbors with four hours of respite a day.

About WVMA

West Valley Muslim Association

WVMA is a faith-based organization, home to a community where everyone feels supported, encouraged, and loved. Our community is not just an event, but a place to belong. Join us as we strive together to worship God, follow the teachings of the Quran, and the way of our beloved Prophet (peace be upon him).

Locations

Nestled among the lush hills of Los Gatos, Los Gatos Islamic Center (LGIC) is the place we call home. Alongside the daily prayers and Friday Services (jummah prayers) LGIC hosts a variety of programs and **our doors are always open**. Come by and enjoy the community garden and explore the grounds filled with greenery. Our indoor facilities include a prayer hall, auditorium, and a space for recreational activities such as table tennis and pool. Visit LGIC at 16769 Farley Rd., Los Gatos, CA 95032

WVMA’s volume is unprecedented for a Los Gatos religious organization zoned residential and is comparable to Calvary Church ([see Calvary’s CUP](#)). But Farley Road does not have access directly onto a major thoroughfare like Los Gatos Blvd (i.e. six traffic lanes and controlled intersections); it lacks the infrastructure (no sidewalks, traffic signals and streetlights) and our residential footprint scale can not accommodate WVMA’s traffic and activities.

Additionally, Calvary has implemented strict measures to protect its neighbors, including a locked gate at the church’s Shannon Road exit that is unlocked only on Sundays (Photo 3), and a locked gate at the back parking lot next to Robie Lane. We have no such protection. Because WVMA’s exit driveway is the sole egress for hundreds of cars, we take the entirety of WVMA’s traffic (except for some low- attendance weeknight activities when vehicles exit vehicles through the entrance driveway.)

To address these existing issues and our growing concerns, we request that at a minimum the conditions listed below be included in WVMA's CUP modification. We've shared video documentation with Bridgette Falconio.

Please share our letter and videos with all relevant departments by November 27, 2024, as we believe it's crucial information. We also ask that these materials also be included in the planning commission packet.

We request that the Town conduct noise and traffic studies in relation to the close proximity of our home to WVMA's main building and exit driveway. We want to ensure the Town Of Los Gatos and WVMA are formalizing the necessary mitigations that will provide a data-driven plan to address the safety and capacity issues (see Calvary's CUP details for reference).

Minimum conditions specific to Ratcliff residence, [REDACTED], to be included in WVMA's CUP modification:

1. **Ramadan:** Last year during WVMA's month-long Ramadan, we experienced nightly traffic comparable to the Vasona Park Fantasy of Lights. Farley Road was unsafe. Additionally, we could not sleep. We were deluged with street noise until past midnight – engines revving, attendees talking loudly, honking horns, car alarms beeping, brakes squealing. There were countless curfew and exterior noise violations. (Curfew Noise Ordinance – Town Code Section 16.20.010.)

We request that WVMA hold Ramadan events at the Saratoga location or alternate between Saratoga and Los Gatos locations with mandatory park and ride program **and all vehicles/attendees departed WVMA property by 10 p.m.** to adhere to Town quiet hours based on the detriment to public health, safety and general welfare, and impairment to integrity and character of the zone. Shuttles to pick up and drop off passengers on WVMA property. No neighborhood parking.

2. **Friday Prayer Traffic Mitigation:** During Friday prayers from 12:30-4:00 pm, hundreds of vehicles stop at the end of WVMA's exit driveway, then accelerate and turn right (per no left turn signage posted on WVMA's property) and drive past our home. The traffic impedes our passage affecting our personal, medical, and work appointments. Recently, I could not get out of our driveway. My husband had to stand out in the street, hold up his hand, and physically stop WVMA's traffic. (see videos.) The traffic is so voluminous, in fact, families have stood at the WVMA driveway and panhandled. We have tested vehicular traffic noise, and it violates the Town's acceptable levels. At a minimum, we request WVMA remove their right turn-only signage.
3. **Noise Mitigation:** WVMA to erect a six-foot noise barrier/sound wall along the property line between WVMA parking lot/exit driveway and Ratcliff home (comparable to those outlined in CUPs for St. Mary's Church at the 30 Tait Avenue residence, and Calvary Church.) Ratcliffs to review the proposed materials and plan, along with approval by a noise consultant. WVMA to fill in seams on concrete driveway that make loud noises as vehicles drive by Ratcliff backyard. WVMA to post permanent signage at the back fence that abuts Ratcliff backyard advising attendees to avoid parking in nine parking spaces and 10 spaces that border [REDACTED] fence unless the lot is full. Please note:

Calvary Church locks the gate in the back parking lot at Robie Lane which is designated as overflow parking only.)

4. **Westside Doors and Windows:** As stated in the current CUP west side windows shall be closed at all times when activities are being held inside the building. We ask that this be included for doors, too, as we are affected by exterior noise from the main building. (see video of WVMA's recent 3rd Annual Siraat Anniversary Market held on Saturday, Oct 26, 2024 from 4-8 pm)

Minimum neighborhood conditions to be included in WVMA's CUP modification:

Ensure WVMA sanctuary occupancy limits are not exceeded during Ramadan and special events; ensure compliance on Fire & Safety Permits: WVMA website shows photo (since removed) of attendees spilling out of prayer hall during Ramadan. (Photo 5.)

Mandate a park and-ride program for services outside of quiet hours (8 am - 10 pm):

WVMA has asked the Town to allow vehicles into our neighborhood as early as 4:30 am and as late as 11:30 pm causing traffic and sleep-related concerns for resident, headlights shining into our bedroom windows, etc.

WVMA to hold an agreed upon number of activities and programs (outside daily prayers) appropriate to the residential zone:

WVMA holds numerous daily activities, some days as many as 14, including weeknights and weekends. This volume creates a tortuous daisy chain of traffic in and out of WVMA's property. Kid's and adult's programs are often held outdoors. Residents on multiple streets with shared fences are unable to peacefully enjoy our backyards due to the disruption of slamming car doors, revving engines, attendees talking loudly, children playing/yelling in the parking lot, etc.

WVMA to hold an agreed upon number of special events appropriate to the residential zone and publish an annual schedule:

WVMA holds outdoor events, including festivals, markets, bazaars with food trucks, bounce houses, etc. (see [video](#) of WVMA's 3rd Annual Siraat Anniversary Market held on Saturday, Oct 26, 2024 from 4-8 pm) Neighbors receive no advance notice. These events bring continuous traffic, overflow street parking and noise. Similar to [Faith Lutheran Church's CUP](#), we request the Town limit the number of annual special events, and mandate that any on-site activity exceeding 100 attendees not specifically authorized by CUP be approved by the Town with 90 days prior notice to neighbors. No overflow parking on street or adjacent neighborhoods. WVMA to publish annual schedule. Events to end and attendees depart at published time. No overflow parking

on street or adjacent neighborhoods.

Limit the number of outdoor ceremonies, including baptisms, weddings, etc.: WVMA allows the hosting of gatherings for large groups and PA systems in the parking lot. These activities are not listed on WVMA’s website so we have no way of knowing what kind of disruption any weekend will bring. These ceremonies contribute more weekend traffic in addition to WVMA’s many calendared activities, and further disrupt neighbors on three streets from enjoying our homes and backyards. We request the Town to limit such gatherings and mandate that any on-site ceremony exceeding 100 attendees not specifically authorized by CUP be approved by the Town with 90 days prior notice to neighbors.

Develop a Communications Plan: We request WVMA implement an outreach campaign to be published in their newsletters and website (including social media promoting events) asking attendees to respect our neighborhood.

Post large visible signage in front of and throughout the parking lot including “Quiet: Residential Neighborhood,” and “Drive with Caution.” (Photo 6) Currently, there are several small signs.

In summary, we ask for the resolution of WVMA’s CUP modification to be expedited since the Town is not enforcing WVMA’s current CUP and Ramadan is fast approaching. Please provide a response and the date of the planning commission meeting by November 27, 2024, to align with the Town’s 90-day review period. In preparation for that meeting, we request all relevant communications submitted to the town by WVMA. Thank you in advance.

Dear Jocelyn,

Hope you're doing well. I am informed that WVMA (at 16769 Farley Road) has filed a CUP modification request with the City. I'm writing to you to express my concerns over the unprecedented WVMA's traffic volume & noise, congestion & safety on Farley road, and the impacts to our normally quiet residential neighborhood.

1: Traffic noise:

According to the LG Noise Zone Map

(<https://www.losgatosca.gov/DocumentCenter/View/38492/Noise-Zone-Map>), between 10:00pm to 6:00am, the noise level limits are 43dBA for weekends/holidays, 48dBA for weekdays. The violation limit is 6dB. The violation limits are 49dBA and 54dBA respectively. Many members of WVMA drive noisy high power vehicles like min-Van, SUV, and sports engine cars. The WVMA vehicle's noise levels are up to 55dBA - 60dBA, and it is above 65dBA when cars move over manhole covers on Farley Rd. (The noise levels were measured at the walls of bedrooms facing Farley Road). My house is about 350 feet from WVMA property, it is between WVMA property and Los Gatos Blvd. Like other houses on Farley Rd, we have bed room facing Farley Rd. Our normally sleep is badly interrupt before 6:00am. It is the worst in Saturday morning, about 30 to 50 cars to attend the pre sunrise prayer service before 6:00am. (It is around 5:00am during the summer time). The current WVMA CUP operation hours is from 8:00am to 10:00pm. WVMA pre sunrise prayer services violate current CUP.

2: Safety on Farley Road.

There are no designated sideways and street lights for pedestrians on Farley Rd. Many MVMA members drive very fast. The worst is the Friday afternoon 1:30pm prayers service, about 140 to 200 vehicles pour into Farley Road. They basically take over the road.

3: During the Month of Ramadan:

WVMA activities during the month of last Ramadan were almost around clock. The service activities started as early 4:30am, and ended as late as 12:00pm. It was a disaster for our neighborhood. There were up to 200 vehicles attending to services during the evenings.

4: LG City Zoning Code:

WVMA's property on Farley Road is designated R1 zoned. According to Los Gatos <<Conditional Use Permit Table>> (<https://www.losgatosca.gov/997/Conditional-Use-Permit-Table>), a CUP is not allowed for a business open between hours of 2:00am and 6:00am in R1 Zone. The same shall be true for WVMA.

5: Enforcement of a CUP:

City must consider the factor if a modified CUP can be enforced or not by current City resources. The Fact is that WVMA does not adhere to current CUP.

At first when I heard WVMA was moving in on Farley Road, I was excited. I welcomed them. I am no longer excited. The noise and traffic are horrible. The mosque is operated more like a recreation center than a place of worship.

My family has been in this neighborhood since 1964. I have seen many changes but the amount of disruption and dangerous traffic conditions that the mosque causes is unprecedented. Sometimes the traffic backs up from the light at Chirco Drive and LG Blvd. all the way down the street to the corner of Flintridge Drive. Pedestrians are unsafe walking in our own neighborhood during these instances which occur regularly.

There was a car accident in front of my house at [REDACTED] last summer which involved traffic from the mosque. I have photos if you would like to see them.

Please deny WVMA's CUP modification request to extend Ramadan until 11:30 pm. At a minimum I'm asking the Town to place the following conditions in WVMA's modified CUP:

- To control the month-long Ramadan traffic, WVMA to hold Ramadan at their Saratoga location which is zoned commercial; and/or alternate events between Farley Rd with mandatory park and ride shuttles. Ensure traffic control during events so fire trucks and ambulances can through in case of emergency.
- Ensure WVMA occupancy limits are not exceeded during Ramadan. (WVMA website photos show congregants overflowing out the doors of sanctuary.)
- Mandatory off-site park and ride program for any prayer services outside the Town's quiet hours (8 am-10 pm)
- Cap the number of weekly non-religious events, lectures, gatherings, activities, etc. held by WVMA that bring traffic and noise to our neighborhood during weeknights and weekends.
- Enforce the no rental condition for baptisms, weddings, etc. These events are often held outdoors in the parking lot during the weekend and disturb those of us like me who share a fence with WVMA.

Please help us return our neighborhood to the quiet, peaceful place it once was.

I'm writing to express concerns over the increasing traffic volume, congestion, parking impacts, and noise disturbance in our normally quiet residential neighborhood. As neighbors to the West Valley Muslim Association (WVMA), we would like to request that a more well-represented and long-term list of solutions be considered and included, and are suggesting the minimum of the following conditions be included in WVMA's CUP modification request:

- Ramadan hours to end at 11 p.m. with all attendees off-site by 11 pm.
- Mandatory off-site park and ride program to be implemented for all Ramadan attendees based on the detriment to public health, safety, and general welfare; and impairment to integrity and character of the zone. Shuttles to pick up and drop off passengers only on WVMA property.
- Daily, mandatory off-site park and ride program for any prayer services outside the Town's quiet hours (8 am - 10 pm)
- Cap non-religious events and activities and hours during weekends to alleviate constant neighborhood traffic and noise.
- Allot a maximum number of special event uses per year (i.e. any on-site activity exceeding 100 attendees that is not specifically authorized by a dedicated CUP) with at least 90 days prior notice to neighbors.
- Town of Los Gatos to provide a controlled left turn signal at the intersection of Farley and Los Gatos Blvd to provide safe conditions for pedestrians and autos to exit from WVMA
- Town of Los Gatos to investigate with traffic survey/study the addition of a left turn only for vehicles exiting WVMA facility
- Town of Los Gatos to investigate and perform a traffic survey/study to determine if a 3-way stop sign or yield sign should be installed at the "T" intersection of Farley and Izorah Way (Note that at the opposite end of Izorah Way at Placer Oaks, there is a 3-way stop sign in place already)
- Town of Los Gatos to pursue adding sidewalks on Farley for safety and continuity in the neighborhood.
- Town of Los Gatos to post speed limit signs on Farley Road and ensure speed limit signs are visible on surrounding streets in the neighborhood (i.e. Placer Oaks, Leroy, Frank, Izorah, Flintridge, Chirco, etc.).
- WVMA to implement an outreach campaign asking attendees to be respectful of the neighborhood, refrain from speeding/street racing, making U-turns in residents' driveways, reverse down Farley Road from exit driveway to entrance, and adhere to quiet hours. This includes departing expeditiously and silently in the parking lot following any activities at the facility.

In the interest of transparency, I would like to request that the Town of Los Gatos provide the outline of the process which this CUP (Conditional use permit) is being managed - to include the specific timeline with details the CUP will undergo (i.e. review forums, approval requirements, public meeting date(s)), to ensure everyone is fully informed and have the opportunity to ask any questions to ensure there is an equitable understanding of the situation, proposal, mitigation, negotiation, and opportunity to respond in the appropriate public forum.

I am also interested in knowing what types of impact surveys have been conducted related to traffic surveys, noise impact, and how a 30-year-old CUP for very different circumstances is being monitored and enforced without approval to date.

I look forward to hearing back from you via email with additional information related to this situation.

In our 10 years living in this zone on Farley, we've not witnessed the volume of cars traveling at high speeds before turning into WVMA (presumably because they're running late), the volume of overflow parking in front of our home (for long periods of time) that don't allow us or our guests access to street parking and the unwillingness of WVMA leadership to put themselves in our shoes (and truly collaborate) as I can guarantee they themselves would not accept this in their own neighborhoods.

I am writing to formally oppose the proposed application for the modification of the [Conditional Use Permit \(CUP\) for 16769 Farley Road](#). As a resident, I urge the Commission to maintain the same standards of neighborhood protection it has historically applied to our specific street.

The "16750 Farley Road" Precedent

The Planning Commission and Town Council have established a clear history of protecting the residential character and "quiet enjoyment" of families on Farley Road. In the case involving the major addition at 16750 Farley Road, the Town intervened specifically to address the concerns of the neighbor at 16472 Farley Road.

In that instance, the Town mandated significant project modifications to protect the neighbors, including:

- Lowering building heights to reduce massing and scale.
- Restricting window placement to preserve residential privacy.
- Requiring specific landscape buffering to mitigate the visual and environmental impact on the adjoining property.

The Town's decision in the 16750 Farley case proved that the "residential feel" and the specific concerns of Farley Road homeowners outweigh an applicant's desire for expansion.

Application to 16769 Farley Road

If the Town was willing to force a homeowner to lower their roofline and move windows just to protect the privacy of one neighbor on our street, it must apply that same standard of care to our entire community. The proposed modification at 16769 Farley Road introduces late-night

and early-morning traffic, noise, and intensity that far exceed the impact of any residential second-story addition.

Allowing this expansion would be a direct contradiction of the "Neighborhood Compatibility" and "Massing and Scale" protections the Town has already upheld for Farley Road residents. We ask the Commission to remain consistent with its prior rulings and deny this modification to protect the established rhythm of our neighborhood.

Dear Mayor Moore, Vice Mayor Ristow, and Members of the Council and Commission,

As a +20 year homeowner in Los Gatos, I am intimately aware of how strictly this Town enforces conformity and in many ways that enforcement is why Los Gatos is still a very desirable place to call home. If a resident tries to remodel a kitchen, add a second story or anything that could impact the character of the neighborhood and the city, they are subjected to months of rigorous Design Review to ensure our private homes "conform" to the neighborhood's quiet, small-town charm.

Why, then, is the Town considering yet another change to the already modified C.U.P.? The proposed hours of expansion will allow a regional-scale assembly—larger than Fisher Middle School—to operate in the middle of a quiet residential street from 4:00 AM to 11:30 PM? We don't allow businesses to operate at these hours in business districts. How can we consider this for a R-1 zoned small quiet residential neighborhood?

1. The Conformity Double Standard: Scale and Intensity: The Town routinely denies residential projects for being "out of scale." Yet, the applicant is asking for a 20-hour workday (4 AM to midnight) all while having a facility with a 41% parking deficit. This isn't a corner lot on a main boulevard; this is 16769 Farley Road is situated in the heart of our neighborhood. If a homeowner and local businesses are held to city standards in order to maintain "neighborhood character," how can the Town justify a 1,217-person regional hub—larger than the student body of Fisher Middle School—operating while families are trying to sleep or walk to school? This is a commercial-scale operation forced into a space that was never engineered to hold it.

2. Speeding on Residential Feeder Streets Unlike a facility on a major arterial road like Winchester, this location sits in the middle of a residential network. When 1,200+ people depart at once in the predawn or late-night hours, Farley Road becomes a high-speed exit ramp.

Dangerous Acceleration: As drivers leave the facility and turn from Farley onto the connecting feeder streets (like Frank or Flintridge), they "speed away" to reach the main roads or make traffic lights.

NO SIDEWALKS: Most streets in this neighborhood have no sidewalks. So as these, already occurring traffic jams happen, walkers and cyclists are forced to the center of the road into oncoming traffic. As a dog walker and avid cyclist I have experienced this issue myself.

Blind Spots & Narrow Shoulders: Our streets have several dangerous turns and blind spots where visibility is severely limited. Forcing hundreds of drivers—who are often rushing to get home or to work—to navigate these blind curves in total darkness with no streetlights and no sidewalks is a recipe for tragedy.

Neighborhood Saturation: This isn't just about one property; it's about the safety of every child and senior living on these "feeder" routes. Headlights sweep into bedroom windows on every curve, and the sound of accelerating engines at 4:00 AM permanently destroys the "quiet enjoyment" of this R-1 zone

As a long-time resident and parent, I ask you to approach this decision with empathy and to consider not only the inconvenience these changes will cause, but also the very real safety risks created when hundreds of cars are released onto narrow residential streets within minutes—especially late at night and in the morning. These are the same streets where your constituents, both young and old, walk their dogs or walk and ride to school, and live their daily lives.

Bottomline if a project doesn't conform to the safety, scale, and quiet of an R-1 neighborhood, it should be **DENIED**.





This incident is a direct illustration of the dangerous "overflow" parking that occurs when this facility exceeds its capacity. Blocking a fire hydrant is not just a parking nuisance; it is a life-threatening hazard that compromises the Santa Clara County Fire Department's ability to respond to emergencies in our neighborhood.



As you consider the applicant's request for expanded hours and increased intensity of use, I urge you to recognize that:

Current Capacity is Already Unsafe: The street cannot safely accommodate the current volume of vehicles, leading to illegal parking that blocks critical fire infrastructure.

Approval Will Exacerbate Hazards: Granting a permit for more occupants or hours will only increase the frequency of these safety violations.

Duty to Protect Residents: The Town has a legal obligation to ensure that its land-use decisions do not create "dangerous conditions" on public property, such as obstructed emergency access.

I request that this report be included in the official project file and distributed to the Planning Commissioners before the next hearing.



Dear Los Gatos Planning Commission,

I am writing as a resident deeply concerned about the Conditional Use Permit (CUP) application for 16769 Farley Road (U-24-010).

The applicant is currently mobilizing hundreds, and potentially thousands, of members from throughout the region to demonstrate public support. While the town allows for broad public input, I urge the Commission to distinguish between general support from a massive organization and the actual land-use impacts on the small handful of residents who live immediately adjacent to the site.

As neighbors, we find ourselves in an impossible position. We are a few families facing a large, coordinated campaign. Many of us are fearful of speaking up because we are being vastly outnumbered by people who do not live here, yet our names and home addresses become part of the public record when we participate.

Furthermore, I must ask: since when is any organization, regardless of religious affiliation, above the law? The Planning Commission's mandate is to protect the character and safety of our specific residential neighborhood. Religious status should not exempt an applicant from the same objective standards—such as noise, traffic, and residential "quiet hours"—that any other entity must follow.

I request that the Commission:

- **Weight Local Impact Over Membership Numbers:** Prioritize the testimony of the residents who will deal with the daily noise and traffic impacts of expanded hours, rather than the sheer volume of support from non-resident members.
- **Apply Laws Equally:** Hold the applicant to the strict residential standards of the R-1 zone, ensuring no special exemptions are granted that would negatively impact the neighbors' quality of life.

- Acknowledge the Climate of Intimidation: Recognize that the scale of this mobilization makes it difficult for local neighbors to feel safe participating in the public process.

Our neighborhood's peace and stability should be protected based on objective planning standards and the Town's General Plan, not dictated by which side can generate the most "public" pressure.

I am writing to oppose the CUP modification for 16769 Farley Road. The Town has a legal and municipal obligation to its residents to uphold the integrity of the R-1-8 (Single-Family Residential) zone—a "social contract" that was clearly defined when the WVMA purchased this property in 2018.

1. The Legal Obligation to Protect Zoning Integrity

Under Town Code § 29.20.190, this Commission is legally tasked with ensuring that any conditional use does not "impair the integrity and character of the zone."

2. Violation of General Plan Policy LU-1.4: "Blend vs. Compete"

If a Single-Family zone can host thousands of regional visitors and operate into late-night hours, the Town has failed its obligation to maintain the very zoning laws it is sworn to enforce.

As a resident of the impacted R-1 neighborhood, I am writing to formally oppose the CUP modification for 16769 Farley Road. While the applicant presents this as a "neighborhood-scale" request, the data shows a Regional Hub attempting to force an incompatible 20-hour operation into a quiet residential zone.

I ask the Town to deny this modification based on the following:

1. Statistically Invalid Noise Data

The 2025 noise study was conducted between January 31 and February 11—outside of peak Ramadan hours. Relying on "off-peak" data to approve a 4:00 AM expansion is statistically reckless. It fails to measure the true impact of 1,200+ people arriving in a quiet residential cul-de-sac while families are sleeping.

2. The "Honor System" is Not a Binding Mitigation

The applicant's plan relies on "reminders" and "signs" for 35% of its proposed mitigations. The Town has no legal mechanism to enforce a "reminder." A Conditional Use Permit must be based on physical, enforceable controls, not an applicant's promise to "self-police."

3. Shifting the Fiscal Burden to Taxpayers

The applicant admits their expansion will require increased police patrols and Town-funded speed bumps. This is a "taxpayer externality"—shifting the financial burden of a private regional hub onto the residents of Los Gatos. Private convenience should not be funded by public tax dollars.

4. Temporary Fixes for Permanent Impacts

The applicant admitted that certain noise-reducing measures, like the removal of gate tracks, are temporary. It is a "bait-and-switch" to grant a permanent hour extension based on temporary physical changes.

5. Outreach Failure (57% Gap)

The applicant's "Neighborhood Outreach" report is deceptive. Of the 35 identified properties, nearly 57% were never successfully contacted. There is no community consensus for this expansion; there is only a lack of engagement from the applicant.

6. The Power Imbalance: Professional Outreach vs. Resident Reality

It is important to note the massive disparity in resources here. The applicant is a formal, professional organization with a regional reach, a dedicated staff, and the communication tools to mobilize thousands of constituents from across the Bay Area. We, the neighbors, are individual residents—families and retirees operating without a PR firm or a professional campaign. We do not have the means to "out-shout" a regional organization, but we are the only ones who will suffer the 4:00 AM consequences.

We ask the Town to protect its residents from this regional-scale pressure and uphold the R-1 zoning standards.

Please protect our neighborhood and deny this modification.

As a 26 year resident of the Farley Road neighborhood, I am writing to formally oppose the CUP modification for 16769 Farley Road. To be absolutely clear: **This is not an issue of religion; it is an issue of land-use intensity.**

Our opposition is not based on who is inside the building or what they are doing; it is based entirely on the **physical impact of what happens outside the building** and how it affects the safety of our R-1 neighborhood.

1. Glaring Inconsistency with Recent Town Precedents

The Town of Los Gatos has a documented history of prioritizing residential "quiet enjoyment" over commercial or institutional expansion. Granting a 4:00 AM start time here would directly contradict the very standards the Town just enforced elsewhere:

- **The Club at Los Gatos (Main Street):** The Town strictly limited this commercial establishment to a 10:00 PM cutoff, seven days a week, specifically to protect nearby residents from noise and traffic.
- **Los Gatos High School:** In late 2025, Town staff recommended against changing on-street parking limits, citing the need to prioritize "small-town charm" and prevent overflow into residential zones.
- **Strict Loading Zones:** The Town recently restricted school loading hours to exact 60-minute windows (7:30 AM and 2:00 PM) to ensure traffic does not "bleed" into the rest of the day for neighbors.
- **Resident Construction:** Even homeowners are prohibited from performing repairs on their own property outside of 8:00 AM to 8:00 PM.

The Question: If the Town enforces a 10:00 PM limit on Main Street and strict caps on our local high school, why would it permit a 1,217-person regional assembly to begin at

4:00 AM in a quiet residential cul-de-sac? The law must be neutral; if it's too loud for a loading zone, it's too loud for an R-1 neighborhood.

2. The "Darkness" Hazard and Infrastructure Failure

Unlike major commercial boulevards, Farley Road has **no streetlights and no sidewalks**. Forcing a surge of hundreds of vehicles and pedestrians onto dark, shoulder-only roads at 4:00 AM or 11:30 PM is a recipe for a tragedy. Physics does not care about the mission of the organization; it only cares about the capacity of the road. This infrastructure was never engineered for "Regional Stadium" intensity during sleeping hours.

Please remain consistent with Town precedents and protect our R-1 neighborhood. Deny this CUP expansion.

Dear Los Gatos Planning Commission,

We are writing as concerned residents and next door neighbors to formally oppose the requested modification to the Conditional Use Permit (U-24-010) for the West Valley Muslim Association (WVMA).

The applicant's proposal relies on a misleading metric: the distance from their building entrance to our homes. In a residential zone, noise impact is not measured from a doorway; it is measured from the source of the disturbance. While the [applicant claims a ~200-foot buffer](#), the actual source of noise—the parking stalls and vehicle pathway—is significantly closer to our bedroom.

The Discrepancy in Proximity:

- **Applicant Claim:** 186–274 feet from the auditorium entrance to nearby homes.
- **Physical Reality:** Parking and idling noise occurs as close as **30 feet** (16793 Farley Rd), **42 feet** (16771 Corcel Ct), and **47 feet** (16760 Chirco Dr). (See Google map images below)

Technical Flaws in the [April 2025](#) Noise Analysis:

The current study is insufficient for a residential "quiet hours" expansion for two reasons:

1. **Averages vs. Peaks:** The study uses Leq (average noise), which mathematically "hides" the very disturbances that wake residents. A car door slam or engine start at 30 feet measures 65–70 dBA. Even if the average noise stays low, these individual Lmax (peak) events at 4:00 AM are "startle noises" that violate the 45 dBA interior sleep threshold and the 100-foot sleep protection zone (Code Sec. 16.20.010).
2. **Lack of Peak Data:** The analysis was not conducted during high-intensity periods, such as Ramadan nights, when the frequency of these peak noise events is highest.

Requested Conditions of Approval:


If the Commission considers this modification, I request the following protections be mandated:



1. **Mandatory 100-Foot Nighttime No-Parking Buffer:** To ensure compliance with **Municipal Code Sec. 16.20.010**, which prohibits activities that disrupt rest within 100 feet of a sleeping quarters between 10:00 PM and 8:00 AM, the Town must **prohibit all parking and vehicle idling within 100 feet** of any residential property line during these hours. As my data shows, current parking stalls at 30–56 feet are well within this protected zone and cannot be used without disrupting resident rest.
2. **Physical Barriers:** Require the applicant to install **permanent signage and physical bollards/chains** to close off these restricted stalls during the requested pre-dawn and late-night hours. Relying on "attendee cooperation" is not an enforceable mitigation measure.
3. **Updated Acoustical Study:** Require a study that specifically measures **Lmax (Peak) events** (Ramadan) at the property line to ensure they do not exceed the 45 dBA interior limit during quiet hours.

We ask the Commission to prioritize the "quiet enjoyment" and health of long-standing residents over the intensification of this institutional use.

Dear Planning Commission:

We are writing as concerned residents and nearby neighbors to formally oppose the requested modification to the Conditional Use Permit (U-24-010) for the West Valley Muslim Association (WVMA). I am a senior citizen who has lived in my home for 55 years!

Until now, our street has been wonderfully quiet but Farley Road now resembles El Camino Real. I am too scared to cross Farley Road on foot at all times of the year due to WVMA's intensity of activities which occur night and day, Ramadan, and services on Fridays for four hours.

Please take our public safety concerns into account and make Farley Road safe again year round so I can visit my friend who lives on Izorah Way without fearing I will be hit by a car as someone speeds to the applicant's facility routinely to make it on time.

We neighbors suggested shuttles during Ramadan but the applicant was unwilling to consider. The applicant's justification for dismissing a Park and Ride/Shuttle program focuses primarily on internal convenience and organizational preference. However, a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) is a contract with the Town to ensure that a project's intensity does not overwhelm the surrounding residential neighborhood. The "burdens" described by the applicant do not outweigh the Town's responsibility to protect public safety and neighborhood quietude.

1. Operational Convenience vs. Public Safety

The applicant claims that shuttles are a "substantial burden" due to the late hours of Ramadan. While we respect the observance of faith, the **physical constraints of Farley Road** do not change based on the calendar. If the facility cannot accommodate the proposed 450+ attendees without causing traffic gridlock or safety hazards for emergency vehicles, the burden should fall on the applicant to manage their capacity—not on the neighborhood to absorb the overflow.

2. The "Shuttle Swarm" Logic is Flawed

The applicant argues that moving 450 people would require 25 shuttles simultaneously. This actually highlights the core issue: **Farley Road cannot handle 450 people arriving at the same time.** If 12–25 shuttles create a "swarm" that is too loud or disruptive for the neighborhood, then 150+ individual private vehicles (many idling, searching for parking, or doors slamming) create a far more chaotic and permanent impact on residents.

3. Noise Comparison: Shuttles vs. Individual Cars

The applicant suggests shuttles are louder than EVs. However, one modern, professional shuttle replaces 10 to 15 individual car trips. The noise of a single shuttle passing by is objectively less disruptive than 15 separate cars navigating narrow streets, high-beam lights shining into bedroom windows, and the cumulative noise of dozens of people walking from distant street-parked cars to the facility.

4. Accommodating Vulnerable Populations

The applicant mentions the elderly and disabled as a reason to avoid shuttles. In standard transit planning, shuttles are actually a preferred method for accessibility, as they can provide door-to-door drop-

off at the facility entrance, sparing those with mobility issues from walking long distances from overflow street parking on dark residential hills.

5. Financial/Administrative Challenges

Under California land-use law, the financial cost to an applicant to mitigate the impacts of their project is not a valid reason to waive safety or parking requirements. Most high-intensity uses in residential zones (schools, clubs, churches) are required to fund and manage their own traffic mitigation. The applicant's reliance on donations does not exempt them from the standard mitigation costs required of any other developer or organization in Los Gatos.

Conclusion

If the applicant finds a Park and Ride program "impractical," the logical solution is to limit the attendance capacity to a number that the onsite parking can safely support. The neighborhood should not be forced to provide "de facto" parking for a surge in attendance that the facility's own infrastructure cannot handle.

I am writing to formally submit my opposition to the proposed CUP modification for the property at 16769 Farley Drive.

As part of the record for this application, I would like to direct the Commission's attention to a public statement made by the applicant's Executive Director, Lubna Shaikh, in a recent [video](#) regarding this project.

At the 2:48 – 2:55 timestamp, the Executive Director states: "It's so rewarding, but your neighbors hate you."

While the applicant chooses to characterize neighborhood concerns as "hate," this admission is a critical piece of evidence for the Commission's decision-making process:

1. Confirmation of Detriment (Town Code 29.20.190): The Town Code is clear that a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) must not be detrimental to the health, safety, or general welfare of the neighborhood. By the applicant's own admission, the current operation has already created a significant, documented conflict. If the applicant acknowledges such a negative impact on the residents, then any expansion of hours or intensity is, by definition, detrimental to the general welfare.
2. Failure to "Blend" (General Plan Policy LU-1.4): Our General Plan requires that non-residential uses in residential zones must "blend and not compete" with the surrounding neighborhood. A project that the director admits is in such deep conflict with its neighbors has already failed this standard.
3. Objective Impacts vs. "Hate": Our opposition is not personal; it is based on the preservation of the quiet enjoyment of our homes. We object because the proposed expansion of hours and intensity on a narrow residential street like Farley Drive is incompatible with the safety and character of our community.

If the current scale of the operation is already admittedly problematic for the neighborhood, the Planning Commission has no legal or planning basis to approve an increase in that activity.

I urge the Commission to deny this modification and uphold the protections of the Los Gatos Town Code and General Plan.

The applicant's testimony regarding their "Decades Long Extensive Search" ([Pages 5-7](#)) provides the clearest evidence for why this CUP modification should be denied. We urge the Commission to consider the applicant's own admissions as follows:

1. "Zoning Restrictions" Exist for a Reason

The applicant admits they struggled with zoning laws that "limit usage to residential areas" for religious facilities. These laws are not "obstacles" to be overcome; they are essential protections for residents. By the applicant's own admission, they chose a site in a strictly residential zone because they could not find or afford a commercial or industrial site. The residents of Farley Road should not be forced to bear commercial-level impacts simply because the applicant found residential land to be their only affordable option.

2. Land Cost vs. Neighborhood Character

The applicant notes that "increased land values" made it difficult to acquire larger properties. However, an inability to afford a properly sized commercial lot does not grant an applicant a "discount" on neighborhood compatibility. Financial constraints do not change the physical capacity of Farley Road. If the applicant cannot afford a site that fits 450 people, they must limit their attendance to fit the site they actually purchased. A residential neighborhood is not an "overflow parking lot" for an organization that has outgrown its footprint.

3. The "Mere Chance" Admission

The applicant states they "happened on the Los Gatos facility by mere chance" after a developer's plan for 10-17 homes faced "stiff opposition." This proves the applicant was fully aware that the neighborhood was already sensitive to density and traffic impacts. By proposing an intensity of use (450+ people) that far exceeds the impact of those 17 homes, the applicant is disregarding the very residential standards they knew existed when they acquired the property.

4. The "Buyer Beware" Principle

The applicant admits they purchased the Farley Road property knowing it was an "existing religious facility" with a specific, limited CUP. They chose to buy into a fixed footprint and a specific neighborhood context. An organization's growth beyond that established capacity

is a reason to find a larger, appropriately zoned site—not a reason to force a quiet residential neighborhood to accept commercial-level traffic and noise.

5. The Saratoga Comparison Proves the Point

The applicant argues their use of the Saratoga Prospect Center is "compatible" with residential life. However, that site is a City-owned facility on 2.6 acres with 150 parking spots. If the applicant requires a facility of that scale to operate effectively, it proves that the Farley Road site—which is tucked deep into a residential street—is fundamentally the wrong location for this level of expansion.

6. False Equivalency: Saratoga Prospect Center vs. Farley Road

Comparing the Saratoga rental to the Farley Road property is an "apples-to-oranges" argument. The Saratoga site is a public facility with different ingress/egress patterns designed for high turnover. Farley Road is a narrow residential street where sound echoes and traffic bottlenecks uniquely. Successful management of a rented hall for limited hours does not prove that a permanent, high-intensity expansion here will avoid a devastating cumulative impact on the neighbors who live here 365 days a year.

7. Operational Convenience vs. Land-Use Impacts

The applicant cites the "burden" of setting up and tearing down at the Saratoga Prospect Center as a justification for expanding their Los Gatos site. However, internal operational convenience for an applicant is not a valid basis for a CUP modification. The Town's responsibility is to mitigate external impacts on the residents—such as noise, traffic, and safety—not to solve the applicant's logistical preferences or "labor-intensiveness." If their current facility requires staggered prayers and rented space to function, it confirms the project has already reached its "by-right" capacity at the Farley Road location.

Conclusion

The applicant is asking the Town to be "lenient" on zoning and safety standards because they had a hard time finding a building and find renting space inconvenient. In a Residential Zone, there is no room for leniency regarding traffic safety, noise, and the "quiet enjoyment" of our homes. We ask the Planning Commission to uphold the integrity of the R-1 zone and deny this modification.

Dear Planning Commission Members,

I am writing to provide specific technical evidence regarding the proposed CUP modification for 16769 Farley Road. Based on the applicant's own "Response to Staff Technical Review," there is a dangerous discrepancy between the building's actual occupancy capacity and the provided on-site parking.

1. The "Fixed Seating" Calculation Gap

This is a critical point for the Commission to consider: Most Town parking requirements are historically based on fixed seating or a lower "concentrated" occupancy. However, the applicant's technical data confirms that without chairs—the primary mode of use, as shown in the attached photo—the total occupancy for the three prayer halls jumps to 1,217 persons.

2. The 124-Space Parking Deficit

Under standard planning ratios for assembly uses (typically 1 space per 4 occupants), a 1,217-person capacity would require 304 parking spaces.

- The site currently only provides 180 parking spaces.
- This represents a 40% deficit (124 spaces) that will inevitably overflow into the narrow residential streets of the Farley Road neighborhood during the requested late-night and early-morning Ramadan hours.

3. Misleading "Seated" Calculations

The applicant's data lists a "seated" occupancy of 869. However, the attached photo from their website proves that the facility functions as an unconcentrated assembly space. Approving a permit modification based on "seated" numbers—when the actual usage reaches 1,217 people—is a failure of land-use oversight that compromises neighborhood traffic safety.

4. Fire Safety and Egress

With a documented capacity of 1,217 people, this facility moves into a higher tier of Fire Code requirements. I request that the Town and Fire Marshal confirm:

- Does the current infrastructure (exit widths, alarm systems, and sprinklers) meet the 1,217-person threshold, or was it only permitted for a lower seated capacity?
- How can the Town ensure that "unconcentrated" crowds do not block required emergency egress paths during peak prayer times?

Requested Action:

I urge the Commission to deny the modification until the applicant provides a verified Parking Management Plan that accounts for the full 1,217-person occupancy, rather than a

lower "concentrated" or seated figure. Alternatively, the Town should impose a legally binding cap on attendance that matches the 180 available parking spaces (approximately 720 persons). See photos below.

We're writing to share a safety-focused recommendation regarding the exit traffic pattern at 16769 Farley Road, currently under review for a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) modification.

Currently, vehicles exiting the property primarily turn right (see attached photo), which sends surges of traffic into a quiet residential neighborhood with narrow streets and minimal lighting. We propose that as part of the updated permit, the Town implement a left-turn-only exit toward Los Gatos Boulevard for the following reasons:


- Proximity to Commercial Scale Infrastructure: Los Gatos Boulevard is only ~800 feet from the mosque exit. It is a commercial-grade artery designed to handle high volumes, whereas the residential "feeder" streets to the right are not.
- Enhanced Visibility and Safety: Unlike the interior neighborhood streets, Los Gatos Boulevard is well-lit and features signalized intersections. Directing 100% of exiting traffic toward this corridor reduces the risk of accidents in dark residential areas.
- Neighbor Mitigation: A left-turn-only requirement effectively protects the neighborhood from "cut-through" traffic, noise, and headlights, directly addressing the core concerns raised by residents during this CUP process.

Regardless of whether the current exit pattern is a private initiative or a prior town requirement, a formal "left-turn only" mandate would align with the [Town's Local Roadway Safety Plan \(LRSP\)](#) by utilizing the safest, most efficient route for high-volume periods.

Twenty-two vehicles came in at approximately 6:20 am and left at 6:40 am today 3/18/26. WVMA violates the Town's allowed R-1 operating hours daily. I assume people are coming for dawn prayers. (attached is a short video "CarsexitWVMAMar18_640am.mov" of two cars exiting at 6:40 am. You can also see the headlights of additional cars coming out through the entrance at the opposite side of the property and their headlights hitting the tree across the street; our porch camera doesn't capture that direction.) I have also attached a longer video ("IMG_7112.2") with a different vantage point that captures 22 cars exiting through WVMA's entrance driveway at 6:40 am. The video is five minutes but the majority of vehicles depart at the 1:28 mark.

In regards to the 3/15/26 curfew violation, attached below is a video showing cars leaving past 11 pm both through the exit (next to our residence) and through the entrance driveway. Dear Commissioners,

I am writing to formally oppose the requested modification of hours for Application U-24-010. The intensification of use—documented at a maximum standing capacity of 1,217 people—presents an unmitigated risk to the safety of the Farley Road corridor and its surrounding residential network.

As Los Gatos has recently established its first Emergency Management Division and issued an RFP for a Town-wide [Evacuation Plan and Traffic Model](#), it is premature and dangerous to approve an expansion of this magnitude without a site-specific version of the same rigor.

1. Conflict with the Local Roadway Safety Plan (LRSP)

The [Town's Local Roadway Safety Plan](#) identifies the protection of "vulnerable road users" as a top priority. Farley Road is a critical "Safe Route to School" for students attending [Los Gatos High School](#) and nearby schools.

- The "Lingering" Risk: While the applicant requests a 4:00 AM start, communal activities and departures from a 1,200+ person assembly will inevitably linger into the 6:30 AM–8:00 AM peak school commute window.
- Safety Data: The LRSP mandates data-driven decisions to reduce collisions. Increasing high-occupancy vehicle turnover on a narrow residential street during school hours creates "near-miss" conditions that the LRSP is specifically designed to prevent.

2. Infrastructure Failure, Parking Deficit, and Fire Safety

Under [Los Gatos Town Code Section 29.10.150](#), religious assembly requires 1 on-site parking space for every 4 occupants.

- The Deficit: A capacity of 1,217 people requires 304 on-site parking spaces. The applicant provides only a fraction of this, forcing hundreds of cars into unsafe street parking.
- Fire Access: In this [High Fire Hazard Severity Zone](#), this overflow narrows Farley Road and obstructs [Santa Clara County Fire Department](#) access. Per Town Policy HAZ-3.4, development must be restricted in areas with inadequate emergency access.

3. Federal "Equal Terms" (RLUIPA) Compliance

Under the [Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act \(RLUIPA\)](#), the Town must treat religious and secular assemblies on Equal Terms. If the Town would deny a secular "event center" of 1,217 people the right to operate these hours due to traffic and safety impacts, it must apply that same standard here to avoid granting an illegal "special privilege."

4. Demand for Technical Studies and Infrastructure Mitigation

Given these "unusual circumstances," the [CEQA Categorical Exemption](#) is inappropriate. I request that the Commission require the applicant to fund:

- Professional Evacuation & Fire Access Modeling: A licensed fire-protection engineer must prove a 1,217-person surge will not obstruct the "Feeder Street Network" or school commute routes.
- Mandatory Off-Site Infrastructure: The applicant must fund permanent improvements on Farley and the Feeder Network, including Comprehensive Sidewalk Infill, Asphalt Speed Humps, and Enhanced LED Street Lighting for 4:00 AM/12:00 AM visibility.

Conclusion

The Town must prioritize the safety of current residents and students over the expanded operations of a single entity. I request the Commission deny this application until the applicant provides the requested modeling and guarantees funding for the necessary infrastructure.

Good Morning.

I would like to respectfully request that my previous email submission regarding the Farley Road matter be disregarded, as it does not fully reflect my personal observations or views. I have since submitted a separate letter with this email that more accurately represents my position based on my direct experience.

To the Los Gatos Planning Commission,
I am writing to provide an accurate account of my observations regarding the mosque located on Farley Road.

Our home is situated approximately three houses from the property, at the intersection with Izorah Way. My family has lived in this home since 1975, and we are very familiar with the patterns and character of this neighborhood.

Farley Road is zoned for commercial and religious use, and as such, it is reasonable to expect periods of increased activity associated with lawful use of the property, including gatherings and vehicle traffic related to worship services.

Based on my direct observations, individuals attending services conduct themselves in a respectful and orderly manner. They arrive and depart quietly, do not loiter, do not play loud music, and have not littered or caused any property damage to my home. Vehicles park along the public street, including in front of my residence, but have never blocked my driveway or interfered with access.

Traffic associated with services is generally limited in duration. When attendees arrive, any increase in traffic typically lasts no more than approximately 10 minutes and remains quiet and orderly. When services conclude, there is a more concentrated flow of departing vehicles lasting approximately 15 to 20 minutes. During this peak period, the volume of traffic can briefly resemble that of a much busier corridor, similar to El Camino Real.

During this peak departure period, it can be difficult for pedestrians to safely cross the street, as vehicles do not consistently yield. A neighbor who lives on Izorah Way, and who has been a resident longer than I have, has expressed that they feel unsafe attempting to cross during this time due to the steady flow of traffic. This is the primary impact I have observed. However, this condition is temporary and resolves once the flow of vehicles subsides.

Outside of these short intervals, the street returns to normal conditions and remains quiet, with typical neighborhood traffic patterns. In fact, regular traffic from nearby commercial businesses, including the Jack in the Box and tire shop, is more constant and often involves higher speeds than what is observed during mosque-related activity.

In summary, based on my experience and that of my household, the use of this property as a place of worship has been respectful, orderly, and consistent with the zoning of the area. Any impacts are brief, predictable, and limited in duration.

I respectfully ask that the Commission consider these factual observations when evaluating concerns related to this property.

Dear Mayor Moore, Vice Mayor Ristow, Council Members, and Planners,

To make an informed decision on the CUP modification for 16769 Farley Road, the Town must look at the **infrastructure reality** of other regional centers. The applicant is seeking "Regional Center" hours for a site that lacks basic "Neighborhood" safety features.

1. The Zoning Incompatibility

Unlike the Saratoga Musalla (Commercial) or MCA (Industrial), which sit on major 4-to-6-lane boulevards, Farley Road is a narrow, 2-lane residential feeder. There are no streetlights and no sidewalks. Forcing a 4:00 AM surge of 300+ vehicles onto dark residential shoulders is a safety failure that other regional centers simply do not face because they are located in appropriate zones.

2. The "Saratoga Alternative" is the Solution

The applicant already operates a facility in Saratoga that is better suited for 5:00 AM services. They have admitted that using the Saratoga site is merely "logistically challenging." Applicant convenience is not a legal basis for a CUP modification. If the Farley Road site cannot safely accommodate a 4:00 AM surge without violating the Noise Ordinance, the applicant should utilize their commercially-zoned alternative.

3. The 41% Parking Deficit

Regional-scale operations require regional-scale parking. The applicant is 124 spaces short of Town Code. This deficit will force hundreds of visitors to park in front of residents' homes at 4:00 AM. This isn't "outreach"—it's an imposition on the taxpaying families of Los Gatos.

4. Protecting the R-1 Foundation

If the Town allows a 1,217-person assembly (larger than Fisher Middle School) to operate at 4:00 AM, the R-1 zoning designation becomes meaningless. We ask the Town to maintain its commitment to "Small Town Character" and Deny this intensification of use.



Senior City Planner Jocelyn Shoopman and Los Gatos Council Members:

We write you for the third time here (as submitted public comment) in support of the West Valley Muslim Association, which operates the only Mosque in Los Gatos (16769 Farley Road), and thus serves as a critical resource for our Muslim community members for preserving their religious practices and cultural traditions.

It is our understanding that the WVMA is seeking to renew the extended hours of operation of the Mosque under their conditional use permit [CUP], such that they could hold morning (Fajr), evening (Isha), and Ramadan nightly (Taraweeh) prayers in accordance with their faith. *We remain in full support of their request* (extending the hours of their CUP), as the timing and consistency of daily prayer is fundamental to Islamic spiritual practice, and they are the only organization offering such organized prayer services in the city.

However, it is also our understanding that the WVMA is being asked to meet a long list of conditions/requirements in order to extend their CUP, creating substantial burdens that limit their ability to host religious practices and services.

While it is always important to weigh the impacts of such decisions on neighbors and other community members, it seems that WVMA has made every reasonable attempt at public education (to the city and to the community) about the importance of these practices, and have demonstrated a willingness to operate with good faith considerations of noise, traffic, and so forth. Further, we believe that WVMA is within their rights to offer morning, evening, and Ramadan nightly prayer service in accordance with their faith under the Federal Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act (2000), which prohibits the government from substantially burdening religious exercise. *Finally, we find it curious that the WVMA is apparently the first and only such organizational resident to be held to these new conditions/requirements.* We urge you to revert to the original requirements, or that you work directly with the WVMA such that no significant burden is placed on religious practice in securing the CUP.

In sum, we write in support of WVMA's request to extend their hours of operation under their current CUP, without new burdensome conditions/requirements, in order to ensure the ability of Muslim community members in Los Gatos to freely practice their faith. Please do not hesitate to contact us at any time regarding this matter.

I write on behalf of the San Francisco Bay Area office of the Council on American-Islamic Relations (“CAIR-SFBA”), our nation’s largest American Muslim civil rights and advocacy organization. Our mission is to enhance understanding of Islam, protect civil rights, promote justice, and empower American Muslims.

CAIR-SFBA last wrote to this Commission in support of West Valley Muslim Association’s (“WVMA”) request to modify its Conditional Use Permit (“CUP”) for the Los Gatos Islamic Center (“LGIC”), located at 16769 Farley Road, Los Gatos, CA 95032, in December 2024. We are again writing to urge this Commission approve WVMA’s modified Conditional Use Permit, as the modifications are critical to ensuring that WVMA can continue serving congregants in Los Gatos.

WVMA’S IMPACT IN THE LOS GATOS COMMUNITY

As you may already know, WVMA established LGIC, the only mosque in the Town of Los Gatos, in July 2018. The mosque has grown to now serve approximately 150 Muslim families in the West Valley Area. WVMA’s key leadership has resided in the area for over thirty years, and their children and grandchildren were born and raised locally. Muslims live, work, and play in this community, and they also choose to pray here.

MANDATED PRAYER TIMES IN ISLAM

As you may also know, Muslims are required to pray five times daily at certain intervals. These prayer times may vary slightly throughout the year as they are based on the rising and setting of the sun. The morning prayer, *fajr*, must be performed after dawn breaks, but before sunrise. The last prayer of the day, *isha*, is performed once twilight has disappeared or the sky has grown completely dark. There is an additional nightly prayer, *taraweeh*, that Muslims perform during the holy month of *Ramadan* after the conclusion of the aforementioned evening prayer (*isha*).

WASHINGTON D.C.

FEDERAL LAWS PROTECT RELIGIOUS ASSEMBLIES AND INSTITUTIONS

The Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act (“RLUIPA”) protects people of all faiths and their institutions from unduly burdensome or discriminatory land use regulations.

RLUIPA prohibits governments from unreasonably limiting religious assemblies, institutions, or structures within their jurisdiction.¹ RLUIPA also prohibits governments from implementing land use regulations that impose a “substantial burden” on religious exercise, unless justified by a “compelling governmental interest” using the least restrictive means possible.² A substantial burden exists where “the governmental authority puts substantial pressure on an adherent to modify his behavior and to violate his beliefs”³; or where government imposes a significantly great restriction on religious use of a property.⁴

“Religious exercise” under RLUIPA includes any exercise of religion, “whether or not compelled by, or central to, a system of religious belief.”⁵ The use of real property for purposes of religious exercise is itself considered to be a religious exercise.⁶

The modifications WVMA has requested to their existing CUP align with the Town’s stated desires to “invigorate Los Gatos as a special place for community gathering.”⁷ Accommodating these modifications would send a strong message that the Los Gatos is indeed committed to valuing its goals of promoting diversity and equity.⁸

CAIR-SFBA urges the Planning Commission to take care not to violate the law by placing excessive or unreasonable burdens on the constitutionally protected right of Muslims to exercise their faith in Los Gatos.

We appreciate your attention to this issue, your support of West Valley Muslim Association’s request to modify its Conditional Use Permit for the Los Gatos Islamic Center, and your continued engagement with your local Muslim community.

Dear Planning Commission,

In support of our formal opposition to the proposed [CUP modification for 16769 Farley Rd](#), I am submitting three pieces of video evidence that document immediate and recurring violations of Town Code and public safety standards.

1. Violation of Lighting Ordinance: Headlight Glare and Light Trespass

- The Evidence: Video shows car headlights beaming directly into residential bedroom windows during late-night hours.
- Legal Conflict: [Los Gatos Town Code Section 29.10.090](#) mandates that all lighting be shielded and directed so it "does not spill light onto neighboring parcels or produce glare when seen from nearby homes."
- The Issue: The current exit pattern creates a "light nuisance" that destroys the quiet enjoyment of R-1 homes. Expanding hours will exacerbate this daily violation of the Town's lighting standards.

2. Failure of Parking Mitigation: Illegal Overflow on Farley Road

- The Evidence: Video shows a mosque traffic controller turning vehicles away because the lot is at capacity, yet dozens of cars are filmed lining up on Farley Road to find street parking.
- Legal Conflict: Per [Town Development Standards](#), conditional uses must provide adequate on-site parking to prevent neighborhood intrusion.
- The Issue: The applicant's "honor system" for parking is already failing. Directing overflow into an R-1 zone that lacks sidewalks and streetlights is a radical intensification of use that the current infrastructure cannot support.

3. Pedestrian Safety Hazard: Attendees Walking in Roadway

- The Evidence: Video captures mosque attendees walking in the center of Farley Road due to the total lack of sidewalks.
- Legal Conflict: [California Vehicle Code 21956](#) requires pedestrians to walk close to the left-hand edge of the roadway when sidewalks are unavailable.
- The Issue: The "regional scale" of this assembly is creating a high-risk pedestrian-vehicle conflict. Forcing 1,200 people onto dark, sidewalk-less streets is a direct violation of the [Town's Local Roadway Safety Plan \(LRSP\)](#).

These videos prove that the applicant is currently unable to comply with basic safety and zoning requirements.

We urge the Commission to deny any modification that would further jeopardize the safety of Los Gatos residents.

I am a lifelong resident of Los Gatos writing regarding the West Valley Muslim Association's (WVMA) request to modify their existing Conditional Use Permit (U-24-010) to allow limited expanded hours of operation, particularly during Ramadan, for religious observances such as pre-dawn Fajr prayers and evening Taraweeh prayers/iftars.

I would be inclined to support the approval, provided the applicant meets standard CUP expectations for any institutional use in a residential zone—specifically addressing parking enforcement, and noise through clear, verifiable, and enforceable conditions.

1. **Parking Requirements and Enforcement**

The facility has 180 onsite parking spaces, which is obviously insufficient for peak attendance.

- The applicant shall fully accommodate additional parking needs **onsite, or through a definitive, enforceable off-site parking plan.**
- **No street parking** shall be permitted in the surrounding residential neighborhood at any time by the applicant.
- The Town shall install and maintain appropriate **permanent "No Parking" signs** on affected streets.
- The Police Department shall enforce these restrictions through regular patrols, similar to other residential parking rules or CUP conditions.

These measures ensure compliance mirrors what is required of any other applicant generating traffic in similar zones.

2. **Noise Compliance and Monitoring**

Expanded hours must adhere strictly to the Town's noise ordinance (Chapter 16), including the 10:00 p.m. curfew for disturbing noises and property-line dBA limits in residential areas. No exemptions should apply—the applicant is subject to the same standards and enforcement as any other entity.

To verify compliance proactively: **Sound Level Monitoring and Reporting Requirement**

To verify ongoing compliance with Chapter 16 (Noise Ordinance) of the Los Gatos

Municipal Code—including the 10:00 p.m. curfew for disturbing noises (§ 16.20.010), exterior property-line noise limits (§ 16.20.015), and prohibitions on excessive or unreasonable sounds—the applicant shall implement a sound level monitoring program during periods of extended or high-attendance operations (e.g., Ramadan nights or any events extending beyond 10:00 p.m.).

- Monitoring shall use a calibrated Class 2 or higher sound level meter (meeting IEC 61672-1 or ANSI S1.4 standards, with A-weighting and slow response time).
- Spot measurements at representative property line locations closest to residences, during peak departure/activity times after 10:00 p.m.
- Submit a **Noise Monitoring Report** quarterly (within 30 days after quarter-end) with data tables, compliance summary, any exceedance explanations/corrections, and certification under penalty of perjury.
- Failure to monitor/report/address issues shall constitute a CUP violation.

These measures ensure compliance mirrors what is required of any other applicant generating sound or noise in similar zones.

Promotion of Fairness: By adopting the measures any applicant would have to abide by, the applicant is able to serve its congregation during key religious times, and the legitimate concerns of neighbors who have been impacted by the applicant's use, would certainly be calmed. Seems fair to me.

Thank you for your thorough review. I look forward to a balanced outcome at the March 25, 2026, hearing.

Dear Planning Commission,

As a resident who shares a direct property line and fence with 16769 Farley Rd, I am submitting additional evidence that this location is objectively unsuitable for the intensity of use the applicant is requesting in the pending CUP modification (U-24-010).

Direct Impact on Neighborhood Safety and Quality of Life I have three young children, all under the age of seven. Like many families in this neighborhood, our kids love riding their bikes on our street and playing with their friends. We also rely on a quiet, peaceful environment in the evenings so they can go to sleep early. Currently, our road is frequently choked with overcapacity parked cars, creating unsafe blind spots and hazards for children at play. Furthermore, the nighttime noise directly disrupts our family's rest. We need our street cleared of this overflow parking and the nighttime noise mitigated, not permanently increased.

Implicit Acknowledgment of Capacity Limits For the upcoming Eid al-Fitr 2026 celebration, the applicant has moved its primary high-capacity events to West Valley College and the Saratoga Musalla. This decision is a direct, implicit acknowledgment that the R-1 residential infrastructure on Farley Road cannot safely or legally support their full congregation for regional-scale events.

Ready Alternatives Exist Under RLUIPA standards, the Town is not "substantially burdening" religious exercise by denying an expansion if the applicant has ready alternatives. The successful relocation of Eid activities proves that the applicant has access to appropriate, higher-capacity venues in the immediate area. Therefore, any claim that they must expand their operations in a quiet residential pocket to fulfill their mission is legally and logically flawed.

Conclusion If the applicant cannot host their own most significant event at this site due to infrastructure limitations, the Town should not grant a permanent permit modification that allows "regional-scale" surges on a daily basis. I urge the Commission to prioritize the safety of our children and the quiet of our neighborhood by denying the modification and maintaining the 2020 CUP protections.











Subject: Formal Opposition to CUP Modification for 16769 Farley Road (WVMA) and Request for Use Intensity Audit

To the Members of the Planning Commission,

This letter serves as a formal objection to the proposed modification of the **Conditional Use Permit (CUP)** for 16769 Farley Road. We request that the Commission not only **deny the extension of operating hours** but also initiate a formal review of the existing permit due to a documented "Material Change in Use" that is fundamentally incompatible with the **R-1 Residential Zone**.

1. Failure to Conform to R-1 Zoning (Section 16.20.010)

The R-1 designation is intended to protect residential tranquility. The current "stadium-scale" impact—characterized by concentrated surges of hundreds of vehicles—violates the spirit and letter of **Town Code 16.20.010**. The noise, light pollution, and traffic congestion occurring 52 weeks a year, peaking during the 30 nights of Ramadan, constitute a public nuisance that exceeds the environmental capacity of a narrow residential street.

2. Distinction from Precedent Use

The "grandfathered" intensity established by the previous occupant (Jehovah's Witnesses) was based on a low-frequency, low-impact model. The current use represents a significant escalation in **frequency, peaking, and duration**. A CUP is a contract with the neighborhood; when the intensity of use scales beyond the infrastructure's ability to safely support it, the permit must be restricted, not expanded.

3. Safety and Emergency Access Concerns

Farley Road was not engineered for regional-scale assembly. The nightly "torrent of traffic" creates significant safety hazards for local pedestrians and threatens to impede emergency vehicle access during peak arrival and departure windows. We have documented instances where the sheer volume of vehicles renders the street impassable for residents.

4. Request for Action

We respectfully urge the Commission to:

- **Deny the request** to extend operating hours to 11:00 p.m., as the current 10:00 p.m. limit is already a significant burden.
- **Commission an independent Traffic and Safety Audit** that measures actual peak-hour volumes rather than theoretical averages.
- **Enforce existing CUP conditions** strictly, with clear penalties for noise and traffic violations.

The neighborhood's quiet enjoyment is not a secondary concern; it is the primary purpose of R-1 zoning. We ask the Town to prioritize the safety and stability of its residents over the unsustainable expansion of a high-intensity use in a low-density area.

Dear Ms. Kendra Burch and Planning Commission Members:

This law firm represents James and Kimberly Ratcliff, who own and reside in a single family residence immediately adjacent to 16769 Farley Road, Los Gatos (the "Subject Property.") We previously wrote letters to the Los Gatos Planning Department on November 2, 2025, and March 9, 2026, regarding our clients' opposition to the above referenced conditional use permit application. Those letters are attached hereto as **Attachment A** (the November 4, 2025, letter) and **Attachment B** (the March 9, 2026, letter) and are incorporated herein by reference.

The Ratcliffs live next door to West Valley Muslim Association ("WVMA") on Farley Road, a small street with no sidewalks, no lighting, no roadway striping. The Ratcliffs and WVMA coexisted peacefully for many years until 2024, when WVMA ceased compliance with its conditional use permit ("CUP") and the ordinances of the Town of Los Gatos ("Town").

In 2020, WVMA obtained a CUP modification allowing late night use until 10:00 p.m., or 11:00 p.m. during Ramadan. (Town of Los Gatos Conditional Use Permit U-24-010.) This CUP modification was granted by the Planning Commission in reliance on a statement by WVMA, included in the 2020 Staff Report, that the facility was to be used by 10 to 25 members for late night prayers during Ramadan, with no increase to traffic or required parking. (**Attachment C**, Town of Los Gatos Planning Commission Report, Meeting Date 3/11/2020, Item No. 2, at page 3.)

Despite these assurances, since 2024 WVMA has hosted nearly 1,000 attendees at its peak times, and, in its routine daily operations, regularly hosts several hundred attendees with programming ending after its already-extended curfew. Its attendees quickly fill its 180-space parking lot, forcing hundreds of cars to park in the neighborhood's streets. This causes roadway congestion to the point emergency vehicles cannot get through; blocking residents' access to their own driveways; increasing noise, light, and emissions pollution; and reducing pedestrian access on this sidewalk-less street making it unsafe for residents, especially children and seniors, to take walks in their own neighborhood.

In July 2024, a violation notice was issued to WVMA regarding the violation of its CUP and the Town Code, included hereto as **Attachment D**. Instead of changing its operations to comply with the Town Code and its CUP, WVMA continues to provide services beyond its capacity to the detriment of the neighborhood, and filed its current application to again modify its CUP seeking approval to operate up to 20-hours per day, with hundreds of cars street-parking on residential roads.

Our clients oppose the proposed modification of WVMA's existing conditional use permit to allow late night and early morning assembly usage within the R-1 Residential Zone for the following reasons:

1. Applicant West Valley Muslim Association has previously and repeatedly violated the terms of its existing Conditional Use Permit U-24-010. Accordingly, rather than expanding the scope of conditionally permitted uses upon the Subject Property, the Town of Los Gatos should suspend or otherwise enforce the existing CUP.
2. The Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act ("RLUIPA") does not apply to this Project, because WVMA has not demonstrated that any other owner or user of real property within an R-1 District in the Town has been granted lawful permission to conduct assembly and/or worship services during the early morning hours prior to 8:00 am or during the late night hours after 10:00 pm, and denial of WVMA's application (i.e., which would simply maintain the *status quo ante*) would not substantially burden religious practices.
3. The CUP modification application is neither statutorily nor categorically exempt from environmental review and instead requires full environmental review. The proposal to modify the CUP would allow expanded after hours assembly use in an R-1 Residential District in the Town is a "project" as defined in the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA"), which would materially increase the intensity of use on the Subject Property and cause significant environmental impact. As such, the CEQA process must be followed.

Please refer to **Attachment A** for an in-depth analysis of the above stated reasons for our client's opposition.

Our clients are not opposing WVMA's use of the 2020 CUP. The Ratcliffs acknowledge WVMA's existing rights under the CUP, while urging the Town to enforce the existing limitations within the CUP and the Town Code.

A. The Town may enforce WVMA's existing CUP and deny its modification request without infringing WVMA's rights.

1. The Town may enforce its reasonable, neutral ordinances on all properties, whether operated for religious or non-religious purposes, within the Town

WVMA has expanded its use both in hours of operation and in the number of attendees it hosts impermissibly. To the extent WVMA invokes RLUIPA as a rationale for allowing its expanded use with impunity, note that RLUIPA does not create a right to special treatment. (See *New Harvest Christian Fellowship v. City of Salinas*, (9th Cir. 2022) 29 F.4th 596, 604

(factoring only whether the City's zoning provision impermissibly treated religious organizations on less than equal terms with a nonreligious assembly or institution.)

The Town may permissibly enforce its existing reasonable limitations on noise and operating hours where no other religious or non-religious entity is allowed to operate past 11:00 p.m. or before 8:00 a.m. in an R-1 neighborhood.

2. WVMA's practice of religion is not substantially burdened by reasonably operating hours and occupancy limits

To the extent WVMA contends that limiting its hours of operation and attendee capacity in conformance with its existing CUP and the Town Code burdens its religious practice, RLUIPA precludes only a *substantial* burden. "[A] substantial burden must place more than inconvenience on religious exercise." (*New Harvest Christian Fellowship v. City of Salinas* (9th Cir. 2022) 29 F.4th 596, 602).

WVMA is not prohibited from conducting its services in the building, and the Town's limits to hours and occupancy are merely inconveniences to WVMA. (*New Harvest Christian Fellowship v. City of Salinas* (9th Cir. 2022) 29 F.4th 596, 602 (finding no substantial burden when compliance with zoning rules would necessarily reduce attendee capacity, nor when live music services were limited to a space within the building with poor acoustics, noting the church purchased the space with full knowledge of its restrictive zoning).)

In fact, WVMA operated for several years in compliance with the Town Code and its CUP. Therefore, the Town does not place an impermissible burden on WVMA by enforcing its Code and the existing CUP. Further, the Town does not place a substantial burden on WVMA by denying the CUP modification application. WVMA has no right to a CUP modification. (see *Sounhein v. City of San Dimas* (1996) 47 Cal.App.4th 1181, 1187 (explaining a CUP is not granted as a matter of right)).

In contrast, the residents of the neighborhood do have an ancient right to quiet enjoyment of their property (*Greater Westchester Homeowners Assn. v. City of Los Angeles* (1979) 26 Cal.3d 86, 91) as well as the **safe**, navigable roadways the Town Code aims to ensure, discussed below.

3. No conditional use permit for the Subject Property contemplates the current level of use and no special consideration must be given to the current occupants

To the extent WVMA argues that the fire-code permits occupancy of up to 600-800 people based on the buildings size and other characteristics, neither the current nor proceeding CUPs for the land establish a use consistent with hosting that volume of attendees simultaneously, let alone on a daily basis from before sunrise and well into the night.

A CUP was issued in 1990 to allow the construction of a library and a hallway within the facility. Such library use did not contemplate an increase to the number of individuals hosted at the site at any given time commensurate with any increased square footage. (**Attachment C.**) If increased occupancy was intended to be approved in 1990, such occupancy and considerations for additional parking would have been stated. Because the

CUP is silent as to occupancy and no increase to parking was required, it follows that the library was intended to be an expansion of services to the existing congregation, not to support an expansion. Fire code limits should not and do not establish reasonable occupancy limits for zoning purposes.

Conditions of approval for CUPs “must relate to the property and not to the particular applicant.” (*Sounhein v. City of San Dimas* (1996) 47 Cal.App.4th 1181, 1187.) As such, there is no need for the conditions set on the land in 1990 or in 2020 when the CUP was modified to be further modified for the convenience of the applicant.

Several other Bay Area cities have contended with these very issues and maintain CUPs restricting use of religious facilities in residential zones to reasonable hours of the day, with limited numbers of attendees. For instance, the City of Campbell has placed restrictions on a property at 400 Budd Avenue currently used as a mosque, limiting congregation use to Wednesdays from 7:30 pm. to 8:30 p.m., and Sundays from 10:30 a.m. to 11:30 p.m. In South San Francisco, a property used as a mosque at 373 Alta Vista Dr, is limited to operating until 10:00 p.m. daily, and must apply for expanded use during Ramadan annually. And in Berkeley, a property at 2716 Derby St. now used as a mosque, restricts use from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., and further caps the number of attendees on Friday nights to 100 people.

There is no requirement that municipalities continually modify use permits such that they are tailored to the preferences of each landowner or possessor, rather municipalities are free to maintain the reasonable restrictions placed at inception of the existing conditional uses.

B. WVMA’s current, impermissible operations violate the existing CUP and Town Code, while causing significant noise and safety issues in the residential neighborhood

1. Our clients have long endured unreasonable noise disturbances preventing them from enjoying their homes.

WVMA’s existing CUP specifies operating hours until 10:00 p.m., or 11:00 p.m. during Ramadan. However, WVMA routinely operates its services past 10:00 p.m. during times other than Ramadan. Even after the July 2024 notice of violation, WVMA failed to conform its use to the CUP and Town Code and instead continues to operate from pre-dawn to past 11:00 p.m. regularly. The late-night noise has been particularly disruptive to our client’s sleep schedules, which interferes with our client Jim Ratcliff’s ability to serve the community in his role as a surgeon and made our client Kim’s recent battle with cancer a more difficult fight than it would have been otherwise. Additionally, because WVMA does not provide notice of its events to its neighbors, our Clients have experienced disruptions to the private events they host in their home. They live with uncertainty when inviting guests as to whether they will be forced indoors or to contend with the noise from the large-scale public events next-door, or if they will actually be able to host in peace.

According to the [2025 WVMA Los Gatos & Saratoga prayer schedule](#) (“Prayer Schedule”) linked in Applicant’s Revised Justification Letter, in 2025, there were 70 dates outside of Ramadan where prayers were scheduled to begin at or after 10:00 p.m., and another 21 dates where prayers were scheduled within 20 mins of 10:00 p.m. WVMA also has

recurring programming scheduled every weeknight until 10:00 p.m. on an ongoing, indefinite basis.

Morning operating hours are not contemplated in the existing CUP, **therefore the Town Code's 8:00 a.m. curfew controls.** (Town Code, Section 16.20.010.) WVMA flagrantly violates the Town Code operating with daily early morning services, including 104 dates in 2025 where prayers were scheduled to start before 5:00 a.m., and 255 dates where prayers were scheduled to start before 6:00 a.m. (Prayer Schedule.)

These early morning and late night operations create unreasonable noise disturbances from the streams of traffic and pedestrians moving through the neighborhood, loud talking, slamming car doors and trunks, folding strollers, and engaging car locks causing their car alarms to chirp or even go off. When the operations are bookended this way, and as WVMA proposes continue in its modification application, that leaves only four to five hours of peace per day.

Our clients and their neighbors have for too long endured instances of amplified services emanating from the facility's open windows and doors, screaming and other ruckus from unsupervised teenagers and children, drumming and music as early as 6:00 a.m., as well as the streams of car and pedestrian traffic multiple times per day every day. WVMA routinely schedules outdoor events with no notice to neighbors and preventing our clients' quiet enjoyment of their home and yards.

WVMA purchased this property knowing it was a small facility, on a small road, in a quiet residential community, and it operated quietly until 2024. Our clients seek the Town's assistance in returning the character of the residential community by enforcing the existing CUP and by denying the CUP modification.

2. WVMA's reliance on street-parking is an unsafe and untenable solution which violates the Town Code.

In its justification letter, WVMA describes in detail why it will not consider any parking solution other than allowing the hundreds of cars belonging to its attendees and members to descend upon the neighborhood parking in front of homes and driveways across several blocks. Town Code prohibits expansion of use without increasing the number of off-street parking spaces commensurate with the increased use. (Sec. 29.10.145.) As a result, WVMA's current unpermitted expansion of use is in violation of Town Code, and approval of its modification application would ensure continuing violations.

The Town's limits on street parking are necessary to prevent obstructions to roadways and unsafe and unnecessary interactions between cars and pedestrians. WVMA's current reliance on street parking creates roadway obstructions as well as unsafe pedestrian conditions.

In at least one instance, Los Gatos Police vehicles were unable to get through Farley Road because both sides of the street were fully parked and the travel lanes were at a standstill. The same could be true in the future for fire and emergency medical services, placing life and property at risk.

Further, WVMA has at times allowed vehicles connected to its operations to double park on the road in front of its facility. Because Farley Road is so narrow, double parking vehicles on the roadway, or even single parking vehicles encroaching on the roadway impermissibly compromises the free passage of Farley Road.

Additionally, the increased volume of street parked cars makes the road impossible to navigate safely by pedestrians at times. When the neighborhood is inundated by parked cars, residents are precluded from walking on the "shoulders" of the road and instead must share the middle of the road with vehicular traffic. These packed-in, street-parked cars create a lack of visibility for pedestrians and drivers to see each other thereby making it **unsafe** for pedestrians to cross the road. These conditions have led to neighborhood residents, including children and senior citizens, getting "stuck" away from their homes on walks and having to wait for the rush of cars from WVMA attendees in order to traverse the road to return home.

Approval of WVMA's CUP modification would undermine the purpose of Town Code's prohibition on street parking by increasing the interaction between cars and pedestrians and decreasing safety and order in this residential neighborhood.

We urge the Town to enforce the current CUP and Town Code, which would allow no more attendees than there are parking spaces for, and no more than 25 attendees during the late-night Ramadan hours.

C. Should the Town grant any modifications to WVMA's CUP, it should do so with thoughtful and necessary conditions to preserve and ensure safe and quiet conditions for all residents.


Should the Town grant any modifications to WVMA's CUP, our clients urge the Town to adopt significant control measures, as the Town did for Hillbrook School, including, but not limited to: restriction of activities to certain hours of the day; capping the maximum number of attendees; establish a maximum for daily car trips with means for calculating car trips, a review process, and imposition of penalties for exceeding the maximum; prohibit opening windows and doors during certain activities; and require advance notice to neighbors for special events. Additionally, our clients urge the Town to require conditions for establishing sufficient off-site parking; to prohibit on-street drop-off or pick-up for attendees; measures to control vehicle noise from the parking lot; and, critically, to establish measures that will guarantee emergency access to, and through, all parts of Farley Road at all times.

On behalf of our clients, we respectfully request that the Town deny the WVMA's application for modification of its conditional use permit on the basis of its violations of the existing permitted uses, and instead diligently enforce the terms and conditions of the existing CUP and the Town's curfew and noise ordinances.

Dear Ms. Shoopman and Mr. Paulson:

This law firm represents James and Kimberly Ratcliff, who own and reside in a single family residence immediately adjacent to 16769 Farley Road, Los Gatos (the "Subject Property.") Our clients oppose the proposed modification of an existing conditional use permit to allow late night and early morning assembly usage within an R-1 Residential Zone upon the Subject Property for the following reasons:

1. Applicant West Valley Muslim Association ("**WVMA**") has previously and repeatedly violated the terms of its existing Conditional Use Permit U-24-010 (the "**CUP**".) Accordingly, rather than expanding the scope of conditionally permitted uses upon the Subject Property, the Town of Los Gatos ("Town") should suspend and/or terminate the CUP.
2. The Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act ("**RLUIPA**") does not apply to this Project, because WVMA has not demonstrated that any other owner or user of real property within an R-1 District in the Town has been granted lawful permission to conduct assembly and/or worship services during the early morning hours prior to 8:00 am or during the late night hours after 10:00 pm, and denial of WVMA's application (i.e. which would simply maintain the *status quo ante*) would not substantially burden religious practices.
3. The proposal to modify the CUP would allow expanded after hours assembly use in an R-1 Residential District in the Town is a "project" (as defined in the California Environmental Quality Act), which would materially increase the intensity of use on the Subject Property and cause significant environmental impact. Accordingly, the CUP modification application is neither statutorily nor categorically exempt from environmental review, and requires full environmental review.

1. WVMA's Current Operations on the Subject Property are in Violation of the Terms and Conditions of the CUP.

The Los Gatos Town Code of Ordinances ("**Town Code**") prohibits modification of a nonconforming use without obtaining a conditional use permit, and identifies changes to intensity of use as a modification. (Town Code Sec. 29.10.215.) Specifically, the Town Code provides that an increase in parking required, commencement or intensification of activities, and an increase in the number of hours or staying open later imposing a new burden on the neighborhood constitutes a modification. (Town Code Sec. 29.10.215(1).) Moreover, the Town Code establishes that "[a]ny change that is a substantial departure from plans which were the basis of any approved; existing use," is a modification. (Town Code Sec. 29.10.215(2).)

WVMA has violated the terms and conditions of its existing CUP by substantially departing from the conditions of approval by increasing the intensity of its parking requirements, by increasing operating hours without approval, and by intensifying its activities.

WVMA Has Substantially Departed from the Approvals of the Existing CUP

WVMA's existing CUP establishes permissible operating hours until 10:00 p.m., or 11:00 p.m. during Ramadan. This existing CUP was issued in 2020, and the staff report for the CUP notes that the anticipated use until 11:00 p.m. during Ramadan is limited to 10-25 members, with no increase to traffic impacts or required parking. However, beginning in 2024 there was a marked increase in members attending during Ramadan and Friday prayers which impacted traffic, parking, and noise in the neighborhood. During Ramadan in calendar years 2024 and 2025: (i) an estimated 1,000+ members attended nightly prayer gatherings after 10:00 p.m., far exceeding the "10-25 members" in the Town's staff report; (ii) during nightly prayer gatherings, WVMA attendees regularly participated while standing outdoors, with the doors and windows of the building open, observing and participating in the "indoor services" from outside; and (iii) outside participation was encouraged by amplification of the services in contravention of the Town's noise ordinance. Because WVMA has increased the quantity of members attending by orders of magnitude from the plans used as a basis for granting the existing CUP, WVMA is violating its existing CUP.

WVMA Has Violated Parking Requirements.

The Town Code prohibits expansion or modification of parking use "through an increase to the seating capacity, number of persons employed or otherwise, unless the number of additional off-street parking spaces necessitated by such ... modification ... are provided." (Sec. 29.10.145.)

While WVMA enjoys the privileges of its existing use to avoid the need for conformance to the Town's parking requirements (one space for every four seats) as noted in WVMA's "Response to Staff Technical Review," the privilege does not shield them from the unlawfulness of its increased use without providing alternative parking. The vast expansion in the number of worshippers attending during Ramadan, Friday prayers, and weekend events has caused WVMA's need for parking to far exceed its 180 parking space

capacity, and its proposal to restripe its existing parking lot to add only an additional twenty to thirty more parking spaces would be woefully inadequate to ameliorate the burden on the neighborhood from its actual, unlawful, expanded use.

In connection with the foregoing, WVMA's inadequate onsite parking has led to hundreds of cars being parked by members and attendees on the neighborhood streets, displacing residents' use of street parking for hours at a time extending into the night, and often overlapping or blocking residential driveways. Farley Road is a narrow residential road that lacks sidewalks. So, the increased volume of street parked cars makes the road impossible to navigate safely at times. When the neighborhood is inundated by parked cars, pedestrians are precluded from walking on the "shoulders" of the road and instead must share the middle of the road with vehicular traffic.

Additionally, these packed-in, street-parked cars create a lack of "daylight" for pedestrians and drivers to see each other thereby making it unsafe for pedestrians to cross the road. These conditions have led to neighborhood residents, including senior citizens, getting "stuck" away from their homes on walks and having to wait for the rush of cars from WVMA attendees in order to traverse the road to return home.

This is exacerbated by the difficulty in enforcing speed limits, despite residents of the neighborhood reporting numerous incidents of speeding by WVMA's attendees to Los Gatos Police Department. Significantly, there was at least one instance when Los Gatos Police vehicles were unable to get through because both sides of the street were fully parked and the travel lanes were at a standstill – the same could be true in the future for fire and emergency medical services, placing life and property at risk.

WVMA Has Increased its Operating Hours

WVMA's existing CUP specifies operating hours until 10:00 p.m., or 11:00 p.m. during Ramadan. However, WVMA routinely operates its services past 10:00 p.m. during times other than Ramadan. On July 5, 2024, the Town notified WVMA of violations of their CUP as well as violation of Town Code. Since that time, WVMA has failed to conform its use to the CUP and Town Code, and instead continues to operate from pre-dawn to past 11:00 p.m. regularly.

According to the [2025 WVMA Los Gatos & Saratoga prayer schedule](#) linked in Applicant's Revised Justification Letter, in 2025, there were 70 dates outside of Ramadan where prayers were scheduled to begin at or after 10:00 p.m., and another 21 dates where prayers were scheduled within 20 mins of 10:00 p.m. WVMA also has recurring programming scheduled every weeknight until 10:00 p.m. on an ongoing, indefinite basis.

Additionally, WVMA operates early morning services, including 104 dates where prayers were scheduled to start before 5:00 a.m., and 255 dates where prayers were scheduled to start before 6:00 a.m. Morning operating hours are not contemplated in the existing CUP, and the 4 a.m. and 5 a.m. start times create unreasonable noise disturbances, discussed further below.

Because WVMA has routinely operated beyond the operating hours listed in the existing CUP, the proposed modification must be denied and the Town should revoke the existing CUP.

The Current and Proposed Operating Hours Violate the Noise Disturbance Curfew

Section 16.20.010 of the Town Code prohibits the making of noise or permitting of noise to be made, between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m., which is "unreasonably disturbing or physically annoying to people of ordinary sensitivity or which are so harsh or prolonged or unnatural or unusual in their use, time or place as to cause physical discomfort to a person(s)."

WVMA's current operations and proposed modification requests to extend operational hours in the morning to 90 minutes before sunrise, every day, and to extend to 11:00 p.m., every night, and, during Ramadan, to midnight. This proposed schedule would leave only a mere 4 or 5 hours per night during which the noise curfew would be enforced to prohibit streams of traffic, streams of pedestrians moving through the neighborhood, loud talking, slamming car doors and trunks, folding strollers, and engaging car locks causing their car alarms to chirp or even go off.

This proposed schedule is patently unreasonable in a residential district of the Town and would interfere with the sleep schedules of residents in the surrounding blocks. In particular, James and Kim Ratcliff, have lost countless hours of sleep per night, affecting James' ability to serve the community in his role as a surgeon, and making Kim's recent battle with cancer a more difficult fight than it would have been otherwise. Attempts to contact WVMA's executive director or property managers during noise disturbances have been fruitless, and/or have not been responded to at all.

WVMA's unlawful 20 hour operation schedule violates the noise curfew and is unreasonable for this residential neighborhood and should not be permitted to continue in violation of the rights of existing residents.

WVMA Unwillingness to Comply with Town Ordinances Should Preclude Expanding its Permitted Operations

In addition to the violations discussed above, the Town has issued several violation notices to WVMA, including notices for noise disturbance related to construction and for use of a gas-powered leaf blower. Significantly, in July 2024, a violation notice was issued which reminds WVMA of the conditions of its CUP, states that its operations are in violation of the CUP, and describes the impact to the neighborhood.

WVMA ignored the July 2024 notice and has shown, through its repeated violations, that it is not capable of respecting the CUP, the Town Code, or the neighborhood it is situated in. Because WVMA has shown it cannot be trusted to comply with its current obligations, the Town should not grant its requested CUP modifications. Doing so would only put the neighborhood at risk of even greater detriments from future WVMA violations.

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2. The Town has not permitted any other religious or non-religious owner or user of real property surrounded by residential uses in an R-1 District within the Town of Los Gatos to conduct assembly and worship services during the pre-dawn hours or after 11:00 at night.

A. The Town's existing CUPs expanding hours for religious users in R-1 districts are inapposite to WVMA's requested modification.

The Town granted extended operating hours to both Calvary Church and Faith Lutheran Church, each of which is located in R1 districts. However, each of these properties and the permitted uses differs significantly from that of WVMA.

The permit granted to Calvary Church allows daily assembly from 7:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m., and allows extended operation until 12:00 a.m. on Saturdays. (Town of Los Gatos Conditional Use Permit U-02-09.) Calvary Church sits on a 7.481 acre property, is surrounded on three sides by commercial or office zoning, and exceeds the minimum 4:1 occupants to parking requirement with 467 spaces for 1,680 seated capacity, plus has an on-site overflow parking lot. Additionally, the ingress and egress for Calvary Church parking is primarily onto Los Gatos Blvd, which is designated as an arterial road. (Town of Los Gatos, General Plan, Section 5.6 Roadways.) For limited times and purposes, Calvary Church allows egress onto Shannon Road, a neighborhood collector road. (Town of Los Gatos, General Plan, Section 5.6 Roadways.) Notably, Calvary Church was required to eliminate vehicle access to Robie Lane, an adjacent residential street designated as a local street. (Town of Los Gatos Conditional Use Permit U-02-09; Town of Los Gatos, General Plan, Section 5.6 Roadways.)

Calvary Church's CUP is not at all similar to the conditions of the Subject Property. WVMA sits on 2.76 acres, has single family homes on all sides, and has a mere 180 parking spaces for its 869 person seated capacity and it insists in its justification documentation that it cannot or will not provide alternatives for its attendees, such as over flow parking or shuttles. Further, ingress and egress from its onsite parking is exclusively onto Farley Road, which is designated as a local street, which is not designed to accommodate the volume of traffic it is currently receiving. (Town of Los Gatos, General Plan, Section 5.6 Roadways.)

Faith Lutheran Church is located on a lot to similarly sized to the Subject Property and is also surrounded by single family residences, the permit granted to Faith Lutheran is not for assembly and worship uses and therefore differs markedly from what WVMA is seeking. Faith Lutheran has operating hours from 5:00 pm to 10:00 p.m., Monday to Saturday; and 7:00 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Sundays. Additionally, Faith Lutheran is permitted to conduct church committee meetings between 3:00 p.m. and midnight daily, and may hold weddings and special events until 10:00 p.m. with 30 or 90 day prior approval by the planning and police departments. All uses are conditioned on complying with Town ordinances, namely the noise ordinance. (Town of Los Gatos Conditional Use Permit U-19-003.)

WVMA seeks to operate an hour and a half before dawn, and as late as 11:00 p.m. or midnight with full prayer services for attendees up to and exceeding its facility's seating capacity. WVMA insists its use does not violate noise ordinances in its noise study, however,

WVMA received a noise curfew violation notice from the town on or about September 23, 2025. Additionally, the actual experiences of the neighborhood residents says otherwise – since 2024, there have been instances of amplified services emanating from the facility’s open windows and doors, screaming and other ruckus from unsupervised teenagers and children, drumming and music as early as 6:00 a.m., as well as the streams of car and pedestrian traffic multiple times per day every day.

No religious or non-religious entity has received permission from the Town to conduct its full services and operations in an R1 neighborhood for 20 hours a day from pre-dawn to midnight. No other entity has received permission from the Town to allow multiple trips from and parking by hundreds of cars on narrow, unlit residential streets day after day with no mitigations.

In fact, the Hillbrook School, which is zoned in HR1 and, like WVMA’s facility, is accessible only by a single local street, has such stringent restrictions on its traffic impact that it must monitor daily car trips and is subject to fines for exceeding stated maximums. (Town of Los Gatos Conditional Use Permit U-12-002; Town of Los Gatos, General Plan, Section 5.6 Roadways.)

Because the Town has not permitted any other entity to engage in the type of conditional use being sought by WVMA, a denial of their modification application would not give rise to a RLUIPA claim.

B. Denial of WVMA’s Application to Modify the CUP Does Not Create a Substantial Burden on the Exercise of Their Religion in Violation of RLUIPA

RLUIPA is not applicable to the Town’s CUP enforcement and modification processes of the CUP.

A California appeals court found no violation of RLUIPA where the jurisdiction enforced the municipal code and ultimately denied a religious entity’s conditional use permit application. *County of Los Angeles v. Sahag-Mesrob Armenian Christian School* (2010) 188 Cal.App.4th 851 (“*Sahag-Mesrob*”). The court noted that, “the requirement that an entity subject to [RLUIPA] apply for a conditional use permit and comply with the California Environmental Quality Act is not a substantial burden on the exercise of religion within the meaning of [RLUIPA].” *County of Los Angeles v. Sahag-Mesrob Armenian Christian School* (2010) 188 Cal.App.4th 851, 862. In fact, the congressional sponsors of RLUIPA stated, “[t]his Act does not provide religious institutions with immunity from land use regulation.” *Id.* at 861.

In addition, the (Federal) Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals found no RLUIPA violation where a religious entity was denied a special use permit for a church in an agricultural zone due to the county’s concerns about increased traffic and burden to public services. (*Spirit of Aloha Temple v. County of Maui* (9th Cir. 2025) 132 F.4th 1148, 1156.) The Ninth Circuit found that “the County’s reasons for denying Plaintiffs’ special-use permits have been consistent and relate to safety concerns that are not arbitrary and have not lessened the possibility that [the applicant’s] could find a suitable property elsewhere.” (*Id.* at 1158.) Further, the Ninth Circuit noted that the applicants “purchased land that they knew at the

time was subject to unique zoning restrictions which would limit their ability to establish a church or host large groups for religious activities." *Id.*

Here, WVMA knowingly purchased property in an R1 zone (rather than in a district with more permissive laws relating to early morning and late night use) and is therefore subject to applicable zoning laws. WVMA has not shown that requiring it to comply with applicable laws of which it had full knowledge would, in any way, substantially burden the exercise of their religion. Rather, the Town has granted its existing CUP enabling the practice of their members' religion until 10:00 p.m. nightly, or until 11:00 p.m. during Ramadan.

WVMA does not indicate that it is unable to provide services or otherwise practice their faith, it wants to expand the range of services beyond the boundaries of the Town Code in the specific area of the Town in which they elected to purchase real property, beyond what their onsite parking can accommodate, and beyond what the residential neighborhood can be expected to sustain.

Further, WVMA has stated it has permission from its religious leaders allowing them to offer a program ensuring they can exit and clear the facility based on the current CUP in effect. (WVMA, "Request for Modification of Conditional Use Permit - Letter of Justification" (April 29, 2025) at p. 13.) By its own admission, WVMA is able to operate and provide prayer services for its members and worshippers within the hours specified by the existing CUP, therefore, by its own admission, denial of WVMA's application will not create a substantial burden.

Additionally, WVMA admits the needs of the congregation are not driving its desire to expand the operating hours. Instead, WVMA states that practical challenges, other obligations, and a general lack of time cause 75% of its attendees to leave early from nightly prayer. (WVMA, "Request for Modification of Conditional Use Permit - Letter of Justification" (April 29, 2025) at p. 13.) The impact of this piecemeal attrition from WVMA's extensive nightly services, is a parade of noisy pedestrians and vehicle traffic disturbing residents throughout the evening.

WVMA's challenges are of its own making – it bought this property knowing it was in a residential neighborhood, and operated on this property without issue until 2024. There appears to be no reason they cannot operate within the boundaries of the existing CUP and attempt to restore the neighborhood to its prior condition.

WVMA lists a litany of location challenges and reasons for choosing the Farley Road location, suggesting there is no suitable alternative location; however, it does not say that the Town of Los Gatos has done anything to create those challenges. Additionally, WVMA does not assert that the Town has denied or would deny future applications for arbitrary or improper purposes. In fact, the Town has largely refrained from enforcement of the terms and conditions of the CUP, while presumably, allowing WVMA to apply for a modification, despite the burden WVMA's violations have caused the neighbors.

Although neither the Town nor the neighbors of WVMA created the challenges of finding a site allowing greater use, the residents of the neighborhood have unfairly

shouldered the burden of WVMA's violations for far too long, despite numerous attempts to get the Town to intervene. The neighbors, including approximately 15 households spanning four surrounding streets, have submitted various complaints to the Town about WVMA's flagrant violation of the terms of the existing CUP. The Town's manager, the Mayor, and a Councilperson came to Farley Road and observed the parking and traffic conditions during Ramadan. And, the Town has heard a presentation from the neighbors describing the character of the violations, including, without limitation, attendees standing outside of the facility, participating by way of amplified audio and music, video of a stream of cars exiting WVMA for over an hour, declarations of cars backfiring and loud sport car engines creating a disturbance around 4:00 a.m.

The Town is well within its discretion to deny the application and to suspend and/or terminate the CUP on the basis that WVMA failed to conform to the lawful existing conditions of use, and that the expanded use places an unreasonable on the neighborhood with respect to WVMA's reliance on street parking which impedes emergency vehicle access, and its operating hours intrude on the noise curfew, causing unreasonable harm and interference to the residential neighborhood.

Should the Town grant any modifications to WVMA's CUP, our clients urge the Town to adopt significant control measures, as the Town did for Hillbrook School, including, but not limited to: restriction of activities to certain hours of the day; capping the maximum number of attendees; establish a maximum for daily car trips with means for calculating car trips, a review process, and imposition of penalties for exceeding the maximum; prohibit opening windows and doors during certain activities; and require advance notice to neighbors for special events. Additionally, our clients urge the Town to require conditions for establishing sufficient off-site parking; to prohibit on-street drop-off or pick-up for attendees; measures to control vehicle noise from the parking lot; and, critically, to establish measures that will guarantee emergency access to, and through, all parts of Farley Road at all times.

On behalf of our clients, we respectfully request that the Town deny the WVMA's application for modification of its conditional use permit on the basis of its violations of the existing permitted uses, and instead diligently enforce the terms and conditions of the existing CUP and the Town's curfew and noise ordinances.

3. A Full Environmental Report is Required Because the Proposed Modification of the Conditional Use Permit is a Project under CEQA and is Not Exempt from Environmental Review

Under the California Environmental Quality Act (Public Resources Code §21000, et seq.) and related regulations promulgated thereunder (14 California Code of Regulations §15000, et seq.) (collectively "**CEQA**"), a "project" is an action "which has a potential for resulting in either a direct physical change in the environment, or a reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment, and that is" an "activity involving the issuance to a person of a lease, permit, license, certificate, or other entitlement for use by one or more public agencies." (Cal. Code Regs. Tit. 14, Sec. 15378.)

WVMA seeks to modify its CUP to expand its permissible operating hours into the late night and early morning (the "**Project**".) The Project will invariably result in a direct physical change to the environment, including but not limited to, changes to ambient noise, light intrusions, traffic patterns, air quality, greenhouse gas emissions, and parking, together with increased imposition on utilities and infrastructure.

In connection with the foregoing, Public Resources Code §21080 states, in pertinent part, as follows:

- (a) Except as otherwise provided in this division, ***this division shall apply to discretionary projects proposed to be carried out or approved by public agencies, including, but not limited to, the enactment and amendment of zoning ordinances, the issuance of zoning variances, the issuance of conditional use permits, and the approval of tentative subdivision maps unless the project is exempt from this division. (Emphasis Added.)***

It is our understanding that the Town intends to claim that the Project meets the requirements for a Class 1 Exemption from CEQA review as defined in 14 CCR §15301, and is therefore categorically exempt from Environmental Review under CEQA. 14 CCR §15301 provides, in pertinent part, as follows:

Class 1 consists of the operation, repair, maintenance, permitting, leasing, licensing, or minor alteration of existing public or private structures, facilities, mechanical equipment, or topographical features, involving negligible or no expansion of existing or former use. . . . The key consideration is whether the project involves negligible or no expansion of use. (Emphasis Added.)

Clearly, a proposed amendment to a conditional use permit that would expand permitted uses to allow late night and early morning assemblies involving hundreds (and potentially thousands) of congregants to take place on real property situated in the middle of a single family residential neighborhood could not be construed to involve "negligible or no expansion of existing or former use" that could not possibly have an effect on the environment. Quite the contrary, such an expansion of use could, and very likely would, have profound and significant environmental impacts upon the neighborhoods surrounding the Project.

Specifically, WVMA's current use, described above, exemplifies not only changes to noise, traffic volume, and parking, but also to traffic patterns, air pollution, and light intrusion from vehicles. Neighbors currently endure abnormally high volumes of U-turns on their streets, altering the flow of traffic, as well as vehicle traffic using private driveways to turn around. Additionally, neighbors experience cars idling in front of their houses and headlight beams shining into their windows early in the morning and late at night for extended periods of time.

Further, the Project cannot simultaneously be considered merely just a "minor alteration of an existing structure" that happens to be located in a zoning district that already permits the intended use. In the current application, the proposed use is expressly prohibited under the existing zoning and use permit, hence the need for the requested amendment.

Because WVMA's action of requesting an expansion of the CUP to allow late night and early morning operations in an R1 zone has the very real potential to cause direct physical changes to the environment, the CUP modification application is a "project" under CEQA. And, as discussed above, because the Project is not exempt, the Town must comply with applicable CEQA regulations and conduct an appropriate environmental study.

Dear Ms. Abdo:

I wish to thank you and the West Valley Muslim Association ("WVMA") leadership for meeting with Joel Paulson, Allen Meyer, and me regarding operations at this location. As promised, I have provided copies of the complaints received by the Town to date, and copies are also enclosed with this letter. The purpose of this letter is to follow up on the issues we discussed and to work together to resolve them. Those matters are:

- 1) The gate: Thank you for addressing the gate to eliminate the noise.
- 2) Hours of operation: I have reviewed the conditional use permit and the application for the conditional use permit ("CUP") modification to determine whether the hours of operation include car traffic to and from services. As explained below in more detail, the hours of operation include car traffic to and from services.
- 3) Number of attendees: The application for the CUP modification stated that there would be up to 25 attendees. The number of attendees currently exceeds this amount.

Background

As you know, the property is subject to a CUP, a copy of which is enclosed. The CUP authorizes maintenance of "an existing Church facility." The CUP was modified in 2020 to authorize worship until 11 p.m. during the month of Ramadan. Worship activities are permitted until 10 p.m. for the remainder of the year. The application for the CUP modification included a description of the proposed project. The project description, a copy of which is enclosed, stated:

Good morning Kim and Jim,

I'm writing to inform you that the West Valley Muslim Association was issued an Administrative Warning notice on September 23, 2025 for a curfew noise disturbance that occurred on August 9, 2025 at approximately 7:30 am. The workers were installing rodent entry preventative measures on the building before permitted hours.

As for the noise disturbances on July 29, August 2, and August 21, 2025. These disturbances were deemed emergency work to repair the air conditioning and not a violation of code pursuant to Town Code section 16.30.010.

This law firm represents James and Kimberly Ratcliff, who own and reside in a single family residence immediately adjacent to 16769 Farley Road, Los Gatos (the "Subject Property.")

On November 4, 2025, we wrote to inform the Town of Los Gatos, ("the Town") of our clients' opposition to the proposed modification of an existing conditional use permit, U-24-010 ("CUP"), to allow late night and early morning assembly usage upon the Subject Property. To date, neither we nor our clients have received a response from the Town.

We are writing today to request that the Town respond to our November 4, 2025 letter and address the very serious and substantial concerns our clients have raised.

Further, we write to request the Town immediately and continually enforce the existing terms of the CUP, as well as the Town's noise ordinances and traffic laws at and around the Subject Property. The owners and operators of the Subject Property, West Valley Muslim Association ("WVMA"), regularly violate or allow their members to violate the CUP, Town ordinances and the law.

On January 26, 2026, our clients reported the following to Code Compliance Officer, Allen Meyer:

On Saturday night, January 24, 2026, WVMA held an event. From 10:15 to 10:40 pm, a van idled next to WVMA's auditorium door on the exit driveway

next to our home. The van's headlights shone directly into Roger and Ann Bundlie's front windows for 25 minutes. The van exited WVMA at around 10:40 pm and parked on Farley Road. Another vehicle came out of the exit immediately afterward and double parked next to the van on Farley. Both drivers got out and opened the back doors of the van and did something. (Can't tell what from video footage.) Additionally, at least 6 additional vehicles exited WVMA on Saturday night with the last vehicle leaving at 11:24 pm.

And on February 14, 2026, our clients called the non-emergency Los Gatos-Monte Serano Police Department ("LGMS PD") line to report early morning violations. On February 16, 2026, they followed up again with Code Compliance Officer, Allen Meyer:

I'm following up on several code violations made by the West Valley Muslim Association recently. Last weekend, WVMA violated their current CUP multiple times. We called the non-emergency LGMS PD line in real time on 2/14 (as we've been advised by Mayor Moore) to report 10 cars that entered WVMA between 6:20 - 6:40 am.

The dispatcher told us she didn't believe WVMA had a current CUP since its modification is pending and that she would have to check with you. Is that accurate?

Does WVMA have a CUP they must adhere to while their CUP modification application process drags on or does an entity get to do whatever they please without repercussions? The dispatcher had no idea about WVMA's CUP operating hours and told us they weren't doing anything wrong.

That same morning at 7:40, a neighbor called the non-emergency line again to report that WVMA started construction activities in the parking lot (re-striping spaces) well before the 9 am allowed Saturday construction hours (incident #260140023).

The dispatcher questioned us and again, did not seem aligned with code compliance on town rules. The disconnect between Code Compliance and LGMS PD is frustrating for us neighbors given the many meetings and previous engagement we've had with the Town on this ongoing quality of life issue.

We would like to know the status of the two incident reports on 2/14 and what, if anything, will be done to prevent WVMA's repeated non-compliance.

Also, what is the status of the incident on January 24 (incident #2601250038) as I never received a response from you after WVMA operated past 10 pm and nine cars entered the property at midnight.

These reported activities violate Town's noise disturbance curfew (Town Code Sec. 16.20.010), the prohibition on obstructing public streets (Town Code Sec. 23.30.005), and the Town's permissible hours for construction (Town Code Sec. 16.20.035).

The activities violate the noise curfew because the late night activities occurred outside of WVMA's operating hours, which extend to 10:00 p.m. for the dates above. The noise was not connected to otherwise lawful conduct. Similarly, the early morning activities violate the Code because WVMA has no authorization to operate before the Town's 8:00 a.m. curfew lifts. Therefore, the unreasonable noise disturbance to our clients' enjoyment of their home constitutes a violation of the Town code. (Town Code Sec. 16.20.010.)

The double parking of vehicles on Farley Road violates the Town Code's prohibition on obstructions. These vans were operated in support of WVMA's Saturday night event, and WVMA allowed them to remain in front of the WVMA premises in a double-parked condition which obstructed Farley Road. As we pointed out in our November letter, Farley Road is a narrow residential street which lacks sidewalks (the Town has designated it a "Local Street"). Even a single van parked on the street would constitute an obstruction, endangering the free passage of Farley Road. WVMA's permitting vans to double park on Farley Road undoubtedly constitutes a violation of the Town Code. (Town Code Sec. 23.30.005(b).)

WVMA's construction activity in its parking lot reported in real time at 7:40 a.m. on Saturday, February 14, 2026 is a clear violation of the Town's permissible construction hours, which begin at 9:00 a.m. on Saturdays. (Town Code Sec. 16.20.035.)

Our clients, specifically, request that the Town actively monitor WVMA's evening and Friday prayer activities, and enforce: the 10:00 pm (11:00 p.m. during Ramadan) curfew of the existing CUP; the building's occupancy limits; the maximum number of attendees (up to 25) under the existing CUP; the Town's noise ordinance, including the 8:00 a.m. curfew; traffic and parking laws, including the non-obstruction code, to ensure that the streets and driveways in the neighborhood are accessible to emergency personnel and residents; and monitor car trips on Farley Road during and after Ramadan with traffic counters.

We note, too, that our clients are not alone in their opposition to the CUP modifications nor their insistence that the Town enforce its Code. Neighbors have also reported violations, spoken at Town meetings, and met with the Mayor sharing the same concerns. It is time the Town takes notice and meets its obligations to ensure peace and safety of the residents of our community.

Time is of the essence here, as the Ramadan has begun. Violations have historically escalated during this season causing significant disruption and injury to our clients and other residents. We urge the town to act swiftly in its code enforcement efforts, as well as to respond to our November 2025 letter.



Kimberly Bryan

- She is alarmed at the delta she sees between the current Town and the potential buildings that were put forth with Plan C. Housing choices such as duplexes, fourplexes, tiny houses, etc., are a much better fit for Los Gatos to find more areas in Town to accommodate these structures. She encouraged the Planning Commission to support Option B and see what happens with property owners being able to have secondary units on their properties.

Lee Fagot

- Going to 45 feet downtown with retail at the bottom and housing above makes sense. The argument on both sides regarding the project at Los Gatos Boulevard and Shannon Road shows the importance of finding the right heights and setbacks that would provide guidance for future developers and to keep the look and feel of Los Gatos.

Jan Murray

- She lives near a development at Union Avenue and Blossom Hill that the Planning Commission recommended against and the Town Council overrode that recommendation. Those homes do not meet the mass, bulk, height, and character of the Town and are elevated. Good intentions get modified when the developers come in and offer incentives to deviate.

Emerald Hathaway

- Los Gatos is a beautiful Town and she feels badly when she reads they are going to try to change the Town into four-story buildings along Los Gatos Boulevard, because it doesn't make any sense. It should be easy to add 2,000 dwellings without putting in four-story buildings because Los Gatos is not designed for that, and while the Town wants diversity they do not want to destroy the Town in trying to be so diverse.

Mark Grimes

- He has read about the number of additional cars that would be added based on the assumption that more people would start to use public transportation and asked what factors were used to come up with that assumption?

BACKGROUND:

On January 10, 1990, the Planning Commission approved a Conditional Use Permit (U-89-11) to allow the improvement and expansion of an existing institution for religious observance facility (Exhibit 4).

PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

A. Location and Surrounding Neighborhood

The subject site, located at 16769 Farley Road approximately 700 feet west of Los Gatos Boulevard, is currently used for religious observance. The adjacent properties on all sides are zoned R-1:8 (Exhibit 1).

B. Project Summary

The applicant is requesting approval of a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) modification for expanded hours of operation from 10:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m., for 30 days annually during the religious service month of Ramadan.

When reviewing a CUP, the deciding body should consider the information in the applicant's Written Description (Exhibit 5); however, the key consideration should be the proposed use

since the CUP runs with the land and the operational details can change from owner to owner.

C. Zoning Compliance

Pursuant to Town Code, the proposed use is an institution for religious observance, which is allowed in the R-1:8 zone, subject to the approval of a CUP. Section 29.20.750(8) of the Town Code (Zoning Regulations) requires Planning Commission consideration of CUPs not assigned to the Development Review Committee or Town Council.

DISCUSSION:

A. Conditional Use Permit Application

The applicant proposes to expand the hours of operation from 10:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m., for 30 days annually during the religious service month of Ramadan. The applicant has provided a Written Description (Exhibit 5) describing operational details for the proposed use.

The applicant indicates that the service month of Ramadan changes based on the lunar calendar. For the year 2020, Ramadan will be from April 23, 2020 to May 23, 2020. Ramadan prayer services begin at 8:30 p.m., with an anticipated 10 to 25 members using the facility. The applicant is requesting expanded hours of operation from 10:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m., to allow participants and West Valley Muslim Association members to attend the prayer service.

B. Traffic and Parking

The site is currently used for religious observance and there would be no increase in traffic impacts or required parking.

C. Conditional Use Permit Findings

In order to grant approval of a CUP, the deciding body must make the following findings:

1. The proposed use of the property is essential or desirable to the public convenience or welfare; and
2. The proposed use would not impair the integrity and character of the zone; and
3. The proposed use would not be detrimental to public health, safety, or general welfare; and

DISCUSSION (continued):

4. The proposed use of the property is in harmony with the various elements or objectives of the General Plan and the purposes of the Town Code.

With regards to the first finding, the use will continue providing a facility for religious observance to which members have grown accustomed. With regards to the second finding, the use will not impair the integrity of the zone because limitations will be placed in the conditions of approval to preserve the character of the residential zone. With regards to the third finding, the use will not be detrimental to public health safety or general welfare because the conditions of approval will address any potential impacts. With regards to the final finding, the proposed use meets the objectives of the General Plan and Town Code as discussed within this report.

D. General Plan

Institutions for religious observance are distributed throughout the Town. The use is consistent with the Low Density Residential General Plan land use designation for the property with the approval of a CUP. The proposed project would have no exterior impacts, maintaining the small-town, residential scale and natural environments of adjacent residential neighborhoods.

The goals and policies of the 2020 General Plan applicable to this project include, but are not limited to:

- Policy LU-6.2 - Allow non-residential activity in residential areas only when the character and quality of the neighborhood can be maintained.
- Action LU-6.2 - The conditional use permit approvals for non-residential uses in residential zones shall be reviewed by the Planning Commission on an as-needed basis for any adverse impacts, nuisances, or any required modifications.

E. CEQA Determination

The project is Categorical Exempt pursuant to the adopted Guidelines for the Implementation of the California Environmental Quality Act, Section 15301: Existing Facilities. No significant effect on the environment will occur since the project uses an existing structure with no increase in floor area.

PUBLIC COMMENTS:

Written notice was sent to property owners and tenants within 300 feet of the subject property. At the time of this report's preparation, the Town has not received any public comments.

CONCLUSION:

A. Summary

The applicant is requesting approval of a modification to an existing CUP for expanded hours of operation from 10:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m., in an existing institution for religious observance, for 30 days annually during the religious service month of Ramadan.

No change in use or additional square footage is proposed; therefore, there will be no increase in traffic impacts or required parking. The proposed use would be in conformance with the Town Code and is consistent with the General Plan.

B. Recommendation

Based on the analysis above, staff recommends approval of the CUP subject to the recommended conditions of approval (Exhibit 3). If the Planning Commission finds merit with the proposed project, it should:

1. Make the finding that the proposed project is categorically exempt, pursuant to Section 15301 of the California Environmental Quality Act as adopted by the Town (Exhibit 2); and
2. Make the findings as required by Section 29.20.190 of the Town Code for granting approval of a CUP (Exhibit 2); and
3. Approve CUP modification application U-20-001 with the conditions of approval attached in Exhibit 3.



Dear Planning Commission and Associate Planners,

I am writing to formally oppose the proposed modification of the Conditional Use Permit (CUP) for 16769 Farley Road. I would like to bring to the Commission's attention a recent and highly relevant precedent regarding Town code enforcement and neighborhood protection: the "Max Family Polar Express" case at 15596 Flintridge Drive.

The "Polar Express" Precedent (Dec 2022)

In December 2022, the Town of Los Gatos took swift action to enforce code restrictions against a holiday display at 15596 Flintridge Drive. Despite the display being a well-intentioned community event, the Town mandated its modification and near-removal based on:

- **Street Capacity:** The Town cited significant concerns that the attraction drew too many visitors (approx. 700 people per night), which overwhelmed the quiet residential street's infrastructure.
- **Public Safety:** The Town prioritized the prevention of traffic congestion and the protection of the public right-of-way over the applicant's desire to host a high-intensity event in an R-1 neighborhood.

Application to 16769 Farley Road

The Town's intervention on Flintridge Drive established a clear standard: high-intensity uses that attract large volumes of people and vehicles are inherently incompatible with the infrastructure of our residential neighborhoods.

If the Town was willing to strictly enforce code and limit a temporary holiday display to protect a residential street from 700 visitors, it must apply that same standard of care to a permanent CUP modification for 16769 Farley Road. Allowing expanded late-night hours and increased intensity at this location would be a direct contradiction of the safety and capacity priorities the Town upheld on Flintridge Drive.

In addition to my objection on this basis, I would like to state my objection based on the fact that our neighborhood has recently been negatively impacted by additional traffic generated by Lester Square, its associated housing, and the new housing at the Placer Oaks development at the intersection of

Placer Oaks Road and Frank Avenue, all of which generate traffic directed northward to Izorah Way, which is the street I live on and which my family know refers to as "Izorah Expressway."

To add to all this an institution that's open as late as midnight and as early as 4:30 am is just as unreasonable and unacceptable in a residential neighborhood.

I therefore request that the Commission maintain consistency in its application of neighborhood protections and deny this modification.

Please find the attached petition and this link to our YouTube video (<https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=yEikr9Z8Ekk>) formally opposing the requested modification of the Conditional Use Permit (CUP) for 16769 Farley Road.

This document represents the collective voices of **over 60 adult residents** from **~ 60 unique households**—a near-unanimous majority of the families who live directly on Farley Road and its immediate feeder streets (Flintridge, Frank, Chirco, Corcel, Benedict, Augustine, and Izorah).

We urge the Commission to weigh this collective evidence against the applicant's "Neighborhood Outreach" report, which we believe is statistically invalid. While the applicant reported contact with only 15 properties, this petition proves that when the actual residents are consulted, the consensus is clear: **this expansion is fundamentally incompatible with an R-1 residential zone.**

Our opposition is based on documented, year-round safety risks, including:

- **Infrastructure Deficit:** Our streets lack the sidewalks and lighting necessary to safely handle a traffic surge at 4:00 AM and Midnight.
- **Capacity Mismatch:** An assembly of 1,217 people is larger than the student body of Fisher Middle School. Operating at this "regional scale" in a quiet residential pocket creates an unmitigated danger to pedestrian safety and emergency vehicle access.
- **Enforcement Failures:** The applicant has a documented 3-year history of non-compliance with existing permit hours and occupancy limits. Granting expanded hours to an entity that cannot manage its current restrictions is a direct threat to the general welfare of the neighborhood.

We are not "a few disgruntled neighbors." We are a unified community asking the Town to uphold its zoning laws and its basic duty of care to protect the residents who live here 365 days a year.

We request that the Planning Commission deny the modification and prioritize the safety and residential integrity of Los Gatos.

PETITION TO OPPOSE MODIFICATION OF CUP FOR 16769 FARLEY ROAD

TO: Town of Los Gatos Planning Commission / Town Council

RE: Application for Expanded Hours – West Valley Muslim Association (WVMA)

ZONING: R-1:8 (Single-Family Residential)

WE, THE UNDERSIGNED RESIDENTS of the impacted residential streets (**Farley, Frank, Flintridge, Chirco Court, Corcel Court, Benedict Lane, Augustine Ave, and Izorah Way**), formally oppose the request to expand the hours of operation at 16769 Farley Road. The applicant's justification documents fail to address critical infrastructure deficits and the resulting safety risks to our families. We request a **DENIAL** based on the following:

1. CRITICAL FIRE HAZARD & EMERGENCY ACCESS RISK

The applicant admits to a standing capacity of 1,217 people (~304 vehicles) but provides only 180 parking spaces, resulting in a massive 41% parking deficit (124 missing spaces).

- Safety Deficit: The applicant admits their commercial-grade gate is inoperable, a direct violation of Fire Code egress (exit) requirements for a high-occupancy assembly.

2. INCOMPATIBLE "REGIONAL SCALE" IN AN R-1 ZONE

An occupancy of 1,217 people is larger than the student body of Fisher Middle School (~1,100).

- The Mismatch: Operating a "high-school-sized" assembly at 4:00 AM and 12 AM in an R-1:8 residential zone is a radical intensification of use.
- Substandard Infrastructure: Our streets lack streetlights and sidewalks. Forcing hundreds of vehicles onto dark, shoulder-only roads during sleeping hours creates an unacceptable risk of pedestrian-vehicle accidents.

3. FLAWED DATA & UNENFORCEABLE MITIGATION

- Irrelevant Noise Study: The applicant's 2025 noise study was conducted outside of peak Ramadan hours, failing to measure the true impact of 1,200+ people arriving in the predawn hours.
- The "Honor System" Flaw: 35% of the applicant's proposed mitigations rely on "reminders" and "signs," which the Town cannot legally enforce.
- Statistically Invalid Outreach: The applicant's "Neighborhood Outreach" report is deceptive. While there are over 100 neighbors in the immediate impacted area, the applicant only identified 35 properties and successfully contacted only 15. This means nearly 85% of the neighborhood was never directly engaged, proving a total lack of community consensus.

4. PREFERENCE OVER NECESSITY

The applicant admits they have access to the Saratoga Prospect Center but find it "logistically challenging." Under Town Code, "applicant convenience" is not a legal justification for a CUP modification that permanently destroys the "quiet enjoyment" and safety of a residential neighborhood.

I am writing as a concerned resident to formally oppose the proposed modification of the Conditional Use Permit (CUP) for 16769 Farley Road.

We urge the Commission to prioritize the voices of the local residents who will be directly impacted by the proposed expansion of hours. Consistent with Town policy and prior Commission actions, we have identified the following precedents and standards that support a denial of this modification based on neighborhood compatibility and noise protection.
