

Demographics preliminary data




Survey response by city/zip








Living Status




Compared with the North county participants, participants from Central county are more likely to live alone.

Annual Household Income




Domains of Livability Notable Findings


Concerns on Cost of Living

• Compared with Whites, Latino Americans are more likely to have concerns that the cost of living may reduce their standard of living.




Future Unpaid Care

• Compared with Whites, Latinos and African Americans are more likely to provide unpaid care in the future.



Current Community Rate: Aging in Place



No statistically significant difference for older adults(>=60), whether they rent or own.

Married couples rate higher on the current community as a place to live as they age.

Moving Consideration: Personal Safety or Security

BIPOC respondents are more likely to treat safety concerns as a major factor when deciding about moving.

Home Sharing

- Overall, 57% would like to share with family. Older adults are less likely to share with family.
- Overall, 30% would like to share with friends. LGBTQIA+ respondents are more likely to share with friends
- Overall, 4.5% would like to share with strangers. Compared with respondents with an income of 30k less, those whose income is 75k or more are less likely to share with strangers.

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Regional Differences

Compared to respondents from north county, respondents form other areas are less likely to rate their community as very good, or good on the questions about:

- Well-maintained parks;
- Safe parks;
- Having enough benches in parks.

Have Others Drive

• Older adults aged 60-69 are less likely to have others drive; Older adults aged 80 and over are more likely to have others drive, compared with those aged 45 to 60.




Internet

 Respondents with incomes of 75k and over are more likely to use the internet.




Feel Left Out

• Latinx are more likely to feel left out, compared to Whites.



Urgency Support from Friends or Family

• LGBTQIA+ respondents are less likely to have urgent support from friends or family.





Meet the Symposium Speakers

Carla Abdelnour, MD, PhD



Dr. Abdelnour is a neurologist and researcher with a passion for advancing our understanding of neurodegenerative diseases. Her work focuses on exploring the intricate relationships between different pathologies, and their influence on the clinical presentation, cognitive profile, and disease progression. Additionally, she aims to shed light on the underlying biological mechanisms of neurodegeneration, with a particular emphasis on identifying potential biomarkers for more accurate diagnosis and prognosis.

Joe Winer, PhD



Dr. Winer is an instructor with the Department of Neurology & Neurological Sciences at Stanford University. His research explores how tracking sleep and other factors in everyday life can provide information about brain health, cognitive trajectories in aging, and neurogenerative disease. His investigations include connections between sleep disruption and Alzheimer's disease in the context of healthy aging. Dr. Winer recently received the Digital Pilot Award from the National Alzheimer's Coordinating Center and Gates Ventures.

Robin Shepherd, CDP



Robin, Co-founder, President, and Executive Director, leads the Susan and Charles Berghoff Foundation's work to advance brain health and dementia prevention with a special focus on Lewy body disease and dementia. Robin is a Certified Dementia Practitioner and frequent guest speaker on brain health and dementia prevention. She was honored as a 2025 Woman of the Year by the California State Assembly (District 28), the US Congress (CA 19), and the County of Santa Clara. She helped establish the Sue Berghoff LBD Research Fellowship at Stanford in 2020. Her history of community service includes the City of Morgan Hill Senior Advisory Council, Morgan Hill Rotary Club, the American Association of University Women, and Leadership Morgan Hill.
