Year in Review

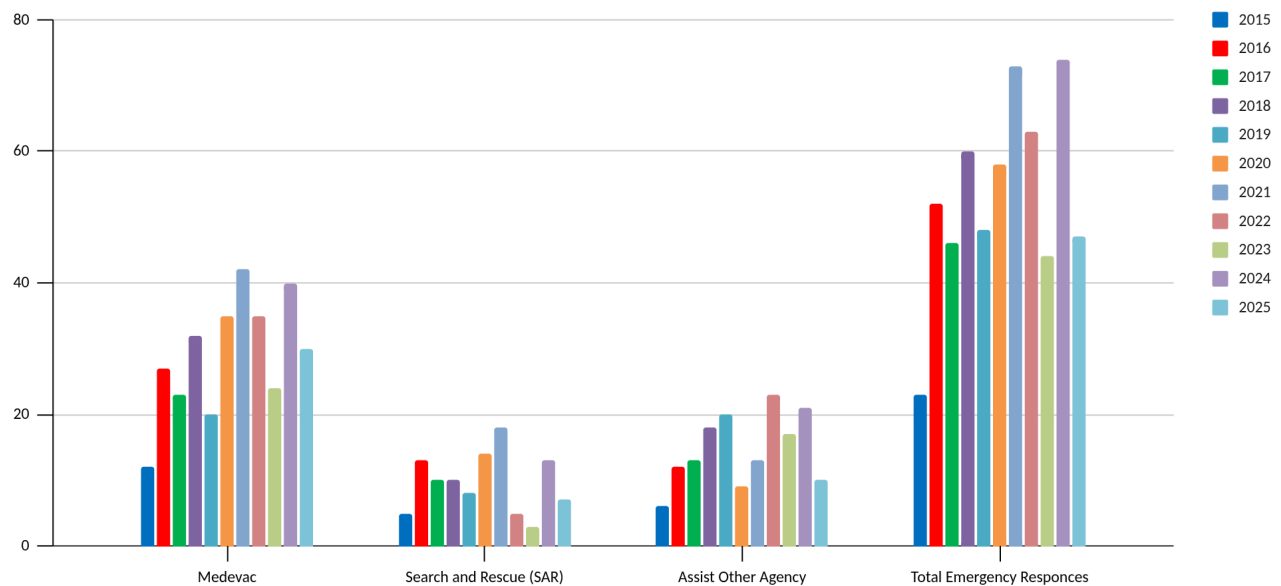
Medical Evacuations (MEDEVAC):

MEDEVAC responses continue to be an important part of MMR's mission. During the summer of 2025, MMR conducted 30 MEDEVAC missions throughout the Straits of Mackinac area. Working with the Mackinac Island Medical Center and Cheboygan EMS, we assisted in the transfer of medical and trauma patients to a higher level of care on the mainland. An integrated system of patients, physicians, nurses, EMS, and MMR staff all worked together for the most efficient and best transport for the patient. MMR received critical calls from Bois Blanc Island Fire/EMS again this summer requesting transportation to the mainland for 911

calls when flights were unavailable. In total, MMR went to Bois Blanc Island a total of 7 times for these these types of calls this season.

Search and Rescue (SAR):

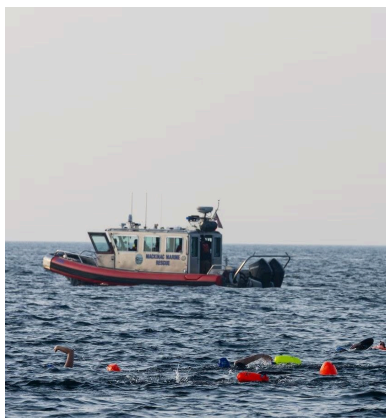
MMR responded to 7 search and rescue missions that were called into 911. The SAR missions MMR responded to this season were related to boats aground, adrift vessels, and swimmers under distress.



Assists Other Agencies:

On 10 separate occasions Mackinac Marine Rescue was called to assist other agencies during 2025. Events MMR supported: Mackinac Island's Fourth of July fireworks, Mackinac Bridge Swim, and Labor Day Bridge Walk.

MMR continued to be an asset to the community as we regularly brought returning EMS and police personnel to the island after they had escorted patients to the mainland on the last ferry boat. Thanks to this assistance, EMTs and officers served Mackinac Island for the remainder of the night. MMR has also assisted Mackinac County's 911 and Emergency Management.

Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear and High Yield Explosives Detection (CBRNE):

Mackinac Marine Rescue was initially funded by a FEMA port security grant. Part of the grant required the boat be equipped with hazardous materials screening equipment and the crew be trained in its use. MMR met these expectations with random, passive screening of vessels and docks while underway this summer. MMR acted as a PRND (Preventive Radiological Nuclear Detection) screening vessel during the Mackinac Bridge Labor Day walk and the Mackinac Bridge Swim in 2025. Being able to use the PRND equipment while underway for other missions kept our staff current on its use even with a limited number of events.

Trainings:

MMR had 40 training sessions keeping the crew educated and ready for any emergency that may be needed. MMR took advantage of every available opportunity to train and work with our new members including time with our partner, USCG Station St. Ignace. We train to the standards of our United States Coast Guard (USCG) counterparts, and this is a high bar to reach. Training can include docking, cross towing with USCG29, driver training, use of all systems onboard, and search pattern drills among other duties. In this training, we were able to deepen our relationship with the Round Island Lighthouse Preservation Society and Troop 323.

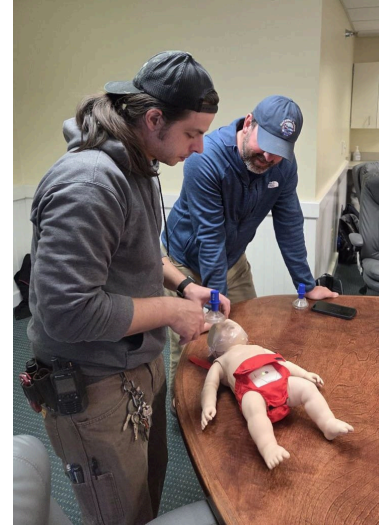

Mock Scenerio with R.I.P.S.



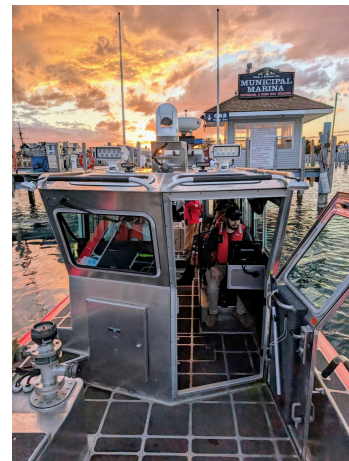
