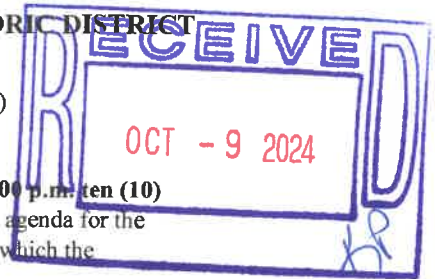

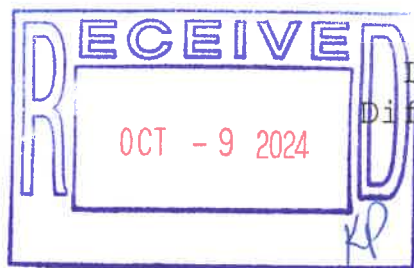

## MACKINAC ISLAND

1 Mackinac Island, or Michilimackinac,  
2 is known as "the great turtle" by the  
3 Anishinaabek (Odawa, Ojibwe, and  
4 Potawatomi). In their various creation  
5 beliefs, it is one of the places where the  
6 first people came to the earth. It is also  
7 home to various spirits and the place  
8 where the Anishinaabek laid their dead  
9 to rest. In 1670 Jesuit Father Claude  
10 Dablon became the first Frenchman to  
11 winter here. Over the next century,  
12 missionaries, fur traders, and explorers  
13 made the Straits of Mackinac the  
14 interior center of New France. Between  
15 1760 and 1815 the island played an  
16 important role in the military conflicts  
17 that involved the Anishinaabek, France,  
18 Great Britain, and the United States.  
19 The British built Fort Mackinac on the  
20 island in 1780. The United States took  
21 control in 1796. During the War of  
22 1812 the British and Anishinaabek won  
23 two battles for control of the island.

## MACKINAC ISLAND

1 After the War of 1812 Mackinac Island  
2 became a center of trade, politics, and a  
3 merging of cultures in the Great Lakes.  
4 It was the hub of John Jacob Astor's fur  
5 empire and at the crossroads of Great  
6 Lakes transportation. As fur trading  
7 declined in the 1830s, fishing continued  
8 to thrive, and such tourists as Great  
9 Britain's Anna Jameson wrote about  
10 "the little fortress, snow-white, and  
11 gleaming in the morning light." Odawa  
12 and Ojibwe villages made the island  
13 an Anishinaabe economic and social  
14 center until the 1870s. By the late  
15 nineteenth century, the fort was no  
16 longer an active military post. In 1875  
17 much of the island became the United  
18 States' second national park. In 1895  
19 the park and fort became Michigan's  
20 first state park. Tourism and summer  
21 cottages grew to dominate the economy  
22 of the island that remains home to the  
23 ancestors of the Anishinaabek.
