

E-Bikes, Motorcycles, & E-Motorcycles





E-Bikes



Class 1 & 2 E-Bikes

Pedal-assist or throttle; motor provides assistance up to 20 mph.



Class 3 E-Bike

Pedal-assist and/or throttle; maximum assisted speed of 28 mph.

Traditional Electric Motorcycles



Ordinance No. 25C-24 pertains solely to the operation and regulation of e-motorcycles.

Background

- Mercer Island has seen an increase in usage of e-motorcycles and edirt bikes, particularly among unlicensed individuals under the age of 16.
- Riders often demonstrate unsafe riding behaviors, creating a danger to themselves and others.
- The proposed ordinance would establish that operation of e-motorcycles/e-dirt bikes by unlicensed individuals under the age of 16 is unlawful in the public right-of-way.
- The proposed ordinance also prohibits <u>any</u> rider from operating an e-motorcycle/e-dirt bikes on any sidewalk, pedestrian path, and within public parks.

Current Enforcement

- Currently, MIPD will attempt to contact youth riding e-motorcycles/e-dirt bikes, call their parents, and require the parents to pick up their child and the vehicle.
- The School Resource Officer will call parents when an emotorcycle is parked at Islander Middle School or MIHS.
- MIPD reminds the parents of the dangers of these types of vehicles and informs the child and the parent of the regulations around their use.

Enforcement / Age of Riders

- There is an enforcement gap due to the age of many youth riding emotorcycles or e-dirt bikes.
- The Mercer Island Municipal Court can only process juvenile defendants if they are 16 or 17 years of age, and the offense is a traffic/driving offense.
- As many of the riders operating e-motorcycles/e-dirt bikes on the Island are 15 years or younger, their case can not be processed by the Municipal Court.
- For individuals under the age of 15, MIPD would need to refer the case to the King County Prosecutor.
- Due to high caseloads and prioritization of violent crime, it is not likely that the King County Prosecutor will pursue these types of cases.

Enforcement / Definition

- RCW 46.04.330 provides the definition of a motorcycle.
- In short, "motorcycle" means a motor vehicle designed to travel on not more than three wheels, on which the driver rides on a seat and steers the vehicle with a handlebar.
 - "Motorcycle" excludes a motorized foot scooter, an electric-assisted bicycle, and a moped.
- While this definition could be interpreted to include e-motorcycles/e-dirt bikes, the path towards enforcing these vehicles and instituting criminal penalties is not straightforward.
- It is likely that e-motorcycles/e-dirt bikes were not contemplated or in existence when these definitions were last revised.

Enforcement / Definition

- E-motorcycles/e-dirt bikes are showing up more commonly on the roads. These are not legal to be ridden on the roads, unless the owner has taken the necessary steps for the e-dirt bike to be licensed.
- They have a dirt bike style frame and have a lower power output than a traditional electric motorcycle.
- E-motorcycles/e-dirt bikes cost significantly less than a traditional electric motorcycle and are available for purchase online, often branded as e-bikes.
- E-motorcycles/e-dirt bikes are not defined in State Law and their regulation falls into a grey area between e-bikes and traditional electric motorcycles.

Enforcement / Definition



- As many jurisdictions are navigating issues with underage riders operating e-motorcycles and e-dirt bikes, an important next step would be for the WA State Legislature to adopt modern definitions that reflect the differences in these vehicles.
- Staff are currently engaging with the Association of Washington Cities and other regional partners to advocate for legislative changes to address these issues.
- These recommendations will be included in the draft 2026 Legislative Priorities presented to the City Council for consideration in November.

Public Outreach & Education

Staff have conducted a robust public outreach and education campaign that included the following items.

- E-Bike Safety webpage
- Social media posts
- Multiple features in the MI Weekly.
- An email, distributed by the Mercer Island School District
- Hosting two assemblies at Islander Middle School
- Tabling at both Summer Celebration and National Night Out





Community Reporting

- Between January 1 and August 25, 2025, the Police Department received roughly 70 calls expressing concerns about e-bikes, e-motorcycles and e-dirt bikes.
- In addition, in 2025, nearly 20 emails have been received between the Customer Service Team inbox and the Council inbox in inquiring about regulations and reporting unsafe behaviors.



Community Reporting

- Staff encourages community members witnessing unsafe and illegal behaviors involving e-bikes, emotorcycles, and e-dirt bikes to call 911 to report the incident immediately.
- Calling 911 is the fastest way to deploy law enforcement to an incident and stop these behaviors as they are happening.





The proposed ordinance would make the following changes to Title 10 MICC:

- Adopts a definition for electric motorcycles. E-dirt bikes fall under the definition of e-motorcycles.
- Prohibits the operation of an e-motorcycle by any person under the age of 16 or any person who does not have a valid driver's license with a motorcycle endorsement.
- Prohibits the operation of any e-motorcycle that is not registered and does not display a valid license plate.
- Prohibits the operation of e-motorcycles on any sidewalk, pedestrian path, and within public parks.
- Establishes the ability for MIPD to impound an e-motorcycle.

Violations of the regulations, established under the proposed ordinance, are civil infractions, subject to the following penalties.

- First offense: \$250
- Second offense: \$500
- Third and subsequent offenses: \$750 and possible referral for criminal citation under RCW 46.20.005 Driving without a license

E-Motorcycles / E-Dirt Bikes

Ordinance No. 25C-24 proposes the following definition...

10.04.170 – Electric motorcycle


Electric motorcycle means a motorcycle, as defined by RCW 46.04.330, which is powered solely by electricity and:

- Is not equipped with fully operable pedals capable of propelling it. Foot pegs are not considered pedals;
- 2. Has a motor with a power output that exceeds 750 watts; or is capable of traveling over 28 mph with motor assistance.

- While the proposed ordinance does not fully address the enforcement issues, the code amendments provide MIPD with a tool to assist with reducing the number of emotorcycles/e-dirt bikes being operated unlawfully on Mercer Island and assigns a monetary penalty.
- Impoundment and retrieval, as well as the civil infractions, serve as educational mechanisms to alert parents and riders of the dangers of these vehicles.



Next Steps



Enforcement & Impoundment

- If adopted, the ordinance will go into effect on January 1, 2026.
- Staff will use this time to establish the process for impoundment of e-motorcycles/e-dirt bikes and make any changes needed to facilitate this process.
- This work may include amending Chapter 10.22 MICC Impounding and the City's Fee Schedule to establish set fees for impoundment.
- Staff will also determine where impounded emotorcycles/e-dirt bikes will be stored, as well as the process to retrieve an impounded vehicle.

Anticipated Additional Regulatory Actions

- As this issue continues to develop, staff will update the regulations to meet emerging needs and provide reports on the effectiveness of established regulations.
- Staff will return to the City Council with a separate ordinance to establish regulations for e-bikes.
- Staff are evaluating a parental responsibility clause that would shift the burden of a violation from the minor who committed the act to their parent, guardian, or the owner of the e-motorcycle.

Communications

- Staff will continue the comprehensive outreach campaign and will update the community upon passage of this ordinance.
- This campaign will include:
 - Coordination with the Mercer Island School District
 - Outreach to parents
 - Updates to the existing E-Bike Safety webpage
 - Social media posts
 - Communications in the MI Weekly

- We requested legislative assistance last year in requiring manufacturers to label e-bikes based on their classification and to restrict the sale of e-motorcycles/edirt bikes.
- Unfortunately, our request did not gain traction with the legislature, and we seemed to be the lone voice on the topic.
- Recently, many other cities are requesting assistance from the State as the problems have worsened.

- During an AWC 2026 session planning call in August, Mercer Island staff initiated a conversation on emotorcycles/e-dirt bikes, and many cities spoke up in support.
- There was clear support for this matter to be elevated as a legislative priority for AWC.
- City staff held a follow up call with AWC policy analysts to share our research of the problem and to coordinate possible legislative tools. This engagement with AWC is ongoing.

- Getting a bill through the legislature often take multiple years and often requires several smaller bills that build on each other.
- Staff have determined the best place to start is an updated/modern definition of e-motorcycles/e-dirt bikes.
- This will be staff's recommendation as a key goal for the 2026 Legislative Session.

- City staff will work with AWC and legislators to see if there is potential for additional state action.
 - We are interested in state support on differentiating traditional electric motorcycles (e.g. Harley Davidson) vs e-motorcycles/e-dirt bikes.
 - We are also interested in state policy on e-bikes, including requirements on labeling and education on classification at point of of sale. It is clear the consumer does not always know what they are buying.
- It is likely additional state regulations around e-bikes will be more controversial than state regulations on e-motorcycles/e-dirt bikes and may require multiple legislative sessions to build consensus.
